## Football Training Machine Developed By Local Man

A local welder, Harry Sheets of Farwell, in recent years has developed a football training apparatus which is similar to

the old conventional blocking sled. Associated with Sheets in the business is E. J. Holub, center for the Kansas City Chiefs, who used the Monster Man machine in their training program.

The Monster Man, a reaction machine simulating actual body contact, is spring operated and the initial opening shock is cushioned by recoil springs.

Holub says that the unique thing about this machine is that the dummies fire out in a realistic movement from 18-20 inches on command of the coach, giving a player a reaction more nearly like that he would receive in a game situation.

The machine teaches the player to move with the movement of the ball and the dummies since it is equipped with

football snapper which is coordinated with the release lever. All the dummies can be released simultaneously by the coach, but each player must engage his own dummy back individually or it will show he is reacting improperly.

Proponents of the machine say it is ideal for developing quickness, power and proper stance for overpowering the opposing player and is considered the best machine available for developing agility, mobility, strength and confidence in the individual player. All its techniques are designed to reflect a realistic game situation to

teach a player to move and explode quicker, to keep his head up and his back flat when extending in an explosive manner and teaches timing to both offensive and defensive players. Holub says he believes it is the best training machine he has ever used and hopes that many high schools will try them in their football training program.

Sheets and Holub are in the process of organizing a company to manufacture and distribute the "Monster Man" reaction-charging machine. They intend to fill orders for the machine in time for this fall's football programs.

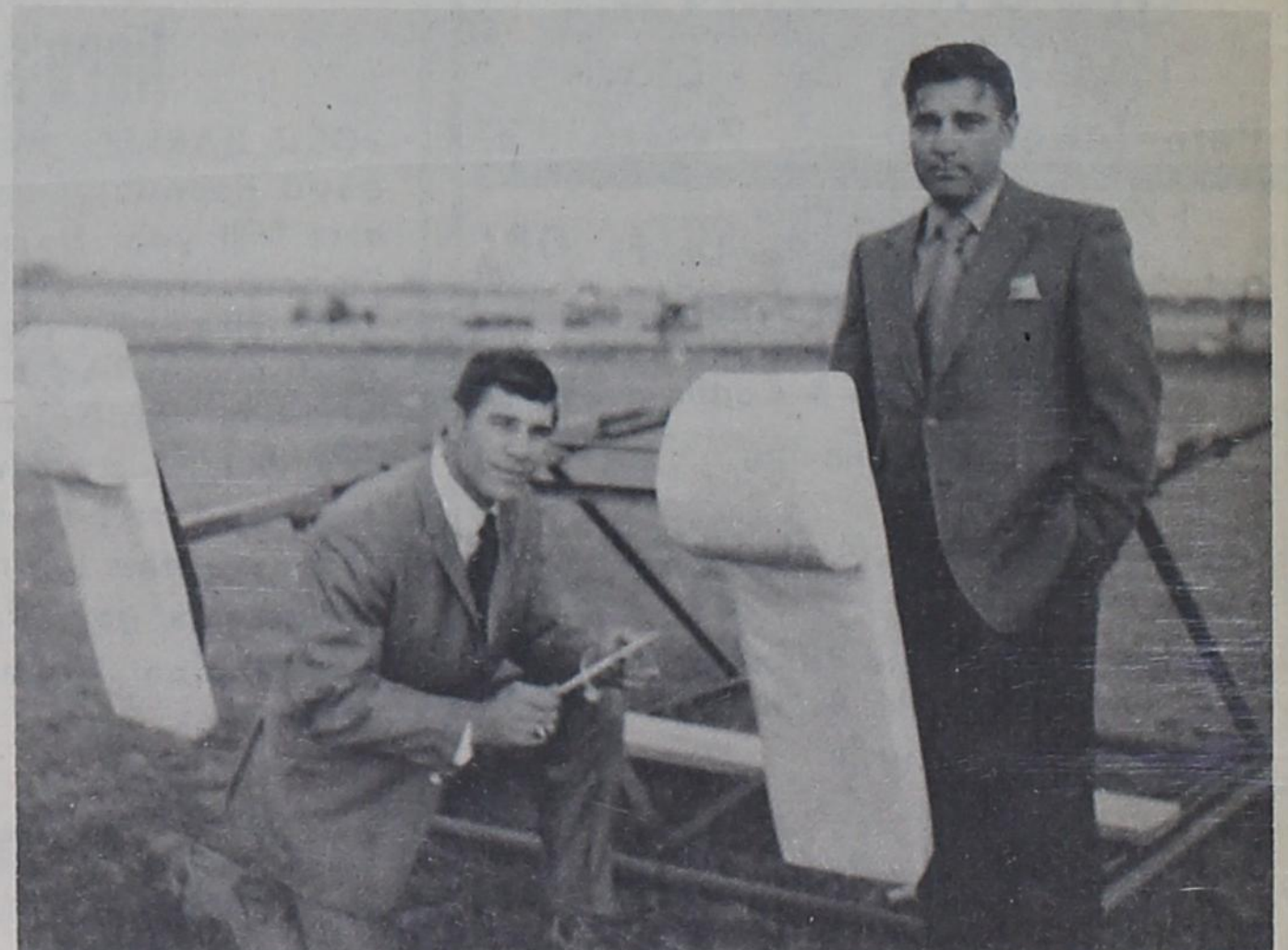
Dubbed the "Good Luck Tournament," invitations have been mailed and Association members have been busy working on favors and other decorations to carry out the "lucky" theme.

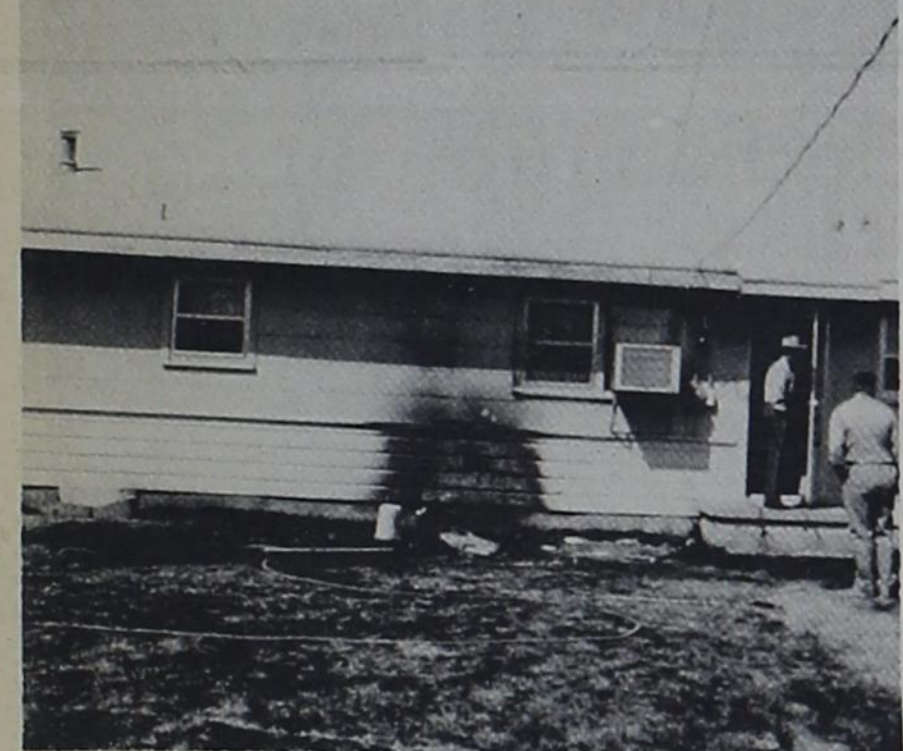



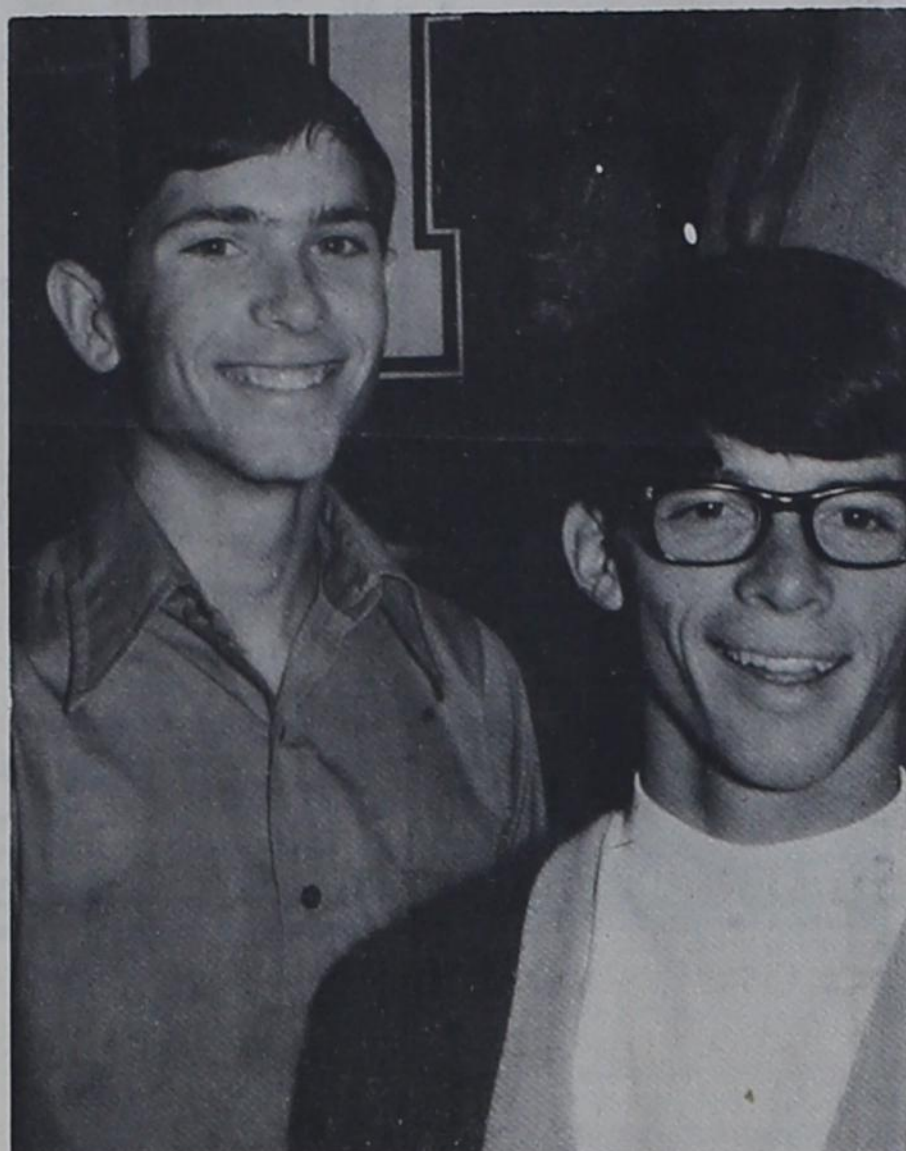

**HAM IT UP THIS EASTER:** Serve a traditional ham and egg breakfast after early morning church service or before an Easter egg hunt, advises Miss Louise Garret, leading extension nutrition specialist, who suggests you decorate your dining table with lots of colorful eggs and Easter bunnies.

A hearty breakfast takes the pressure off your preparations for the dinner meal, the specialist explains. She gives these tips for Easter eating:

Plan to serve lamb, ham, beef or turkey for your main course. But whichever you choose, serve it up with plenty of garnish.

For the dinner's first course serve a chilled fruit juice. A combination of pineapple, orange and lemon juice could be mixed ahead of time and placed in the refrigerator ready to serve. Add a scoop of sherbet for this special occasion.

Spiced crabapples are quick and easy to serve. Or peach halves can be stuffed with mint jelly to go with lamb or pears with cranberry sauce for ham.

Plan to use mashed squash in place of mashed potatoes with ham and roast, and parsley potatoes with lamb. For a green vegetable, take your pick of asparagus, broccoli, peas or green beans. Feature a bouquet of colorful, crisp vegetable relishes. To prepare a raw vegetable bouquet, attach

radish "tulips," cauliflower "narcissus," and carrot curl "jonquils" to celery or green pepper stems with toothpicks. Put the vegetables in a bowl of crushed ice to keep the bouquet crisp and attractive.

If you prefer serving a tossed green salad, use the carrot curls, radishes and cauliflower to garnish your salad.

Serve a melange of colorful fresh and frozen fruits for dessert.

The fruit should be served very cold with a small scoop of lemon or orange sherbet. Decorated Easter cookies or cake could be served with the fruit.

**Old Timer's Chicken Stew**  
Everyone yearns sometimes for chicken the way Grandma made it. It was stewed chicken and vegetables, the broth thickened slightly with corn starch, served over rice in soup bowls.

**Chicken Grandmere**  
2 fryers, cut in serving pieces  
2 cups sliced celery  
3/4 cup parsley sprigs  
2 medium onions, sliced  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
2 teaspoons salt  
1 bay leaf  
1/4 teaspoon thyme leaves  
6 tablespoons corn starch

Place chicken in kettle; cover with about 6 cups water. Add celery, parsley, onions, bouillon cube, salt, bay leaf and thyme.

Cover; bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer until chicken is tender. Remove chicken. Strain broth. (There should be about 6 cups.) Return 5 cups to kettle. Mix 1 cup broth with corn starch. Stir into broth in kettle. Bring to boil, stirring constantly and boil 1 minute. Add chicken and heat. Makes 8 servings.
