Border Town Days - -

Saturday's Festivities Attract Large Crowds

After two nights of AJRA rodeo competition and the crowning of a new Border Town Days Queen at Friday night's performance, Twin Cities citizens and visitors amassed in Farwell City Park for the first annual Old Timer and Family Reunion.

A traveling plaque was presented to the Ray Ford family. Thirty-six members of the family registered with a total of 4861 miles traveled to win the plaque sponsored by Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Mrs. Maggie Robertson of Farwell was the oldest "Old Timer" to register. She was 81 years old. A total of 37 families registered Saturday afternoon at the booth which was manned by members of Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha Sorority.

At the reunion, music was provided by Ed and Juanita Hardage, the musical group "Savage" and other talented individuals in the area. Soft drinks were dispensed, courtesy of Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Farwell junior class was in charge of the dunking booth which proved to be popular with both adults and children. Boy Scouts and Scout mothers manned a concession stand, horseshoe pitch, marriage booth and fortune-telling booth.

After the get-together in the park, Border Town Days parade got underway with several floats, four riding clubs, Clovis Shrine Drum and Bugle Corps, Cannon Air Force Base color guard, Texico and Farwell fire trucks, colorful

bike riders, 12 antique cars, farm equipment and sundry other vehicles and participants joining in the fun.

Girl Scout Troop 426 won the trophy for best float. Judges for float competition were Nell Walling, Hugh Preston and B. V. "Shorty" Hughes.

Second place winner in the float competition was Farwell varsity cheerleaders. Third place in the competition went to Texico varsity cheerleaders. Another float entered in the parade was sponsored by Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

Best Riding Club trophy went to Y-L Riding Club. Other riding clubs placing were Farwell, second; Bovina, third; and Texico, fourth. Charlie Jones and Vaudie Pierce of Clovis judged the riding clubs.

Later on in the afternoon, large crowds returned to Farwell City Park to consume barbecue and trimmings which had been catered by Suthpen's of Amarillo. Approximately 400 persons were served.

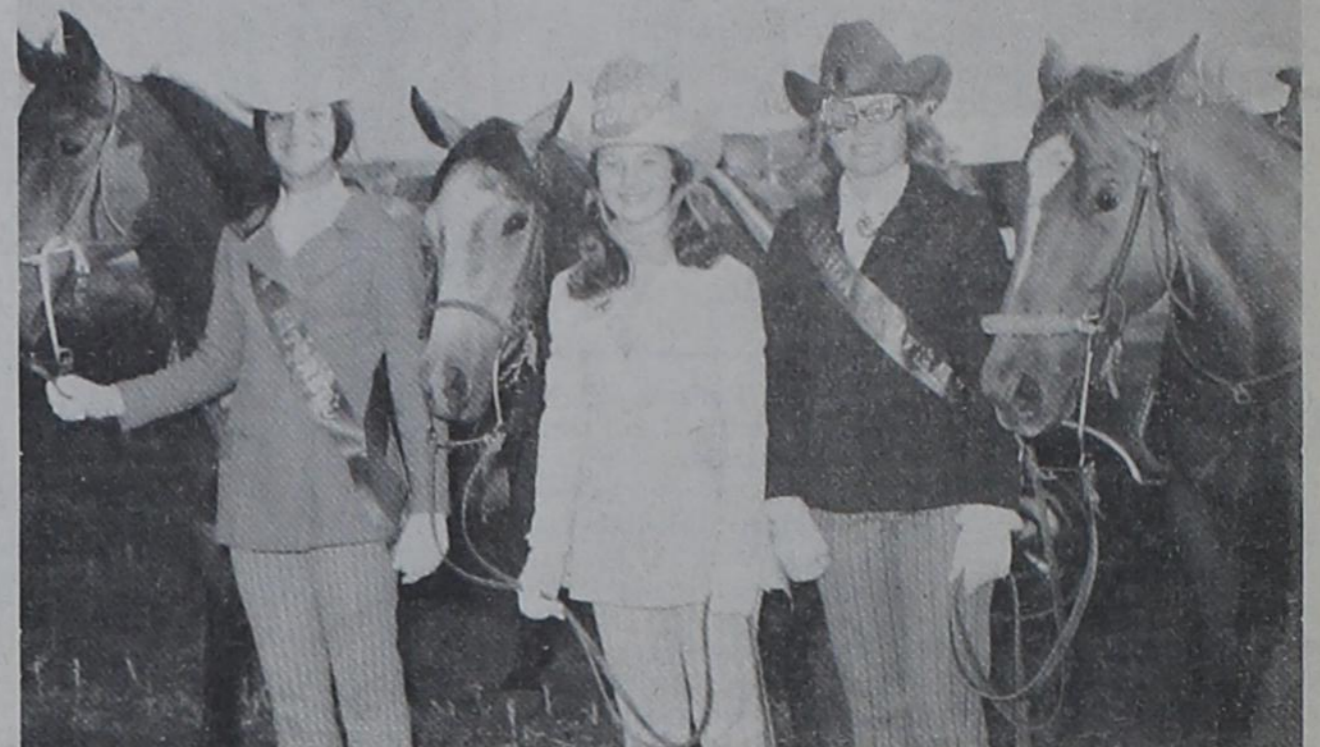
During the barbecue time, several gospel singing groups and area church choirs performed.

Sheriff's officers have also recovered some tools, Champion oil and one small four-horsepower gasoline engine which had been stashed near Farwell. Anyone from whom

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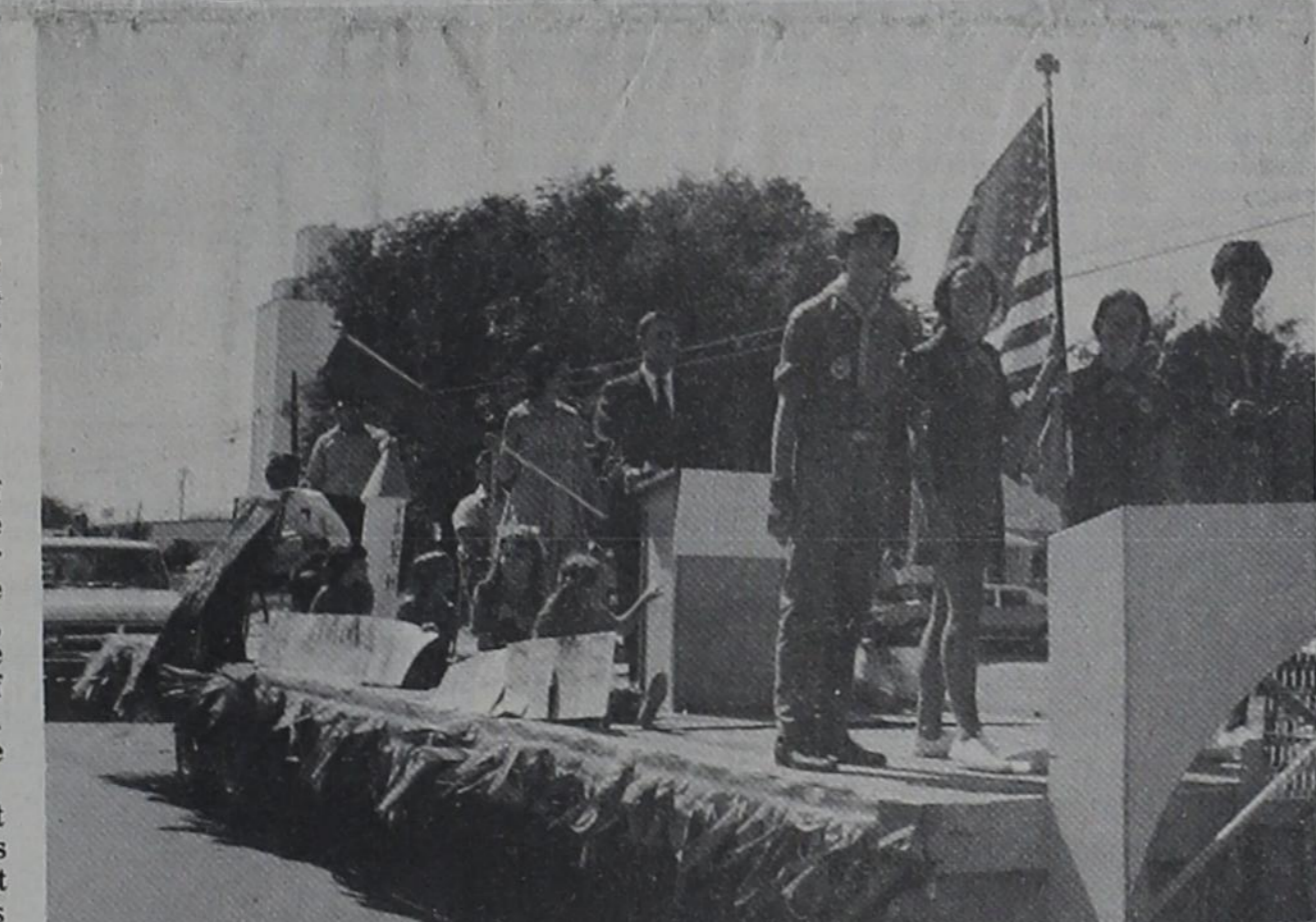

New Term - -

Local Schools Slate Registration Periods

Both Twin Cities school systems have scheduled registration periods for their students for the coming year. Farwell Schools begin August 21 and Texico Schools begin August 28.

Texico High School students will register August 22 and 23. Texico seniors will register from 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Tuesday, Aug. 22, and juniors will register from 1 to 4 p.m. On Wednesday, Aug. 23, sophomores register from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and freshmen register from 1 to 4 p.m. Texico elementary students will register in their individual rooms on the first day of school, August 28.

Farwell High School students who have a good reason to make changes on their pre-enrollment, new students who have not pre-registered, and students who failed courses and need to change their pre-enrollment should meet at the high school building Friday, Aug. 11, at 10 a.m.

Thursday, Aug. 17, juniors will check out books and lockers at 9 a.m., and seniors

will check out books and lockers at 1:30 p.m.

Friday, Aug. 18, sophomores will check out books and lockers at 9 a.m. and freshmen will check out books and lockers at 1:30 p.m. High school students pre-enrolled before the last school term ended.

Lazbuddie Schools Register Aug. 25

Lazbuddie school students will register in their respective schools, elementary, junior high and high school, on August 25. Buses will run that day. First day of school is August 28.

School lunches for grades one through four are 35 cents, grades five through eight, 45 cents; and grades nine through 12, 50 cents. School insurance is \$7.00 for at-school protection and \$20 for 24-hour coverage.

Farwell Elementary and Junior High School enrollment will start at 9 a.m. Friday, Aug. 18. Buses will run that day arriving at school by 9 a.m. and returning children home by noon. Kindergarten children will enroll Monday, Aug. 21, which is the first day of school.

Gad! We find it difficult to stay away from politics entirely in our weekly writing, so will pass this along for the week. As reported in the Lubbock A-J, a new bumper sticker says, "Will Rogers never met George McGovern."

Amongst the deluge of weekly handouts that come across our desk, via our overburdened mails, was one extolling the value of "natural, organic foods." In some of the arguments for this "type" of foods we can see some merit. In others, it seems to be pure blarney.

Now we do not wish to ingest any more pesticides, herbicides or fungicides than the next fellow, but we have always rested reasonably secure in the thought that most of this type material is either chemically decomposed or physically removed by the time it reaches the consumer. It may or may not be, so we can understand some reluctance on some people's part to subject themselves to this additional hazard of life.

What we cannot grasp is the promotion behind "natural fertilizers" for crop growing. For example, there is only one atom of nitrogen as an element in nature. This atom is the same whether it be in an inert compound, inorganic, or a living compound, organic.

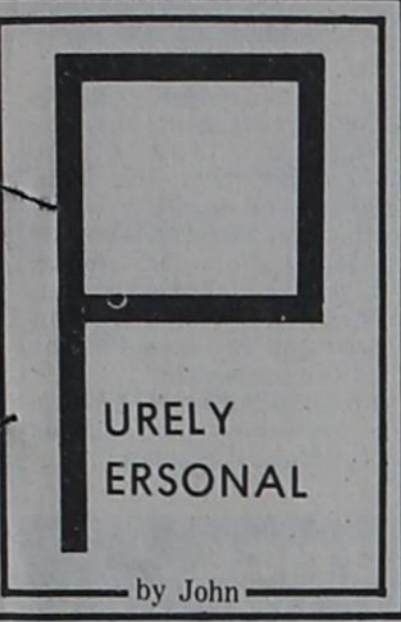
In the growth of plants, the gathering of nutritious material, i.e. elements, is done in only one way. It makes no difference whether the original supplier of the chemical element was from a so-called organic or inorganic source. The plant only takes up nitrogen as an element with no differentiation.

In a word, a little understanding of mother nature's growth process will help to separate the wheat from the chaff and, incidentally, save the overburdened family budget from disaster in the process.

The public is invited to view this showing and there is no charge for admission.



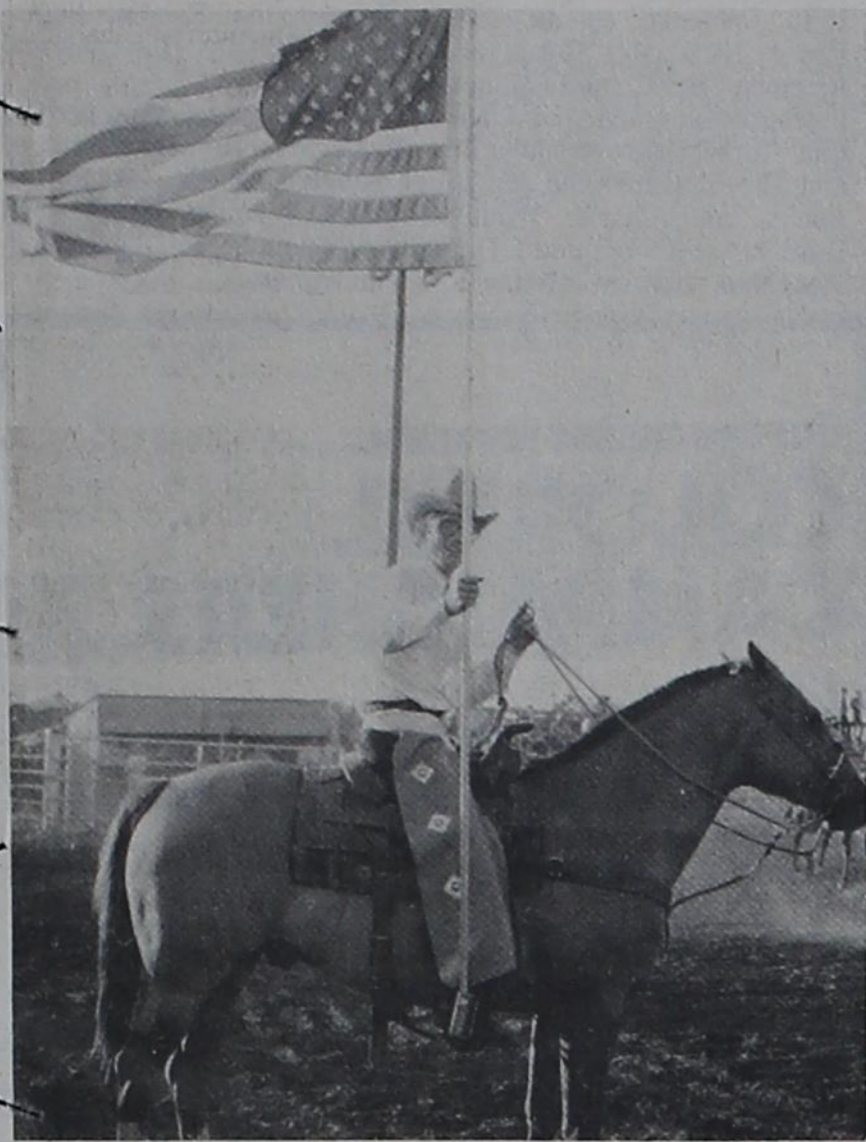

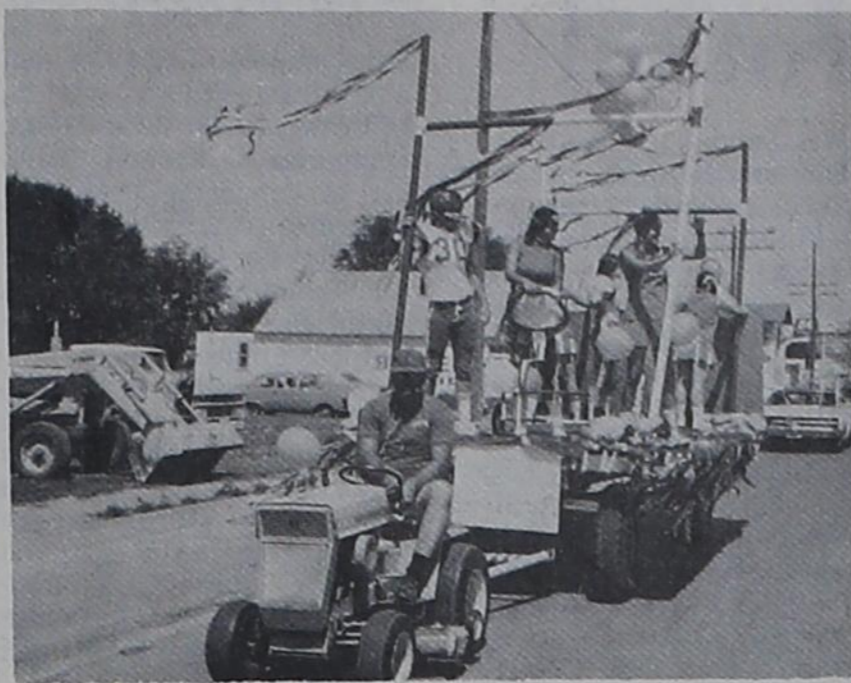

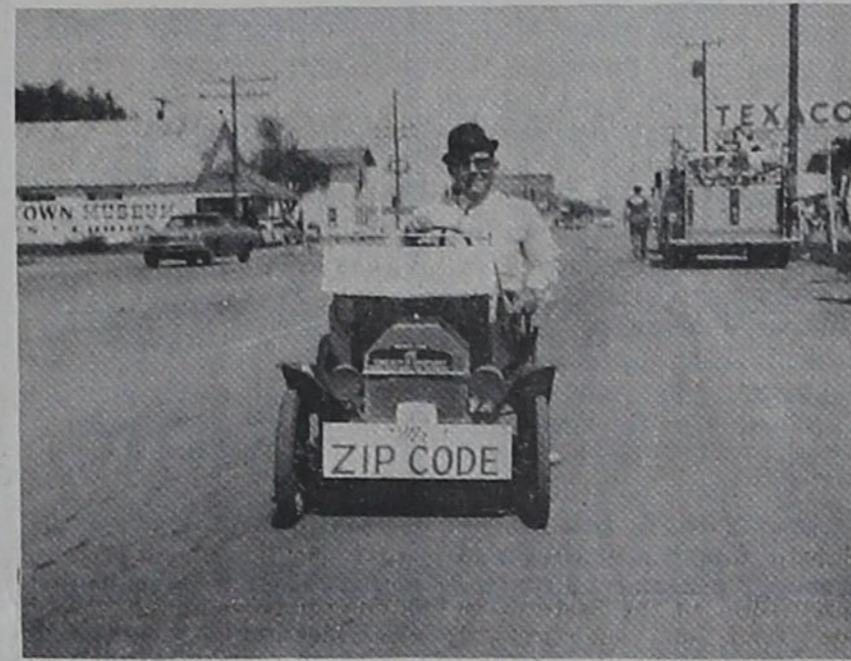

Vincent's Return From Washington

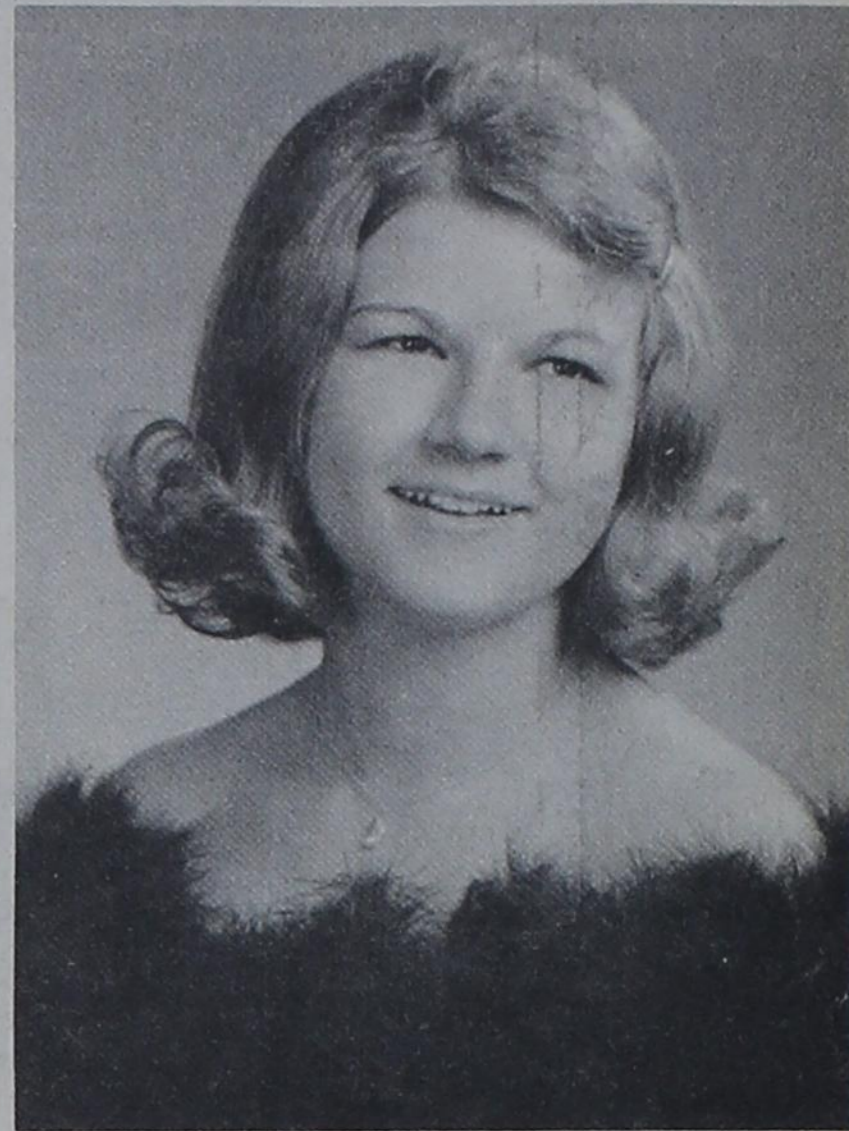

1 pound fresh shrimp, shelled and deveined or 1 (14-ounce) package frozen shrimp, partially thawed
1 tablespoon dry sherry
1 tablespoon corn starch
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon sugar
3 medium cucumbers, pared
5 tablespoons corn oil

Cut shrimp in half lengthwise. Mix shrimp with sherry, corn starch, 1 teaspoon salt and sugar. Set aside. Quarter cucumbers lengthwise and remove seeds. Cut into 1-inch diagonal pieces. Heat 2 tablespoons of the corn oil in 3-quart saucepan over medium heat. Add cucumbers and 1 teaspoon salt. Cook, stirring frequently, until cucumbers are slightly transparent, 3 to 5 minutes. Remove cucumbers; keep warm. Add remaining 3 tablespoons corn oil to oil in saucepan, heat. Add shrimp mixture. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until shrimp are almost tender. Add cucumbers and cook 2 to 3 minutes. Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.
