Johnsons To Sun Bowl --

Consistent Craft Wins Trip To Cotton Bowl

Consistency was the name of the game this year as Terry Craft plodded through 12 weeks of the Tribune's 13th annual Merchants Football Contest to win the Grand Prize of a trip to the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day plus \$50 expense money.

Craft edged out 401 entrants, a record number since the contest began 13 years ago, to end up with a total of 83 points. He never had less than five correct games in any one week during the 12-week contest. However, he only reached the weekly winner's circle once when he tied for third place, winning 50 cents.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Johnson also proved to be consistent guessers, tying for second place with a total of 80 points. Johnson was declared the winner of two tickets to the Sun Bowl in El Paso and \$25 expense money by having a smaller point spread for the season

on the tiebreaker game scores than did his wife. Johnson did not win any weekly prize money, but Mrs. Johnson did win first place prize of \$5 in the second week of the contest.

Third place in the overall contest was held by Jerry Mathis and Jim Wiman, each with 79 points. Mathis did not get into the weekly winner's circle, and Wiman's sole claim to a weekly prize came in the 11th week of the contest when he tied for second and third places. Mathis was tied with Craft the 10th and 11th weeks of the contest, but dropped out of contention the last week, calling only three correct games while Craft picked seven games correctly.

Fourth place for the overall contest was Kie Watkins with 78 points; Carl Davis, fifth place, 77 points; David Norton, sixth place, 76 points; Fern Christian, Ralph Franse and Champ Porter, seventh place,

75 points; and Carolyn Sue Davis and Earlene Porter, eighth place, 74 points.

Ninth place winners were B. V. Hughes, Charles Dannheim, Kirk McFarland, and E. A. Walker. Each had 73 points. Tenth place winners with 72 points were David Dannheim, Carolyn Herington, Mrs. Bill Moss, Jim Walker and Mrs. E. A. Key.

Weekly winners in the last week of the contest were Billy Watts, Bill Boling and Cindy Watts. Watts guessed eight correct games and was five points off on the tiebreaker score to win first place prize money of \$5.

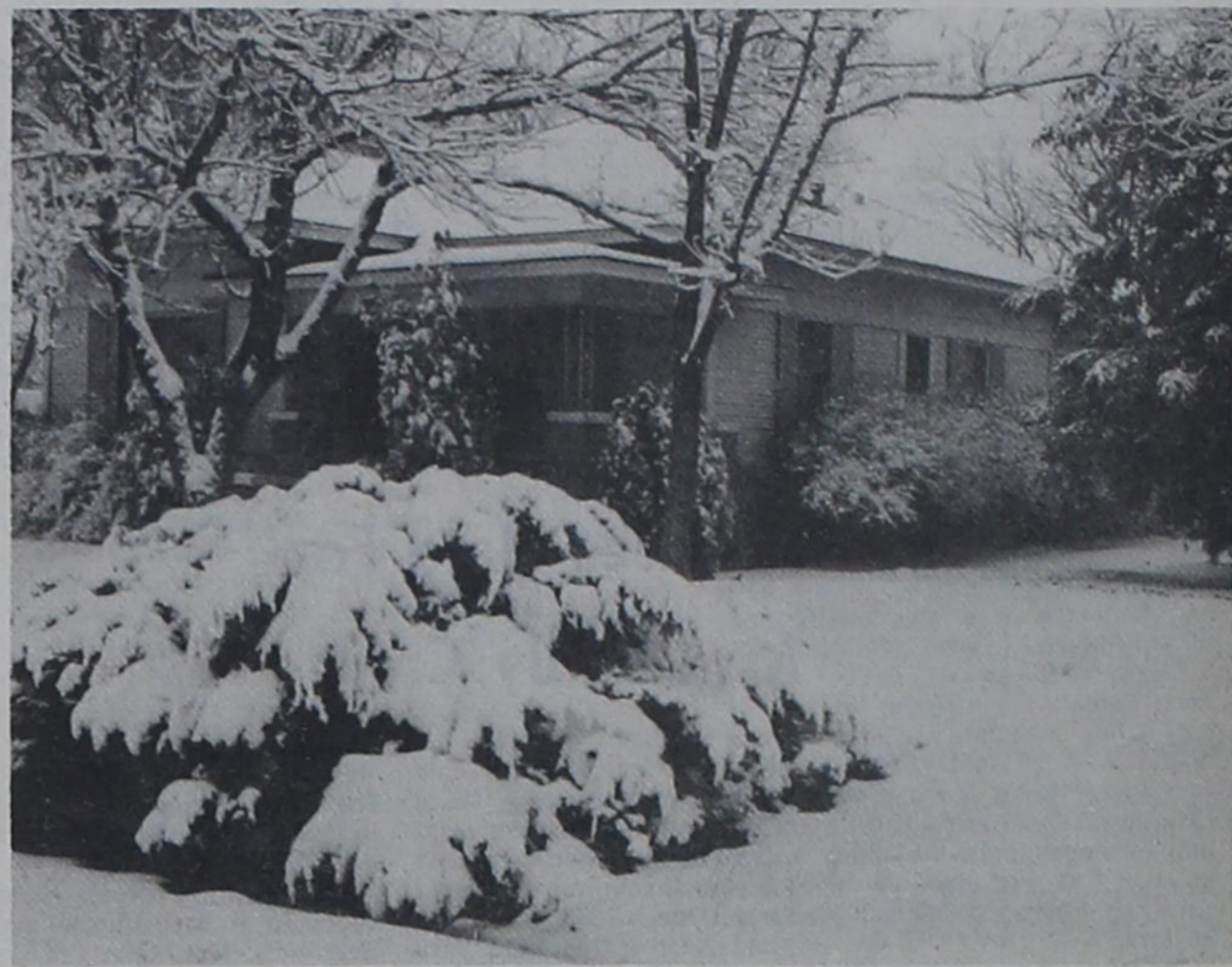
Boling and Miss Watts tied for second and third places during the last week. They both had eight correct games, but were 10 points off on the tiebreaker.

Several other entrants had eight games right, but failed to post a low point spread in the

tiebreaker. They were Buster Herington with 11 points off, Champ Porter with 25 points off and Carolyn Herington, 26 points off.

Richard Hogue, called by many "God's Man for the Now Generation," will be speaking to Farwell High School students at 1 p.m. CST Wednesday, Dec. 8.

Adults are also invited to hear this speaker who is also conducting a "Spireno" Festival in Clovis at the First Baptist Church at 7:30 p.m. MST nightly next week, Dec. 5-12.

Richard Hogue's "Spiritual Revolution, Now!" (SPIRENO) movement has attracted America's teenagers in an unprecedented manner. Complete with dazzling day-glow flower emblems, youngsters by the literal thousands crowd out school auditoriums, stadiums and church auditoriums to hear his straight-forward comments regarding their need to function according to God's design for their lives.

Hogue will appear at the Festival with a folk-rock trio, Bill, Dave and Mary, who reveal their own revolutionary commitment to Christ through their music.

Students who have found experiments with drugs to be unsatisfying are especially influenced by Hogue, and for this reason, the team was invited to speak in every high school and junior high in Houston recently. As a result, the 16-week stay in that city brought over 5000 young people to make a "personal commitment to Christ."

Invitations to speak in high

school assemblies are only part of the team's activity. They can be found early or late, talking to teens in drive-ins, stadiums or on college campuses.

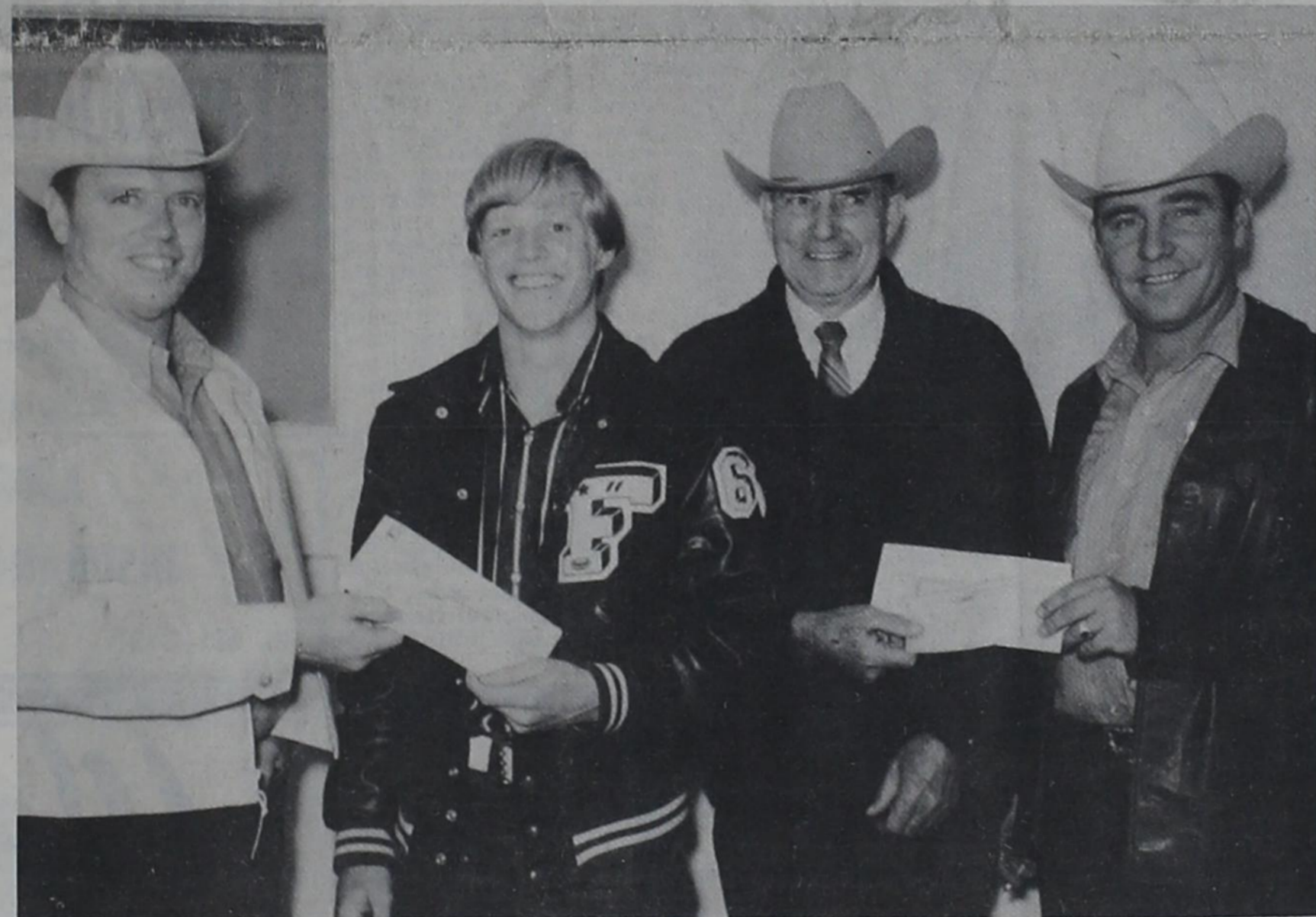
While 60 per cent of the audiences often are teenagers, ad-

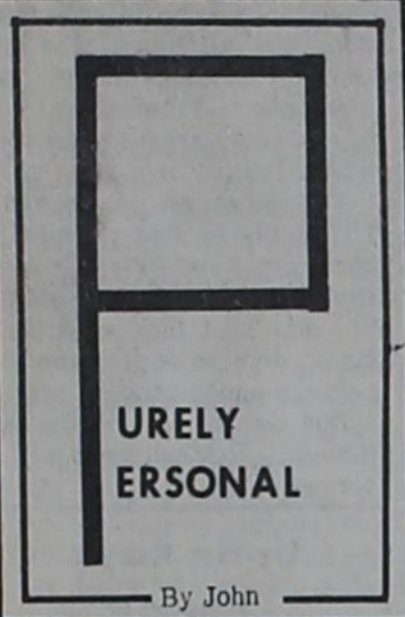
They are also helping Farwell Elementary purchase equipment and supplies which are used throughout the year by children in this area.

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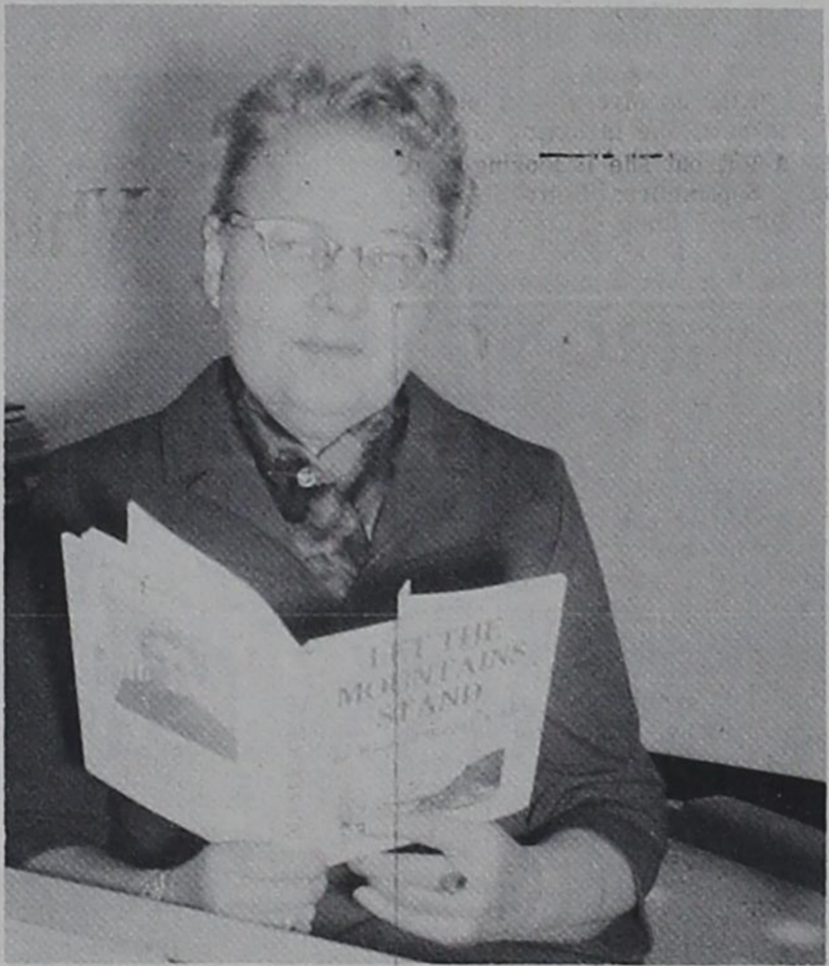

Promptly File Medicare Claims

To avoid delay in Medicare payment, patients should file claims promptly after they get their doctor bills, according to J. C. Carabaja, social security Field Representative.

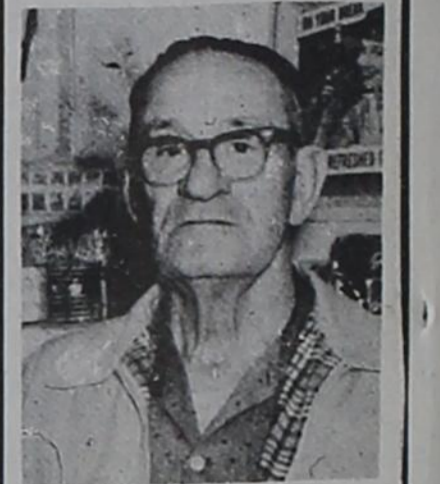
"Many people let their medical bills accumulate until the end of the year and then file their claim. This tends to create a clerical backlog that can cause delays in payments," Carabaja said.

Claims are filed on "Request for Medicare Payment" forms available at most doctors' offices and at any social security office, Carabaja said. The booklet, "Your Medicare Handbook," tells where claims forms should be sent.

In many cases physicians submit claims for their services under Medicare themselves and are paid directly by the Government.

Carabaja said December 31, 1971, is the deadline for filing medical claims for services rendered October 1, 1969, through September 30, 1970.

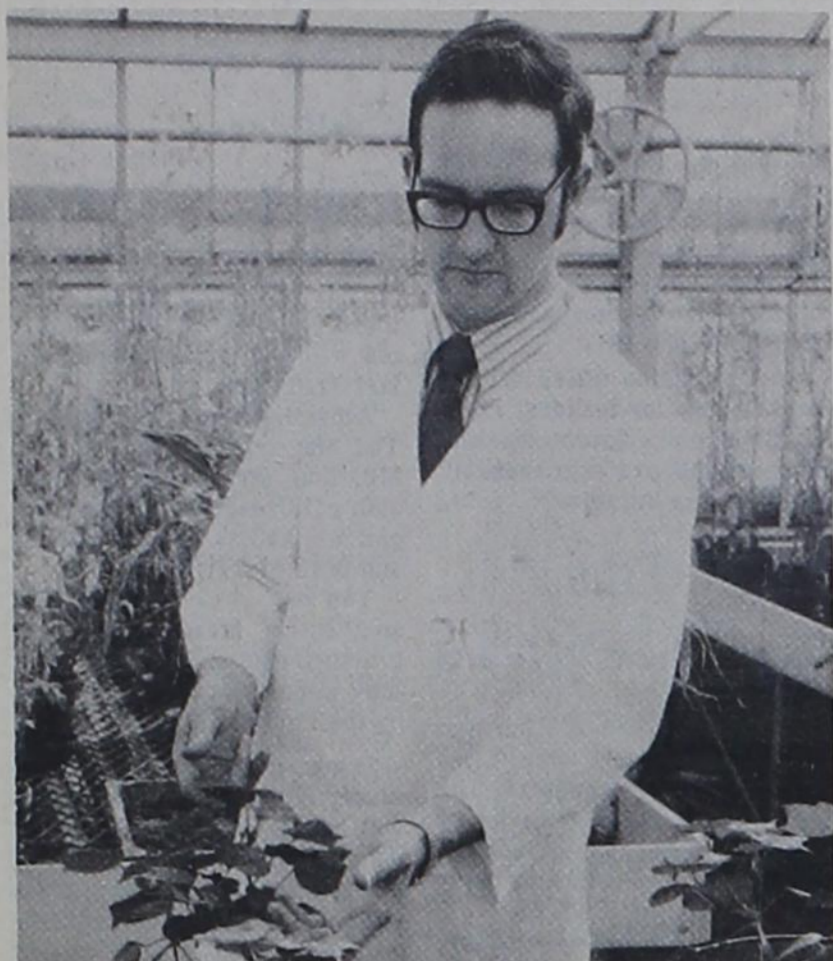

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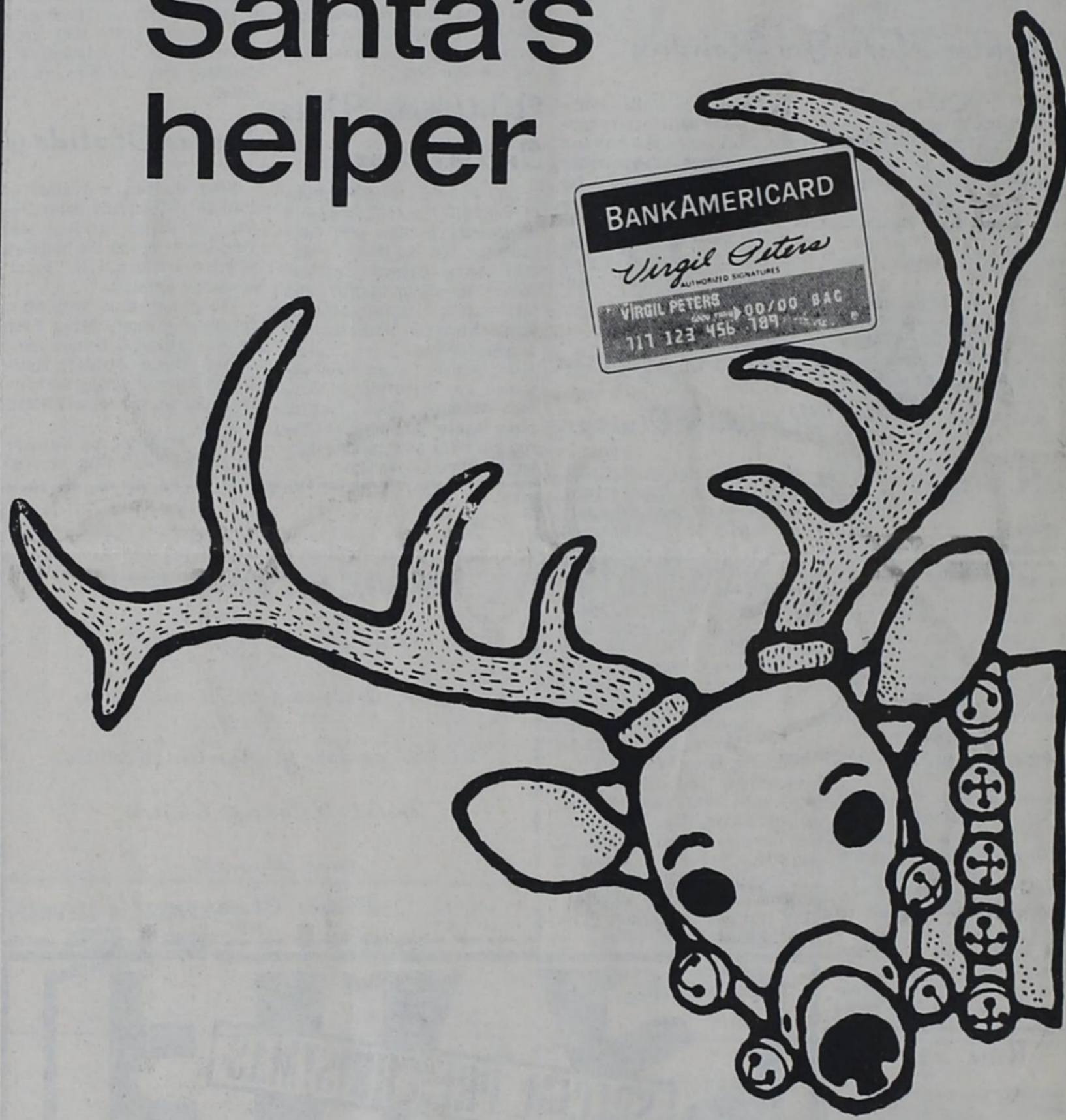
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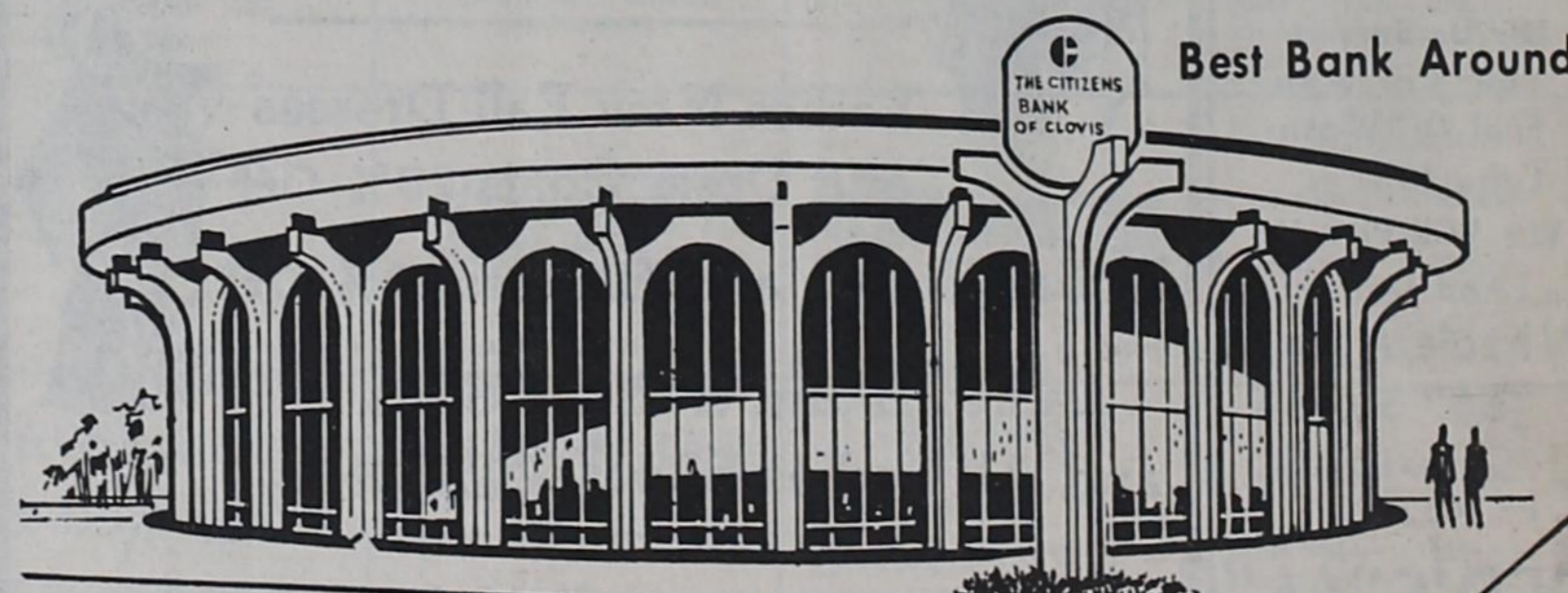
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
