
To avoid delay in Medicare payment, patients should file claims promptly after they get their doctor bills, according to J. C. Carabajal, social security Field Representative.

"Many people let their medical bills accumulate until the end of the year and then file their claim. This tends to create a clerical backlog that can cause delays in payments," Carabajal said.
