

Announces 1972 Farm Program

"With the information available at this time, wheat and feed grain producers can pretty well plan their 1972 grain farming operations now," says Prentice Mills manager of the local ASCS office.

"The 1972 wheat allotment on most farms will be about the same as 1971 and the set-aside requirement will be an acreage equal to 83 per cent of the 1972 allotment for the farm," he says.

Barley will be in the feed grain program for 1972 and soybeans may be substituted for wheat and/or feed grains, according to Mills. The set-aside for barley will be between 20 and 35 per cent of the farm's base.

Under the substitution provisions, acreage devoted to feed grain or soybeans will be considered planted to wheat to prevent loss of allotment. Acreage devoted to wheat or soybeans will be considered planted to

feed grain to prevent loss of the feed grain base. This provision will enable a producer to plant all or any combination of acreage to wheat, feed grain or soybeans without loss of planting history or program benefits, Mills says.

As was the case this year, producers will receive preliminary payments after July 1 equal to 75 per cent of the estimated value of the wheat certificate. Any remainder will be paid after Dec. 1, 1972.

Inclusion of barley in the 1972 feed grain program is the result of USDA estimates that feed grain supplies will be adequate in 1972 due to the improved supply of blight-resistant corn seed. Soybeans have been included as a substitute crop in 1972 in view of the supply situation. This gives producers additional planting options.

Producers are not required to plant wheat to obtain cer-

tificates, according to Mills. However, failure to plant or be considered to have planted at least 90 per cent of a farmer's 1972 domestic allotment of either wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley or soybeans can result in a reduction in the 1973 allotment by as much as 20 per cent. If no wheat or substitute is planted for three consecutive years, the entire allotment can be lost. All allotments removed from farms will be reallocated to other wheat farms.

Acreage which is not planted due to a drought, flood, or other natural disaster or a condition beyond the control of the producer will be considered planted to wheat. Also, any producer who makes a required acreage set-aside but elects to receive no payment will not lose his allotment, says Mills.

As in 1971, producers may graze set-aside acres except (Continued on Page 2)

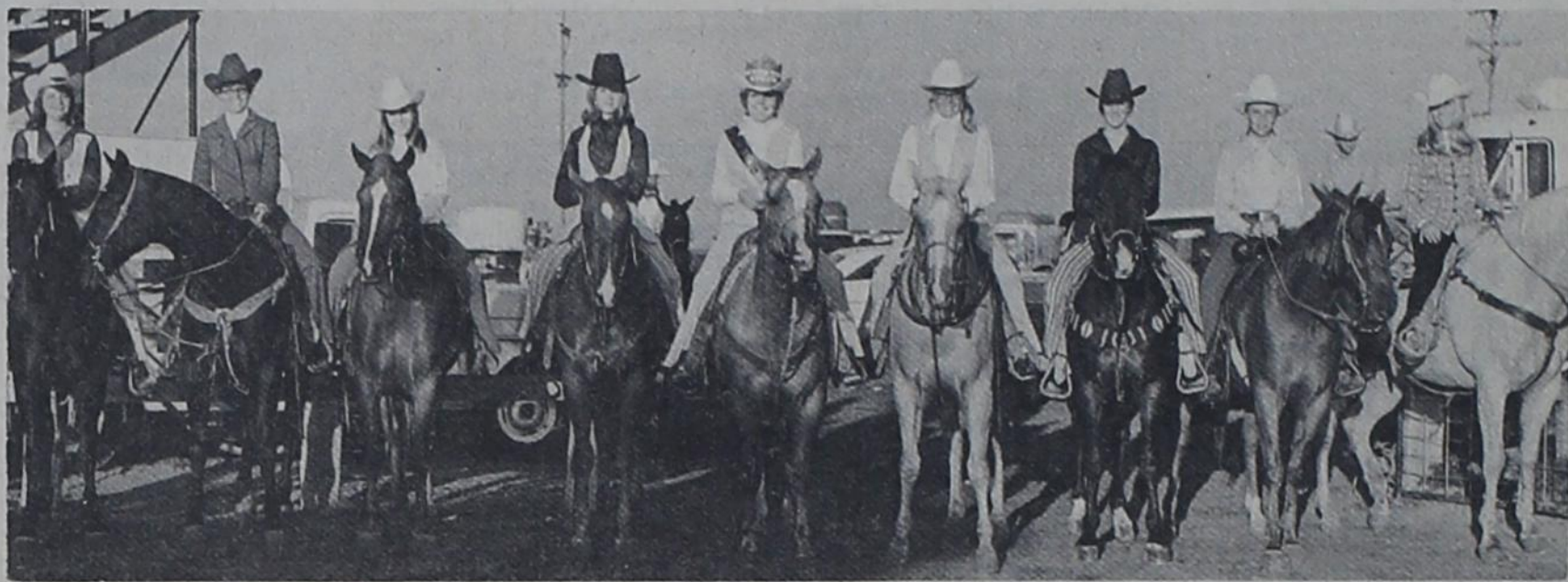

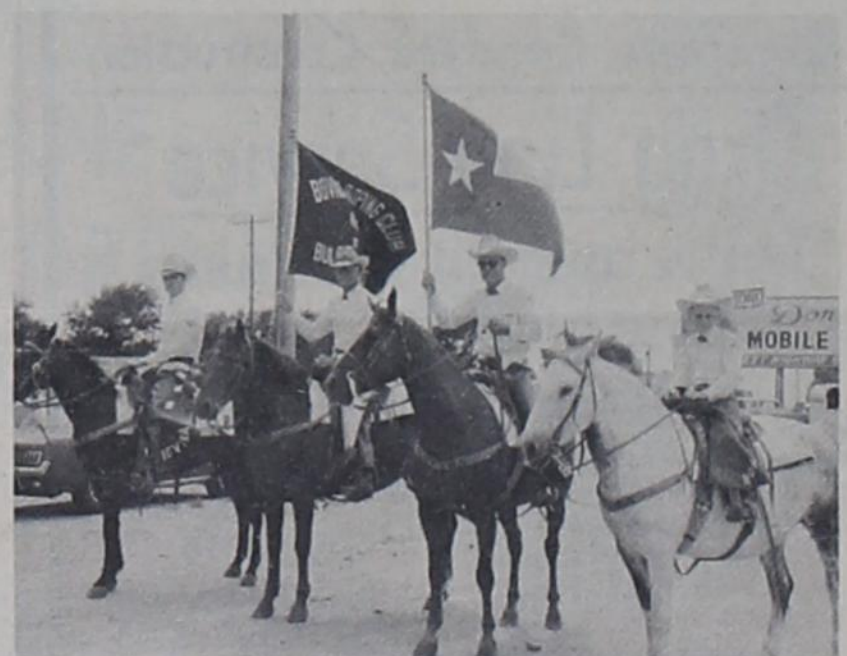

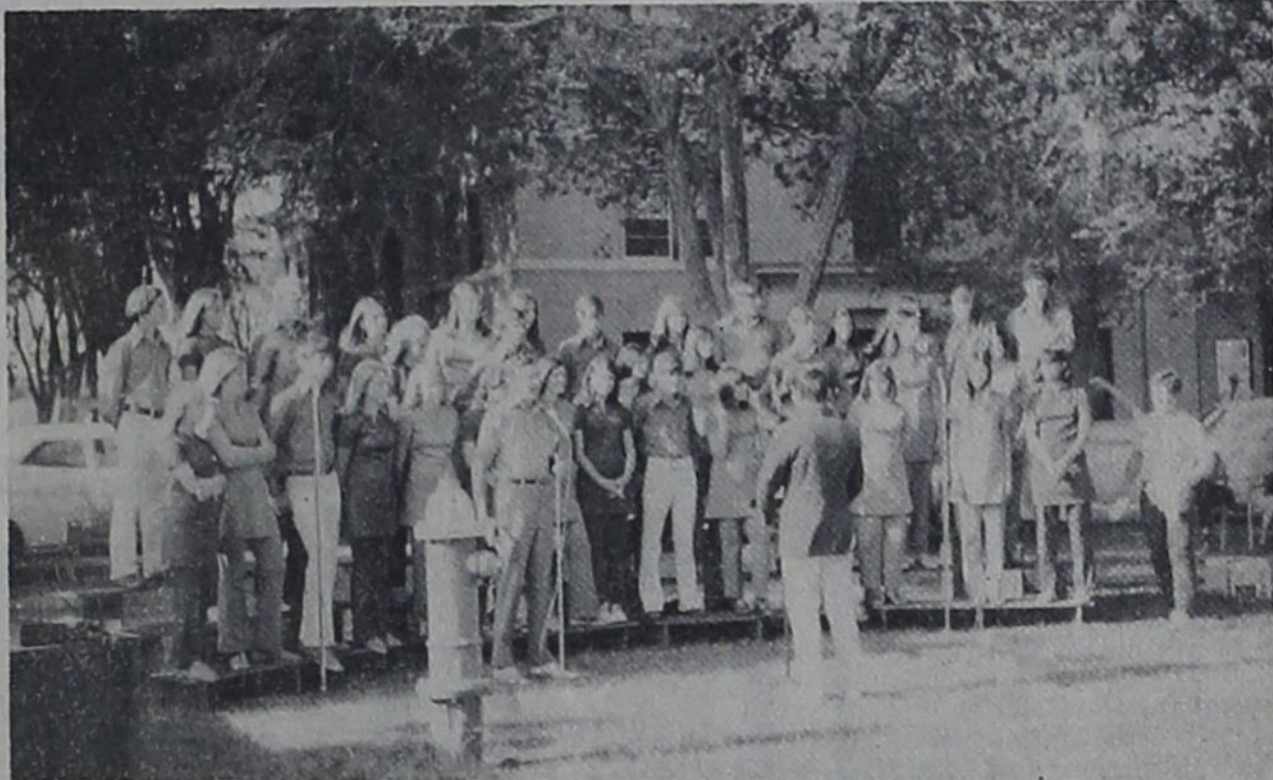
Special guests at the barbecue were members of the chapel choir of the First Baptist Church of Carrollton, Tex. The choir sang several religious songs during the meal.

Schools Start Soon --

Texico, Farwell, Lazbuddie Schedule Enrollment Dates

Vacation is almost over for several hundred Texico, Farwell and Lazbuddie school children. In less than two weeks,

school will be starting for children in grades 1-12 at Texico and Farwell schools.

Before the students are expected to return, though, their teachers will need an orientation period. A teacher's meeting will be held at Texico Schools at 10 a.m., Aug. 20. All teachers are expected to attend.

All students in grades 1-6 will come to Texico Elementary School at 9 a.m., Aug. 23. Buses will run on the first day.

Names will be posted on each room so students will be able to find their classes. School will dismiss early on the first day.

"New students as well as former students will need to have their correct birth information," said Jim Rogers, elementary principal.

Texico High School will begin its first day of classes with a general assembly in the old gym at 9 a.m. After the assembly short classes will be held, books will be checked out and first day assignments given.

Students are reminded to bring a supplemental material fee of \$2, according to James Pierce, high school principal. He also reminds students in

grades K-6 that they may purchase insurance at \$5 per school year for "at school" coverage and \$20 for 24-hour coverage.

Students in grades 7-9 may receive school insurance for \$7 per school year for "at school" coverage and \$20 for 24-hour coverage. Students in grades 10-12 may get insurance for \$7 for "at school" coverage and \$20 for 24-hour coverage. Football insurance will be \$28 per school year for boys in grades 10-12, said Pierce.

Due to a recently passed state law, all students attending school this year will be required to have a certain number of immunization shots, according to Rogers.

A student must have a series of DPT (diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough) shots. If he has received this series, he must have a booster shot.

A student must have had a series of three polio oral doses. If he has received this series, he must have a booster shot. Students must also have had a smallpox vaccination.

Recommended, but not required, is a measles vaccination.

Ted Magnus south of Farwell reported a little over a fourth of an inch for Thursday night and 2 3/4 inches for Saturday night.

In Texico, B. A. Rogers reported .24 inches of moisture in Thursday night's rain and 2 1/4 inches Saturday night.

E. E. Routon of Oklahoma Lane reported a trace of rain Thursday night. W. O. Chadwick east of Farwell reported 2 1/2 inches of moisture Saturday night.

Another shower was received in the area Monday night.

At the time it happened, it did not occur to many people that a census of horses was being taken. Every horse owner apparently rushed to register his horse or horses because many more horses were recorded than it was first thought to exist. We refer, of course, to the recent vaccination program against VEE. A record of each vaccination was made and a record of the owner kept. This built-in horse census has not escaped the notice of the New Mexico taxing authorities.

According to recent figures, approximately 75,000 head of horses have been vaccinated for VEE, yet a little less than 25,000 are rendered on the state's tax rolls. This discrepancy has raised some official eyebrows in the Land of Enchantment and a statement was made that each horse owner as reflected in the vaccination reports will be tracked down and asked why his animal was not duly rendered for taxation. This should tell us something about the "big brother" government and how many ways he has to unexpectedly check his wayward children. Taxation eventually gets to everybody.

Sneaky, sneaky, sneaky. This is the way to best describe our "Honest John" politicians. Yes, our Congressmen have found another way to extract monies from our pockets. In the face of mounting opposition to higher and higher income taxes, the good old resourceful U. S. Congress has found a way of quietly raising more revenue; this is by increasing payroll taxes. These payroll taxes have already become an important part of our federal revenue system. They now account for the second largest source of federal tax receipts -- amounting to an estimated \$56 billion take for fiscal, 1972.

Yet our fearless House of Representatives has recently passed and sent to the U. S. Senate a bill that would double the middle income wage earner's tax by 1980.

For example, under today's Social Security laws, the Social Security payroll tax on earnings of \$9,000 per year in 1980 would be \$1,071. Under the new proposal, the Social Security payroll tax would be upped to \$2,086 on a \$14,000 base. This rape of the great middle class wage earner would be done by the present "Social Security/Welfare Bill H.R. 1" otherwise known as a guaranteed annual wage package.

This is no pipe dream, and all that stands between this country and a complete economic breakdown a decade hence, is the tender mercies of the U. S. Senate. To get an idea of how slim our chances of staving off national suicide are, we can report that one Senator (Ribicoff of Conn.) is already calling the bill inadequate.

We think we will contemplate something more pleasant, like eating a bite of an apple before noticing that half of the worm is still in the apple. Ugh!

rollment should report to Farwell High School at 1 p.m. on Aug. 17, according to Jack Williams, high school principal.

Regular enrollment for Farwell High School will take place on August 19 and 20, said Williams.

Freshmen will register at 9 a.m. on Thursday, Aug. 19. Sophomores will register at 1 p.m. on the same day.

Registration for juniors will take place on Friday, Aug. 20, at 9 a.m. and seniors will register at 1 p.m. on Friday afternoon.

Students taking biology or chemistry must bring a \$5 fee with them to enrollment, says Williams.

All parents who want to pre-enroll their children for Farwell Elementary School are asked to call or come by the elementary school office Monday morning, Aug. 16, according to Vernon Scott, elementary school principal.

Regular enrollment for elementary school students will take place Friday, Aug. 20, at 8:30 a.m. Students in grades one through five are included. Buses will run and return students to their homes at noon, Scott said.

Supplies for grades three, four and five have been announced by Vernon Scott, elementary principal.

They are No. 16 crayolas, scissors with point, small zipper bag to hold crayons, etc., small container of Elmer's glue, pencils, eraser, clipboard, package of 3x5 cards, theme binder.

In addition to those items, fourth graders need a set of map pencils. Fifth graders need, in addition to the other items, an additional theme binder and map pencils.

All kindergarten and Head Start students will come to school on Aug. 23. There will be no previous enrollment for these students.

Insurance fees and lunchroom meal charges should be paid at the time a child enrolls, Scott said. "I would like to have one check for each child's fees who is enrolled

in elementary school," he added. Parents having more than one child enrolled in elementary school should make one check for each child.

Farwell Junior High School students will enroll Friday, Aug. 20, at 8:30 a.m. Students in grades six through eight are included. Buses will run and return the students home at noon.

Workbook fee and lock rent will be \$3.50 for junior high students, according to James Craig, Farwell Junior High principal.

School will start at 8:30 a.m. Monday, Aug. 23.

All children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools of institutions of higher education must have been immunized against six diseases including diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox, according to a bulletin by W. M. Roberts, Farwell School superintendent.

The bulletin further states that "the State Department of Health shall provide the required immunizations to children in areas where no local provision exists to provide these services."

Children ages 5-11 must have received a series of three doses of oral vaccine provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday. The same requirement pertains to children ages 12 and older.

Diphtheria and tetanus must have been received by children ages 5-11 with a minimum of three doses usually given as DPT for children less than six years of age, and Td for children six years of age and older. At least one dose should have been received since the fourth birthday.

Children ages 12 and older are required to have a minimum of three doses of diphtheria and tetanus with the last dose being given within ten years.

The measles vaccine is recommended but not required for children in both age groups unless a child entering school for the first time has not had a history of measles.

Rubella is not required past age 12 years. A smallpox vaccination must

during the five principal months of the normal growing season, but set-aside acreage must be protected against erosion, weeds, insect damage and rodents. In 1972, sweet sorghum again may be planted on the set-aside acreage and grazed, except during the five months of the growing season.

Producers who wish to qualify for program benefits need to sign up to participate, according to Mills. Sign-up dates will be February 23 through April 7, 1972. A producer may participate in the wheat program on any farm or all farms in which he has an interest, as he wishes.

Mills says his office will notify wheat producers of their domestic allotments and the applicable set-aside for their farms at a later date.

The training period will include a general faculty meeting and four days of preparation before school starts on Monday, Aug. 30.

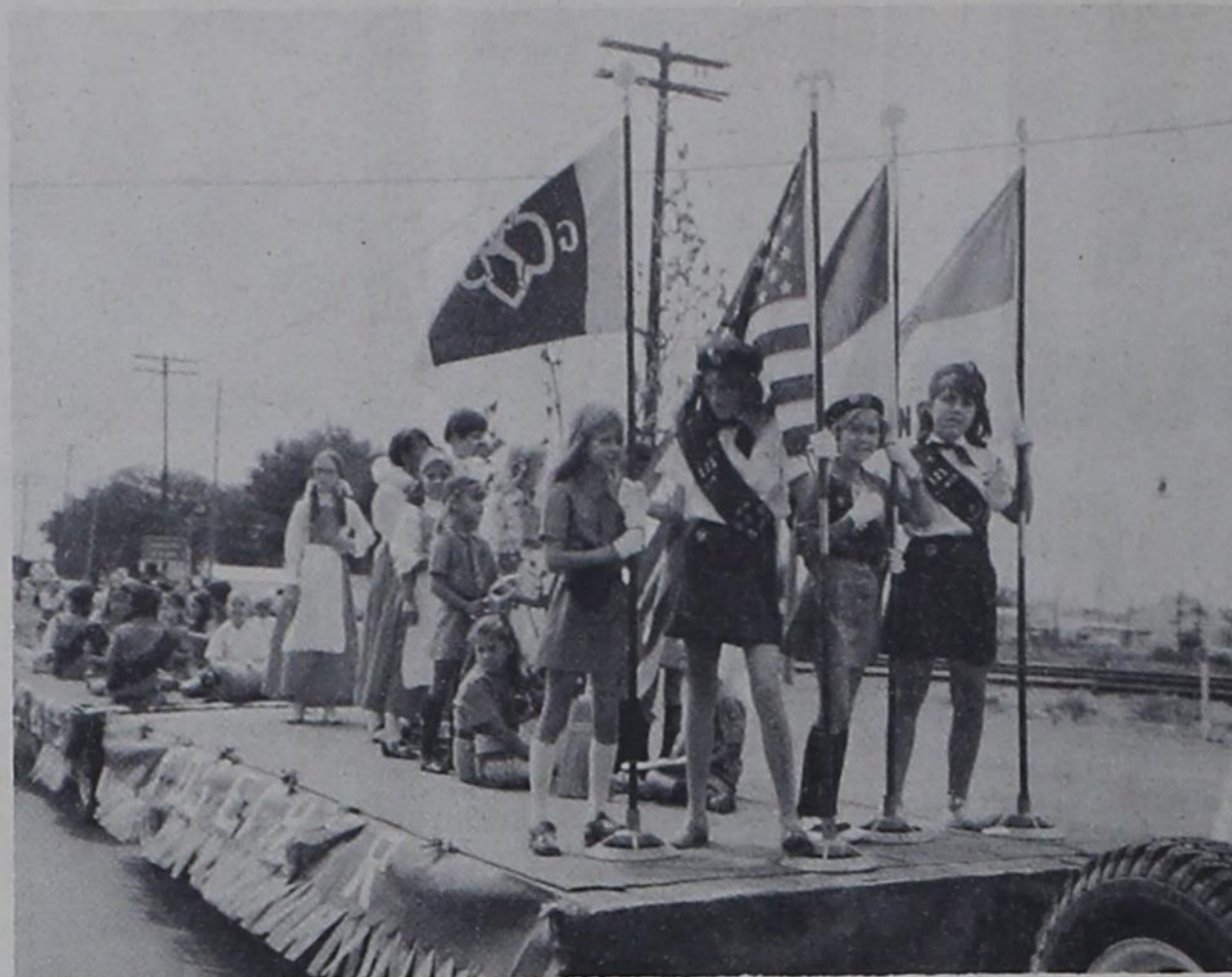

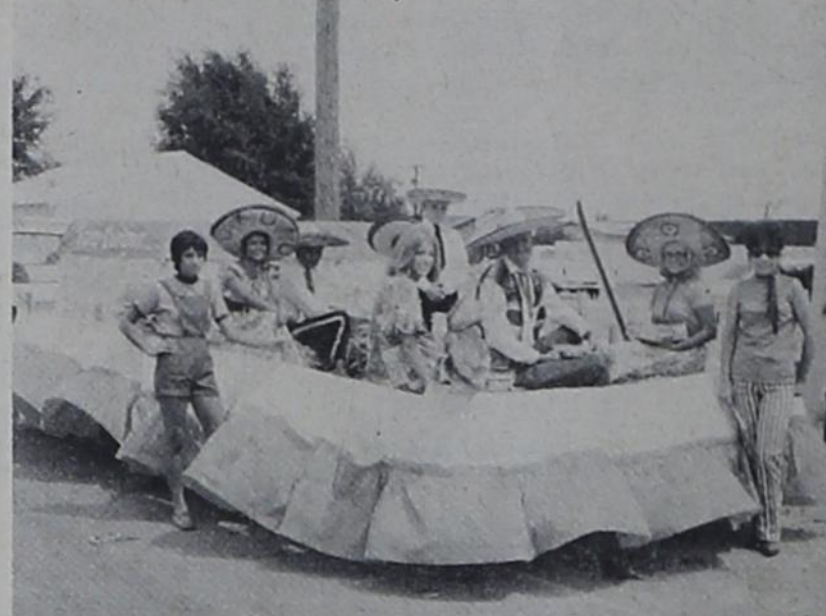

Farwell School Board Approves Insurance Plan

Farwell school board members at a meeting held Monday, Aug. 9, approved an insurance program for Farwell students which will be offered by the Heritage Agency with Standard Life and Accident Insurance Company.

The school will pay half of the football insurance and the student will be required to pay the remainder. A student may take football coverage for a premium of \$14.

A student taking the "at school" coverage and the football coverage will pay a premium of \$24. If he takes the 24 hour coverage and the football coverage, he will pay a premium of \$40.

The policy carries an excess insurance clause. Payment, up to \$50, is made regardless of payments made by other insurance carriers. This applies to all in hospital care. Thereafter, 100 per cent of the reasonable and necessary expenses, in excess of the amount payable by another insurance, will be covered, up to a maximum of \$10,000.

The school will not be responsible for claims not turned in. The student and parent bear the responsibility for the claim being turned in.

In other business, the school approved the hiring of two new

teachers, Mrs. Dianne Heil and Larry LeFevre. The board members also approved the state free school lunch program for the coming year.

Jack Williams, high school principal, and the board members revised the student handbook at the meeting. The revisions will be effective for the coming year.

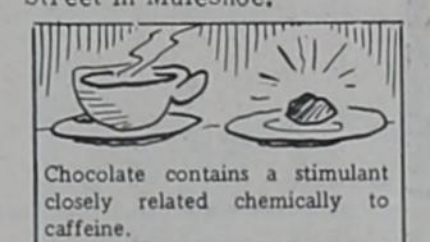

It is not our love to Him, then, but His love to us, that saves us -- and it is His love to us that keeps us saved. This is where we must begin the Christian life.
A wayward husband returned to his grieving wife one day, after many months of living in sin. Sobbing his heart out in remorse and shame, he told her how often he had longed to be home again with the wife he knew to be so true. Asked why, then, he had not returned sooner, he explained that he was ashamed; to which his wife replied: "John, I want you to know something and never forget it: I love you." And John sobbed in response: "Who wouldn't want to live for a woman like this!"
Just so it is the knowledge that Christ loves us no matter what; that nothing shall ever separate us from His love; it is this that makes the sincere believer determine, by God's grace, to be always true to Him.

pans so that tops of loaves are greased as well as the bottoms. Cover loaves with light cloth and let raise until each loaf is well rounded. Bake for 25-30 minutes in a 375 degree oven. Remove from pans immediately and brush margarine lavishly over all crusty areas.

This recipe can also be used to make hot rolls. Just divide into desired roll shapes instead of loaves. It also works for the old-fashioned fried bread which Sally's mother had for lunch on baking day when she was a child. After the second raising step, take small portions of the well kneaded dough. Stretch until flat and fry in bacon grease (about 1/4 inch deep in iron skillet) until brown. Flip and lightly brown the other side. Children love the holes in this fried bread filled with honey or sugar.

ORANGE SLICE CAKE
2 c. flour
2 t. baking powder
1 c. sugar
4 T. margarine or vegetable shortening
3/4 c. milk
1/4 t. almond extract
1/2 t. vanilla
1 c. chopped nutmeats
2 egg whites
1/4 t. salt
12 orange slice candies
1 small can crushed pineapple
Sift together flour, baking powder and sugar. Blend in margarine. Combine and add milk, almond extract, vanilla and nutmeats. Stir vigorously. Whip egg whites until stiff, add salt. Fold into above mixture and pour into greased, floured 9x12 baking dish. Top with orange slice candies, sliced thin and dredged in flour. Bake at 375 degrees for 35 minutes. Remove from oven and punch holes in cake and spread with crushed pineapple.

ICING
8 large marshmallows
1/4 c. milk
powdered sugar
peppermint flavoring
Melt 8 large marshmallows with 1/4 c. milk in double boiler. Beat in enough powdered sugar to make a manageable icing and add a drop of peppermint flavoring. Spread on warm, not hot cake.
