At Chamber Banquet --

Anderson, Mrs. Christian Man & Woman Of Year

Anderson was described by Jim Berry, who presented the award, as a man interested in the growth and development of Farwell over the years. Berry read a congratulatory telegram which was sent to Anderson by Sen. John Tower. Anderson currently serves as chairman of the board of Security State Bank where he previously served as president for many years.

G. D. Anderson was heralded as Man of the Year at the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet held Friday night at the school cafeteria. Mrs. Troy (Lillie) Christian was chosen Woman of the Year.

Anderson is currently serving as chairman of the board at Security State Bank where he also served as president until last year when his son, R. W., took over the position. Anderson had served in the capacity of president for many years.

He was described as a man interested in the growth and development of Farwell. He has devoted both time and money to various civic projects throughout the years.

Mrs. Christian is president of Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority and is very active in the sorority's philanthropic work. She was recently chosen Outstanding Girl of District I of ESA, along with two other women in the district. She will compete for the state Outstanding Girl award at the ESA state convention in April.

Jim Berry made the presentation of Man of the Year award to Anderson. Mrs. Charles Aycock, last year's recipient, made the Woman of the Year award presentation to Mrs. Christian. R. W. Anderson, son of this year's honoree, was

He traced an imaginary tornado that appeared six minutes out of Farwell. He then asked the audience to ask questions on what precautions they should take against the threat.

True suggested to the banquet attendants that the South Plains and Panhandle towns and cities establish a spotting point on the southwest edge of the city and man it with volunteers to spot for tornadoes during the season.

He cautioned the audience saying, "Whether we like it or not we are in a tornado area." He concluded his speech by giving defenses against sustaining injury during a tornado.

Approximately 200 persons attended the annual banquet and meeting. The meal was prepared by Farwell School cafeteria ladies. Ed Hargade and Juanita Smith provided interlude music.

Theme of the banquet was "Chamber Carnival." Decorations were large colorful animal cutouts along the cafeteria walls with clusters of balloons hanging from the ceiling. A carnival skyline was outlined on one wall of the cafeteria. Members of ESA Sorority made the cutouts and decorated the room.

The students are enrolled in the College of Engineering. Lunsford is majoring in civil engineering and Patrick is majoring in chemical engineering.

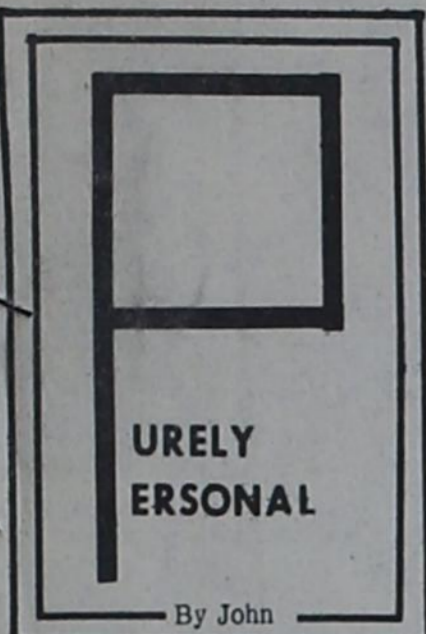
Local Woman's Father Dies

It is time for many folks to quit looking at the world through rose-colored glasses, or just plain wishing for a miracle. This is an election year and truth will take a beating -- we may as well acknowledge this fact. Therefore it behooves us to apply a little reasoning power of our own to our problems. One of these problems for the farm and ranch-oriented economy is the growing gulf between local prices that the farmer and rancher receives and the prices that the city housewife pays for the finished product.

It is the height of naivete to think that high prices can be paid to the farm producer; that high wages can be paid to all the labor necessary to place an item in the final consumer's hands; while all along the line the various businesses can pay high corporation taxes, high legal and accounting fees necessitated by boundless reams of government records and reports, and wind up with a low priced product for the harried housewife.

By all the laws of logical economics, this is just not possible. By the unrealistic presentations of unsound political oratory, this may be made to seem possible. This high everything with a final low price is the miracle that just will not happen. No political party or person can make it happen and still maintain even a reasonable free economy. A political party or candidate who wins office may attempt it, but it will mean either a socialistic controlled economic system or utter economic chaos.

As things stand at the present, next fall we will, in effect, be choosing between a moderately free economic climate and a rigidly state-controlled economic system.

There is an alternative to this seemingly dismal outlook. It calls for foresighted wisdom on the part of our elected officials; hence we doubt its coming to pass but nevertheless we offer this solution.

First of all, we must have less government red tape and other profit-draining requirements imposed by legal fiat upon business. Secondly, we must relieve the economic system of the unconscionable strain of paying unproductive wage scales. If business can be allowed to recover from the stifling blanket of government regulations, and if wages can be adjusted all along the line from market to market, then and only then can relative high prices be paid for farm products and the housewife still pay a fair price over the counter.

In effect, what we are saying is that as long as all major candidates for office are supported by huge labor donations and supported by large blocks of votes delivered by a few top labor bosses, the farm segment of the population had ought to quit looking for the impossible dream. In a word, three million farmers are not in the same ball park with 80 million other wage earners. Political oratory not withstanding.

Representatives from Texas State Technical Institute discussed commercial art, interior design, livestock and ranch operations and technical communications.

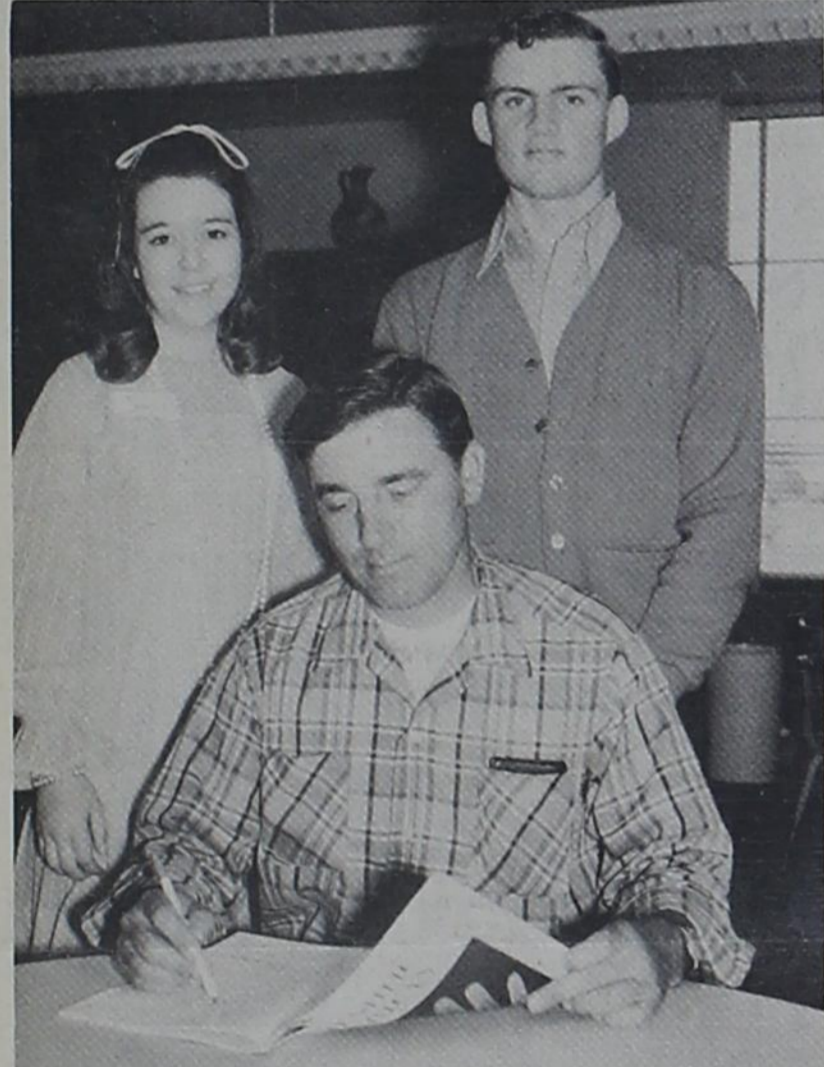
Revival At Lazbuddie

THE SPIRIT OF PROMISE

"Having also believed, ye were sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise" (Eph. 1:13,R.V.).

Of all the wonderful Scripture passages on the eternal security of the believer in Christ, this is perhaps the most blessed of all.

"Having heard the Word of truth you believed," says the apostle, and "having believed, you were sealed."

Now a seal speaks of finality and permanence, whether it be the official seal on an electric transformer or the seal on a jar of preserves.

But the most blessed fact of all is that the believer in Christ is "sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise." Mark well, he is sealed not by, but with the Spirit; the Spirit Himself is the seal.

Here, let us say, is a woman sealing jars of preserves with wax. but with the wax. Thus the humblest believer is sealed with the Spirit. It is He Himself who keeps us safe in Christ through all eternity.

And this is but the "earnest," the first installment "of our inheritance" (Ver. 14), for the Spirit keeps us secure in "this present evil age" only that "in the ages to come" God might show "the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus" (2:7).

Little wonder the apostle closes this passage on our security with the appropriate acknowledgement: "TO THE PRAISE OF HIS GLORY."

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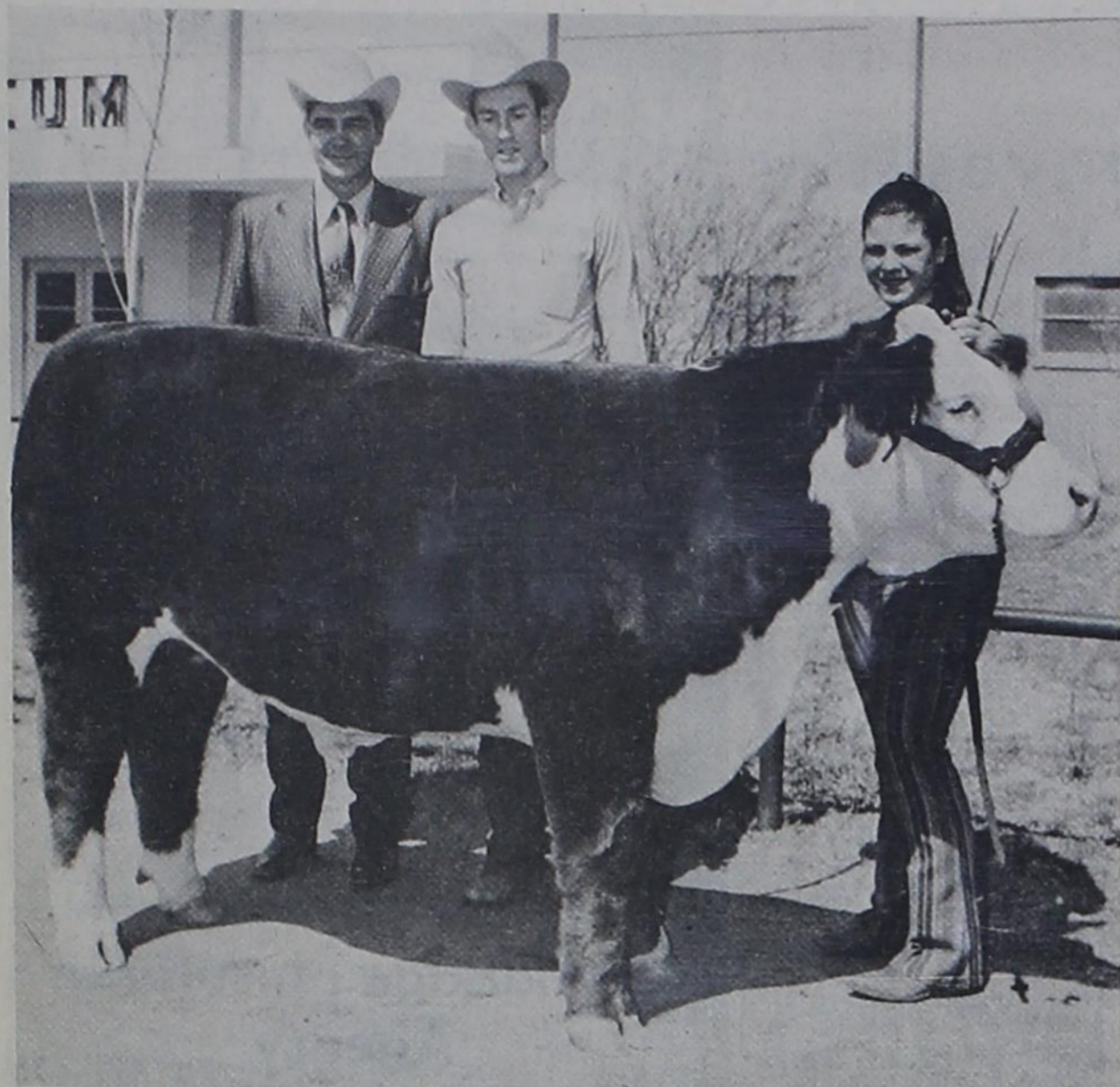

Craft placed second in the high hurdles. Richard Rodriguez placed third in the same event.

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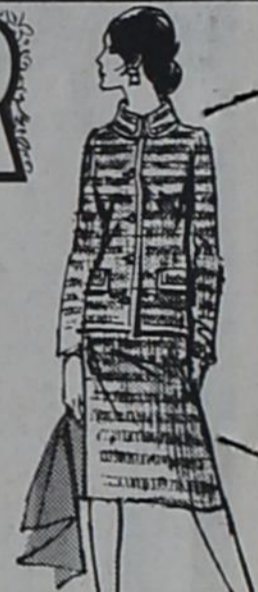
