And under the administration's blessing have come new policies in the agriculture department which point to a "return to normalcy" where prices for commodities in the market place are largely determined by supply and demand.

This, we still believe, in spite of much local opposition to such a philosophy, is the best one for the long-range interests of the farmers, but at the same time, Mr. Eisenhower has seen big business riding atop an all-time crest of prosperity-still enjoying the same tariff protections, the same old padded government contracts, as in the days of the New Deal and World War II.

It's hardly consistent, in a true analysis.

What is the cost of our national defense budget? Something around \$40 billions, isn't it? Nobody can deny the necessity of this expenditure, because of the perilous times in which we live. No one complains that about 67 cents of every dollar he pays Uncle Sam in taxes goes to the upkeep of a strong military effort. Business gets most of this money in the form of defense contracts.

And while these huge amounts must be spent, and nobody denies it, there also is no denying that the war effort is a strong business stimulus that tends to keep the wheels of the factories turning at a torrid pace.

If anybody asked us, we would tell them we are anti-labor and promanagement in the titanic squabble for supremacy that is now being waged in our nation.

But even from our viewpoint, it appears that the farm program, with its \$3.7 billion total bill, is perhaps given more publicity than it deserves. We favor an elimination of subsidies to EVERYONE, including the farmers. They would be getting along pretty well right now, we bet, ifthey had been left alone.



### The Public Schools Are Our Biggest Tax Bargain

Education is the key to better living, and it is significant that this week is set aside for the observance of the public schools in Texas. Our taxsupported community educational institutions are the best example we know of for a sound investment in the future.
