

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



For a special treat for visitors try this Apple Dip Appetizer -- that will please them! Cut cored, unpeeled red ap-

ples into bite-size chunks; dip in lemon juice; spear on wooden picks; insert picks in whole red apples. Serve on fancy platter with one of these cheese dip suggestions:

1. Pineapple cheese spread blended with dairy sour cream.

2. Pimento cheese spread blended with a little mayonnaise.

3. Cream cheese, softened with heavy cream plus crumbled blue cheese, whipped together to "dipping" consistency.

Want to know how to make applesauce without cooking? Try this easy idea while apples are in plentiful supply says the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service. Combine 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup sugar (use less if apples are sweet), and 1 teaspoon ascorbic acid/citruc acid mixture in an electric blender. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt. 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

In severe cases, cows exhibiting symptoms when the veterinarian is called may be dead before he can arrive. He will probably be able to save only those which are still breathing.

Farmers and ranchers should be on the lookout for nitrate poisoning that may occure during the late fall on winter pastures when there is a lot of cloudy weather.

Under these conditions, the plants, instead of growing and changing nitrates into protein, just accumulate the nitrates. Animals must also be taken off COURTHOUSE NOTES these pastures until the plants have had a chance to grow and convert the nitrates to protein.
