13 Vote Absentee - -

Run-off Election For Primaries Saturday

A run-off election for both Democratic and Republican primaries will be Saturday from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Both Democrats and Republicans will be voting for gubernatorial run-off candidates. Democrats also have run-off elections for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor and comptroller of public accounts.

Republicans will have a choice to make for governor between Albert Bel Fay and Henry C. (Hank) Grover. Jack Hamil of Friona is a write-in candidate for County Chairman. Democrats will choose between Barefoot Sanders and Ralph Yarborough in the senatorial race. Dolph Briscoe and

Frances "Sissy" Farenthold are run-off candidates for governor. Also in run-off elections on the Democratic ballot are Wayne Connally and Bill Hobby for lieutenant governor and Robert S. Calvert and James (Jim) Wilson for comptroller of public accounts. Democratic voters in Rhea

and Black precincts will combine with Friona Saturday. Other voters will vote in the same polling places as in the May 6 primaries. Republican voters will vote at Farwell City Hall, Bovina School, Lazbuddie school cafeteria and Reeve Chevrolet in Friona, depending on the voter precinct. Thirteen absentee ballots were cast as of Tuesday morning, May 30. Tuesday was the last day for absentee voting. Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren cautioned voters to cast their ballots in the same primary in which they voted May 6. Otherwise, she said, there would be a penalty. Voters are not eligible to change primaries once they vote in the initial primary election.

In Sheriff's Office - -

Teletype Boon To Law Enforcement

A teletype machine which can find out driver's license information, vehicle registration information and criminal records on both the state and national levels and, at the same time, receive information from

other stations in Texas on criminal activity has been set up in the office of Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace. Sheriff Lovelace says the machine was obtained through

Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and furnished by Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. It is being financed partly by federal funds with assistance from state and county. Mrs. Carliss (Irene) Woods is employed to operate the newly-acquired machine. Each message is strictly coded to be sent through an Austin computer and is designated for a particular department. Messages may also be sent from station to station and from state to state. Lovelace said that by the end of the year, the department would be receiving high-band radios for all department automobiles and office which would be operating on four frequencies. "We shouldn't have as much interference with these new radios," he added.

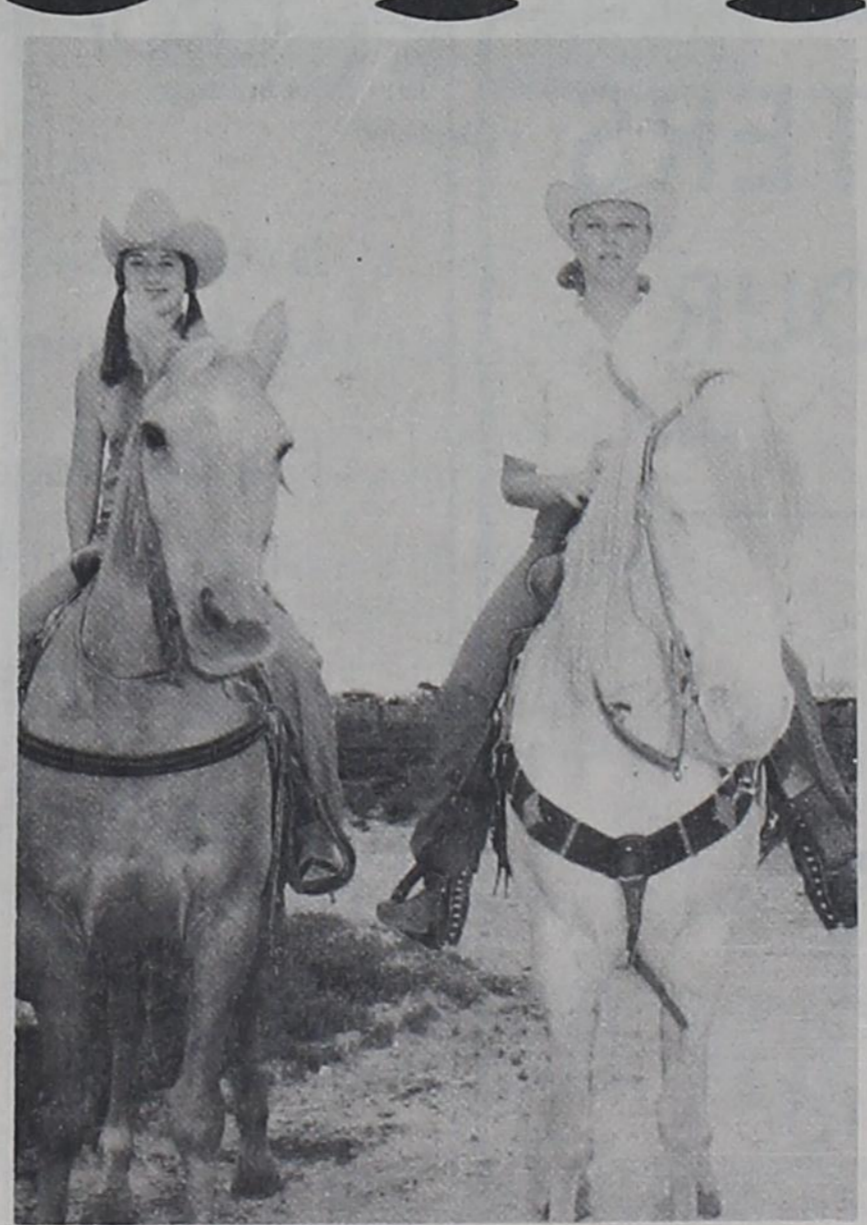
Horsemanship & Personality--

Any girl between the ages of 10 and 21 who is interested in competing in rodeo or fair queen contests judged on horsemanship and personality is invited to attend the Queen Clinic to be in Clovis, June 5 and 6. The Clinic is sponsored by New Mexico State Fair Queen Alumni Association, and the sessions will be conducted by its members. Purpose of the clinic is to better prepare anyone who might be entering the New Mexico State Fair Queen contest as well as 4-H queen contests, high school rodeo contests, and various other riding club and rodeo contests. Registration will be from 10 a.m. to 12 noon June 5 at the Extension building on the Curry County fairgrounds. The \$15 registration fee will cover all sessions and the banquet Monday night.

The personality division will begin at 1 p.m. Monday afternoon. It will include public speaking and conversation improvement, make-up, hair care and styling, and modeling and poise instruction. That evening a banquet will be followed by a discussion of clothes and how to dress for a contest. The girls are encouraged to wear their best western clothes and suits for the banquet. At Home In Parmer County

Have you ever noticed your child not responding to your requests? Try listening to yourself and to your child. Parents who stop now and then to listen to themselves understand why some ways don't work. If you find yourself saying "I've told you once, I've told you a dozen times," then this method isn't working. It may be wise to try something else. Listening gives you an opportunity to check yourself and your actions. Paying attention to what children say gives clues about what they've been learning. Adults are often surprised to discover that children learn something different from what parents think they teach. Try keeping a record for one day of the things you say to your child when it's time for bed or when you want him to do a good job. And write down what you say when you want him to turn off TV or to change his behavior. How many times a day do you say the words "no", "don't", "stop", or "quit"? You might be surprised. Write down the number of times you say these words. If you find that you use such words often, why not try stating your requests in a more positive manner.

WASHABILITY AND ADJUSTABILITY INTO CHILD'S ROOM?

Easy care and growing quality make good sense. Children seem to pop out of everything, from their first crawlers and soft shoes to blue jeans and sneakers—even their bedrooms. Growing happens and clothing must be replaced. But a room is something else. Carefully planned, it can grow with the child and involve few major changes. One criterion for creative, easy care decorating should be washability. Then both mother and child can be more relaxed about activities that take place in the special hideaway. A youngster's bedroom is like a home within a home. It's a place for more than sleeping. Playing, studying, day dreaming, listening to records, nibbling, and rapping with friends are all a part of the bedroom scene during the growing years. A second criterion is adjustability. At all ages and stages, a child's room should be sized for his needs with furnishings at the right height to develop good habits of neatness, cleanliness, and grooming. Properly chosen accessories—toy and book shelves, rods and pegs for clothing, a mirror for those initial efforts at grooming—can be placed low to serve the toddler and be adjusted upward as he or she adds inches. Be sure to include a good-sized bulletin board for showing off artistic efforts—and later give over to savables—pictures and mementos dear to a teenager's heart. Stackable furniture is a good choice. Pieces can be added as the child and inevitable collections grow. Brightly enamel-painted and top-coated with polyurethane, the furniture will

be cheerful, scuff- and stain-resistant and suds washable. There are also furniture lines that feature tough, washable laminated plastic surfaces. Easy washing, no-iron fabrics are best for window treatments, bed coverings and pillows. Pattern themes are almost limitless and materials provide the most economical way to change the entire atmosphere of a room. Thus, while the major expense items such as furniture and flooring are simple and suitable for years, fabrics used can easily take on the decorative task of creating room personality. Simply up the look from the A, B, C's of nursery to ballerina or car racers or some popular motif in early school years. Then as youngsters get older, they want very much to do their own rooms. Flooring should not be overlooked in planning. Because children of all ages spend much time on the floor playing, studying and visiting, floor coverings should be easy to care for, safe, warm and attractive. The newer durable and scrubable carpetings are worth considering. Vinyl in combination with washable scatter rugs is a good choice. Whatever the final scheme is, some pre-thought with an eye to growth possibilities, easy upkeep, and the activities the room will serve is likely to result in greater satisfaction for all concerned.

Says Joe Jones - -

Easter Seal Provides Handicapped Services

Texas Easter Seal Society can provide the following services for handicapped persons who cannot afford to pay all or part of the costs involved and who are not eligible for help from any other resource - public or private, says Joe Jones, County representative.

1. Assistance in paying for physical, occupational, and speech therapy when it is prescribed by a medical doctor.
2. Pay for special diagnostic evaluation (such as orthopedic, audiological, language and psychological).
3. Purchase orthopedic equipment such as wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, braces, etc., when prescribed by a medical doctor. (There is a \$200 limit placed on artificial limbs. This \$200 is to be used as "seed money" and hopefully will be matched by local resources such as individuals, service clubs, sororities, foundations, etc.)
4. Help to defray transportation costs for treatment or evaluation when the family is unable to meet these costs. This is determined by paying 30 cents per gallon - based on 10 miles per gallon, figured on a round trip basis - or by purchasing round trip bus tickets.
5. Assist families and individuals to reach the right person or agency to obtain help. The Easter Seal Society of Texas cannot provide. People are often eligible for services from public or private agencies but do not know the person, eligibility requirements, or place to obtain the services needed. PERHAPS WE DO.

A limit of \$150 per client per year for therapy and \$150 for transportation has been set except in unusual cases requiring special attention. This limit can be exceeded only with the permission of the Treatment and Service Committee of the State Board. All services must be authorized before being rendered by the Treatment and Service Department of the Texas Easter Seal Society. Services which cannot be provided by Texas Easter Seal Society, according to Jones are listed below.

1. Tuition, room or board to special schools or sheltered work programs.
2. Surgery, drugs, medication or hospitalization.
3. Non-orthopedic or non-hearing items (such as glasses, contact lens, dentures, cosmetic devices, etc.)
4. School material (such as books, paper, pencils, etc.)
5. Clothing or food.

Traveling With Your Dog

Wondering about taking your pet along on a vacation trip? If this is the dog's first long trip, he should be used to riding in the car, well housebroken for the motels en route, and in good health. A car-sick, unhappy dog would make the trip miserable for both of you. Better to board him with friends who love him or with a clean, well-run boarding kennel. Let's say your dog, like most, meets the travel test and you decide to take him. Good! As a member of the family, he deserves to share the fun. All you have to do is include him in the advance planning and you will all have a good time. Most motels/hotels have pet facilities or allow you to keep the animal with you. But some do not. 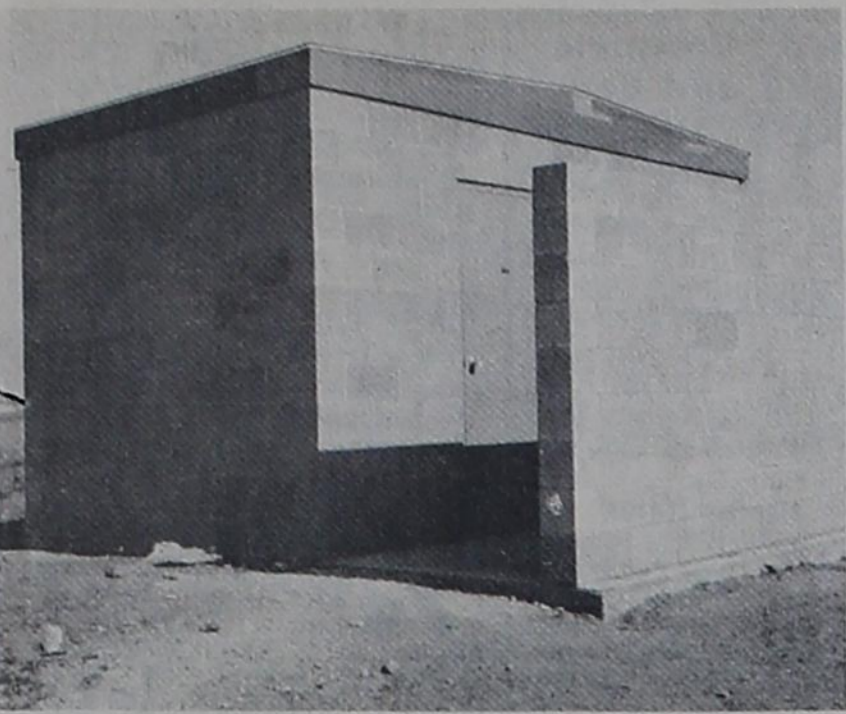

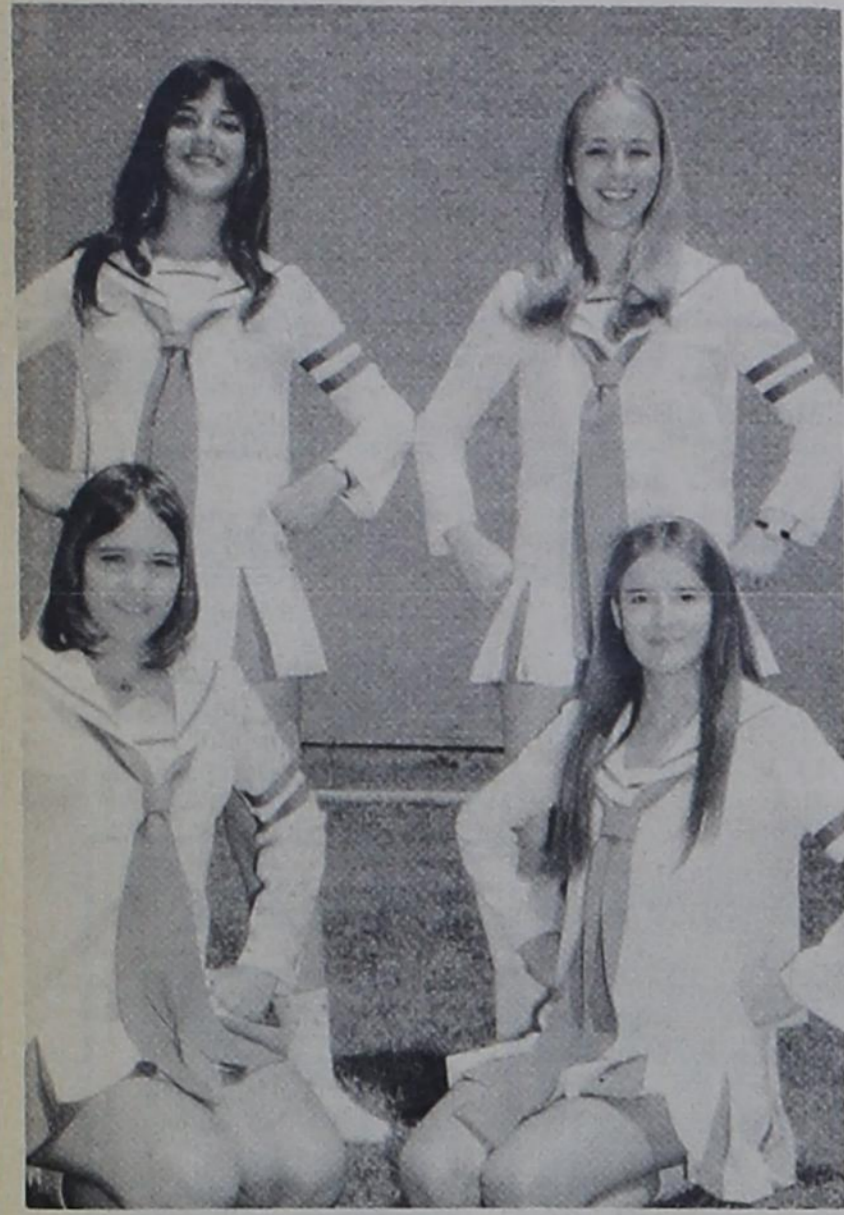

THE FIRST BOOK TO READ

In years gone by, when life was simpler, men had time to ponder over the really important questions: What will become of me when I die? Is there a heaven—and a hell? Can I know God? Will He forgive my sins? If so, on what basis? What must I do to be saved?

The materialism, commercialism and the technology of our day, however, have so complicated life that secondary problems hinder many people from even considering at leisure the truly important things.

Yet, despite all the hurry and anxiety, all the noise and distraction, there are troubled souls, hungering and thirsting for true satisfaction, for a heart cleansed from sin, delivered from the awful burden of a guilty conscience.

Such people should read Paul's Epistle to the Romans and meditate on its great message of salvation. In fact this is the first book they ought to read.

In Romans the inspired apostle declares that "all have sinned"

(3:23) and that "the wages of sin is death" (6:23). But this is not all. Romans also proclaims the good news that Christ "was delivered for our offences, and raised again for our justification" and that therefore we may have "peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (4:25; 5:1).

More than that, Romans offers abundant grace to all who trust in Christ. "The law entered that the offence might abound, but where sin abounded grace did much more abound" (5:20, 21). Thus believers are "justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (3:24) and "the FREE GIFT of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (6:23).

We urge those who are not sure of salvation to read carefully and prayerfully Paul's Epistle to the Romans. You may be thanking God for the rest of your earthly life that you did. Read St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans.

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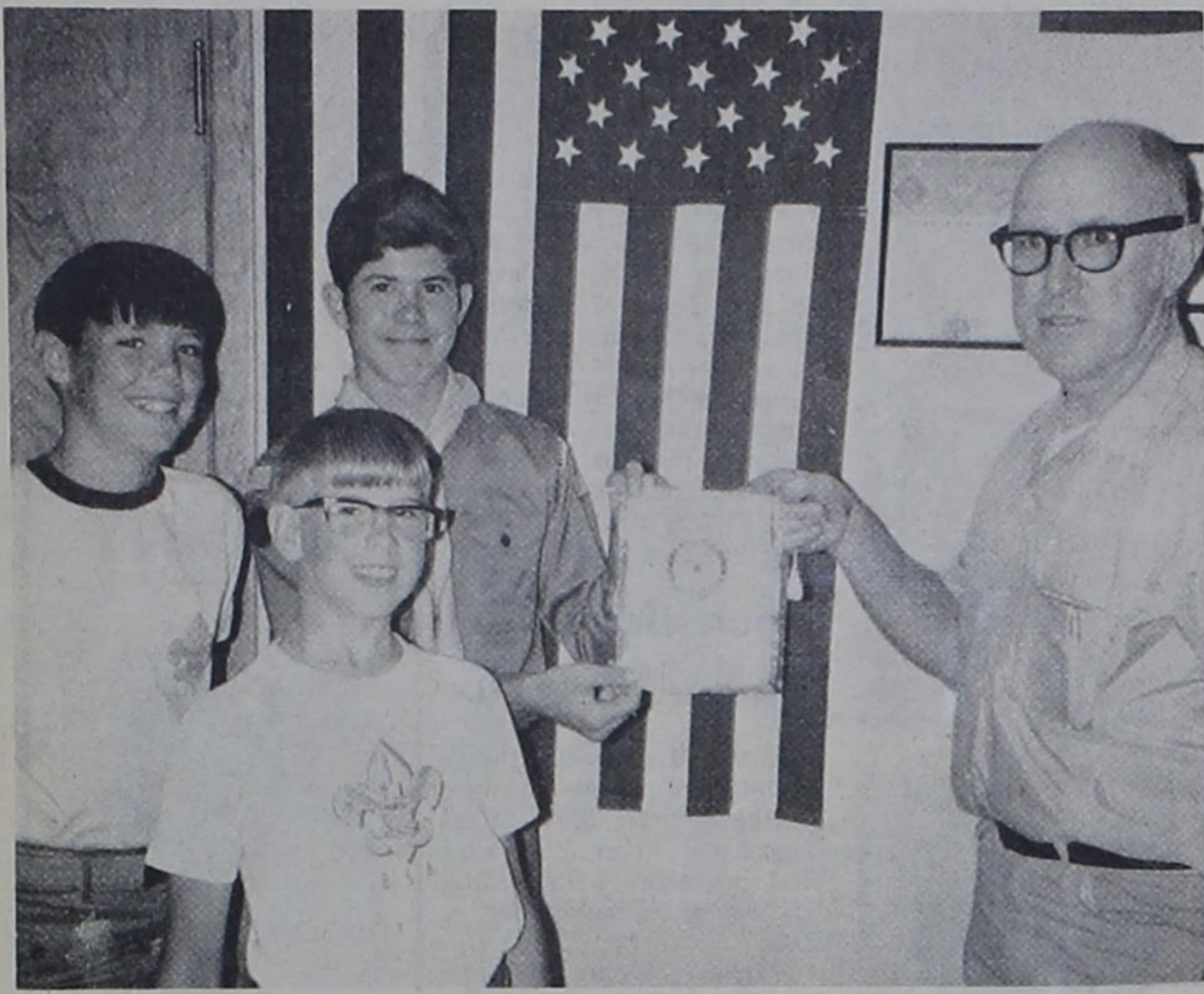
