## FROM THE By Hop Jr.

One of the little disturbances that has long played its part in making newspapering something less than a paradise has been the attitude of many professional people concerning advertising.

Like most disagreements, this particular one has been based more on lack of understanding between newspaper folk and professional people than anything

Some of the notable professions which turn their noses up at newspaper (or other forms) of advertising have included lawyers, dentists, doctors, engineers, architects, and optometrists.

At a meeting of the West Texas Press Association in Lubbock last week, it cheered us greatly to hear a couple of speakers on the program who were practicing professional optometrists from the Abilene

They outlined to us a revolutionary institutional advertising program designed to educate the public on the difference between professional eye care and what they called "commercial optometry," a booming industry where some sharp operators are cleaning up (and endangering the vision of their patients) with bargains in glasses that sell for dime-store

This new educational program has been called "the Texas uprising" by optometric associations across the country, and not always in a derogatory way, as one might suspect from the label.

This "Texas uprising" was conceived by a few doctors of optometry who were greatly disturbed over the increasing toll of "commercial optometry"-both to their own pocketbook, and to the health of the public.

They undertook a method of educating the public through the newspaper space that was nothing more than advertising, but they shunned this term in favor of "releases," or "features." The work was originated by the West Texas Chapter of the Texas Optometric Association.

Optometrists, like many other professionals, have thrown up. a high wall against advertising in the sense that most of us think of it, but this was something different. It was completely positive in approach (didn't "throw mud" at the competition) and was really a public service for the education which it gave the public. Its acceptance as a promotion entirely within the bounds of good taste was instantaneous.

## THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

#### What Do We Care **About The Gas Bill?**

The above topic for these short paragraphs is a question that likely is on the lips of many, many persons in this part of Texas, where oil and natural gas development is notably absent. It is an honest query spawned by ignorance of national

The Fullbright-Harris gas bill was nothing more than another effort to test the federal government's power to regulate business which has always been taken for granted as being in the state's province. Bureaucrats, in the guise of emancipators of the "people's best interests," have declared that the federal government ought to decide what price producers of natural gas should charge the distributing firms that pipe gas all over America.

Passage of the F-H bill would have done away with this bureaucratic control, but the veto of the measure by President Eisenhower nullifies all the efforts of both houses of congress which have attempted to protect the states' rights in the mat-

The president has intimated that his reason for scratching the bill was because of the now hotly disputed \$2500 "campaign contribution" offer that was hoped to influence the action of a congressman. If this be so, then the oil and gas industry have themselves to blame for not better policing their lobby's methods, but in fact, the real issue has been clouded by this scandalous revelation.

The real issue is to decide whether a man behind a desk in Washington can tell a man in Texas who wants to sell gas to a man in New York, how much he should charge for his product. Price fixing, whether it be in the field of commerce or agriculture, has never done anything

The billowing clouds of sand and dust were picked up from open or poorly covered fields from an area including thousands of square miles of cultivated acreage.

Although visibility was reduced to zero on many Parmer County roads during the height of the blow, no serious accidents were reported. Highway 60 was closed for a time by the highway department.

The winds, which stirred up late Friday morning, did not abate until after midnight.


