In Madrid, Spain --

## Inmans Participate In New Life Crusade

Mr. and Mrs. Marlon Inman of Farwell were part of a group of 250 Baptist Americans who went to Spain in October for a New Life Crusade, sponsored by World Evangelism Foundation in Abilene.

The Inmans traveled to Spain with 33 other members of First Baptist Church, Clovis, for the purpose of reaching people who are not a part of any church in Spain.

The Inmans, along with area groups, flew to Madrid by way of New York. The Inmans traveled to Lubbock by car where they boarded Braniff to New York. In New York, the group from this area was joined by the rest of the Baptists attending the crusade. The entire group boarded a TWA plane which took them to Madrid.

According to Mrs. Inman,

the Spanish government granted freedom of religion to its 33 1/2 million people only three years ago. Up until that time, Catholicism was the state religion.

The Inman's team was assigned to Usera Baptist Church in Madrid upon their arrival. Two other Clovis groups were assigned to First Baptist and Villa Verde Baptist Churches in Madrid.

"Upon arriving, we found the people of the church skeptical of us and of their government officials. The church doors had been sealed for seven years before the government granted freedom of religion and the pastor had been imprisoned," said Mrs. Inman.

Mrs. Inman commented that the people's skepticism was overcome somewhat when a large

reception was held in the Melia' Castilla Hotel where the Baptist group stayed. Dignitaries representing the American Embassy in Spain, Mayor of Madrid and Archbishop of Madrid attended.

Each night of the crusade, which was held October 17-25, Mr. and Mrs. Inman and team members, Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Allsup, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Hartley, Ric Hunt, Brian Jones and Margaret Jackson, all of Clovis, took turns giving their testimonies and acting in different capacities. Mrs. Inman played the organ for the nightly crusades.

Other activities by the team included giving a special children's program and visiting Spanish Baptist members and their friends. Each team member was assigned to a member of the Usera Baptist Church. Inman's comrade for the crusade was an elderly, retired man who couldn't speak any English. So eager to be of help to his new American friend, the man purchased an English-Spanish dictionary so he could learn enough English to communicate during the week.

One of the most inspiring activities for Mrs. Inman was visiting with the Spanish women in their homes. When Mrs. Inman visited the apartments in which most of the people live, she would be greeted by her hostess and a room full of guests which the hostess had invited.

While the women were visiting, the hostess would bring out a "snack" which Mrs. Inman said seemed enough food for supper. The food included sandwiches, with several different kinds of meats, and specially-purchased bread for the American visitors.

Mrs. Inman was especially pleased with the way the Spanish people tried to please the American Baptists. One missionary said that it was a rare occasion for the Spanish people to invite visitors to their home.

Upon leaving, the Inmans and their team members were presented Spanish fans and sword-type letter openers. Mrs. Inman later found out that the fans were engraved with gold and that the letter openers were made from gold in nearby Toledo.

The Usera church also presented First Baptist Church of Clovis with a large silver engraved plaque to show their delight and appreciation with the visiting Americans.

Another experience which the Inmans had with the generosity of the Spanish people was on a visit to a local restaurant. After coming to a decision on what to order, which was hard because of the communications barrier, the Inmans and their team members decided to order omelets.

While waiting for their food, the group began talking to a Spanish man who spoke exceptionally good English. When he received his food, the Inmans inquired what it was. As it turned out the man was eating a Spanish working man's lunch.

The lunch, which consisted of a meat dish and a special type of beans, appealed to the American group, and they asked for a sample. The owner of the restaurant complied with their request by bringing them entire bowls full of food. "I think that is probably the best meal we had the entire time we were gone," said Mrs. Inman.

Although the Baptist group stayed in a new motel called an apartotel -- like an efficiency apartment in the United States with a kitchenette -- most of the meals were eaten in local restaurants or in the homes of their Spanish hosts.

In Sevilla, Spain, a group of Baptists from First Baptist Church, Muleshoe, was conducting crusades. Although Sevilla didn't have a resident pastor, the group tried to reach as many people as they could. Attending were former Muleshoe residents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Buice and Mr. and Mrs. John Crow; and Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Harlan, Rev. and Mrs. Doug Dubose, Mr. and Mrs. Mark Crimsley, Mrs. Mildred Neely and Larry Henry all of Muleshoe.

An interesting comment from a priest who attended a Baptist church during the crusade seems to sum up the feeling of the Spanish people for their American Baptist friends. "This is the first time I have heard a sermon on Jesus in two years, and it came from a Texas farmer."

After the crusade was over, the Inmans spent several days sightseeing in Paris, Amsterdam and London before returning home by plane. When asked about this part of her trip, Mrs. Inman said, "I just wasn't impressed with what I saw after I had received such satisfaction in Spain by visiting with the common people."

While the Inmans were attending the Crusade and traveled in Europe, their children stayed with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Verney Towns, and with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Hargrove, all of Farwell, and with Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Inman of Muleshoe, Inman's parents.

### Mechanic Training Offered

An auto mechanic training course which has been approved by Texas Employment Commission and Texas Education Agency under the Manpower Development Training Act will be offered beginning Jan. 24 and ending Oct. 20 in Hereford.

The 39-week training course will be under the direction of Hereford Independent School District. Applications and information concerning the program may be obtained from the TEC office in Friona. The address is 103 W. 7th Street.

Any person unemployed or underemployed, 18 years of age or older, who has a desire to do automobile mechanic work is eligible to apply.

Trainees who are heads of families may be paid \$42 per week, plus \$5 per week for each dependent up to six dependents. Trainees under 22 years of age may receive \$42 per week. Travel allowances are paid to trainees who commute to the training facility.

Trainees must attend classes eight hours daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Training will be conducted Monday through

## Nominees Sought For Homemaker Award

A nominee for Parmer County for the Texas Conservation Homemaker Award is being sought by the Soil Conservation Service and Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Jana Pronger, Parmer County Home Demonstration agent, and Herb Evans, Work Unit Conservationist for Soil Conservation Service, are in charge of finding a county nominee.

Any woman who lives in the county and she or her husband operate a farm or ranch under a basic soil and water conservation plan developed in cooperation with the local Soil and Water Conservation District may submit her name and record.

County participants must submit their records to the Home Demonstration agent's office at Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell by Feb. 1 in order to be considered as a nominee from Parmer County. Guidelines for putting together a record book and other information pertaining to the local contest may be obtained at the Home Demonstration agent's office or by calling 481-3691.

A three-member county committee will be in charge of selecting a nominee from those entering record books. Any organization wishing to sponsor a woman in the contest must have her record book in the extension office by Feb. 1. Former regional winners of the Homemaker Award may en-

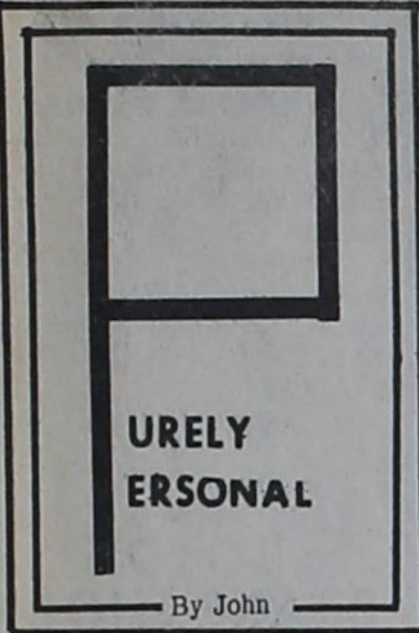
ter the county contest providing they update their record books and submit it to the HD agent by Feb. 1.

Women will be judged on farm and ranch conservation practices followed, 50 per cent; conservation practices followed in the home, 25 per cent; and leadership and community life, 25 per cent.

County nominations will be sent to a regional judging committee, in the case of Parmer County, it will be Region I. The regional committee will pick one nominee who will be given a silver award at the regional awards banquet held in May.

The regional nominee from each of Texas' five regions will have her records sent to a state judging committee who will be in charge of picking a Texas Conservation Homemaker. The top award will be a silver service presented to the honoree during State Conservation Awards Program held May 13 in the Student Center Ballroom on the Texas Christian University campus in Fort Worth.

The Texas Conservation Homemaker Award -- "Walter R. Humphrey Award" -- is one of many awards sponsored by Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce in the 1972 Awards Program. It is given to recognize achievements of Texas homemakers in the area of conservation of human and natural resources and to inspire others to cooperate in good conservation practices.

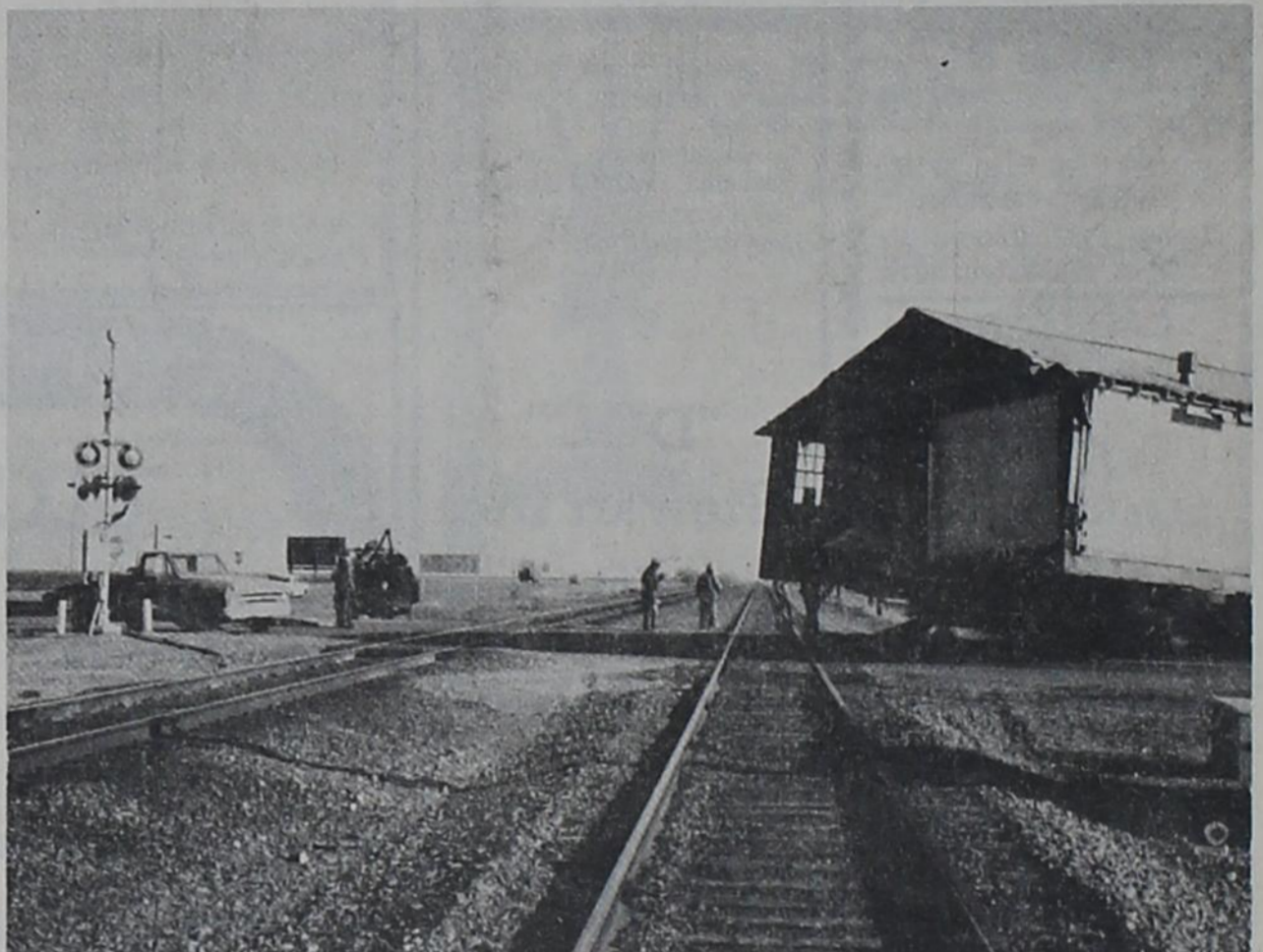

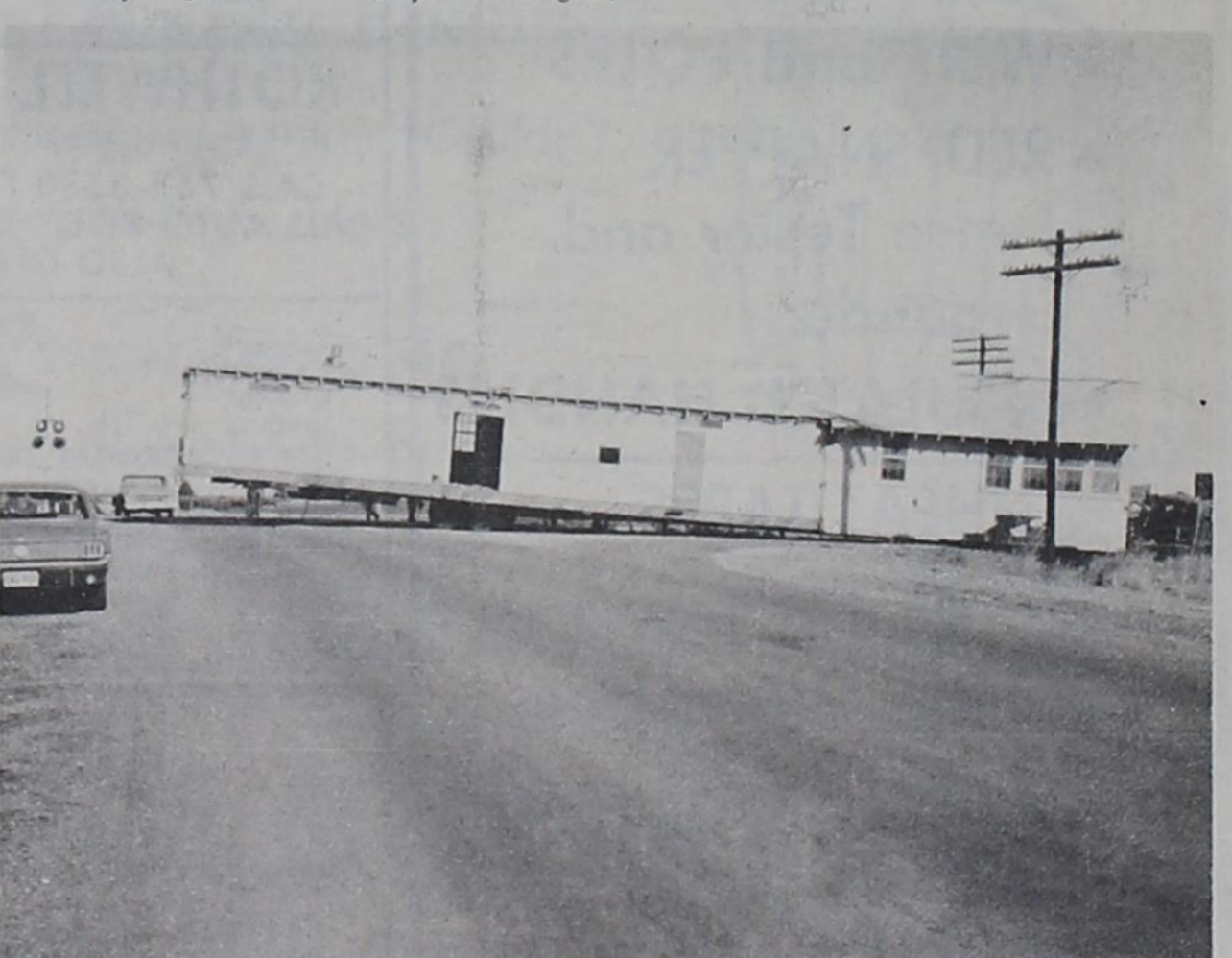

### By Secretary Of State --

## Directive Issued Concerning Elections

Secretary of State Bob Bullock has announced that, as the State's chief election officer, he has issued to all persons involved in the election process a directive governing the maintaining and reporting of campaign contributions and expenditures.

"The Texas Election Code clearly specifies," Bullock said, "that the people have a legal right to know who contributes money, how much money is contributed and how the money is expended in every campaign for elective public office in Texas.

"Likewise, contributors themselves have the right to know that their contributions are expended for campaign purposes and not diverted to fulfill a candidate's personal financial obligations.

"Unfortunately, however, it has become common practice for candidates to list names and addresses which are insufficient to identify the contributors. In addition, records have frequently not been maintained or made available to the public concerning the sources, amounts and expenditures of contributions to local campaign

Instead of the solid mesh cap, a stretch framework has been developed, in which soft bands hold together free-floating strips of the fiber. Every strand of hair can thus be brushed in any direction and parts placed anywhere. And the wearer's own hair can be pulled through to blend with the synthetic fiber.

These new developments, then, allow the wearer to completely restyle her wig and to combine natural and synthetic hair fibers for creative holiday styles, the specialist points out.
