



Sugar Cube Architects Make Super Castles

Five hundred pounds of sugar cubes, several gallons of glue, a dozen buckets of cement are the basic ingredients for a most unusual advocation of two Bartlesville, Okla., high school students.

John Carignan and Rick Laughry build castles. They use glue to hold the structures together, cement for foundations and to create mountains and other terrain effects. Toothpicks are used for drawbridges and doors.

The sugar cube buildings are exact replicas of the originals. The huge replica of the Welsh castle Caernarvon is built on a scale of one cube equalling three lineal feet. This structure contains walls three to four cubes thick and represents approximately 60 boxes of sugar cubes. Rick estimates he spent about six months on this castle.


