





Preparation for the new school year at Texico begins August 25 at 9 a.m. in the high school with a general faculty meeting. A faculty get-together is scheduled that night at 8 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Farwell school faculty will begin preparation for the new school year on August 14 with a general faculty meeting in the high school library at 10 a.m. At 1 p.m. that day there will be a teacher evaluation orkshop in the library.

Tuesday, August 15, a Drug Abuse workshop will be at 10 a.m. in the library with faculty meetings to begin at 1:30 p.m. In-service workshops are slated Wednesday, Aug. 16, in Canyon at the Junior High School. The workshops are planned by the Regional Education Service Center in Amarillo. Thursday, Aug. 17, Elementary and Junior High school in-service programs continue.

School lunch prices at Texico will be 35 cents for elementary and high school students and 50 cents for adults. Lunch prices at Farwell schools are the same as last year with the exception of sixth grade. They will be 40 cents for kindergarten through grade five and 45 cents for grades six through 12.

A regular school insurance

for Farwell students will be available with the same agency and at the same price as last year. At-school coverage for kindergarten through sixth grade is \$7.00 and seventh grade through 12th, \$10. Twenty-four hour coverage for kindergarten through sixth grade is \$23 and seventh through 12th, \$26. Coverage for high school football is \$28.



In case some of you have been wondering about the dip order on scabies scheduled for July, it was postponed a full month. Dipping was started on Tuesday, August 1. A scabies quarantine is still in effect in the following counties: Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Foard, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hardeman, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts,

Undipped animals' leaving the quarantine area and moving outside the quarantine area must be accompanied by an official movement certificate allowing movement to an official dip point for official dipping at destination, exception being animals moving direct to slaughter.

The high risk of creating source of infection makes it necessary that any undipped cattle from a scabies quarantined area that move through a livestock market outside the quarantined area be dipped at the livestock market together with all other cattle at the livestock market, exception being animals consigned from the sale directly to slaughter prior to release to the country. 









Most of us limit our use of cucumbers to salads and to the relish or pickle tray.

Chinese cooks are more imaginative. They often saute the cucumber - frequently with shrimp.

Now, when cucumbers are available in abundance, try Cucumber Shrimp Saute. Cucumber-Shrimp Saute

1 pound fresh shrimp, shelled and deveined or 1 (14ounce) package frozen shrimp, partially thawed

1 tablespoon dry sherry 1 tablespoon corn starch 2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon sugar 3 medium cucumbers, pared

5 tablespoons corn oil

Cut shrimp in half length wise. Mix shrimp with sherry, corn starch, 1 teaspoon salt and sugar. Set aside. Quarter cucumbers lengthwise and remove seeds. Cut into 1-inch diagonal pieces. Heat 2 tablespoons of the corn oil in 3quart saucepan over medium heat. Add cucumbers and 1 teaspoon salt. Cook, stirring frequently, until cucumbers are slightly transparent, 3 to 5 minutes. Serve immediately.
