

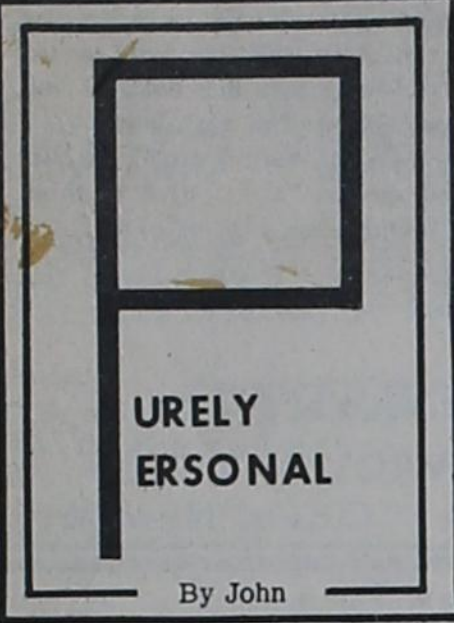

Well, well. All I know is what I read in the papers. But by reading the Monday, Jan. 22, issue of the Lubbock Avalanche Journal I find that being a high-placed politician certainly does not hinder a person from obtaining a bank loan.

It seems that the Texas House Speaker Gus Mutscher obtained a rather large bank loan, at least for us common folk, with a minimum of security. Upon being quizzed by a SEC investigator, the bank official who granted the loan gave these cogent and revealing reasons: "First of all he was in public office. He was a prominent political figure. He was a friend of Mr. (Frank W.) Sharp's. And under circumstances like this, discretion is the better part of valor."

This, neighbor, is why you will seldom see a poor politician. We do not know if any laws were broken in this instance, evidently not, but it surely indicates that the man and his office are hard to separate. Therefore, it would behoove a politico with any degree of sensitivity to see that his financial dealings were always covered with an excess of collateral rather than a questionable minimum. Like Caesar's wife, they should be above suspicion. We have always had an admiration for Mutscher-- look at the wife he snagged-- but right now we do feel that he needs to relinquish his official duties until a thorough airing of the brewing Texas scandal is made.

If there is one thing we need in this country, it is public officials who can and do feel the same economic pinch that the millions of faceless voters feel. They can't feel the common man's pinch when vast monetary sums are thrown their way. I, too, might not feel so bad about a tax raise if I could count on hundreds of thousands of dollars being thrown my way, just for the picking. We can never have responsible government in this day of big deficits and big doles until the parties responsible for them are made to feel the day-by-day struggle to make a living that you and I feel.

There are a lot of our other high state officers who are coming under a cloud in this deal. But we are sure that the dailies are keeping everybody informed and our few remarks are intended in the whole rather than in the individual. So do not feel bad if we have picked on Gus and left Ben or Preston out. It looks like many a reputation will be tarnished before the whole story is laid bare. Texas may have to look for a new set of leaders by the next election.

We are the recipients of many government releases and news items by many advertising agencies as well as publicity hungry public officials. Many of these releases, from Texas and New Mexico, have been about the meeting of their legislatures and the problems that will beset them in the next two months or so. While there are many points of similarity between the two states and their legislative problems, there is one big, massive and startling difference.

All Texas information concerning their upcoming session is about ways to fund an anticipated half a billion dollar deficit. Nowhere is economy even remotely hinted at; only how to wring more money from the public pelf. How different in New Mexico where their legislature is faced with the pleasant prospect of how to best spend a fourteen million dollar general fund SURPLUS. Somehow there must be a moral in this for the Texans. It is difficult to see how any governmental body could wind up with a surplus in these spend-thrift days. Surely somebody, someplace in New Mexico deserves a great public accolade for this feat of public economy.

We suspect that Governor Cargo, who just finished a four-year stint as the New Mexico Chief of State, should be given some credit for this uncommonly rare state of state finance. This also speaks well of the legislators from New Mexico in their performance of their duties.

Possibly if our Texas state officials had been more concerned with state business and less with life insurance stocks the public weal would have been better served.

# Texico Election Set For Next Monday

Registered voters of the Texico Municipal School District will go to the polls Tuesday, Feb. 2, to select one school board member and to vote on

whether or not Texico will become a part of the proposed High Plains Area Vocational School. Votes will be cast at the City Hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

David Turner, incumbent whose term is expiring on the school board, has filed for reelection and is the only person running for the board.

In voting on the vocational school proposal, it is pointed out that only registered voters who live in the district may vote. Citizens will be asked whether or not a levy shall be placed upon the district for the support of the school. If the Texico voters agree to help support the multi-county school, persons from Texico who attend the school would pay a lower tuition cost than those from outside of the district.

If the proposition is defeated, Texico students may still attend the school; however, their fees would be the same as those from an outside district.

High Plains Area Vocational School is a branch of Eastern New Mexico University and will serve the counties of Curry, De Baca, Quay and Roosevelt. Proposed location of the facility will be between Clovis and Texico.

## Rabies Vaccine Clinic Set For Cities

According to a schedule released by the Curry County Health Department concerning a series of rabies vaccine clinics in the area, a veterinarian will be at Farwell City Hall on February 19 starting at 3 p.m. CST to administer the rabies vaccine to pets in the Texico-Farwell area.

The vaccine will also be given all day at the following locations in Clovis: Clovis Veterinary Hospital, 2210 West 7th, February 20 and 27; and at Northridge Animal Hospital, 2910 Prince, February 27.

The health department reports that New Mexico had 19 positive rabies laboratory reports during the past year; therefore, all persons are urged to have their pets vaccinated.

The following information about this disease is outlined by the Curry County Health Department to inform pet owners of its dangers:

Rabies is a viral disease of warm-blooded animals. Rabies virus entering a wound is ordinarily a pre-requisite to infection. Most cases of rabies occur as the result of virus-laden saliva entering a wound caused by the bite of a rabid animal. Infection can also occur when infected saliva comes into contact with preexisting open wounds.

Rabies is a fatal disease. No human has been known to recover from the disease once clinical symptoms have begun. However, the disease can be prevented if rabies vaccine is administered at the proper time.

There is not much that can be done to eradicate wildlife rabies, but domestic animal rabies can be avoided and the chance of human infection diminished if certain precautions are taken.

This is what you can do:

1. Have all domestic animals such as cats and dogs, three months of age or older, vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian.
2. Domestic animals should not be allowed to run at large. They should be penned up or kept on a leash at all times.
3. Report all animal bites immediately whether from a wild or domestic animal to the local health department.
4. Do not kill any animal which has bitten anyone. The animal should be captured and observed. Killing the animal may reduce the chances of the

infection.

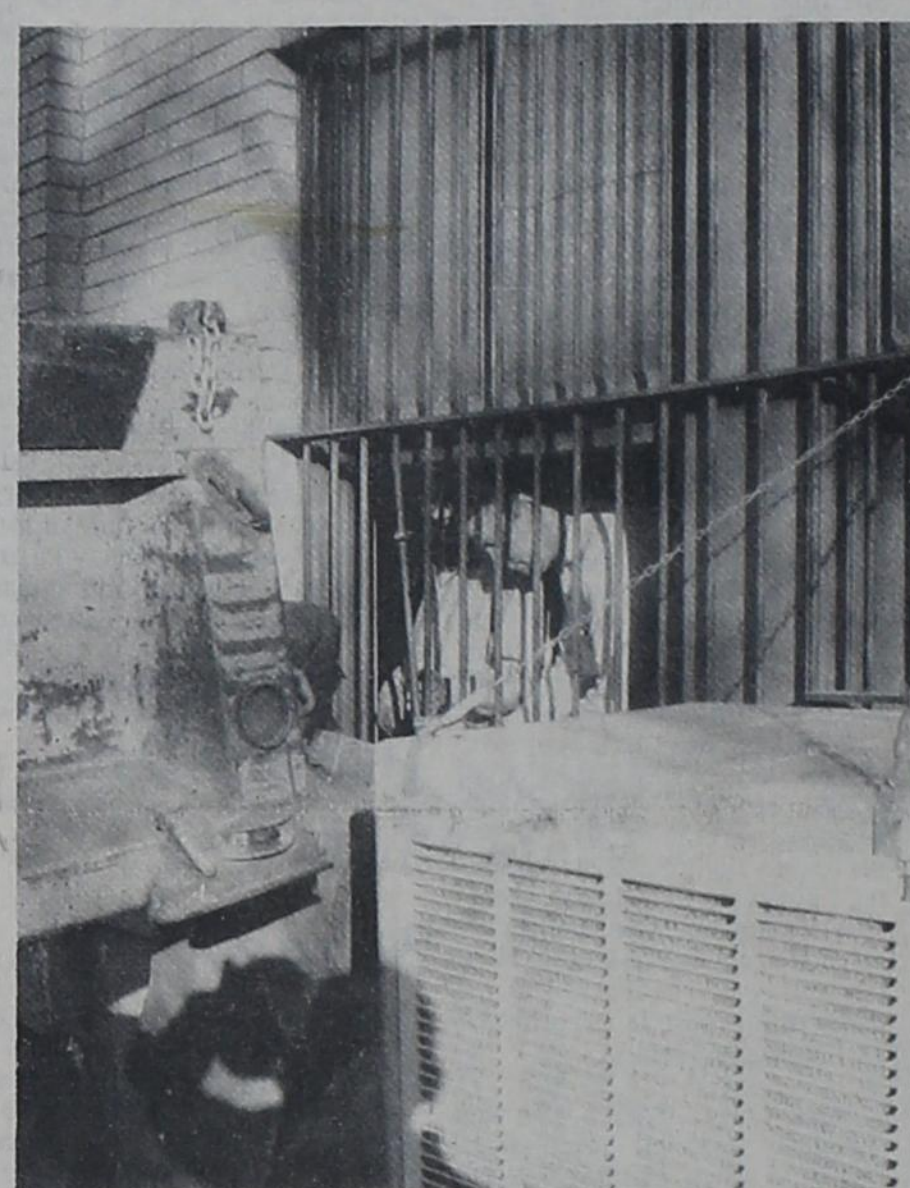

# County Cash Income Increase Projected

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Farmer County should be more than \$86,000,000 by the end of 1976, according to Mack Heald, county agricultural agent.

This will be an increase of more than \$22,000,000 from 1968-69 figures, with grain sorghum and fed beef contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on

studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3.76 in '76" program, a statewide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than one billion dollars.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural enterprises in Farmer County are presently about \$69,000,000 says Heald.

The most important ones are grain sorghum, fed beef, and stocker cattle. They are expected to account for about 80 per cent of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Panhandle Economic Program.

The projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee; af-

ter separate predictions were made by Extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Farmer County producers will have access to production information and techniques that can help spell success for the Texas goal of \$3.76 billion in 1976," says Heald.

## Local Man's Father Dies In Crosbyton

Funeral services were conducted Saturday, Jan. 23, in Crosbyton, Tex., for Cecil W. Berry, 63, Crosby County Judge who died Thursday in the Crosbyton Hospital. He was the father of Jim Berry of Farwell.

Rev. Leonard Sims of the Pansy Baptist Church officiated at the services at First Baptist Church of Crosbyton and was assisted by Rev. Ernest Stewart of the Crosbyton Baptist Church and Rev. Jim Ransom of the McAdoo Baptist Church. Burial was in the Crosbyton Cemetery with arrangements by King Funeral Home of Crosbyton.

Mr. Berry, who was born in Whitney, Tex., had been a resident of Crosby County since

1926. He had served three terms as county commissioner from precinct two and had been county judge for 16 years. He was re-elected to a four-year term in 1970.

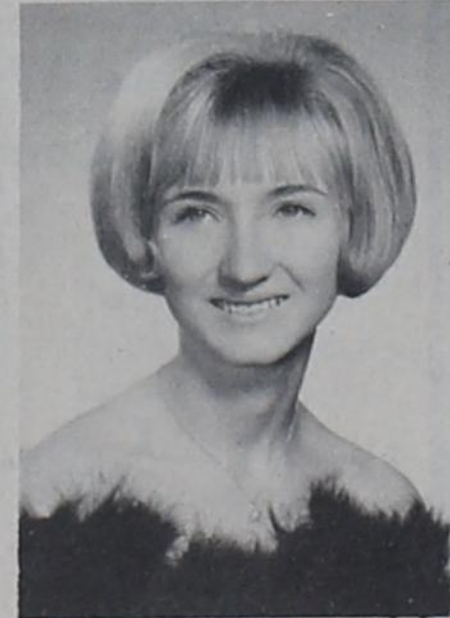

laboratory demonstrating rabies by as much as 50 per cent.  
 5. If your animal has bitten someone it must be placed under observation for 10 days.  
 6. If your animal has been bitten by another animal suspected or known to have rabies, contact the local health department immediately.  
 7. Contact the local health department of any animal, whether wild or domestic, which behaves suspiciously or dies for some unexplained reason.

Terry Yell was named to the first all-tournament aggregation and Ricky Pace and Monty Lambert were listed on the second all-tournament team.

Texico was defeated 46-38 by Dora in the final game of the meet Saturday to determine the champion. Texico led at halftime 18-17, but Dora came back in the third quarter with an 18-point effort while the Wolves only managed 12. Dora added 11 points in the final stanza to ice the game.

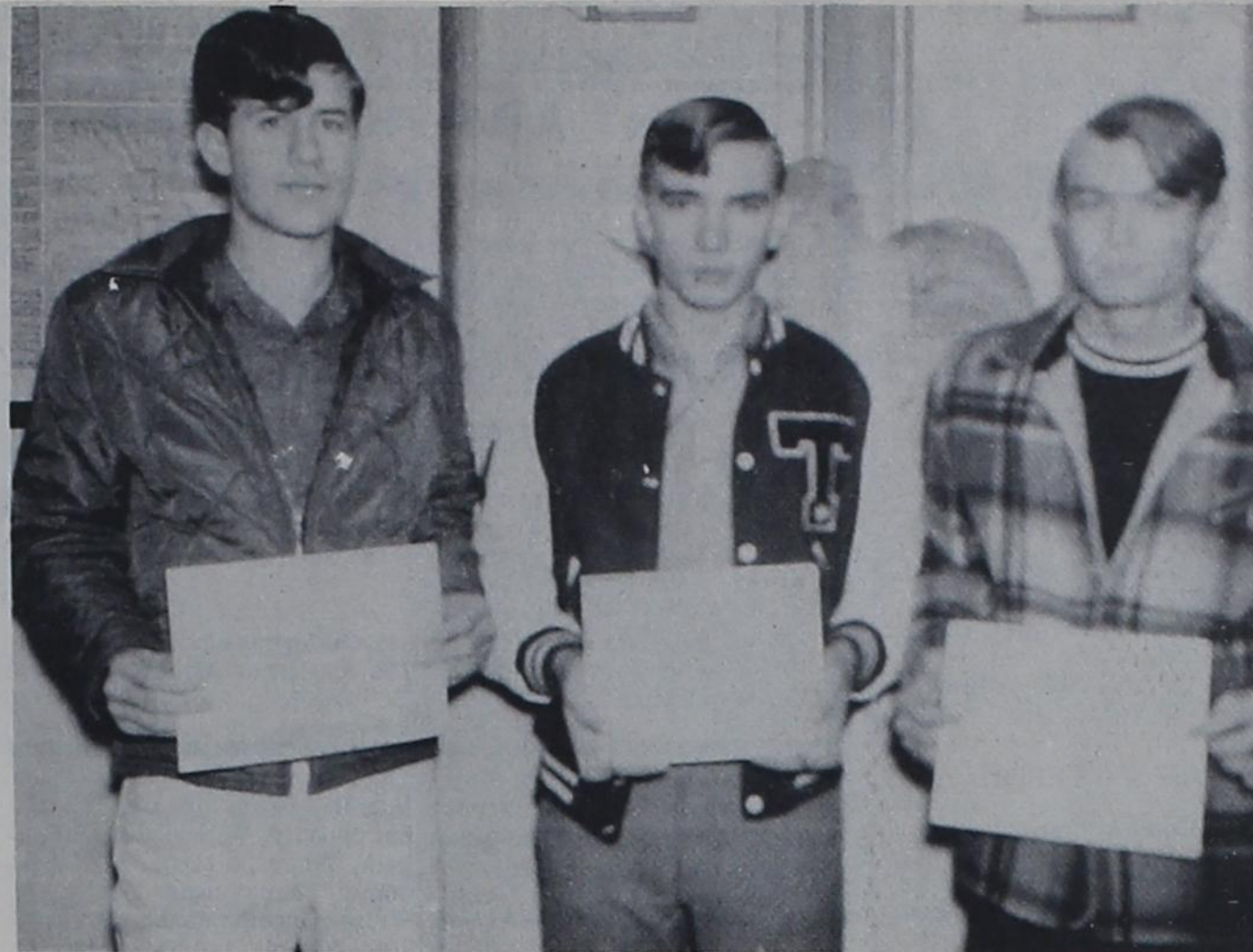

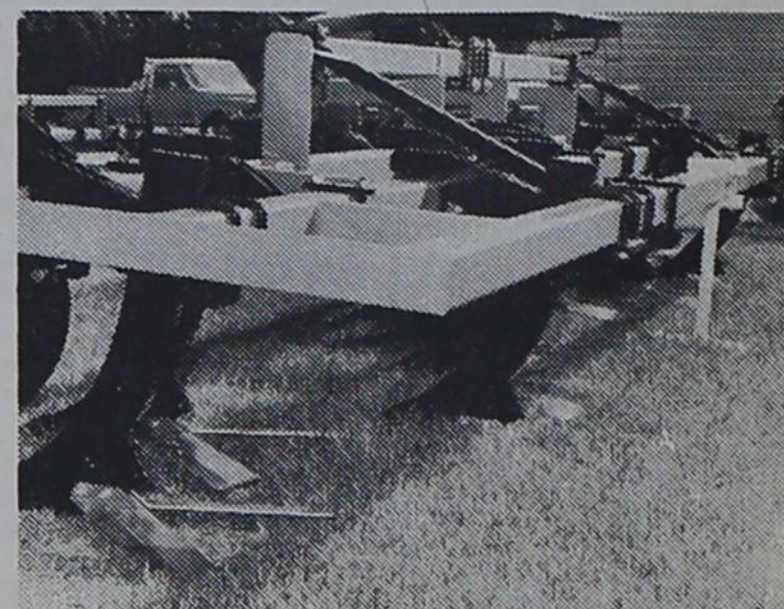

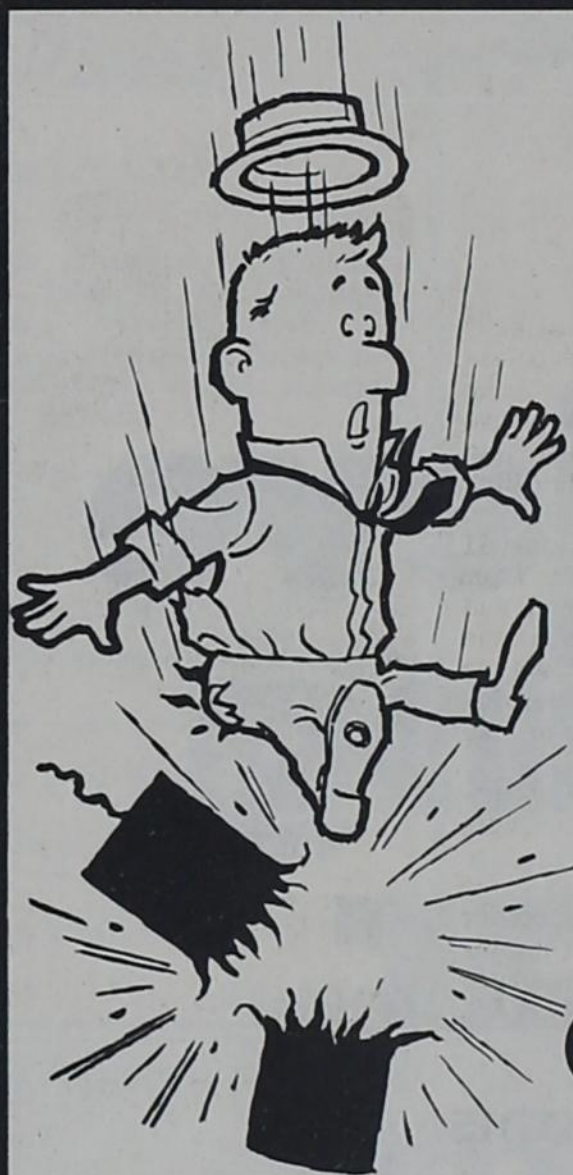

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**"THE REVELATION OF JESUS CHRIST"**

The last great book of the Bible opens with the words: "THE REVELATION OF JESUS CHRIST." and from these words it derives its title: "THE REVELATION." In this book St. John deals largely with the return of Christ in glory to judge and reign.

II Thes. 1:7,8 tells us that one day "THE LORD JESUS SHALL BE REVEALED FROM HEAVEN. . . in flaming fire taking vengeance on them that . . . obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ." This is what the book of the Revelation deals with.

But this phraseology is also used in Paul's epistles, for in Gal. 1:11,12 he says:

"I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of [by] me is not after man, for I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by THE REVELATION OF JESUS CHRIST."

Surely this is not the same "revelation of Jesus Christ" of which John wrote. St. Paul refers not to "the revelation of Jesus Christ" in glory, but to "the revelation of Jesus Christ" in grace while He delays the judgment, not

His revelation to the world in person, but His revelation to and through Paul the chief of sinners, saved by grace.

In Verses 15,16 of Gal. 1, the apostle says: ". . . it pleased God . . . TO REVEAL HIS SON IN ME." What a revelation of grace to a sin-cursed world. God saved Saul, His blaspheming enemy! He tells about it in I Tim. 1:13-16, where he says: "I was a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious . . . Howbeit, FOR THIS CAUSE I OBTAINED MERCY, THAT IN ME FIRST JESUS CHRIST MIGHT SHOW FORTH ALL LONGSUFFERING, FOR A PATTERN TO THEM WHICH SHOULD HEREAFTER BELIEVE ON HIM TO LIFE EVERLASTING."

This is why Paul says: ". . . it pleased God . . . TO REVEAL HIS SON IN ME." By saving the chief of sinners (as Paul calls himself in I Tim. 1:15) God would show us that HE is willing to save any sinner. "FOR WHOSOEVER SHALL CALL UPON THE NAME OF THE LORD SHALL BE SAVED" (Rom. 10:13).
