In County Show --

Mark Haseloff Shows Grand Champion Steer

Mark Haseloff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Haseloff of Farwell, exhibited the Grand Champion Steer at Farmer County Junior Livestock Show over the weekend in Friona. He was also presented the Beef Showmanship Award.

Haseloff, a member of the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Club, sold the 1057-pound Charolais Angus cross named "Bourbon" to Worley Grain of Farwell for \$1.05 per pound, bringing a premium price of \$1,110. The steer also placed first in the heavyweight class.

It was the first time in the show's 25-year history that a crossbred steer has won a championship. A record number of 66 entries was recorded in the steer show.

An auction held at the end of

the end of the show netted \$43,676.95, a new record. The total represented premiums as well as floor price bids for the cattle, sheep and barrows.

Mac Langford, Farwell 4-H Club member, placed second in the steer heavyweight class. Others placing were Joe Haseloff, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, third; Mark Haseloff, fourth; and Ronald Powell, Lazbuddie 4-H, sixth.

Placing in the steer medium heavy class were Vickie Gillan, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, second; Billy Johnson, Farwell FFA, fourth; and Bruce Kaltwasser, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, fifth.

Steve Kaltwasser, Farwell FFA, exhibited the first place steer in the light medium class. Others placing were Conda

Jones, Farwell FFA, second; Annette Langford, Farwell 4-H, fourth; Carrie Haseloff, Farwell FFA, fifth; Jacquelyn Langford, Farwell 4-H, sixth; Joe Haseloff, seventh; and Conda Jones, eighth.

John Johnson, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, exhibited the first place steer in the lightweight class. Jeannette Gillian, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, placed second. Others placing were Harold Jones, Farwell FFA, third; Freddie Dale, Farwell FFA, fourth; Carrie Haseloff, seventh; and Scotty Gillian, Oklahoma Lane 4-H, ninth.

Out of 40 steers sold during the show, 18 belonged to 4-H Club members, according to Farmer County Agent Mack Heald.

Dwight Green, Farwell 4-H, exhibited the Champion Hampshire in the barrow show.

Reserve Breed Champion in the Hampshire class was Greg Taylor, Farwell FFA. Also placing in the lightweight class was Ricky Williams, Farwell FFA, ninth.

Russell Windham placed second in the mediumweight Hampshire class. Also placing were Carl Kirkland, Farwell FFA, fifth; and Kent Gast, Farwell FFA, tenth. Second and third places in the heavyweight class went to Lori Norton, Farwell FFA, and Carl Kirkland.

Terri Clark, Lazbuddie 4-H, exhibited the first place lightweight Chester White. Others placing were Gary Green, Farwell FFA, fourth; and Lori Norton, seventh.

Ricky Williams placed sixth in the mediumweight Chester White class. Placing in the heavyweight class were David Garner, third; Thad Phillips, fifth; and David Norton, sixth. All are Farwell FFA members.

Placing in the lightweight Duroc class were Lisa Meneff, Lazbuddie 4-H, third; Stephen Stevenson, Lazbuddie 4-H, fourth; and Donnie Garner, Farwell FFA, ninth.

Another week with a federal flat Monday holiday. This does wreak havoc with the weekly newspaper business, as a large number of our news and advertising sources are closed. Upon reflection, this is not as bad as the poor barber. Pity him, he now has to celebrate his holidays on his regular day off.

This week, the Farwell city offices were moved to the old Security State Bank building on the corner of First St. and Avenue A. Janie Bowery, city clerk, worked most of her Monday holiday effecting the change. This will greatly improve the ability of the general public to find and get into the city offices, as well as provide larger and more attractive space for the transaction of city business. The City Council expressed gratitude to G. D. Anderson for his generous gift.

This does leave the city with the decision as to what to do with the old City Hall, also known as the former American Legion building. It cannot be just abandoned and left to decay, yet there is need for extensive repairs to the old place. It is possible that some organization looking for a home could arrange a deal with the city that would be advantageous to all concerned. It might be possible that with sufficient repairs some federal or state office could be found that could use the facility.

Let us apply our collective minds to the problem and see if we can turn a potential liability into a positive asset. Nothing is lost, it just may be overlooked.

At this writing, early in the week, we are not faulting the China trip or the reception given to our President. But, the obvious difference between the level of attainment of a communist country and a free enterprise country ought to be obvious to even the most dedicated foe of crass commercialism.

The view offered by the television cameras of the Grand Square in Peking was startling to Western eyes. Here is a place in China that is the equivalent of Times Square and Pennsylvania Avenue all rolled into one, and it looked about as empty as a large air base after abandonment.

There were a few buses whizzing past with an occasional sedan type of automobile and a few pedestrians and bicycle riders. This looked as if it was China's main thoroughfare. Shucks, Clovis on Saturday night has more teen-agers draggin' Main than that.

Well so much for technology in the people's paradise. If we desire to "progress" to this exalted state, we need only to listen to some of our more hairbrained national politicians. And in a decade we could find this country returned to 19th century methods of existence.

No Cases Come Before Court

Petit jurors summoned for district court last week were not called to appear since civil cases which were to be tried were either settled out of court or passed until another term, said District Clerk Dorothy Quickel.

Farwell Steers upset Lorenzo Tuesday night with an electrifying last minute play to win 73-70 during the bi-district game in Plainview Tuesday night. Brett Hargrove was fouled in the last three seconds and brought the house down with two beautiful free throws.

With 33 seconds left in the game, Lorenzo led by one point, 70-69. A field goal scored by Brett Hargrove with 22 seconds left put Farwell ahead by one point. The win was clinched by Hargrove's free throws. The "Cardiac Kids," dubbed by Coach Vernon Scott, will play in the regional tournament Saturday morning at 10 a.m. They face Petrolia, champion of districts 7 and 8 Class A. Petrolia is 7-A district champ. Petrolia is located about 35 miles northeast of Wichita Falls.

Farwell will be the home team, sitting on the south side, at the regional tournament which will be played at Coronado High School, 34th and Vicksburg in Lubbock. Sanford Fritch and Seagraves, champions of districts 1 and 2 and 5 and 6, will battle at 8:30 a.m. Winners in these games will play at 7 p.m. for the regional championship.

Scott said, "There are 16 teams left in Class A, but Saturday night there will only be four teams left to go to Austin for the state playoffs. A 6'4" player and No. 44, Massey, will be the ones we need to watch for in our game with Petrolia. The tall player is mobile and a very good basketball player. Massey is a good ball handler and outside shooter."

"Petrolia doesn't run and

doesn't press. We will be playing our style of ball when we fact them this Saturday. We will be playing aggressively, using our bench and playing like we're going to win."

Farwell led in scoring at the end of the first quarter of play Tuesday night 19-10 over Lorenzo. By the end of the second quarter, Lorenzo had gained a two-point lead over Farwell, 32-30.

Playing nip-and-tuck ball in the third quarter, Lorenzo still hung on to a one point lead, 51-50, at the end of the third quarter. The Steers earned their nickname, the "Cardiac Kids," in the fourth quarter of play.

With 3:41 to go in the fourth quarter, Lorenzo led 64-63. In a topsy turvy, heart-stopping quarter, Farwell caught up and led by one point, 67-66, with 2:36 to go. Tension began to build up as Farwell and Lorenzo again exchanged one point leads until Brett Hargrove's basket with 33 seconds left. The final two points were tacked on with three seconds left in the game when Hargrove was fouled and scored two free throws giving Farwell the 73-70 win.

Hargrove scored 29 points with 16 rebounds during the tilt. Kevin Hardage scored 20; David Dannheim, 10; Larry Erwin, nine; Kevin Hargrove, three; and Mike Travis, two, for the Steers.

Scott mentioned the individual efforts of Brett Hargrove, David Dannheim and Kevin Hardage, but stressed that the win was a team effort on the part of the 10-man team. "They were all pulling together," he said.

Farwell beat Spearman 59-58 in a pre-bi-district scrimmage.

'Going Places' --

Adds Extra Dimension To Scouting

When Gene Bitner first became a Scoutmaster in 1966, he was determined to "get the boys out of their back yard." And, from their inception, Texico-Farwell Scouts have made the highways and both state and national parks a meaningful part of their program.

This year, as Boy Scouts across the nation celebrate their 62nd birthday (and the local program celebrates its sixth), our boys will be representing the Twin Cities across most of the western United States in their longest and most exciting trip to date. Leaving Saturday, June 10, for an eventual destination of Fairbanks, Alaska, they will begin an expedition covering 13 states; two Canadian provinces and one Canadian territory.

Is there anything to be gained from such travel, other than seeing a lot of beautiful country and having a lot of fun? Most of the boys' parents believe there is! Scoutmaster Bitner explains it this way: "Travel today is a part of everyday life, and it gets more complicated every day. One Scout mother told me just the other day of how her youngest son had to make a long trip on his own. She expressed the belief that the boy's

experiences in traveling with Troop 200 helped him use the correct procedures."

Scouts themselves have found that their travels have "built memories," never to be forgotten in a lifetime. While nothing much exciting or especially interesting is available in the back yard or next county, things are always happening on a Troop 200 trip says Bitner.

For instance, explains the Scoutmaster, just ask any Texico-Farwell Boy Scout who made either the 1970 or the 1971 trips to San Antonio, Houston and Galveston. He might tell you about the time he and his buddies went for a walk at 2:30 in the morning and were nearly scared out of their uniforms by sudden flashing red lights! The friendly patrolman just suggested that walking across the San Jacinto River Bridge might be a little dangerous at that hour.

Then there are stories of sand crabs on Galveston Beach who investigated sleeping bags rolled out on the sand, a visiting skunk while in the Wichita Mountains of Oklahoma, ghost stories before sleeping in a snow-covered cabin in New Mexico mountains -- and the memories go on and on.

"And, there is even a benefit for the citizens left back here in Texico-Farwell," says Bitner. "These youngsters are providing people with a good picture of our community. They are learning values which will make them better students, neighbors and future leaders. And -- they discover better things to do than run around town molesting public and private property."

The play, described as a merry, madcap mystery, was written by Frances L. Stuart. It centers around two weird sisters, Teresa Drake and Loretta Page.

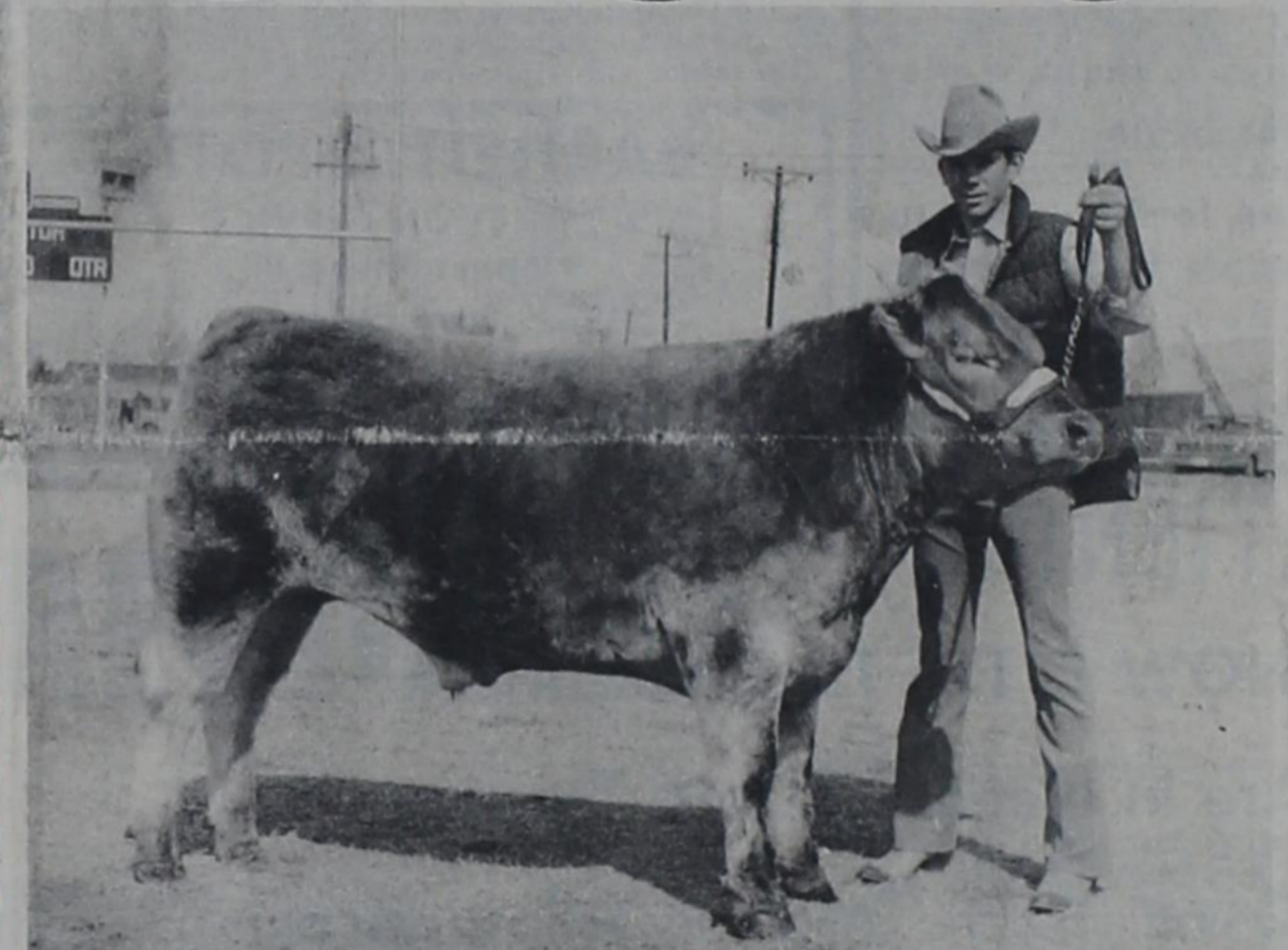

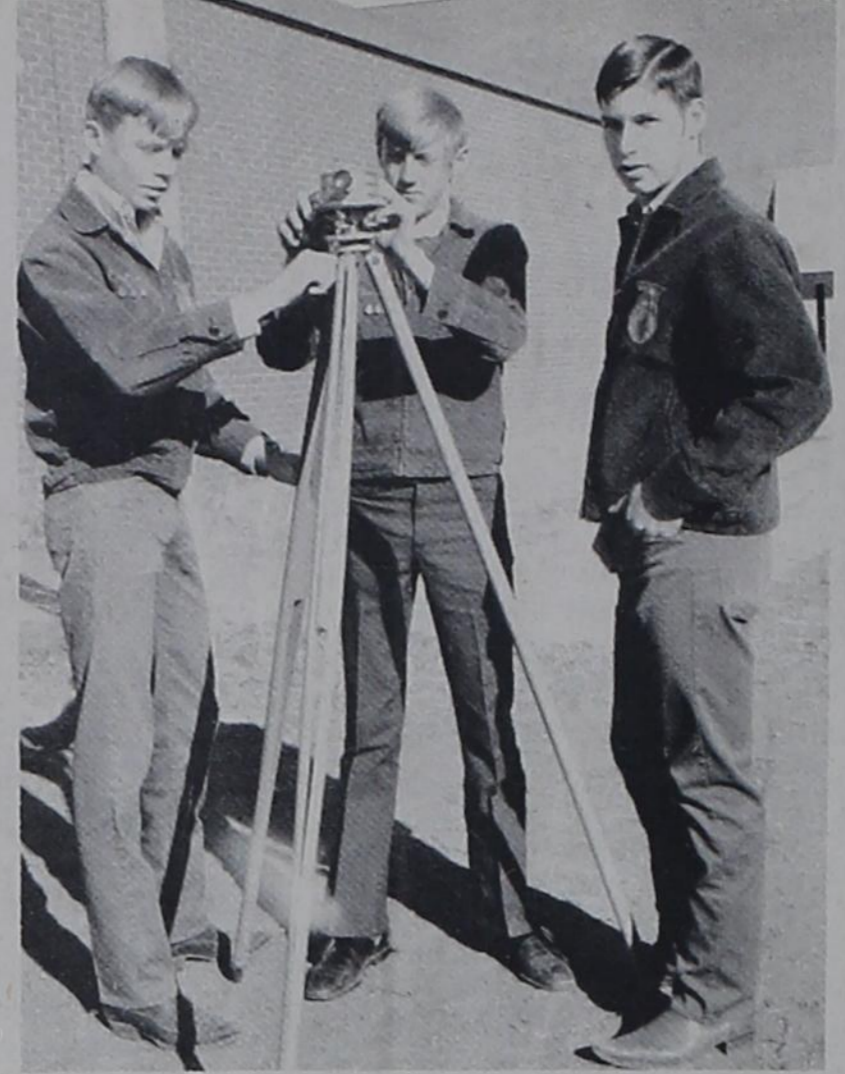

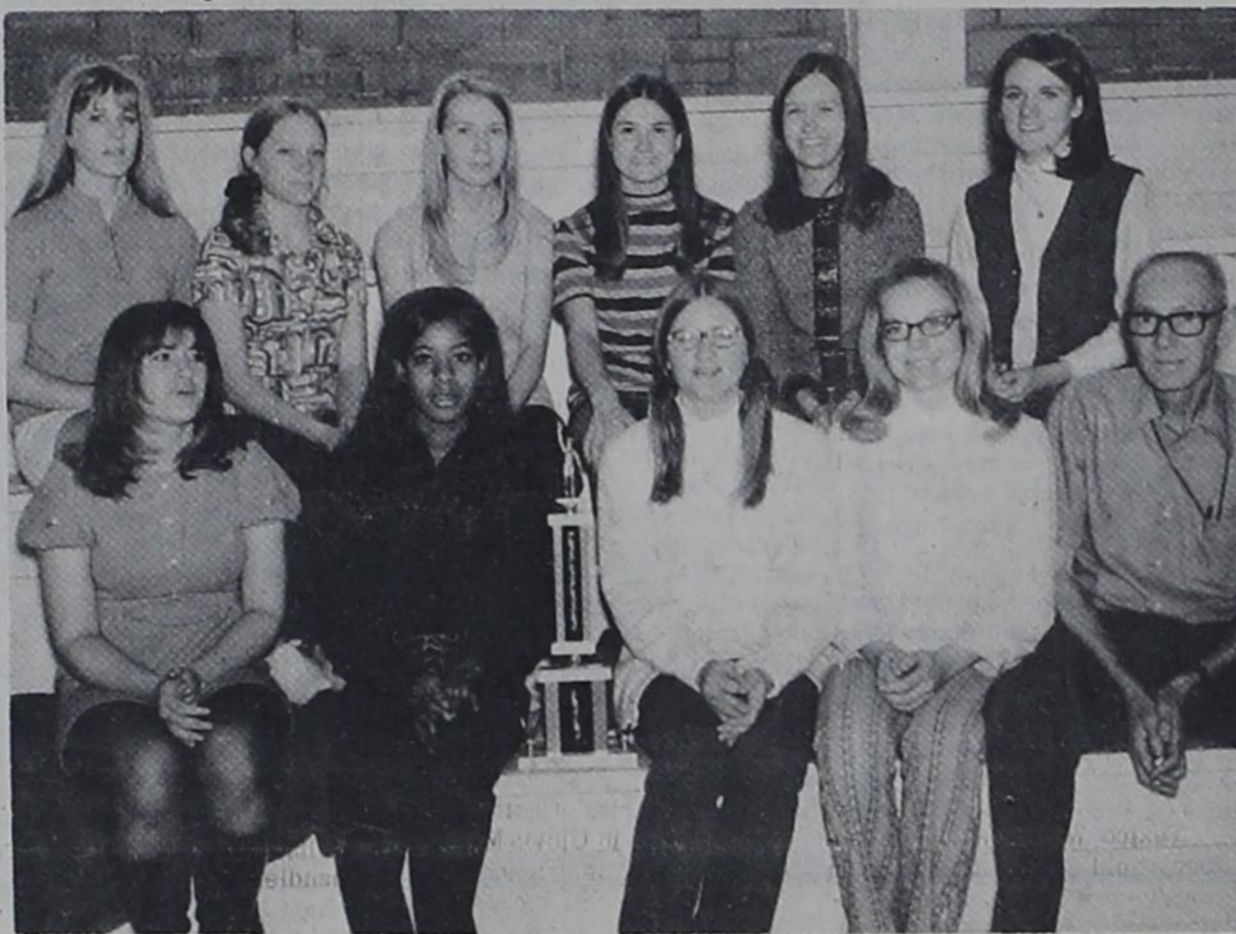
In the semi-finals, Texico shut out Ft. Sumner by a score of 31-28. San Jon stopped Texico girls in the finals by beating them 40-29.

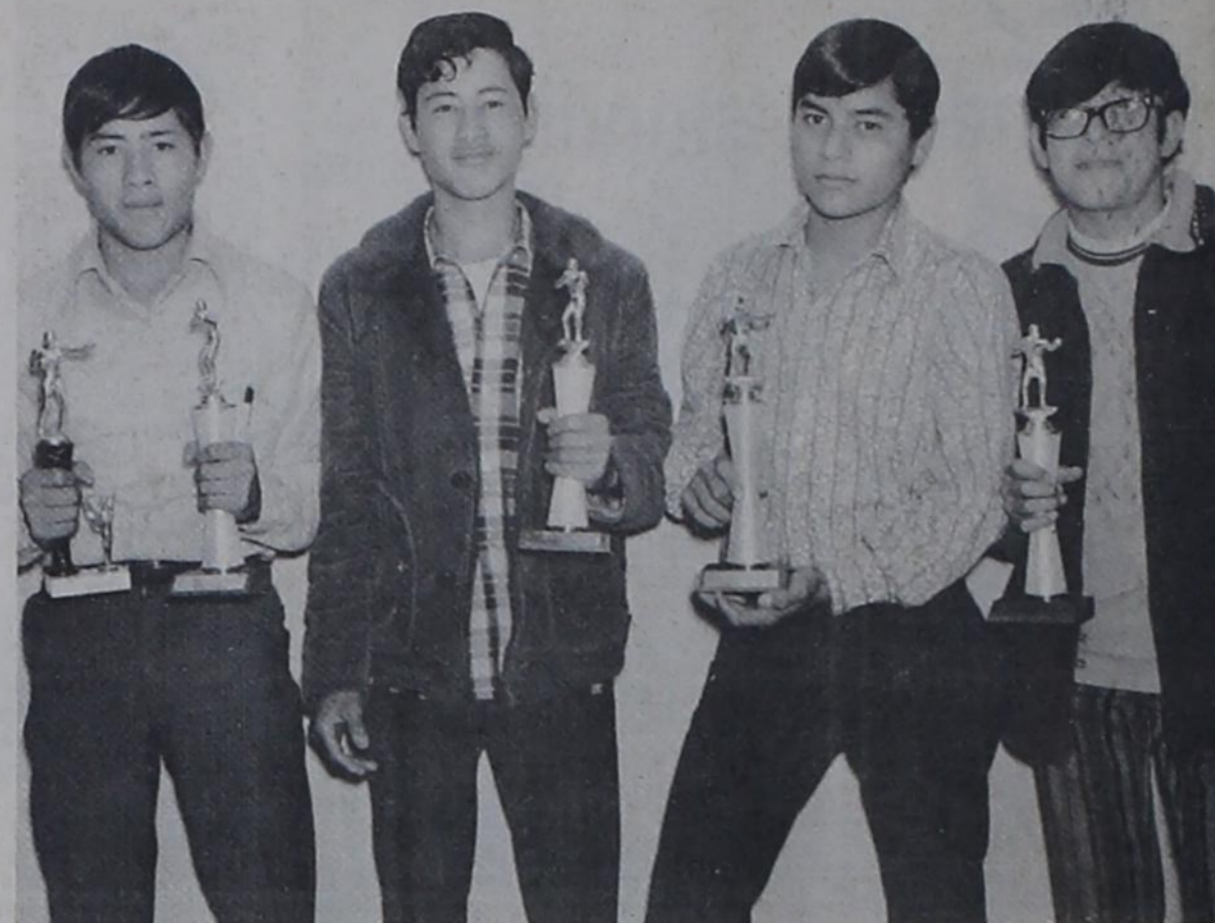

Texico and Farwell Future Farmers of America chapters paused this week to summarize their activities for the year, recognize their officers and observe National FFA Week with chapters in every state of the union.

Farwell FFA chapter, under the direction of Danny Ivy and Jerry Mathis, is composed of 69 members from the ninth to 12th grades.

There are two programs currently being carried out in the vocational agriculture department. These are production agriculture and a co-op training program.

In production agriculture, the boys are taught the basic needs for the program. Phases of the program include livestock production, plant science, soil science and agriculture mechanics.

In studying livestock production, the boys study the anatomy and physiology of farm animals, feed and feed rations, livestock diseases and parasites, judging and selection of livestock, meat products and their evaluation.

Areas covered in plant science study include identification and selection of plants, how to use grass and forest lands, control of insects, di-

sease and undesirable plants, the essential elements plants need and weed control.

Soil Science studies include many areas covered by plant science plus the makeup of soil, soil fertility, land evaluation, soil mapping soil conservation and water conservation.

In studying agriculture mechanics, the boys learn general shop safety, techniques of power and hand tools and basic welding techniques.

As the boys advance through the four-year program they are taught more advanced techniques of welding making objects in both wood and metal, working with electricity, small gas engines, tractor maintenance and plumbing. In their senior year, the boys are allowed to build any type of project they wish.

The co-op training program is limited to junior and senior boys. They have one hour of classroom instruction each day and work three hours each day in on-the-job training. Eleven boys are currently enrolled in this program. Their jobs range from feedlot industry, farming and grounds keeping to ranching. The program is in its third year at Farwell.

FFA officers this year are

David Norton, president; Ray Norton, vice-president; David Garner, secretary; Kevin Kaltwasser, treasurer; Steven Kaltwasser, sentinel; and Kevin Hardage, reporter. Chapter Sweetheart is LaShawn Sheets. FFA Plover is Sandra Ensor.

Texico FFA chapter, under the direction of Eddie West, has been engaged in several money-making projects this year selling floodlights and portable panels. A chapter project for the year was building a stock trailer. There are approximately 35 boys in FFA.

Several boys have been attending judging contest, Ray Hagler recently won first in the District FFA quiz contest. Special project in conjunction with FFA Week is a poster picturing room work, initiation of Greenhands and other activities and projects. The poster is currently hanging in the foyer of the high school and will be transferred to Citizens Bank of Texico later in the week for public viewing.

Shop projects include hay feeders, portable livestock panels, stock trailers, pipe trailers, loading chutes, barbecue grills and nail boxes.

During the first year of the vocational agriculture pro-

gram, boys are introduced to the FFA manual, woodworking, meat and dairy judging and welding.

As they advance, they are involved in individual shop projects, horticulture, dairy, poultry, beef and swine production. Student helpers are involved in instructing the first year members of vocational agriculture in several different areas.

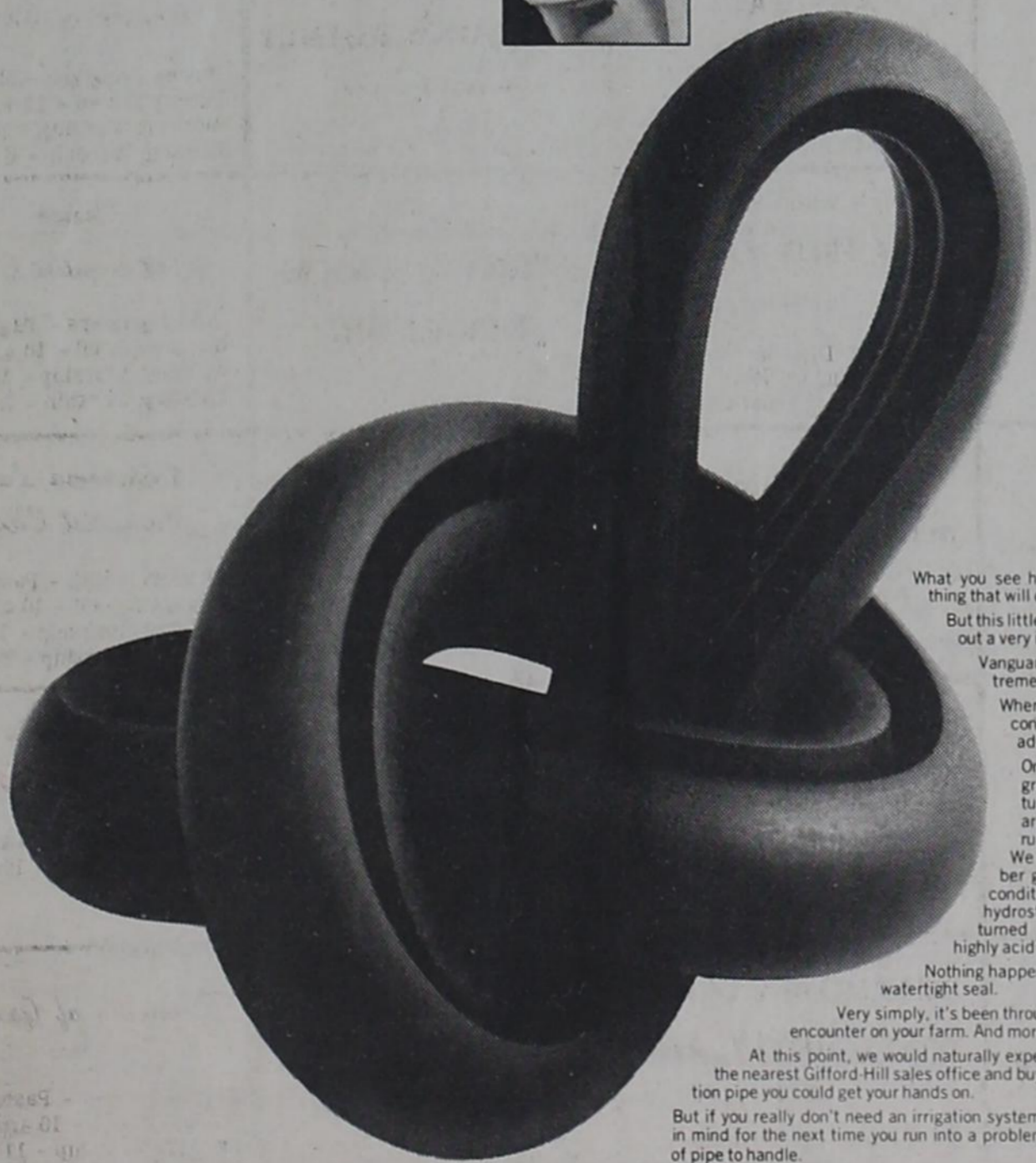

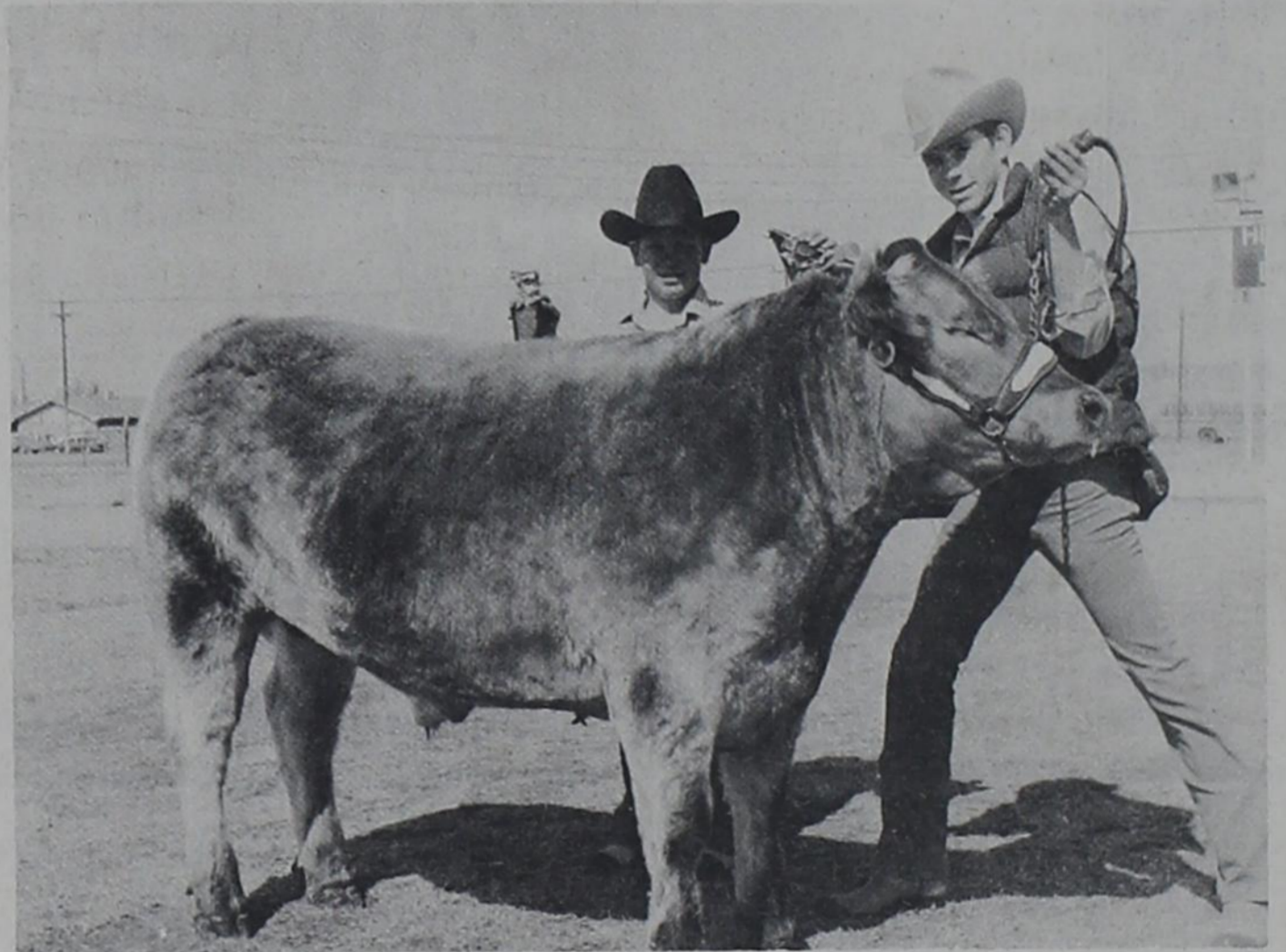

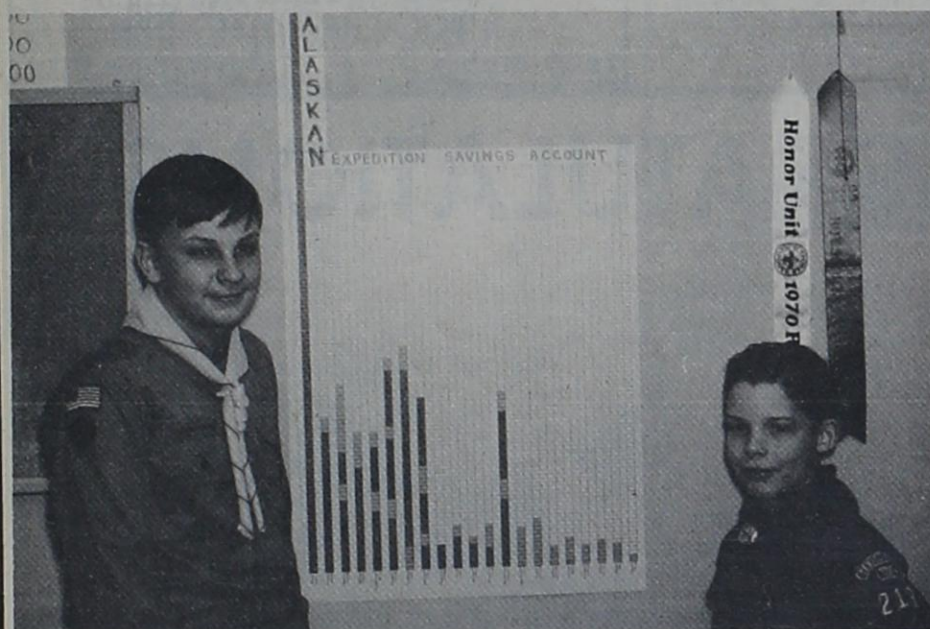
