Cotton Bowl, Any One?

Next Week Begins Merchant Madness

Attention! All experts on the subject of football are urged and expected to match wits with each other in picking the winners each week in the Tribune's annual football guessing game sponsored by area merchants. The contest starts next week.

The contest is in its 13th year of driving area residents to paranoia by enticing over 300 persons yearly to try to predict the outcome of high school, college and professional football games during a 12-week period.

Ten games are listed in the Tribune each week with games coming from any of the three categories. A winner must be circled or otherwise indicated for each game.

A Game of the Week will be listed each week on the entry

blank, during the Steer season, Farwell football games will be used as the tie-breaker. Entrants must guess the scores of the Game of the Week in order to determine the weekly winners in case of a tie. The point-spread method will be used. Whether an entrant predicts the winner of the Game of the Week right or wrong, it will not be counted.

Rules of the contest include circling or otherwise indicating the team picked as winner of each of the ten games listed. Entries must be placed in the Tribune office by 5 p.m. each Friday. Entries mailed in must be postmarked by 5 p.m. Friday in order to be accepted.

Tabulation of individual entrants will be kept all season and will be available for public inspection.

Contestants must be 12 years old or over in order to submit entry blanks. Only one entry blank will be accepted from an individual each week.

T. J. Kittrell won the Grand Prize in last year's contest with a close victory over James Hobbs. Grand Prize is two tickets to the Cotton Bowl New Year's Day plus \$50 expense money.

Second prize in the contest is two tickets to the Sun Bowl in El Paso plus \$25 expense money.

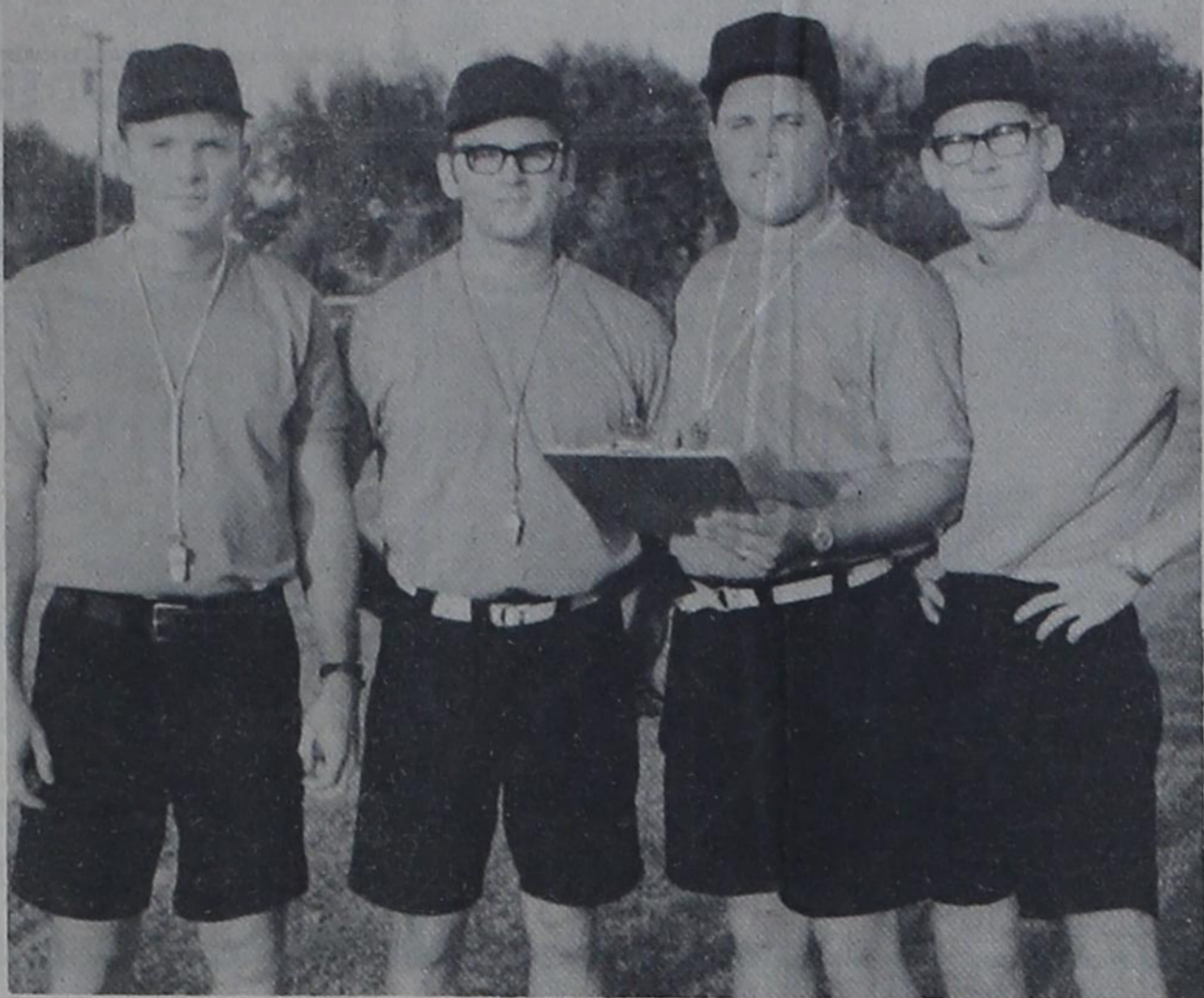
Weekly prize winners will receive \$5 for first place, \$3 for second place and \$1 for third place.

A record number of 374 persons entered last year's contest. The football contest, which is a forerunner of area contests, was begun in 1959

when 30 entrants were recorded.

Teams Set Scrimmages, Prepare For First Games

Farwell Steers are set to engage in their second pre-season scrimmage which will be held Friday night (tonight) at 8 p.m. in Farwell.

The Steers will scrimmage against Hereford B team in their last scrimmage of the

season before they play Class AA Friona in the season opener Sept. 10 in Friona.

Head Coach Toby Booth said the Friona team would be scouted Friday. He declined to make any comment on the opposition until the cross-county rival

team could be viewed by scouts.

Booth did say that he felt Friona would be a tough opponent with 14 lettermen and a total of 44 young men in the Friona football program.

Lazbuddie Longhorns are scheduled to scrimmage Ropes at 8 p.m. in Lazbuddie Friday night (tonight). This scrimmage will be the last before the Longhorns' opener Sept. 10 with Hart at Lazbuddie.

Head Coach Buddy Brock said Hart had a good fullback and a fast back. "They throw the ball good and will be a tough team to handle," he said. Hart is a Class A team and Lazbuddie is in Class B.

In Season Opener --

Wolverines Play Hagerman Tonight

Texico Wolverines will travel to Hagerman, N.M. Friday night (tonight) to face the Class A team in the first game of the season.

Head Coach Jim Wynne said he didn't know much about the Hagerman team, which was going to make the first game difficult to predict. He did think the game would be low scoring.

He commented that if the game is low scoring, the Wolverines might be able to break it open with their defense. "The outcome will also depend on whether the Wolverines can get their offense geared," he added.

Hagerman is a young team in its second year of football, according to Wynne. They have a good quarterback and defensive line. They also play a hard

game for their field, he said.

Texico prepared for tonight's game by scrimmaging Clovis B team Tuesday afternoon. Wynne said the scrimmage was about what he had expected since it was the team's first contact.

Clovis B team made three touchdowns to Texico's two during the scrimmage. "Defensively, the line and line-backer look pretty good," he said. "Our defensive secondary is weak, though. We looked very poor offensively. We made too many mistakes," Wynne added.

Wynne expressed concern over several team members who received bruises during the scrimmage with Clovis. He said there were a few doubtful starters this week.

Watermelon Feed Set For Tonight

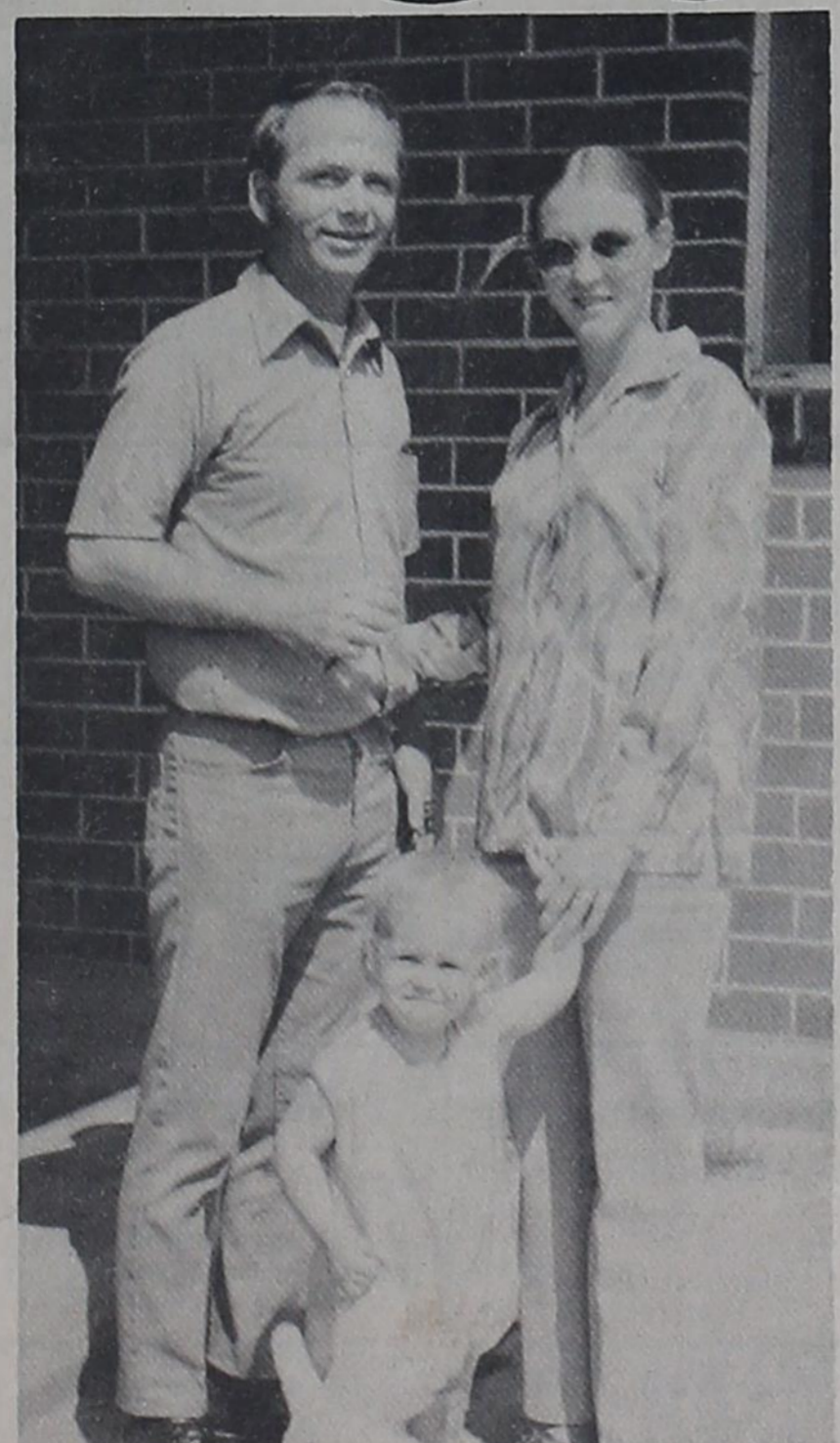
Farwell Booster Club will host a watermelon feed after the Farwell-Hereford scrimmage tonight.

Fall is in the air. While Mother Nature has not given any discernible signs of the seasonal progression, the slap of leather and the roars and growls of neophyte pigskin practitioners has tipped off the faithful that "that time" is upon them.

The football capitol of the Golden Spread, otherwise known as the Twin Cities, dips its collective toe in the fall waters as the Green and White of the Texico Wolverines crack the new season with a game at Hagerman, N.M., tonight (Friday) at 7:30. This is the beginning of the third year of the return of the game to that school. Already the Wolverines are making a respected name for themselves in New Mexico football circles.

Next week all systems are go as the Farwell Steers initiate their season with a game against Friona at Friona while Texico will play a home game with the Whitefaces from Texas. This will be the big plunge into a rootin' tootin' football season for the happy citizens of the football capitol.

Friday, Sept. 10, will also mark the beginning of the 13th season for the merchants' big football contest that annually draws hundreds of entries from the entire area. Again this year the Tribune, through the cooperation of the contest sponsors, is offering weekly cash prizes plus grand prizes of expense money and tickets to both the Cotton Bowl and the Sun Bowl.

While all this is taking place, the pro circuit will have begun in earnest and the Cowboy fans will be adding to the hubbub. When you add it up, the next several weeks promises to be paradise for the football faithful.

The President's wage price freeze has generated a lot of hot words, both pro and con. Some of the hottest words have come from the high mogul of organized labor George Meany. His attitude has been very antagonistic to the administration's action in freezing wages and prices.

However, this is very understandable as Brother Meany has been a brass collar party man for longer than most folks can remember. Fairness and objectivity comes hard for a person who has spent a lifetime finding fault with his political opponents.

In this case, Meany is only living up to the record of organized labor when it comes to supporting the Republicans. For instance, in the 1970 elections organized labor contributed over 30 times as much money to the campaigns of Democratic candidates as Republican candidates.

This tidy tidbit came to approximately \$4,153,746.42 of the check-off boys' money for favored Democratic candidates and only \$143,550.52 for favored Republicans. Incidentally, Ralph Yarborough was enriched to the tune of \$101,765.84 by the labor barons, not an inconsiderable part of his entire campaign costs.

We have a list of contributions by labor to candidates and it makes interesting reading, especially when it comes to comparing anti-administration rhetoric and the size of the labor nest egg dropped in the speakers' campaign nest.

Our purpose in this muck-raking is to remind folks that nowadays it is organized labor that calls the legislative tune and labor's interests are seldom the same as the farmer and rancher. We should be concerned about the high costs of political campaigning and how it affects legislators and legislation. We as a rural area are not in a favorable political position.

--LEGAL NOTICE--
 All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations indicate.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

WHAT WAS ACCOMPLISHED AT CALVARY?

If the Bible makes anything clear, it is the fact that the secret of all God's good news to man is centered in Calvary. It was because Christ was to die for sin that God could proclaim good news to sinners down through the ages.

It was not until some time after the crucifixion, however, that "the preaching of the cross" was widely proclaimed as a message by Paul in "the gospel (good news) of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24; I Cor. 1:18).

The proclamation of "the gospel of the grace of God" was the natural accompaniment to the revelation of the cross as the secret of God's good news to man. In this proclamation of His over-abounding grace to sinners, everything centers in the cross.

According to Paul's epistles "we have redemption through Christ's blood." (Eph. 1:7), we are "justified by His blood" (Rom. 5:9), "reconciled to God by the death of His Son" (Rom. 5:10), "made nigh by the blood of Christ" (Eph. 2:13) and "made the righteousness of God in Him" because "God hath made Him to be sin for us" (II Cor. 5:21).

The "covenant" of the law was abolished by the cross (Col. 2:14), the curse of the law was removed by the cross (Gal. 3:13), the "middle wall of partition" was broken down by the cross (Eph. 2:14,15) and believers in Christ are reconciled to God in one body by the cross (Eph. 2:16). Little wonder Paul calls this message "the preaching of the cross"!

To the believer it is thrilling to see the cross as God's reply to Satan when, at first glance, it had appeared that the cross was Satan's greatest triumph.

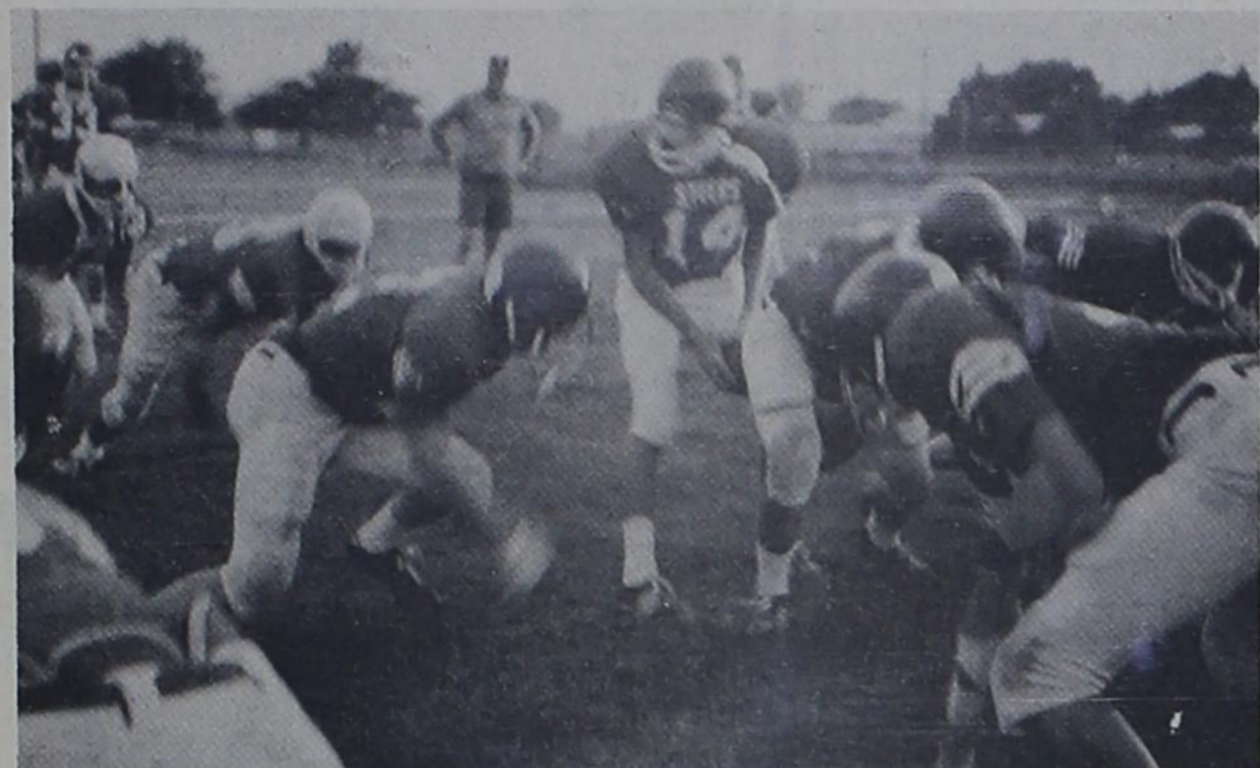

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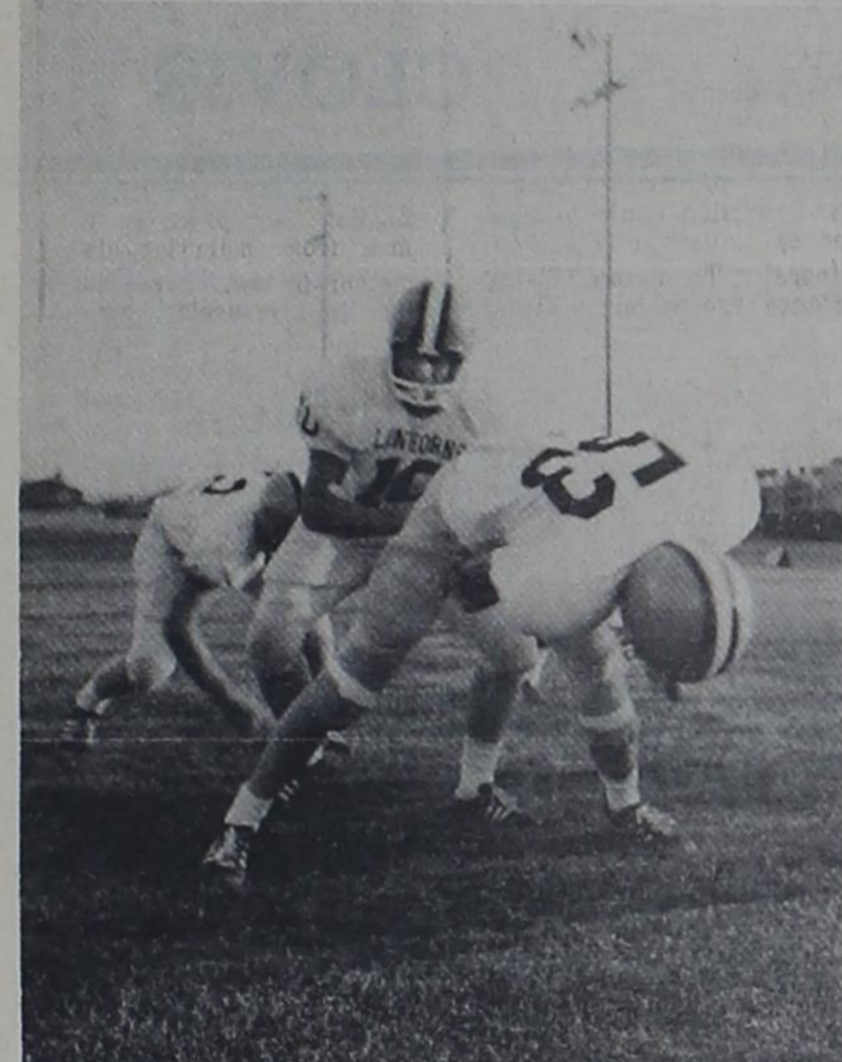
