

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup sweet milk 1 cup sifted flour

Put handle on iron. Dip clean iron in deep fat first. Have a clean cup towel on cabinet. Lean iron on towel. Then dip into batter; then back into hot grease. (Grease should be deep; she uses vegetable oil). When brown, take off with fork (very gently); sprinkle with powdered sugar. Oil should be 375 to 400 degrees.

POPCORN BALLS

"My mother has always made popcorn balls for Christmas for as long as I can remember. All the grandchildren always beg for them and she usually manages to make a few through the year also. (Those at Christmas keep our mouth watering for more during the year.) Hers never fail; but I'm not nearly as talented as she in preparing them," says Mrs. Liethen. Pop two cans of corn.

SYRUP 2 cups of sugar 1/2 cup white Karo 1/4 cup water dash salt

Cook until it forms a hard ball in cold water or strings from spoon. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 tablespoon vinegar (this prevents it from turning to sugar). Put back on burner and boil one minute. Pour over corn, stir with wooden spoon evenly. Flour hands and form into balls.

Mrs. Gilbert Kaltwasser brings us to Germany with a few of her husband's family favorites. She was introduced to German cookery after her marriage to Gilbert who comes from a long line of Germans. She especially called our attention to her Blitz Torte recipe which she has adapted to cake mixes.

POTATO PANCAKES 6 large potatoes (about 3 lbs.) 4 eggs, well beaten 2 tablespoons flour 1 teaspoon salt few grains pepper 1 small onion, grated vegetable oil or shortening

Peel potatoes and soak in cold water for several hours. Grate potatoes and drain off excess liquid. There should be four cups of potato pulp. Add eggs, flour, salt and pepper; mix until blended, Stir in onion. Pour a thin layer of oil into bottom of a large skillet and place over moderately high heat (about 350 degrees).

Drop spoonsful of batter into skillet and fry until golden brown on both sides. Makes 30 or more large pancakes. The Kaltwassers eat their with applesauce.



CRAFTY IDEAS

Play Clay Topiary Tree

Prepare play clay mixture. When cool enough to handle, knead like dough. Form into about 30 1-inch balls and about 66 1 1/4-inch diameter balls. Stick a clove into each ball and set out, clove side up, on protected surface; dry overnite. Stick a toothpick into soft (undried) part on bottom of each ball; dry completely.

Melt paraffin wax over water in a double boiler. Add bits of red crayon to color wax a bright red. Dip dried play clay balls into melted wax, coating evenly. Then dip each immediately into ice water to harden wax and give it a shiny appearance. For a brighter color, play clay can be dipped again into wax, then ice water.

Purchase a 12 inch high styrofoam cone and separate base. Beginning around bottom edge of cone, stick in larger play clay balls. Continue adding balls in rows, placing smaller balls near top and finishing with 1 ball on the top. Fill in spaces with holly or green plastic leaves. Set finished, decorated cone on base.


Play Clay: Thoroughly mix 1 cup Argo corn starch



To make this attractive decoration, play clay is dipped into red-colored wax and arranged to look like a tree of shiny, tiny apples.






