## Texico And Lazbuddie Schools To Commence

Texico and Lazbuddie schools will open their doors Monday morning, Aug. 28, for the next school term.

Texico High School students registered Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. Elementary students are to register on the first day of

classes, in their individual rooms. A general faculty meeting was scheduled this morning (Friday) and a faculty get-together is planned for tonight at 8 o'clock in the school cafeteria.

New teachers in the Texico school system this year are Rita Dunsworth, primary; Sue

Harris, math; Kenneth Shaw, junior high coach; Peggy Weiss, science; and Darryl Haley, basketball coach.

Registration for Lazbuddie students was to be today (Friday) with buses running at the regular time and returning children home at 11 a.m. Kindergarten and first grade

students who pre-enrolled last May were not required to come on registration day.

New teachers for the school year at Lazbuddie are Allen Harmen, high school coach and history; Gary Cox, junior high coach and science; Mrs. Zana Segovia, home economics; and Miss Jeana Cole, business.

## First Day Enrollment Down From Last Year



Farwell school children gave up their summer activities for books and papers and classrooms one week earlier than their area friends. School started off with buses running at the regular times Monday.

First day enrollment for Farwell High School, Farwell Junior High and Farwell Elementary School was down from last year. Superintendent W. M. Roberts contributed the small enrollment to an earlier starting date than usual for Farwell.

Last year total enrollment at Farwell schools was 660. This year the figure dropped to 634, 26 fewer students. Not only was the total enrollment down, each school reported fewer students than last year on the first day.

Last year Farwell High School had 195 students on the first day. This year there were only 189. Monday, Farwell Junior High had 150 students. That is 13 fewer students than the 163 who reported on the first day last year. Farwell Elementary School boasted 295 students Monday, seven less than were in school the first day last year.

The largest class on Monday was the fifth grade with a total of 65 students.

Supt. Roberts expects quite a few more students to enroll in the next few weeks as families come back from late vacations, the growing season is finished, and everyone settles down for another school year.

### Christian Services Sunday

Funeral services were Sunday afternoon in Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church for C. C. (Clarence) Christian, 69, long time resident of the Farwell and Oklahoma Lane area.

Mr. Christian, a prominent landowner and farmer, died Friday night in Clovis Memorial Hospital. He had been in ill health for the past several months.

Services were conducted by Rev. Vernon Willard of Chilli-cothe, a former pastor of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church, and Rev. B. J. Foster of Knox City, a nephew of Mr. Christian.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery. Serving as pallbearers at the funeral service were nephews of Mr. Christian. All family friends were honorary pallbearers.

Mr. Christian moved to the Oklahoma Lane community in 1918. He moved to Farwell in 1956. A community leader, he served as a member of the school boards at Oklahoma Lane and Farwell for 14 years.

He served on the official board of the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church, Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church and as a member of the Farwell City Council. He was a partner in Oklahoma Lane Farm Supply and Gin.

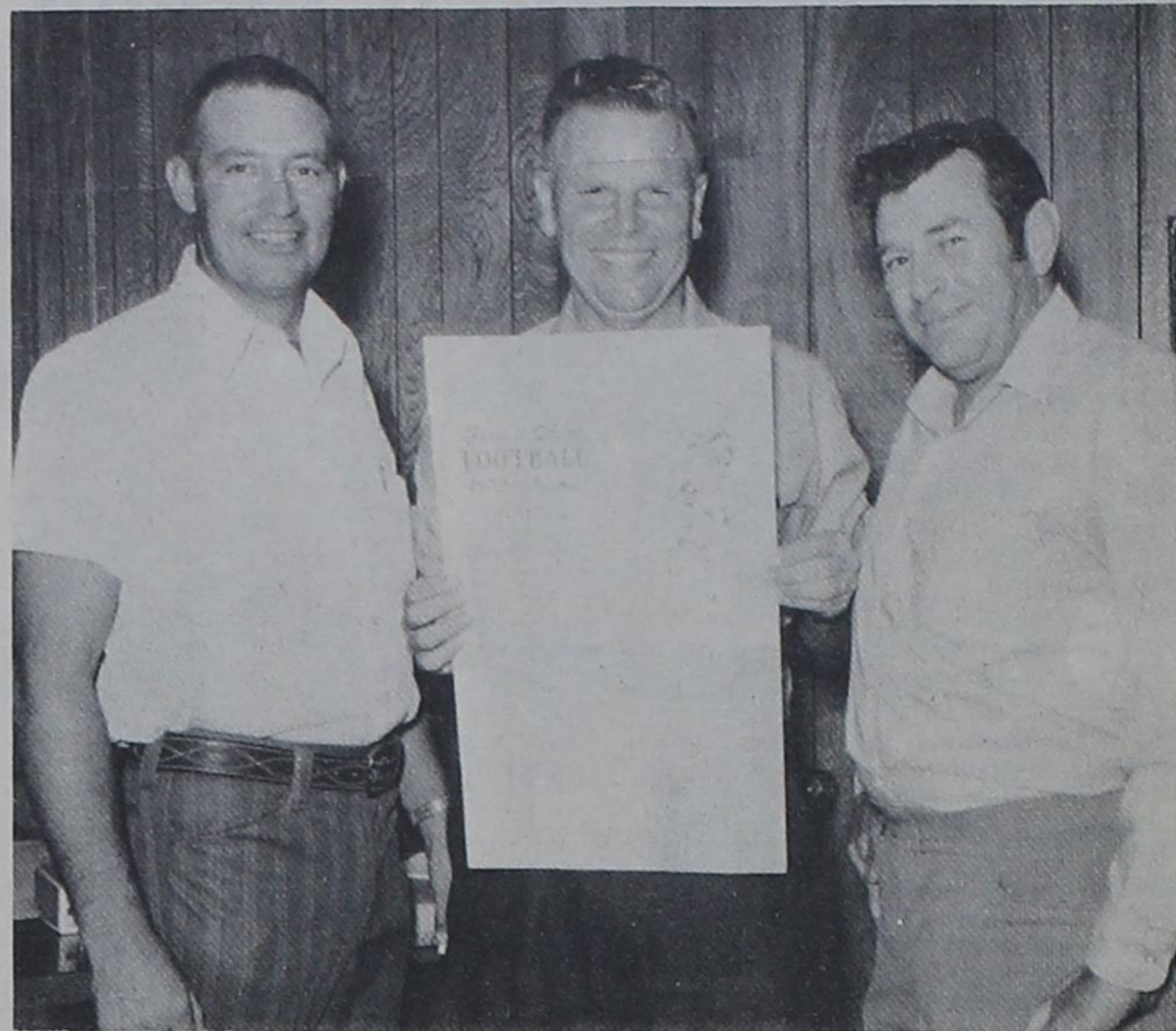
Mr. Christian was born Nov. 26, 1902, in Cold Springs, Okla. He was married to the former Carrie Foster May 16, 1926, in Bovina.

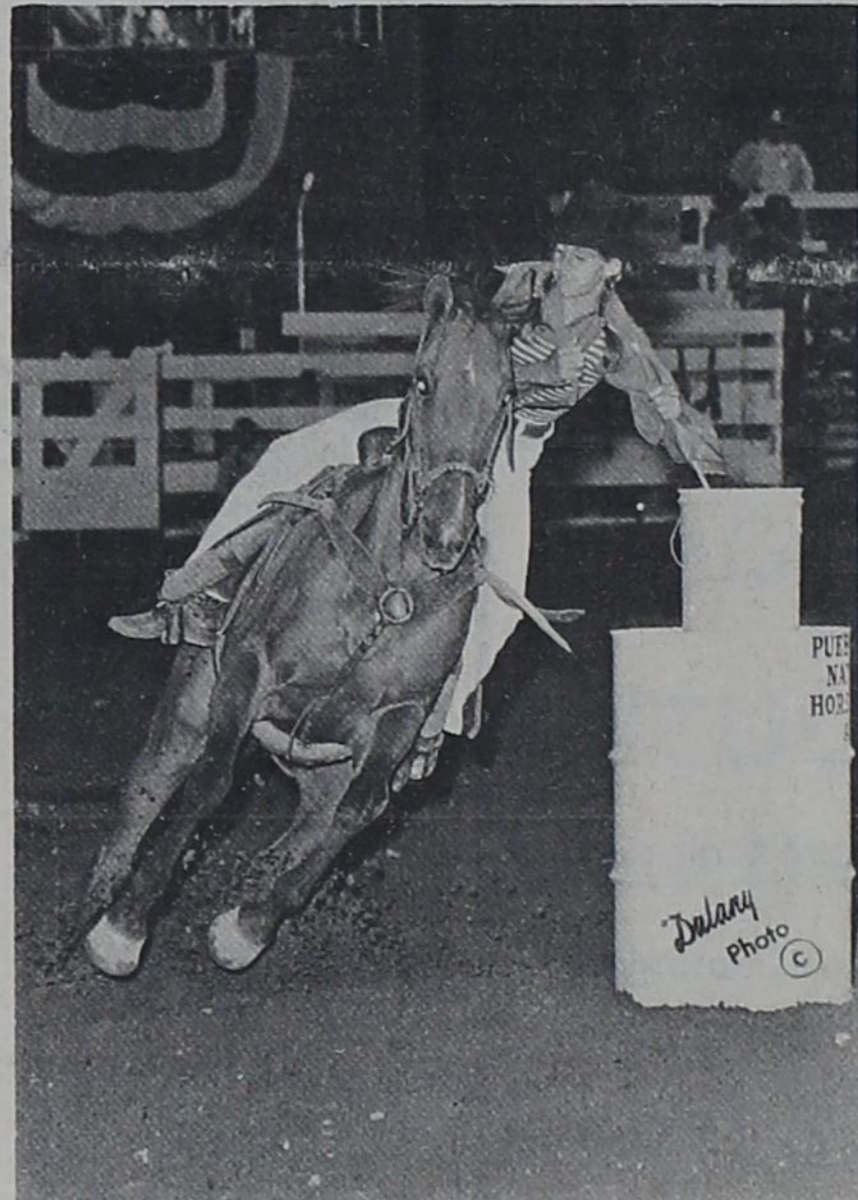
Miss Snodgrass was fourth in flags and fourth in poles for the year in national competition.

Haney Tate of Broadview has purchased the controlling interest in the firm. He has been designated president and chairman of the board for the corporation.

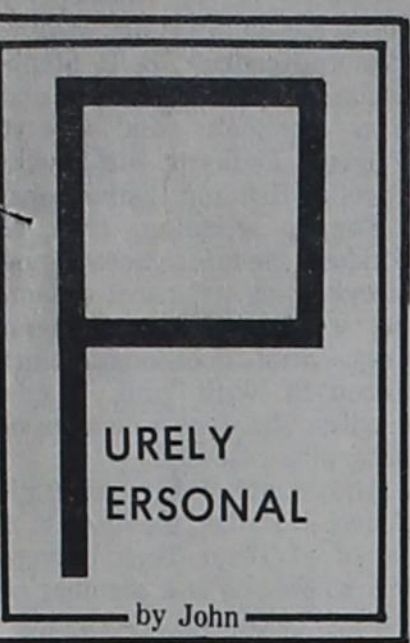

Communism works that way.

On the other hand, even the barest hint of commercialism has kept United States athletes from competing. This has allowed the Red brethren to point out how much better life is, under the Hammer and Sickle, and they have borne down on this theme for the last 12 to 16 years. It's time this "double standard" came to a halt.

This destroys the purpose of the quadrennial Olympics. The original Olympic Games were instituted as a means whereby individual athletes could come from all parts of the globe to compete person to person, WITHOUT POLITICS being a factor in the physical competition.

Now that the public rag is off the bush, the whole mess needs to be junked; and not given a new start until a better day of understanding between nations and races arrives. At the current level of thought, this may well be another 100 years.

### Pastor To Be Installed At St. John's Church

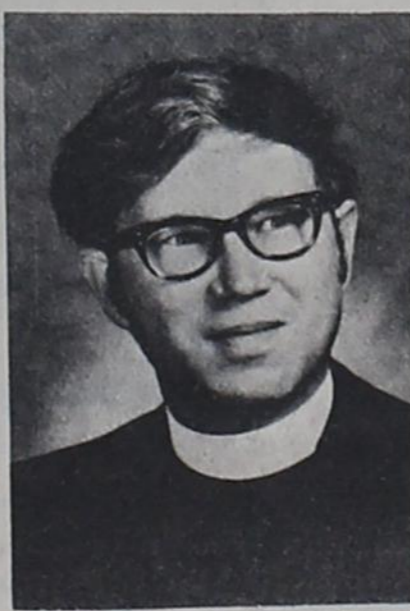

**THE DISPENSATION OF GRACE**

Many people have a mistaken notion that a dispensation is a period of time. This is not so, however, for the word "dispense" means simply "to deal out." The word "dispensation," then, means "the act of dispensing or dealing out," or "that which is dispensed or dealt out."

There are medical dispensaries, for example, where medicines are dispensed to the poor. Sometimes these dispensaries are conducted on a particular day of each week. Such a dispensation of medicine may take a full twelve hours each week, but it does not follow from this that a dispensation is a period of twelve hours! It is rather the act of dispensing or that which is dispensed.

The word dispensation is used many times in the Bible, though it is not always translated the same way. In Eph. 3:2 Paul writes of "the dispensation of the grace of God, which is given me to you-ward." God had committed to him a wonderful message of grace to dispense to others. Thus we read in Acts 20:24 his stirring words, spoken in the face of persecution and death:

"But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and THE MINISTRY WHICH I HAVE RECEIVED OF THE LORD JESUS, TO TESTIFY THE GOSPEL OF THE GRACE OF GOD."

The "gospel" or "good news" of the grace of God: this was the dispensation committed to Paul for us by the risen, ascended Lord. This is always Paul's message: "Where sin abounded grace did much more abound" . . . "The forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" . . . "Justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" . . . "By grace are ye saved, through faith."

Before any firm agreement can be reached, it is necessary for the District Court of Hale County to ascertain the number of claimants who wish to come forward with their stamps. NUMBER 2 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 6 of Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows: "Section 6. On the effective date of this Amendment, the Lamar County Hospital District is abolished. The Commissioners Court of Lamar County may provide for the transfer or for the disposition of the assets of the Lamar County Hospital District."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 14 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 57)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 6b, to read as follows: "Section 6b. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 6, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, any county, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purpose of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements. The commissioners court shall, however, retain a sufficient amount of the cor-

pus of the county permanent school fund to pay ad valorem taxes on school lands or royalty interests owned at the time of the distribution. Nothing in this Section affects financial aid to any school district by the state."

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or a retired officer of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, from receiving compensation for services as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonselective State officer may hold other nonselective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such rates may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed." This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void."

(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of more than 70 percent, or a veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

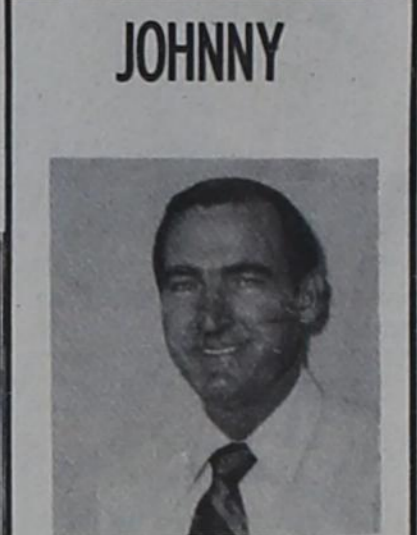

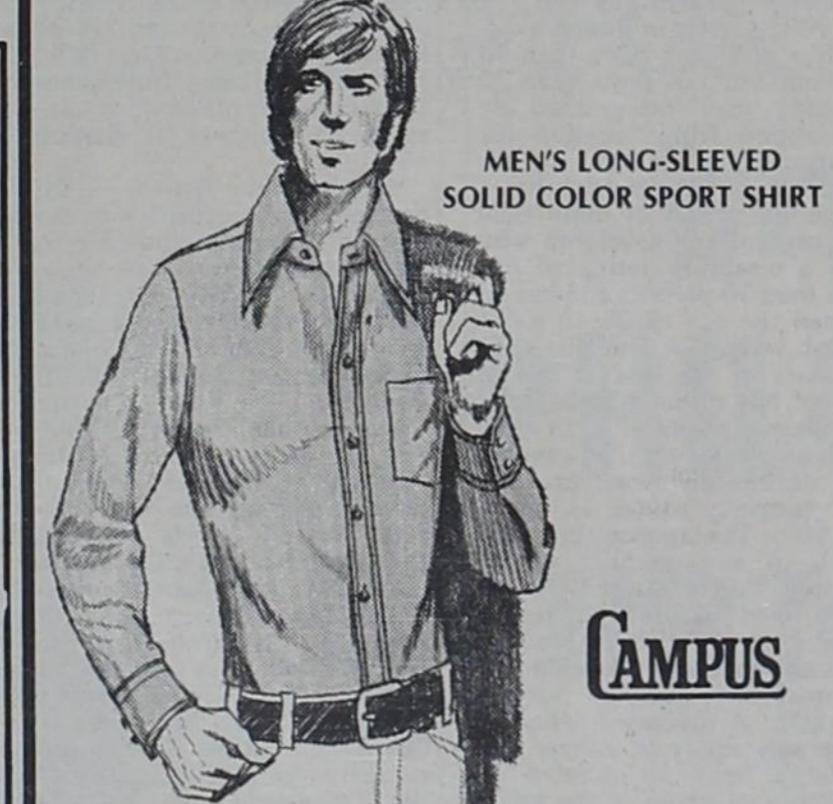
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
