To Conduct Study - -

Improvements For Local TV Cable Due

Prospects for improved Cable TV reception brightened for Texico-Farwell viewers following a Tuesday morning conference between representatives of Midwest Video Corp. and persons representing subscribers in Texico-Farwell.

According to G. R. Morrell, president of Midwest Video, operators of the local system will study the possibility of directing two Amarillo stations into the local receiving tower by microwave.

At the present time all of the local stations are picked up out of the air by direct transmission from the Amarillo or Lubbock sending stations. Due to the remoteness of this area from those stations the local signal is weak and gives a poorer quality picture than

receivers closer to the transmitting source.

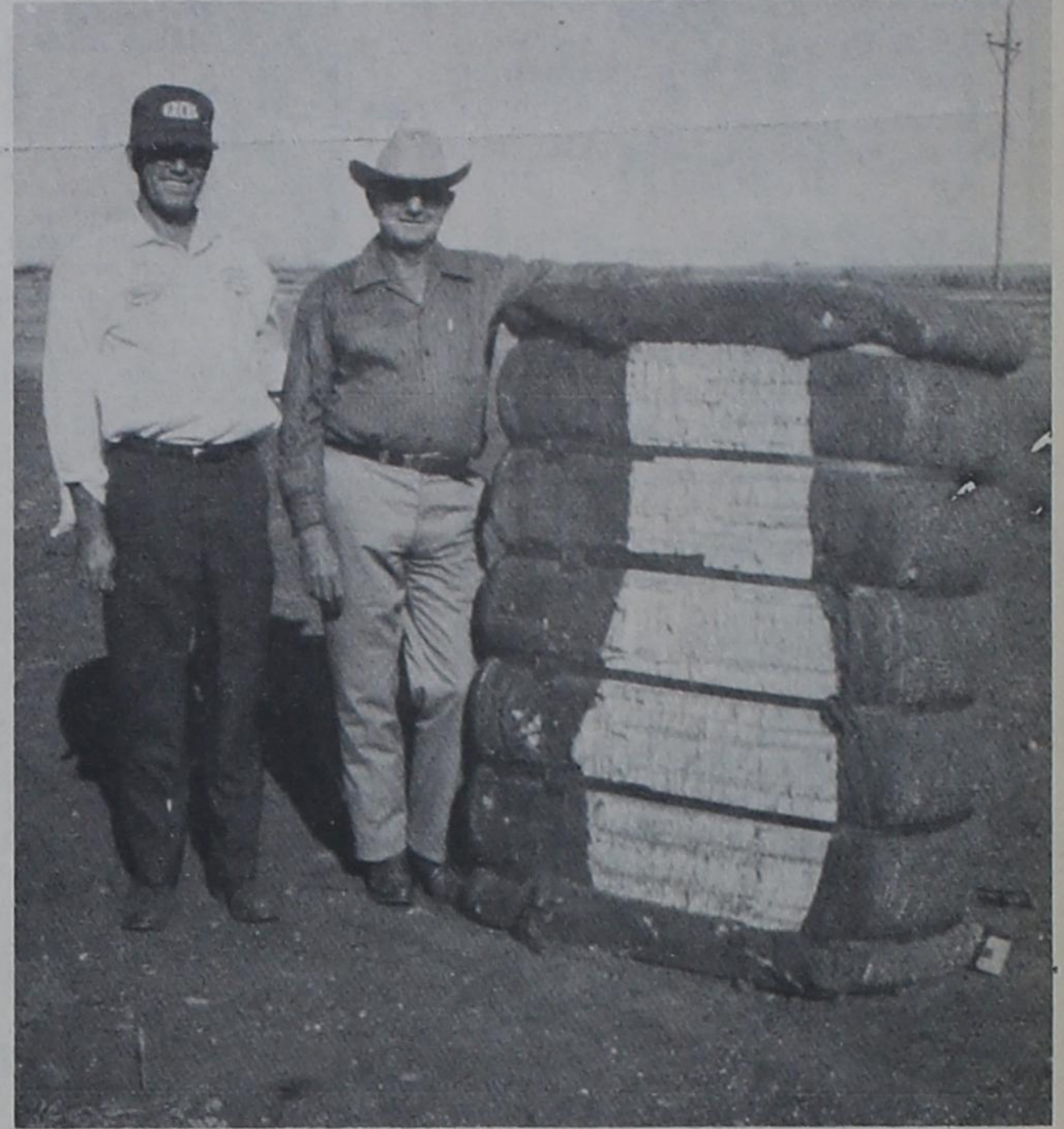
Midwest Video maintains a receiving station approximately seven miles north of Friona where it picks up the Amarillo stations and then microwaves them to the Midwest tower in Clovis for distribution over the Clovis system. An attempt will be made to direct those stations to Farwell by microwave and thereby improve the picture quality for distribution over the local system.

According to Morrell, it will be impossible, at least any time in the foreseeable future, to connect the Texico-Farwell system to the Clovis system. One big obstacle is the position of the Federal Communications Commission which limits this area to the five channels it is presently receiving. Also mentioned was the fact that nearly \$75,000 additional cost to the company would be required for the hookup.

Company records show that there are just over 400 cable hookups in the system here and that the potential is for only several hundred additional. At the maximum figure of hookups, it would be at least 10 years before the company could expect to recover its investment, and this was thought to be too long a period.

At the conclusion of the meeting Tuesday, the company agreed to examine the possibility of the microwave system from north of Friona and to look at the present monthly fees charged for the service.

Representing Midwest were Morrell, company president from Little Rock, Ark.; Lynell Skarda, Clovis attorney for the company; and George Doerr, company manager for Clovis and Texico-Farwell.

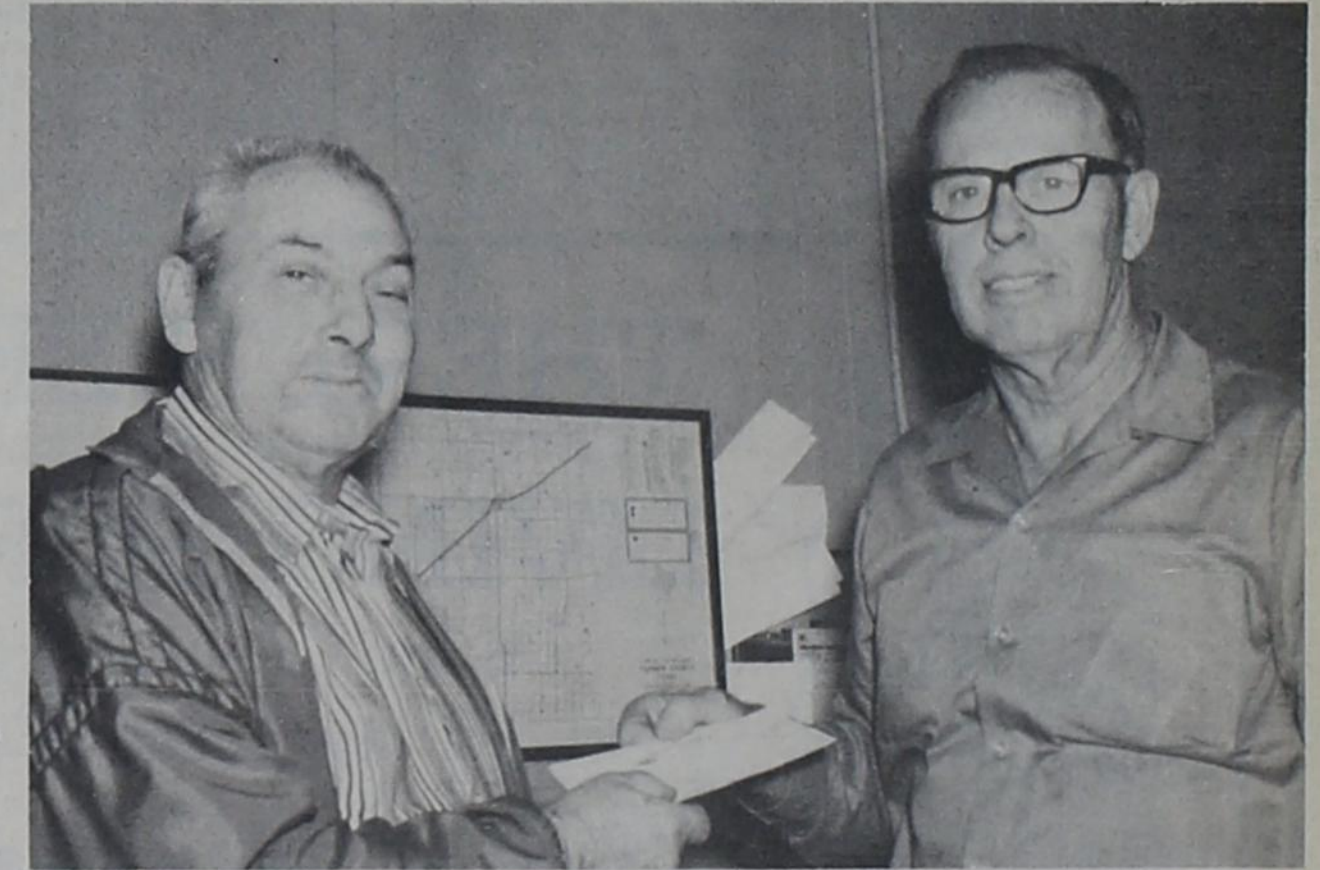

Lazbuddie - Matador Tilt Ends In 30-30 Deadlock

Quarterback Ricky Seaton led the Longhorns in their bid to defeat the Matadors Friday night, but the final score indicated a tie.

With Seaton at the helm, the Longhorns managed to score one touchdown in each quarter. The Matadors picked up two scores in the second quarter and one in the first to lead,

22-12 at the half.

Seaton made a 10-yard run in the first quarter for the Longhorn's initial TD. In the second quarter, he returned a kick-off for 73 yards. Both PAT tries were unsuccessful.

Matador got its first touchdown and extra points in the first quarter of play. They speeded up the scoring in the second for two TDs. The first TD in the second quarter came on a run from four yards out. The second PAT try added two more points to give them a total of 16. After another second quarter TD on a five-yard run, the Matadors led 22-12. The PAT following the final second quarter TD was no good.

Lazbuddie came back in the third quarter for another Longhorn touchdown with Seaton crossing the goal line from 10 yards out. They tacked on two more TDs in the fourth quarter to bring their score to 30. None of their PAT tries were successful.

The first TD in the fourth quarter was made on a five-yard run by Seaton and the final TD was scored when Seaton took the pigskin in from 18 yards out.

The Matadors failed to score in the third quarter of play, but added their final TD in the fourth quarter on a 20-yard run. The PAT was good, bringing the Matadors their 30 points.

Coach Allen Harman said he wasn't disappointed in the performance of the Longhorns. "I thought the kids gave a good effort," he said.

"Besides the great job by Seaton, Jerry Barber, wing-back, made 96 yards rushing. He did a fine job of running the ball," he commented.

"Defensively, the linebackers and linemen did a respectable job. Offensively, our line did a good job of blocking," he added.

Lazbuddie Longhorns will be in Sundown tonight (Friday) at 7:30 o'clock for their final district clash and last game of the season.

Harman said the Rough-necks have a good ball club. "They've lost only one game. That was when Happy beat them last week. If they get a win from us, they'll be tied for district, so they'll be up for the game," he commented.

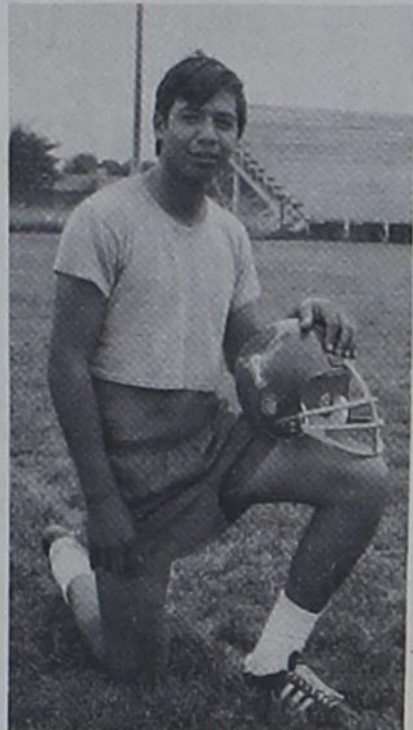

Farwell seventh and eighth grade Yearlings and Farwell Junior Varsity teams finished their football seasons Thursday, Nov. 9, with games against Sudan at Steer Stadium.

Farwell seventh grade Yearlings conquered Sudan 8-0 in the only Farwell win of the night. Russ Jones scored the only Yearling touchdown in the second quarter of play on a 15-yard run. The try for extra points was no good.

In the last two minutes of the game, Carlos Lucio tackled a Sudan runner in the endzone for a safety, giving the Yearlings a total of eight points.

"The whole team deserves to be Yearlings of the Week this week," said Coach Larry McDorman. "They've done a good job throughout the year and I'm very proud of them," he added. The Yearlings finished with a 6-1-2 record for the season.

Farwell eighth grade Yearlings' bid for district is still up in the air after their 6-0 defeat to Sudan, according to Coach

Jerry Dee Owen. The Yearlings are half a game out of first for the district title. Sudan and Kress will play this week and the outcome will determine who wins first. If Kress beats or ties Sudan, says Coach Owen, the Yearlings will win district.

Steers Stung By One Point In Sudan Hornets' Nest

There wasn't a dull moment from the opening kickoff to the final one second. Even though we suffered the 27-26 loss, it was a mental victory for the Steer team and supporters. Even though the Steers were busier than the bees, Sudan had 410 total yards to Farwell's 296. As things looked hopeless for the Steers in the final 29 seconds, Ray Norton had something planned that will go down in history. Keep reading for the full exciting game.

The fired-up and ready-to-go Steers kicked off to the Hornets to start the thrilling ballgame into motion. The kick was booted into the endzone and Sudan started offensive play on their own 20-yard line. After traveling 59 yards, the mighty Steer defense forced them to punt.

The Steers were only able to complete three plays until they fumbled. The ball jumped from player to player trying to decide where to go until finally a Hornet was in possession for Sudan to take over on Farwell's 17-yard line. Mark Hanna took the ball those 17 yards for a Sudan touchdown. The Hornets ran the ball over for two extra points after touchdown, giving them an 8-0 lead with 7:34 remaining in the first period.

Ray Norton took the Sudan kick on the five and ran 40 yards where the Steers started offensive play. Again the Steers completed only three plays when the ball was fumbled. The Hornets took possession once again on their 38-yard line.

The Steers allowed Sudan to have only three plays until the ball was jarred loose and the Steers took over on the Farwell 48. It took Farwell only five plays to travel 52 yards for a TD. Norton took the ball over from one yard out for the six points. The pass for points

after touchdown was caught by Doug Johnston, but was ruled incomplete by the referee, saying the reception was made out of the endzone. The score stood 8-6 with 2:25 remaining in the first period.

After a series of punts, the Steers were able to hang on to the ball for three plays going 35 yards. Mike Woods ran the ball 13 yards for Farwell's second TD bringing the Steers into the lead 12-8. The try for extra points failed.

During the remainder of the second period, each team lost the ball three times, with forced punts, fumbles and intercepted passes. The first half ended with the Steers in the lead, 12-8.

The Farwell High School Marching Band displayed a fine performance during half-time to conclude the Band's football season. The Band has worked long and hard to perform at halftime and also for the contest in Lubbock which was attended Tuesday, Nov. 14. Following the Steer kickoff, each team exchanged punts. When Sudan was able to hang on to the ball, they decided they needed more points. Gary Edwards carried the ball eight yards for a TD for Sudan. The extra point try failed and Farwell kept the lead 20-14

with 2:27 remaining in the third period.

Then came the wild and woolly fourth period. Sudan had possession of the ball and kept it for 15 plays. They had advanced to the Steer 5-yard line when destruction hit them. They lost 20 yards in penalties and Farwell took back possession of the ball. What a break!

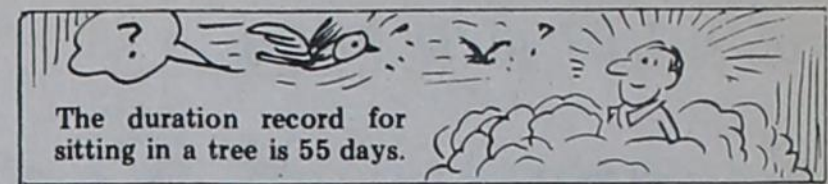
Winfred Long for their offensive play.

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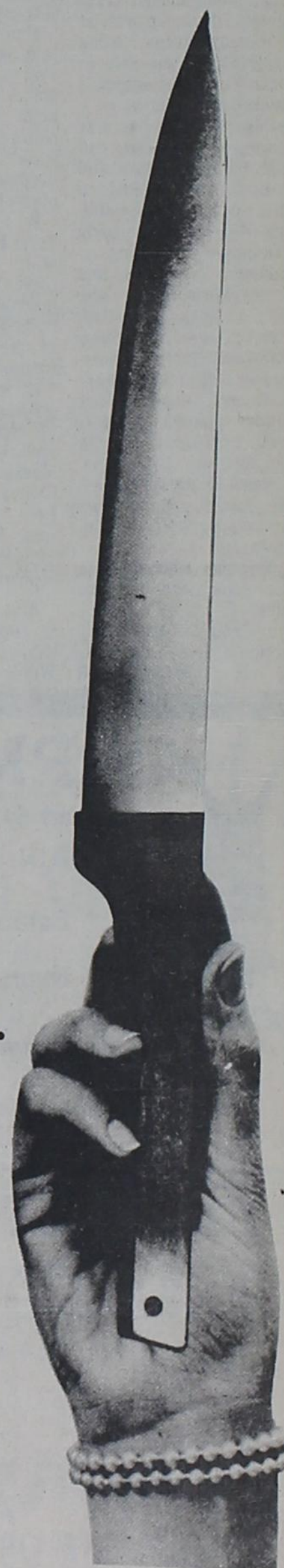

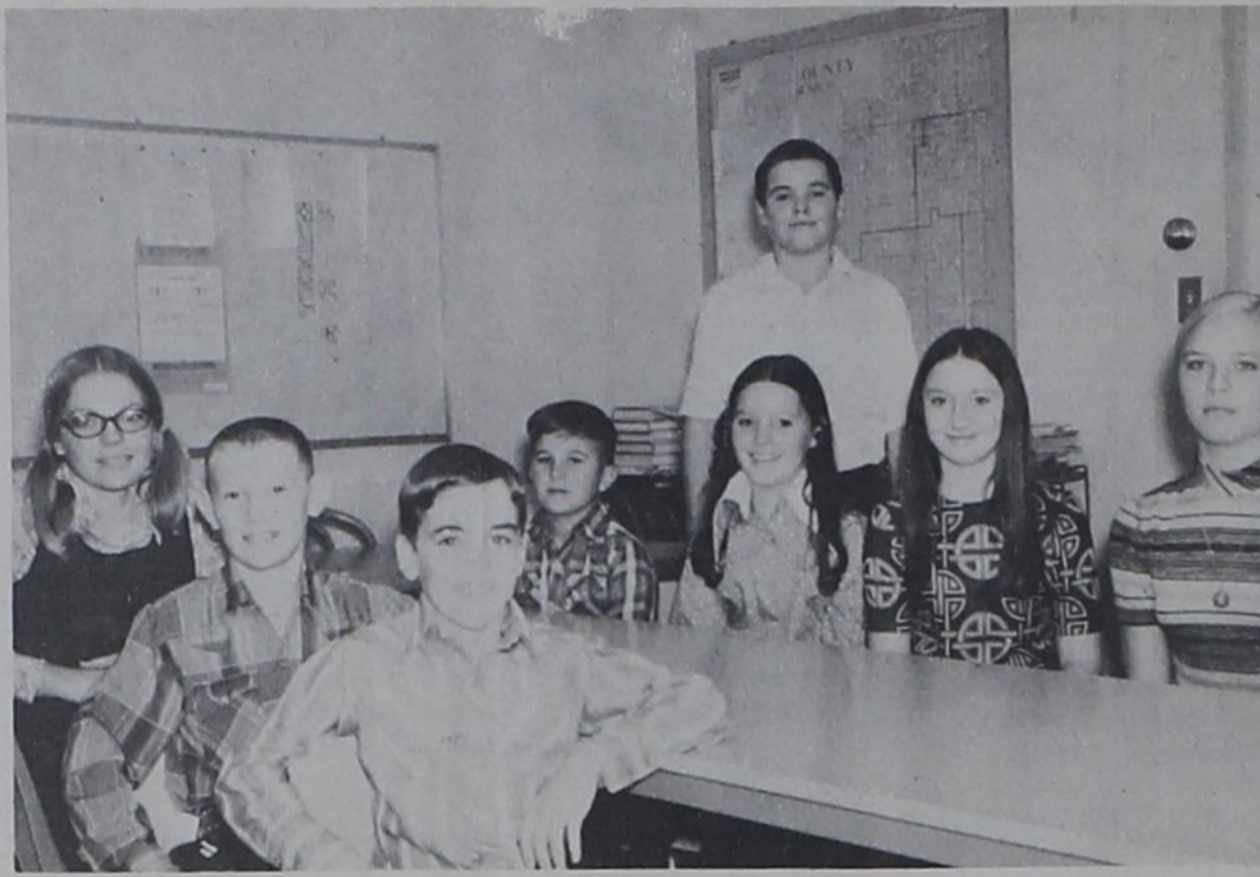
Committee Hears Survey Results

At Home In Parmer County

He's courageous, freedom-loving, gregarious, vain about his appearance, boastful in the presence of ladies and inclined to over-indulgence and overweight. He's American through and through.

This might sound like your Uncle Fred, but actually it describes a typical Thanksgiving turkey. With all its faults, the turkey is still the best loved fare during the holiday season. Other things may change - the trimmings, the method of cooking the bird, even the family gathering place - but the turkey continues to symbolize the spirit of Thanksgiving.

Since most Americans don't cook turkey quite as often as their families would like and since Thanksgiving Day is no time to blow your cool in the kitchen, here are some pointers to help assure a Thanksgiving success:

The successful Thanksgiving feast starts long before the oven is turned on. Take your time in selecting the right turkey for your family.

Poultry must be inspected for wholesomeness before it can be graded for quality. Often, the inspection mark and the grade shield are displayed together. Remember, the grade of the poultry does not indicate how tender the bird is - the age (class) of the bird is the determining factor. For roasting, choose young turkeys which may be labeled young turkey, fryer-roaster, young hen or young tom.

HOW MANY SERVINGS FROM ONE TURKEY, AND HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE?

This chart indicates there is more meat per bone weight on larger turkeys. Number of servings also will vary according to the quality of the turkey, correct cooking and skill in carving:

Ready-To-Cook Weight of Turkey	Number of Servings	*Guide to Total Roasting Time
6-8 lbs.	6-10	3-3 1/2 hrs.
8-12 lbs.	10-20	3 1/2-4 1/2 hrs.
12-16 lbs.	20-32	4 1/2-5 1/2 hrs.
16-20 lbs.	32-40	5 1/2-6 1/2 hrs.
20-24 lbs.	40-50	6 1/2-7 hrs.

*Use timetable to estimate the length of time turkeys may take to cook. However, remember it is only a guide, since differences in shape and tenderness of individual birds may necessitate increasing or decreasing cooking time. When dinner is set for a definite hour, start bird 20 to 30 minutes ahead of schedule to avoid delay should turkey take longer to cook than was estimated from guide.

TWO WAYS TO THAW FROZEN TURKEY

All frozen turkeys should be thawed slowly; the slower the thawing the better the aging. Follow turkey bag directions, or:

1. Defrost on tray in refrigerator in original, partly opened bag, allowing 2 to 4 days, or 24 hours' thawing time for each five pounds of turkey.
2. Thaw in original unopened plastic bag in cool water 4 to 8 hours, changing water frequently. Allow about 2 hours' thawing time for each five pounds of turkey (never use warm or hot water).

Prompt cooking of a fresh or thawed turkey is best. However, it can be kept for 2 or 3 days, wrapped loosely in foil, in a refrigerator. Do not refreeze.

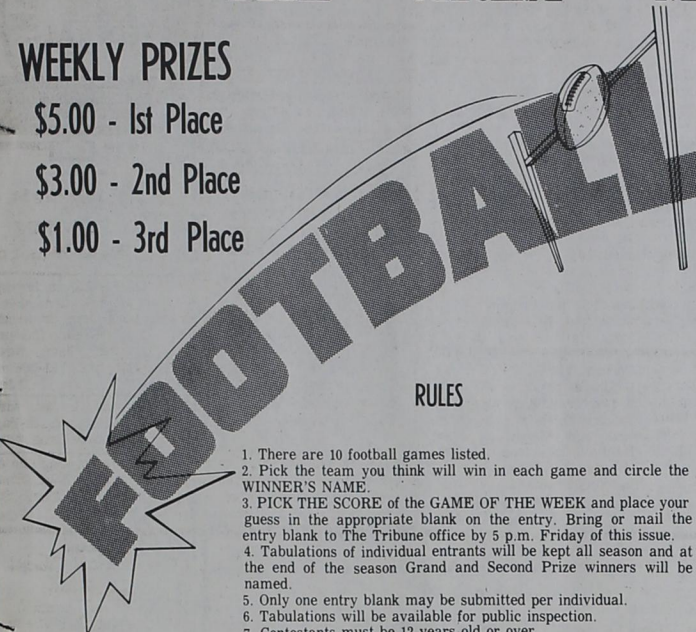

**Amarillo Wheat
Confab Slated**

Topics ranging from wheat production and grazing to ecology will highlight a Wheat Symposium at Amarillo November 29. On the following day, several out-of-state speakers will discuss key topics related to the overall wheat situation, farm programs and transportation during the 22nd annual meeting of the Texas Wheat Producers Association (TWPA).

The two-day program will be conducted at the Holiday Inn West and will begin each day at 9 a.m.

The first day's program will include discussions on ecology, current wheat situation, control of wheat insects, diseases and weeds, wheat varieties, feed wheat, wheat grazing and health problems of animals on wheat pastures.

Among the keynote speakers will be Bill Nelson, executive vice-president of the Texas Wheat Producers' Board, and Dr. L. S. (Bill) Pope, Associate Dean of Agriculture at Texas A&M University. Also on hand will be specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. A consultant in feed wheat nutrition and a livestock and wheat producer will also be on the program.

The TWPA meeting on November 30 will feature several outstanding speakers on the national scene. Among these are Joe Halow, executive

vice-president of Great Plains Wheat, Inc., Washington, D.C., who will discuss the world wheat situation. Gene Moss, president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, will talk on farm programs and how they affect wheat farmers.

Another speaker on wheat programs will be Victor A. Senechal with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, Washington, D.C.

A panel discussion that afternoon will feature the topic, "Transportation - The Key to Wheat Marketing". The two-day program is being sponsored by the Texas Wheat Producers Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and three of its area income programs - Panhandle Economic Program, South Plains Development Program and Rolling Plains Development Program.

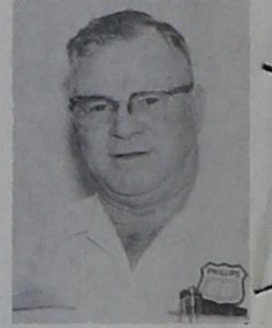
