Texico School Carnival Scheduled For Friday

Texico's annual school carnival will get underway at 7:30 p.m. in the old gym Friday night, Oct. 15. It is being sponsored by the Student Council.



ASCS Reminds Cotton Producers --

Payment Yields Can Be Protected

This message is for all cotton producers; and, especially the farm operators. The farm operator is the person who can do the most to maintain a farm's cotton program yield.

As the yield for each farm is established on the basis of actual production of cotton from the farm, it behooves the farm operator to make certain that the yield records for the farm are correct. As the operator of a cotton farm, there are two very important things for you to remember to do, says Prentice Mills, Parmer County ASCS manager.

1. When you carry your cotton to your gin, make certain that the ginner knows which farm it came from. Look at your account sheet and make certain that it shows your name (operator), the name of owner of the farm and be certain that the ASCS Farm Number is shown on the ginner's account sheet for that farm.

DO NOT allow your ginner to list cotton for more than one farm on one account sheet. As soon as all the cotton from one of your farms has been ginned

and marketed, bring your settlement sheets (or copies of them) to the ASCS office in order for us to record the necessary information. We will keep these documents in the farm file.

National 4-H Week Climaxes Activities

Last week, October 3-9, was designated National 4-H Week, with the theme of "4-H Bridges the Gap." Almost 75,000 Texas young people from 9-19 years of age are 4-H members. Chances are you know someone who is a 4-H member in Parmer County. This youngster may even be your child or grandchild. If this is the case, then you know about some of the educational activities these youngsters are involved in. However, if you are not connected with 4-H, you may be interested to know what these youngsters have done in the past year.

A total of 175 members were enrolled in Parmer County's seven 4-H clubs in 1971. A brand new club in the Rhea Community with Mr. and Mrs. Walter Schueler and Mrs. Norman Taylor serving as the organizational leaders was formed.

Parmer County 4-H youngsters sold over \$1,100 worth of chocolate to go toward the State 4-H Center near Brownwood. Bovina was the high selling club and Randy Gerles was the top salesman.

January and February is show time and Parmer County 4-H members exhibited in 10 different livestock shows. Carrie Haseloff, Oklahoma Lane 4-H member, exhibited the Grand Champion Steer in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, while Mike Windham of the Lazbuddie club showed the Reserve Grand Champion Barrow and the Champion Dorset Lamb. Mike also showed the Champion Poland China Barrow in Amarillo and Hereford, as well as the Reserve Champion Southdown Lamb in Hereford. Mike took two barrows to Houston and won Reserve Grand Champion

Barrow over all Breeds and Champion Crossbred Barrow. In the county show, Cathie Trimble, Bovina 4-H, showed the Reserve Champion Southdown Lamb and Alonzo Strickland had the Reserve Champion Fine Wool Lamb. Gary Green was awarded the swine showmanship award in the County show. Joe Haseloff had the Grand Champion Steer at the Farwell local show, while Deborah and David Harding showed the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion lambs.

At the District I Elimination Contest in Canyon, "The Golden Girls," a group composed of Tammie Smith, Karla Littlefield and Candy Moore, won first in the Share-the Fun Contest. Deborah Harding won third in the Food & Nutrition Educational Activity. Michael Mimms and Kent Winders won second with their Farm and Ranch Management Demonstration.

Thirty-four girls participated in the County Food Show. There were five seniors and 29 junior girls. Jacquelyn Langford was high point individual. Carrie Haseloff and Deborah Harding won the senior division and participated in the district contest, while Cheryl Gohlke and Jacquelyn Langford participated in the junior division.

Three girls attended the District I 4-H Horse Show in Amarillo. Gay London, Patti London and Lee Ann Williams showed in Amarillo, with Gay placing ninth in her halter class.

Danny Clark and Reta Davis, Lazbuddie 4-H, attended the 4-H Electric Camp in New Mexico, which is sponsored by Southwestern Public Service. Two 4-H youngsters' record books went to state judging contest in College Station, Kevin Kaltwasser sent his in Field Crop Sciences and Deborah Harding sent her book in Food Preservation.

In July, 22 girls competed in the Parmer County 4-H Dress Revue. Mary Beth Bennett, Friona 4-H, was the Senior winner with Karene Hart, alternate. Holly Hart was winner of the 12-13 year-old division and over-all high point individual. Terri Boling was second high point individual. Evelyn Hart was the winner of the 9-11 year-old group. Cheryl Gohlke was the winner in the County Bake Show, and represented Parmer County at the District Bake Show held during the Tri-State Fair.

The 4-H Fair was held in September with 183 entries by 23 4-H'ers from over the county. Those winning trophies for being high point individual in each division were: Evelyn Hart - Crops Division; Kent Winders - Gardening; Holly Hart - Crafts; Cheryl Gohlke-Canning; Karene Hart-Clothing; and Cheryl Gohlke - Baked Goods.

These educational activities are designed to train young people for leadership roles in the future. With the help of interested individuals and adult leaders, these programs and projects are made possible. In this way, today's 4-H'ers "bridge the gap" to make tomorrow's citizens.



At Home In Parmer County

Consumers in the United States loose about four billion dollars a year through gyps and fraud. The only way consumers can guard against such losses is to learn to recognize dishonest business gimmicks. A popular gimmick is the promise of a free gift. But remember, very few things are really free with no strings attached. Businessmen who make a habit of giving away free goods and services cannot make a profit or stay in business. Consumers, then, should investigate before being taken by claims such as "free" and "low, low prices." Consumers usually get no better quality than they pay for.

Another attention-getter is "you have been selected." You probably were selected because your name is next in the telephone book, or because your house happens to be next in the block.

Watch for the "supply is limited" claim. Often the supply really is limited, but this is not always the case. The company may be overstocked and the salesman instructed to push the product. For some reason, the produce may not sell on its own.

"If you get 10 buyers, it's yours free," is a phrase usually spouted by door-to-door salesmen. Be cautious: you may not be able to get buyers for the product, and the salesman may have already covered the neighborhood. Or, you may not really want to sell the product to neighbors.

Also, put on your guard when you hear "a well-known person in your neighborhood bought one." Don't be fooled into thinking such a claim automatically makes the product worthwhile. Many people buy foolishly, and the same product will not meet the needs of everyone.

A product that "can't be purchased in the store" may be a good product from a reputable company. Many well-known companies conduct their business only through door-to-door salesmen. But, dishonest businesses may also operate through direct contact, peddling low quality, poor merchandise. So be on the alert.

Always beware, then, of unrealistic promises. Watch out for "too good to be true" and "something for nothing" signals. Remember, legitimate bargains come and go everyday -- but so do frauds.

Second District Win --

Farwell Tops Happy In Homecoming Game

In a key district game, the Farwell Steers knocked off the Happy Cowboys, 33-12, in Farwell Friday night. It was a great night for the Steer offense who drove for 14 first downs and a total yardage of 337 yards. Ray Norton was again the leading rusher, amassing a total of 131 yards with an average of 3.7 yards per carry. In the air, quarterback Brett Hargrove completed five of 10 passes for 101 yards. During the course of the game, Hargrove also ran for an additional 101 yards.

The Cowboys totaled 19 first downs and 329 yards in the game, mainly on the ground, completing four of 12 passes for 58 yards. The Steers lost 76 yards on nine penalties as compared to five Cowboy penalties for 45 yards.

playing defense last Friday night with a heavily bandaged arm. Texico had seven first downs with 109 yards on the ground.


Head Coach Jim Wynne commented after the game about his


Tandy, who moved to Oklahoma Lane in 1917, has been in the Dumas resthome for two years. He was a farmer in this area before his retirement.

CHURCH ON FIRE

The Chicago newspapers carried an account several years ago of a large church, burned to the ground, at a loss of about half a million dollars. Our sympathy went out to the pastor and congregation who, at best, had to carry on for a time under makeshift arrangements.

But the account reminded me of the story of another church on fire. The crowds had gathered to see the fire engines pour water on the burning building, when one man spotted a friend in the crowd. "Hi Bob!" he shouted: "This is the first time I've seen you at church!" "Well," responded the other, "This is the first time I've seen a church on fire."

We write this as a special appeal to true, born-again Christians. Isn't it true that if believers were more "on fire" for Christ, more completely sold out to Him, those who are now disinterested

would be more apt to become interested and come to know Him as their Savior? We so soon lose interest or become discouraged, and quit. This is why the Apostle Paul, that tireless ambassador for Christ wrote:



Squirrels Celebrate 20th Anniversary

Approximately 45 squirrels living in the trees around Parmer County Courthouse and Farwell City Park received an anniversary gift recently. When Farwell Future Farmers of America members delivered 10 new homes to the courthouse.

The structures were built from materials furnished by the county. FFA members provided the manpower to build the homes as part of their yearly projects.

This month is the 20th anniversary of the squirrels' presence in the trees. On Oct. 22, 1951, Parmer County Commissioners Court appropriated sufficient funds to pay for the construction of suitable boxes as living quarters and to furnish suitable feed for the squirrels.

At that time, the court also expressed appreciation to Lubbock Park Commission for furnishing five pairs of squirrels without charge for beautifying the courthouse and as a control of English sparrows.

Joe W. Jones, then Parmer County agent, went to Lubbock in a pickup truck to get the squirrels and a squirrel nesting box to be used as a pattern for additional boxes.

Jones related that K. N. Klapp, then in charge of Lubbock Parks, was much impressed at the legal document that was drawn-up by the late John H. Aldridge, attorney, and approved by the Commissioners Court.

Information concerning Jones' anecdote and the court's motion concerning the squirrels was obtained from a record of Commissioner's Court Minutes dated Oct. 22, 1951. The record is being typed on cards and filed by Parmer County Tax Assessor and Collector Hugh Moseley for future use.


