At Barbecue --

Senator Discusses Issues With Farwell Area Folks

"I've heard that United States Senators don't often get to Farwell, so while you're looking in the whites of my eyes, the opportunity is here," said Senator John G. Tower in his opening remarks to a crowd of approximately 200 persons who attended a barbecue meal sponsored by friends of John Tower in Farwell school cafeteria last Friday night.

Sen. Tower arrived in Farwell after making stops earlier in the day in Houston and Dallas. He commented on the nice weather in Farwell saying it was humid in Houston. He conceded that the humidity might be a welcome change in the weather in this area.

Tower was greeted by citizens of the Twin Cities, along with interested persons from surrounding towns. There were also several persons from Austin and Dallas in attendance.

Included among the notables attending the barbecue were John Hadley, State ASC Committeeman from Texico; Howard Williamson of Clovis, Curry County Republican Chairman; Mrs. Raymond Tapp, Republican District Committeewoman; Glenn Lust, Parmer County Republican Chairman, and Clarence

Mason, Bailey County Republican Chairman.

Representatives from Chamber of Commerce organizations from Bovina and Muleshoe attended along with the Muleshoe Ambassadors, Mr. and Mrs. Don Spring represented the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Bradley represented Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

After the invocation by Rev. W. T. Perry, Gil Patschke introduced special guests and members of the press attending the barbecue and told the crowd that the meat for the barbecue was furnished by Frank Hinkson of Lazbuddie. Lust introduced Senator Tower.

Tower covered several issues of interest during his talk including economics, the Vietnam war, stock scandal, agricultural community and the weather.

On discussing price controls, Tower said he recently testified at a hearing against imposing price controls. He said the agricultural community was one element of society that had never aspired to great collective power and never abused it.

"In the last 20 years, prices of the farmers have gone up six per cent, while the prices of re-

tail foods have risen 43 per cent," he said.

"The problem doesn't lie down on the farm, it lies in the tremendous increase of labor costs," he added. He went on to say he thinks agricultural products will not come under the scope of the price commission.

Tower said there was nothing he could do about the weather due to the fact that the opposing party controlled Congress, but most of his remarks were not political and dealt with issues concerning all the people in this area.

The Senator expressed a belief that the economy in 1972 will be better than the economy of two or three years ago. He said he thinks it will improve in an orderly way. The reason for his optimism is that he feels the United States has realized the value of the dollar in relationship to other countries. "We have also secured agreements with common market countries," he added.

Hightower Services Held

Funeral services for Mr. John M. Hightower, 77, of Texico were held Wednesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church in Texico with Rev. Hugh Frazier officiating, assisted by Rev. John Summers.

Burial was in the Bovina Cemetery. Pallbearers were John Spearman, Pearl Singleterry, Joe Helton, Lewis Cooper, Mason Neely and Homer Kelley. Honorary pallbearers were Jim Walker, Guy Cox, Bud Peyton, Howard Whitener, B. D. Younger, Bill Christian, Monk Horton, John Range and Troy Lovett.

Mr. Hightower died at Clovis Memorial Hospital about midnight Sunday. He came to this area in 1937 from Ellis County, Tex. He was born in St. Louis, Mo. on March 14, 1895.

He was a retired salesman and driver for Helton Oil Company for whom he had worked 15 years. He previously had been a trucker for 15 years for the Coca-Cola Bottling Co.

Mr. Hightower arrived in Pleasant Hill in 1937 where he and his wife, Mamie, ran a grocery store for 24 years before they moved to Texico.

Survivors include his wife, Mamie; one son, Gen. John M. Hightower in Athens, Greece, with the United States Army; one daughter, Mrs. Betty O'Neil of Covina, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. George McKnight of Lancaster, Tex.; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Boys 9-12 who haven't tried out before and boys who wish to try out for the major league teams are urged to be present Saturday.

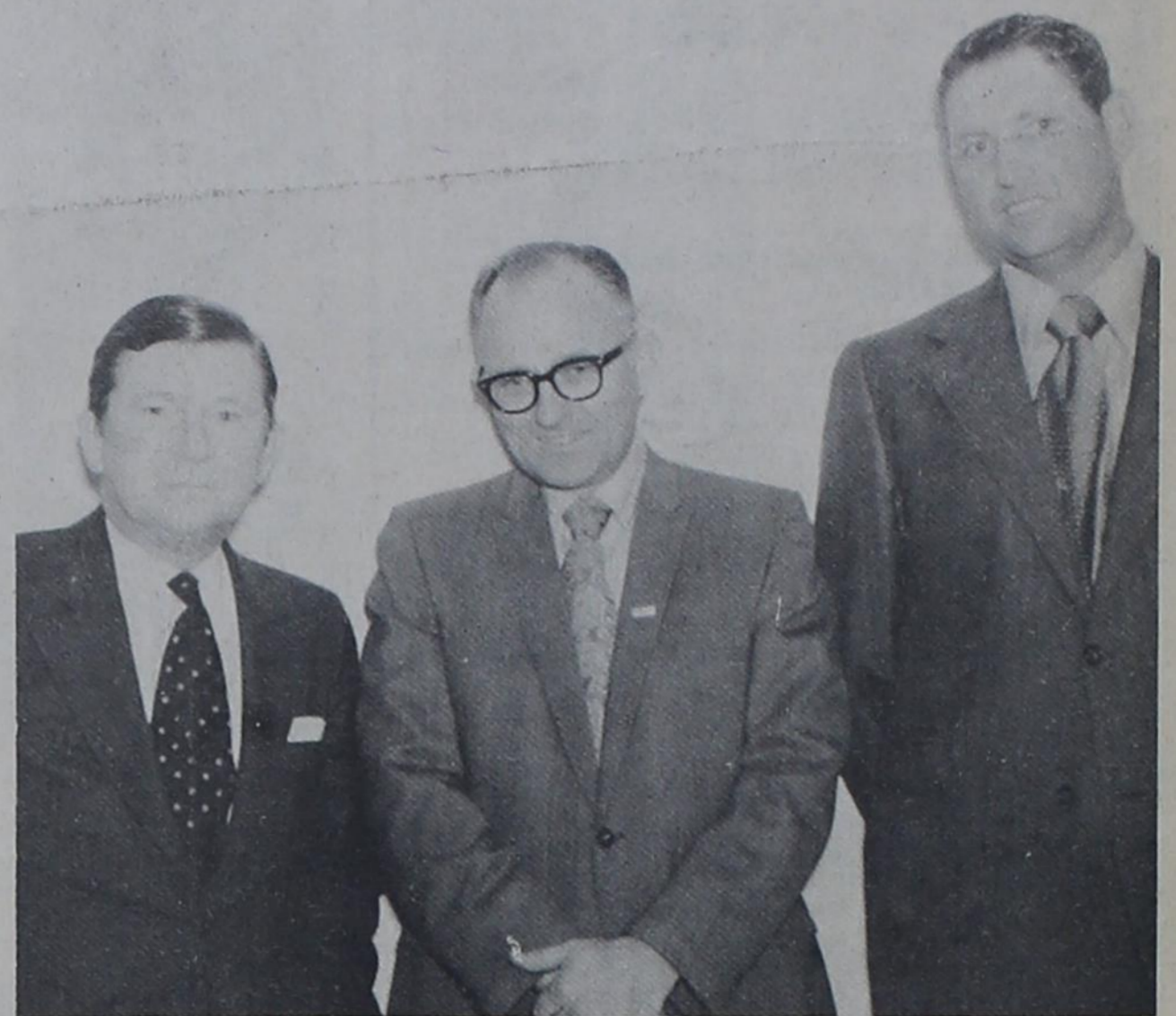
The managers of the four major league teams will choose the team members.

Tower said he thinks there will be good markets for feed grain and soybeans this year and said all indications are that the market abroad would improve.

During a question and answer period in which the audience participated, Tower discussed his views on the war in Vietnam. "I think if we go north again, we need to beat the enemy when it is trying to beat the enemy escalating the war," he said in taking a stand on the side of the Nixon administration.

When asked how best to insure the release of our prisoners of war, he commented that military strength seemed to be the answer.

Sen. Tower concluded his speech and the question and answer period by re-affirming his intentions to seek another term in the Senate. "It has been a pleasure for me to represent the people of this state," he said in closing.

To Be In Friona --

Donations Sought For Activity Center

Donations are being sought for the construction of a county activity center to be built in Friona. Purpose of building the proposed structure would be to house the Parmer County Stock Show, as well as art shows, flower shows, machinery exhibits, antique shows and other events of this nature.

The show barn or activity center has been in the idea stage since the middle of March. On March 27, several interested persons from the towns of Farwell, Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie began discussing possible locations for the proposed center.

Friona received a donation of six acres of land by the Jaycees and over \$30,000 was pledged for the construction of a building. The land is on the present sight of the old rodeo arena.

After a second meeting on April 11, a four-man committee met on April 18 to decide which city provided the most desirable plan. Dwayne Menefee, Friona; Gilbert Kaltwasser, Farwell; Dolph Moten, Bovina; and Pete Jesko, Lazbuddie; were the men chosen as spokesmen to make the decision.

Present plans called for constructing a 100' by 150' structural steel building. It will be owned by the city of Friona.

Donations for the construction of the building can be given to Gilbert Kaltwasser or Calvin Meissner in this area.

Each of the three towns of Farwell, Friona and Bovina submitted plans and possible locations for the structure with ideas on how to finance the project.

Farwell negotiated with Gifford-Hill about the purchase of a barn and 10 acres of land at a cost of \$44,000. The barn was formerly used to manufacture concrete pipe.

Bovina chose a site near the present roping arena and decided they could raise approximately \$15,000 in the event that the city was chosen for the location of the center.

Car Vapors Cause --

Close Call For Two Texico Women

A car left running inadvertently in the garage overnight almost created a tragedy Wednesday morning in Texico. Mrs. Nettie Tharp and her sister, Betty Zimmerman, who lives with her, were found unconscious at 7:15 a.m. by Mrs. Tharp's son, Ray.

Tharp called the Texico emergency vehicle to take the women to Clovis Memorial Hospital where they were reported later in the morning to be in satisfactory condition. Farwell emergency vehicle was called to aid in getting the women to the hospital.

The women accidentally left the car running about 5:30 p.m. Tuesday when they had returned home and it continued to run throughout the night. Apparently, carbon monoxide fumes filled the garage and seeped into the adjoining house.

Before she lost consciousness, Mrs. Tharp placed a note on her door reading "Ray, Help, We're Sick." Tharp visits the women early each morning to see if they are all right and if they need anything.

Both women were conscious and talking by mid morning Wednesday after hospitalization and treatment.

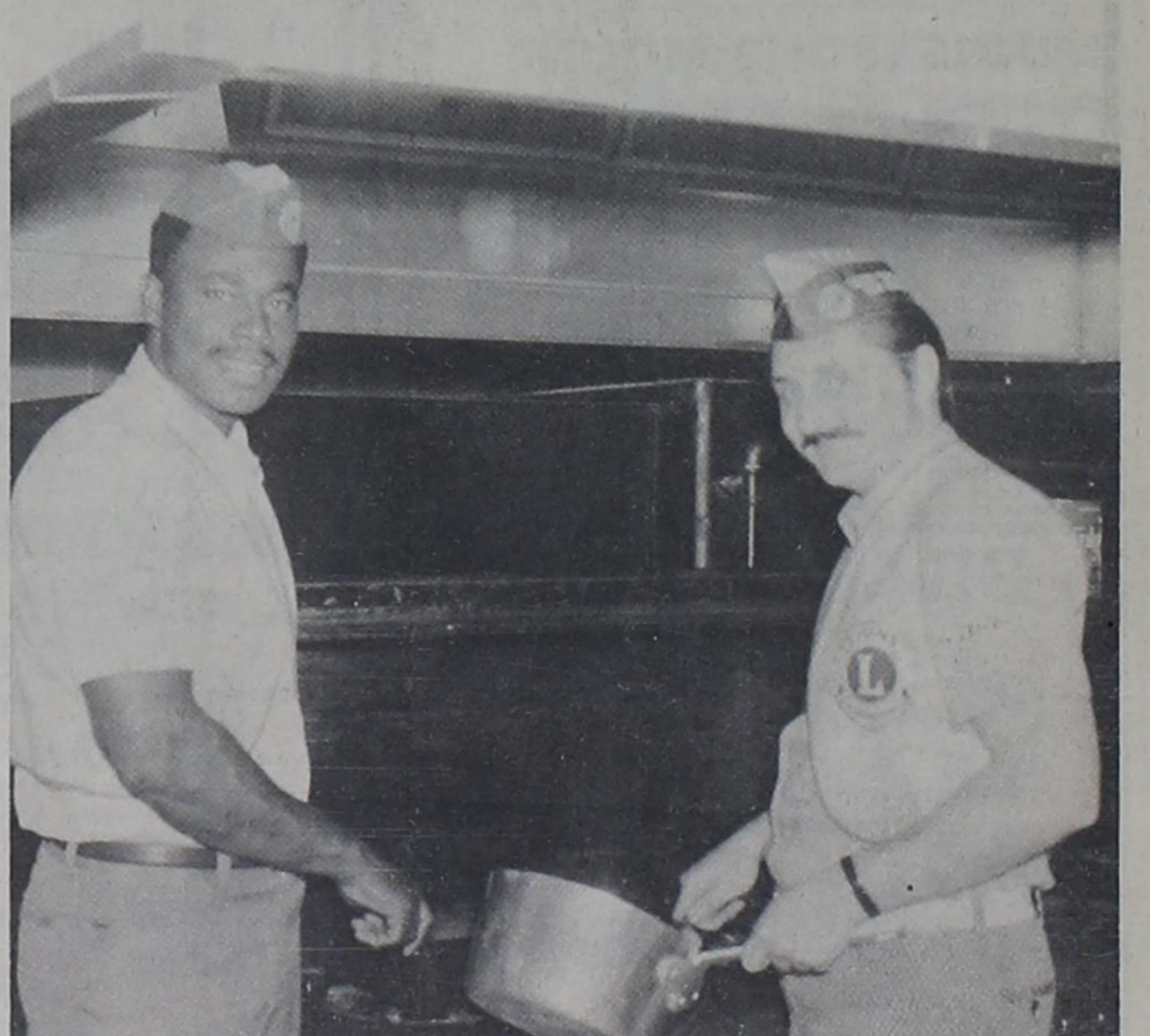
Texico High School band and chorus, along with the beginning band, will provide entertainment for the Pops Concert. Admission is 75 cents for adults and 50 cents for children.

The "general excellence" category has two divisions -- one for newspapers published in towns of less than 1,500 circulation and one for towns over 1,500 circulation.

Lamb County Leader-News of Littlefield, published by Bill Turner, was the winner in towns of more than 1,500 circulation.

The Tribune was also awarded second place in Best Column Writing with its column "Purely Personal," written by John Getz, editor and publisher. This category has no divisions -- Getz' column was judged with all other entries from weeklies, semi-weeklies and dailies be-

longing to the Panhandle Press Association.

Getz was also presented with a plaque in appreciation for his service to the organization the past year as president.

Kenneth Hogue, publisher of the Dalhart Texan, a daily newspaper, was elected new president of the association.

Other officers are Trenton Davis, circulation manager of the Amarillo Globe-News papers, vice-president; and Dave McReynolds of the Stratford Star, secretary.

Elected to the board of directors were Dolph Moten of The Bovina Blade, Ross Middleton of the Earth Sun-News, Sue Cannon of the Olton Enterprise, Speedy Nieman of the Hereford Brand, and Getz.

Senator John Tower paid a visit; and on Saturday and Sunday, the New Mexico Junior Rodeo was staged by the Texico Riding Club. This usually is enough to last our towns for several weekends without coming on consecutive and conflicting days as they did this time.

To compound our reporting problems, the Panhandle Press Association annual meeting was scheduled last weekend in Amarillo. Under ordinary circumstances we would have remained in the community to participate in these important events. The circumstances were not ordinary because "Ye Olde Publisher" was the outgoing president of the press association, and the "expiring Prexy" is charged with the management of the annual convention. So we convened, managed and "expired."

Fortunately we live in a community where thoughtful understanding and cooperation are a by-word. With the help of our friends and a great deal of extra effort by our "Miss Editor" Janie Crane, we are able to report on all these events in this week's Tribune.

From the publisher and his wife goes a great big thanks to all those who helped us over this difficult weekend. We ARE glad we live in the Twin Cities.

While we were conventioning in Amarillo, we were privileged to hear two excellent speakers talking on subjects of great interest to all of us in this area of the country.

One speaker was Wayne Thomas, chairman, Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, who spoke on the future direction of higher education in Texas. This was of great interest because a very large per cent of our tax money goes for education in Texas, as it does in other states. We have a copy of this talk and would be glad to share it with any interested party.

We will at a future date discuss this talk in our "Personal" column and hope that it generates some thinking and action locally. As we have stated in past columns we believe that we as an area must be very politically aware and active if we are to keep our heads above water in future years.

The other talk was by Dr. John F. Buessler, vice-president for health affairs, Dean of Texas Tech University School of Medicine, Lubbock. Here was information which we believe will be good news for all small communities on the High Plains.

The regional health center complex will give the area towns a much better chance to obtain the services of a physician. Not only will it help the citizens in having better medical facilities more readily available, but it will keep the local doctor better informed on the latest wrinkles in medicine.

It is even planned that a doctor in the area can go back to the medical school for a week or two "cram" course and catch up on his knowledge, while an advanced intern comes from the school to the doctor's community and takes care of the patients during that time. Certainly all the medical facilities in West Texas and 10 counties in Eastern New Mexico will be better due to this medical school at Lubbock.

It will finally be complete when, in addition to the main complex at Lubbock, there is established and operating six auxiliary medical teaching and treatment centers in areas such as Amarillo, Midland, San Angelo and other major population centers.

This is one large scale area program that sounded not only very well planned but that will actually fulfill a very vital role in the overall development of the Golden Spread and benefit all citizens in the process.

Council Takes Stand On Dogs

Texico City Council met Tuesday night in regular session with all members present. First on the agenda was a discussion of the dog situation. City Marshal Willie Ronquillo was instructed to cite violators of the city's dog ordinance with no exception. The council urged that all violators be treated

equally in an attempt to solve the problem.

Mayor Manford Turnbough gave a report on the trip he and Bill Christian, council member, made to Tucumcari April 12 to the Eastern Plains Planning Council.

The council agreed that the mayor should spend one week, sometime in May, going over the problems of the water and sewage department and street and sanitation department with city officials.

The council approved the payment by the city for membership fees of \$38.60 to Eastern Plains Planning Council. In other business, they hired Mrs. Helen Hill to do part-time office work. She will begin her duties Monday.

An audit contract in the amount of \$364 was also approved for H. H. Delozier of Clovis to audit the 1971-72 records. Lewis Cooper was appointed by the council as the new civil defense director.

Bills were approved for payment and the 1972-73 fire department budget was approved.

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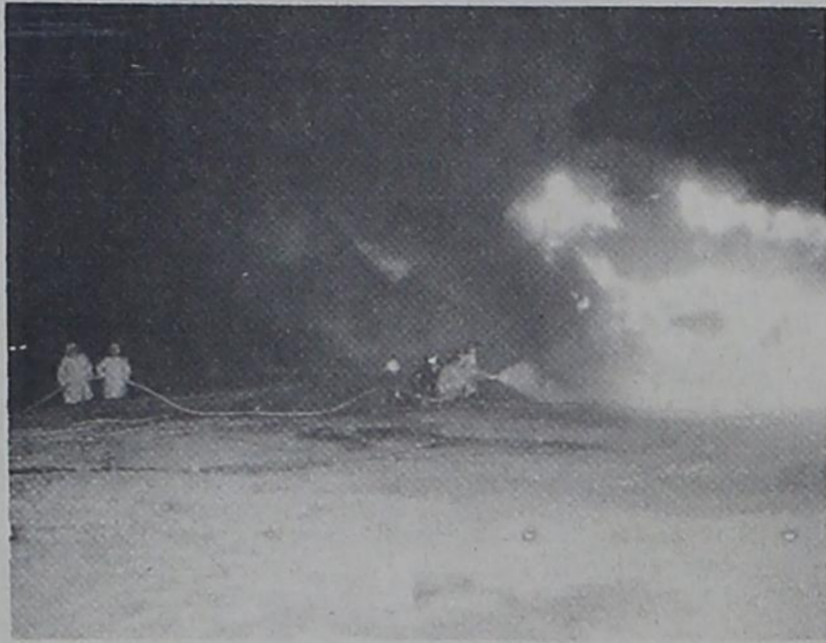
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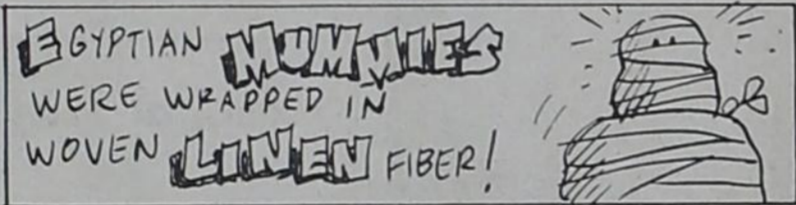

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

THE NAME OF THE LORD

Many people use the name of the Lord very lightly. They are quick to exclaim, "My God!" or to use the name of the Lord Jesus Christ in vain.

We should all understand that the Bible declares that "God will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain" (Ex. 20:7). This is one of the Ten Commandments which too many people forget or ignore. But it is more than a commandment. It does not merely forbid taking the Lord's name on our lips carelessly; it adds the warning: "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain, FOR the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain." Don't commit this sin. He warns, for if you do you will have to face God Himself for it and He will not overlook it.

Now, probably many of our readers have used the name of God and Christ in vain again and again. They have gotten into the habit and find it difficult to stop. Now what? How can such escape

the condemnation of God upon this sin?

First, one of the principal reasons for not using God's name in vain is because of His infinite greatness. We should all bow and worship before Him. The second reason is because He—the infinite God—took upon Him human form and as God the Son died for our sins at Calvary. Now would you want to curse and swear in His name? You wouldn't want people to curse and swear in your mother's name, would you? How much less should we curse and swear in Christ's name or God's name?

Those who have this problem, invariably have never trusted Christ as their own Savior—as the One who died for their sins. Those who have trusted Him as Savior usually never are tempted to use His name in vain again. Rather, like St. Paul, who once was "a blasphemer and a persecutor," they exclaim with deepest gratitude: "He loved me and gave Himself for me." (Gal. 2:20).
