much of the unrestrained joy-How would you like to have access to \$5 billion dollars worth of financial aid while at the same time Uncle Sam steps in and wipes out your major competitor? Sounds good, Heck yes, it is good for those who profit thereby. BUT what about the taxpayer and equally important small independent and unregulated truckers???

It looks as if the latter two mentioned will take a beating if the proposed legislation passes in its present form. We are calloused to the beatings handed out to Johnny Q. Taxpayer but do feel a twinge of sympathy for the independent trucker.

The independent trucker in this neck of the woods is most popular as well as necessary. Practically all our livestock is hauled in this way. Much of our farm produce is likewise hauled by local independent truckers. In fact, local independent non-regulated trucking plays a big part in any farming locality.

So while we are all thinking that maybe the railroads and the big truckers are going to have their lot eased a bit by federal fiat, we should apprise our U.S. Senators and Representatives that we are also in layor of protection for the taxpayer and the small independent businessman at the same time. Rewriting of the U.S. Senate bill #2362 appears to be in order.

While the women were visiting, the hostess would bring out a "snack" which Mrs. Inman said seemed enough food for supper. The food included sandwiches, with several different kinds of meats, and specially-purchased bread for the American visitors.

Mrs. Inman was especially pleased with the way the Spanish people tried to please the American Baptists. One missionary said that it was a rare occasion for the Spanish people to invite visitors to their

Upon leaving, the Inmans and their team members were presented Spanish fans and swordtype letter openers. Mrs. Inman later found out that the fans were engraved with gold and that the letter openers were made from gold in nearby To-

The Usera church also presented First Baptist Church of Clovis with a large silver engraved plaque to show their delight and appreciation with the visiting Americans.

Another experience which the Inmans had with the generosity of the Spanish people was on a visit to a local restaurant. After coming to a decision on what to order, which was hard because of the communications barrier, the Inmans and their team members decided to order omelets.

While waiting for their food, the group began talking to a Spanish man who spoke exceptionally good English. When he received his food, the Inmans inquired what it was. As it turned out the man was eating a out 221 sacks which had been

When asked about this part of her trip, Mrs. Inman said, "I just wasn't impressed with what I saw after I had received such satisfaction in Spain by visiting with the common people."


An auto mechanic training course which has been approved by Texas Employment Commission and Texas Education Agency under the Manpower Development Training Act will be offered beginning Jan. 24


Any person unemployed or underemployed, 18 years of age or older, who has a desire to do automobile mechanic work is eligible to apply.
