

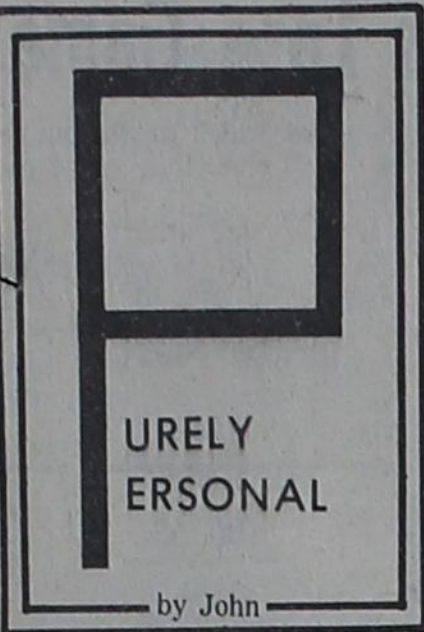

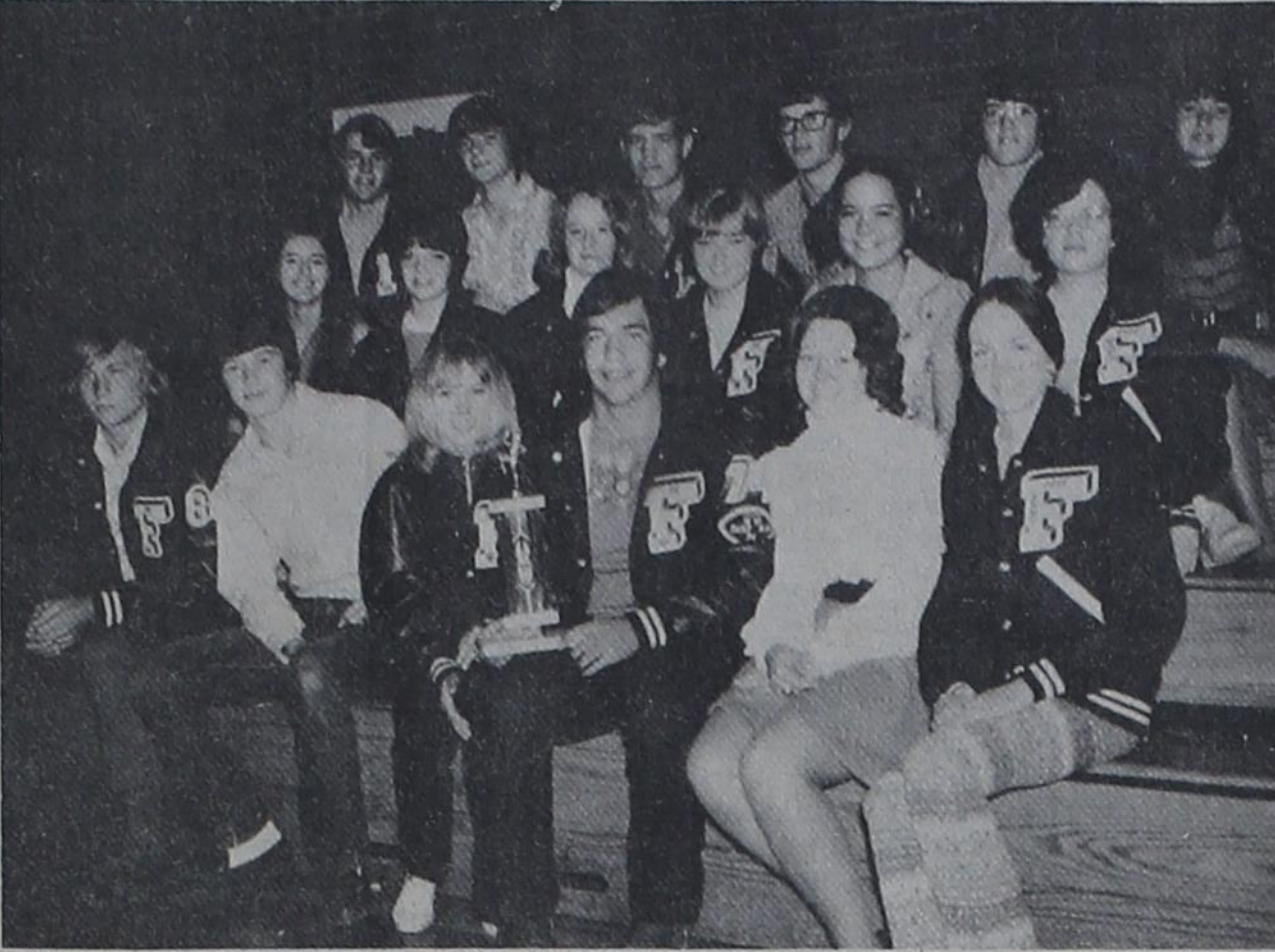
However, nothing in the foregoing statement is to be construed as saying that Ray Ford and Albert Johnson are leading their respective spouses. They're not.

Voter Registration Deadline Coming Up

Deadline for registering to vote in the November 7 general election is Friday, Oct. 6, at 5 p.m., according to Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector.

One hundred twenty-four voters have registered since the June primary bringing the total to 3,767 registration certificates issued by the tax assessor-collector's office.

With 6,644 eligible voters in Parmer County, that figure is just over 50 percent, with only five more days to register. It is not known how many of those voters are in the 18 to 21 age bracket or over 65, but there have been quite a few persons in both categories registering.

Vandals Strike In Twin Cities

Vandalism occurred for the second week in a row in Farwell and spread across the state line into Texico. Week before last, vandals damaged doors and windows at First Baptist Church, Farwell.

Several flares were taken from the Texico-Farwell Boy Scout bus which was parked at the church and were apparently used in the destruction. Sheriff Charles Lovelace said he suspected B.B. guns had been used to break out street lights nearby.

Last week, vandals were again at work at Farwell Schools. Windows were broken out at Farwell High School. Lovelace said it appeared large rocks and bottles were used. There were several large rocks found under the windows when officers investigated.

The vandalism spread to Texico over the weekend. Bricks were used by vandals in breaking out two windows at Rip's Western Wear, said Mrs. Rip Snodgrass.

Mrs. Snodgrass said she thought a pair of boots and a few shirts were missing from inside the store. The incident was investigated by City Marshal Willie Ronquillo. He contacted Sheriff Lovelace to assist in the investigation.

Garner Chosen To Play In National FFA Band

David Garner, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Garner of Lariat, is one of 120 FFA members from across the nation who has been selected to participate in the National FFA Band. Garner, who will play bass clarinet, was selected from over 500 applicants representing 44 states.

He will leave Oct. 7 from Amarillo by plane for Kansas City, Mo.

After two days of intensive practice prior to the convention Oct. 10-13, the Band will perform during all but one session of the 45th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America in Kansas City.

Garner is a member of the Farwell FFA Chapter where his advisors are Jerry Mathis and Danny Ivy. He is a member of Farwell High School Band directed by Lynn Burton.

Often referred to as the "mail order band" because of the method of recruiting members, the National FFA Band was first organized in 1947. Since that time competition for the honor of playing in the band has steadily increased. Under the direction of Roger Heath, Assistant Director of the Purdue University Bands, the FFA Band has gained a reputation for its polished performances even though bandsmen have only two days of practice together prior to their first performance.

Bandsmen are chosen on the basis of tape recorded auditions or competitive auditions in their State FFA Bands with support-

ing recommendations from their high school band directors," explains Heath who has spent many hours during the summer selecting FFA members to fill the 120-piece band. In addition, all applicants are required to list their musical experience and activities such as solo and ensemble performances, special honors and special experience such as drum majoring or twirling.

To be selected for the National FFA Band, FFA members must first be recommended by their high school band directors and their State FFA Association. The State Association forwards applications to Director Heath who bases his selection on the written recommendations, the tape recordings, the instrumentation needs of the band, and representation of most of the states according to their budget limitations. Travel and living expenses for the bandsmen are usually paid in part by the State FFA Association, and the bandsman or his FFA Chapter pays the remainder of the expenses.

Wet Milo Trickle In To Elevators

Area grain elevators have received some loads of wet milo this week, but dry milo should be ready in a week or so. Elevator operators say they expect dry loads to start coming in soon.

First load of milo to Worley Grain was brought in by Jim Curtis, three miles south of Farwell. Curtis' load of X-L 707A milo had a moisture content of 15.8 and a test weight of 56 lbs. per bushel. The irrigated milo was averaging 9,350 lbs. per acre.

Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator of Farwell has received several loads of wet milo this week. The first load was brought in by Joe Clark of Clark and Paul Farms, three miles west of Texico.

The irrigated milo had a moisture content of 14.3 and a test weight of 55 lbs. According to a spokesman, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Texico has not received any milo.

Asa Smith at Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat said just a little milo had been brought in. He said it is averaging 15 to 17 in moisture content. He said he hoped dry milo would be coming in the next week or so.

He mentioned that the Lariat elevator is receiving a lot of corn. "The corn that's coming in now looks pretty good," he said.

Melrose 'Buffaloes' Texico, Wolverines Lose Game

Before the game, the Melrose field looked like a herd of four-legged Buffaloes had stampeded across it. After the game it looked like the two-legged variety had trampled the Wolverines, to the score of 42-0.

In the first three minutes of the game, Melrose scored two times. The first score was made by the Buffaloes after they recovered a Wolverine fumble on the four-yard line.

On Texico's second play of the game, Randy Harrison was hit hard and fumbled the ball on the four-yard line with a quick recovery by Melrose. The next play resulted in a score by Melrose's Kippie Black. The extra points run was successful making the score 8-0.

The Wolverines held the ball for three plays after the

kickoff and then fumbled again. On Melrose's second play after the fumble, Ken Reed ran 40 yards for the second score of the game. The extra point try was successful and the Buffaloes jumped to a 16-0 lead.

The Wolverines were successful in corraling the Buffaloes until the last part of the first quarter when the Wolverines again fumbled the ball. In the play that followed, Butch Merritt of Melrose ran 10 yards for the third score. The PAT kick failed and the gun went off ending the first quarter 22-0.

In the second quarter, the Buffaloes scored once when Rex Rush ran 45 yards for a touchdown. Melrose broke through the Texico line for two extra points making the score 30-0.

In the third quarter Don Gunn of Melrose ran one yard for another TD after Texico fumbled the ball. The extra point kick failed leaving the score 36-0.

The fourth quarter brought another touchdown for the Buffaloes when Marvin Estes ran three yards after they recovered the ball on another Texico fumble.

Near the end of the second quarter Gerald Whitener of Texico received a minor concussion and had to be taken to the hospital in Clovis.

Whitener is expected to be completely recovered in time for the Wolverines' next game.

Coach Bucky Walters played many of his sophomores in the second half of the game. Albert Galvan, Roger Pace, Sammy West, Bobby Englant and Kevin Stanley boosted the attack of the Wolverines.

Johnny Hagerton will probably remain on the team's inactive list because of a broken arm.

James Steward and Bobby Goforth were out because of scholastic ineligibility.

The Buffaloes, pre-season favorites for regional championships, averaged 40-pounds-a-man heavier than the Wolverines.

Cowboys' Rope Is A Little Too 'Tight'

It seemed as though the Cowboys were holding the Steers down just a little too tightly last Friday night as Plains took a 52-8 victory. There weren't as many fans out as previous games but the spirit was just as high.

Plains dominated the statistics as well as the scoring with 418 total yards to Farwell's 239. The Cowboys took 375 yards on the ground to the Steers' 184. Plains also had 19 first downs to Farwell's 10. The game was not as boring as the score indicates because the Steers made some great plays but just weren't able to get across the goal line.

To start the ball game off, Mike Woods ran the kickoff back 28 yards and Farwell started offensive play on their own 38-yard line. Quarterback Kevin Hargrove hit David Norton with a pass of 10 yards for the first play of the night. The Steers were not able to obtain another first down and Ray Norton booted the ball to the Cowboys' 20-yard line where they took over. Plains was forced to punt also and Farwell took over on their own

20. Three plays later, a Steer fumbled the ball, and as it rolled back into the Steer endzone, a Cowboy landed on it and that was a safety for Plains for two points. Plains received the ball again on Farwell's 46-yard line. The Cowboys traveled those 46 yards in nine plays on the ground to give them their first touchdown of the night with 3:53 remaining in the first quarter. David Norton stopped Lowell Trout short of the extra points run and the score was 8-0.

Farwell took over offensive play on their own 14 after the kickoff. The Steers traveled 46 yards plus 15 yards of penalties against Plains. Woods picked up 36 yards of those 46. Farwell's drive was ended as there was a bad handoff resulting in a fumble. A Cowboy was on the ball, but it popped out and a Steer was on the ball. The ball didn't like it there either so it popped out again and this time a Cowboy kept it. The fans didn't know whether to yell or not during that mixup. Plains made a drive of 47 yards only to fumble again with Farwell

taking over on their own 25-yard line.

Starting the second quarter off, the Steers drove 70 long yards for their only touchdown of the night. Hargrove connected with Doug Johnston on a 6-yard touchdown pass. The same pass play was used for the PAT's to Johnston in the endzone to make it 8-8 with 8:57 remaining in the first half.

After the Farwell kickoff, Plains drove 65 yards in 11 plays with Tony Chandler going over the goal line for Plains. The extra kick was blocked by Kevin Hargrove but Farwell was offside. The Cowboys tried to run with the ball this time but were still stopped short of the goal. This made the score 14-8.

Farwell took the ball on their own 26 but on the first play, the ball was fumbled and Plains took over on the Steer 31-yard line. Plains went those 31 yards in seven plays to give them another TD. Their extra point try failed. The score was 20-8 with one minute remaining in the first half.

During the halftime, the Farwell High School Band performed an excellent and unusual show. The band

formed an FHS and played the fight song to conclude activities.

Plains took the kickoff and drove until Joey Lowe took the ball in from the one-yard line for the Cowboys' fourth TD of the night. Hargrove again blocked the kick and the score was 26-8 with 7:37 remaining in the third quarter.

Farwell could not move the ball and received 25 yards in penalties. Then a Steer fumbled and Plains took over on Farwell's 41-yard line. However, Plains was forced to punt and Farwell took over on their own 2-yard line. A Cowboy caught a Steer again in the endzone for another safety and two points for Plains. The Cowboys took over on the Steer 41. After three plays, Plains fumbled and Ty Phillips recovered the ball.

Farwell went 37 yards in five plays only to fumble with Plains taking over again on their own 40-yard line. They drove those 60 yards with Joey Lowe again going two yards for another TD. A pass was completed for the extra points and the score was 36-8.

After exchanging punts twice, Plains took the ball for another TD and extra points to make it 44-8 with 3:40 left in the game.

Farwell was not able to obtain a first down and Plains took over. Lowell Trout took the ball two plays later and went 28 yards for the final touchdown of the night. The extra points were good and the score was 52-8 with 1:01 remaining in the game. The Steers were unable to get anywhere and the game ended with Plains very happy with a 52-8 victory.

Farwell now stands 0-3 for the season as Plains stands 2-1.

Coach Toby Booth said the Steers didn't play as badly as the score indicated. He mentioned injuries to two Steer players, Johnny Boling and David Norton. Norton will be out for several weeks after bruising cartilage in his knee.

Boling underwent surgery Tuesday morning in Lubbock to repair ligaments and remove torn cartilage in his knee. He is expected to be out the entire season.

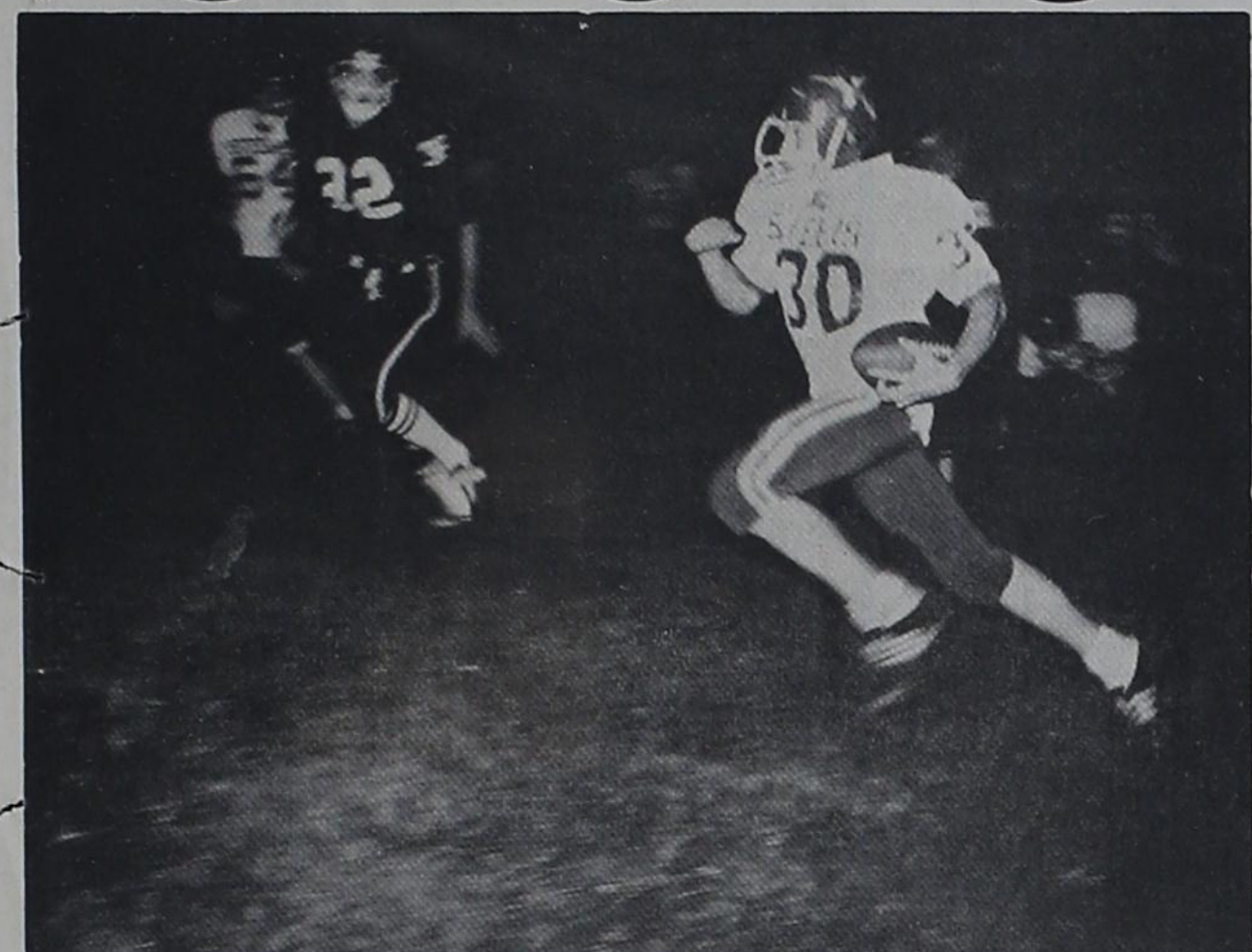

On The Farm In Parmer County

Parmer County was in the news during the week of September 18 through September 23 at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo. Several different divisions in which county residents participated included: County Educational Booth, Livestock shows, and 4-H activities.

Each year the County Extension offices set up a booth during the fair exhibiting a sampling of the various types of crops grown in the county. The booth, along with other county booths, was judged and paid premium money. The county booth this year again featured the "3.76 in '76" program.

This program is designed by the Extension Service Agricultural Program to increase the income from the sale of agricultural products by \$1 billion by the year 1976, through the use of educational programs, result demonstrations, research and improved technology sponsored by the State Extension Service.

This goal is being obtained by a yearly increase in the total agricultural income. Parmer County's share in this amounts to over \$7 million annually.

Karene and Evelyn Hart of the Friona 4-H Club exhibited their Shorthorn heifers in the open show Wednesday, Sept. 20. Evelyn placed third with her heifer and Karene placed sixth with hers. These two girls, along with their sister, Holly, were among the top 10 finalists in the Wheat King contest.

This contest is open to all 4-H and FFA members in the Panhandle of Texas and is judged on the quality of wheat samples by youngsters entered. Several different tests are run on that sample such as protein, milling, quality, etc.

On Saturday, Sept. 23, the top ten finalist were presented and the places were announced. Karene Hart was second, Evelyn was eighth and Holly Hart was ninth.

Cheryl Whitecotton of the Bovina 4-H Club was the county winner in the Bake Show contest. Each county in the Panhandle of Texas entered their county winner in the District Bake Show. These 22 girls were presented during the Rural Youth Day activities and awarded premium money for

entering the contest.

Beef cow numbers have increased substantially in Texas since the first of the year, according to figures compiled by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, points out that the biggest increase in cow herds has occurred in South Texas and in parts of East Texas and along the Red River.

The Texas A&M University specialist lists improved range conditions and favorable cattle prices as the main reasons for the expansion. Grazing conditions have been average to above average in many areas of the state although parts of Northeast Texas are still suffering from lack of moisture.

Uvacek notes that the situation is in contrast to last year when cow numbers in Texas moved down six percent. The drought of last year took its toll and breeding herds were thinned to avoid over-stocking of ranges.

Cow herds were cut back in most areas of the state during 1971. Largest reductions occurred in the Gulf Coast area, South Central Texas, the Edwards Plateau and the Panhandle. The Red River area in North Texas was the only region showing an increase in cow numbers during 1971.

Cow numbers have increased at such a rapid rate during the first half of 1972 that the losses experienced during 1971 have been almost entirely overcome. Uvacek believes that this cow herd expansion will continue the rest of the year, although at a less rapid rate.

At Home In Parmer County

Congratulations to our outstanding 4-H'ers at our Parmer County 4-H Fair Sept. 16. They were: Clothing, Holly Hart; Baked Goods, Cheryl Gohlke; Canned Goods, Cheryl Gohlke; Arts and Crafts, Holly Hart; Agriculture, Evelyn Hart; and Vegetables, Karene Hart.

Hunting seasons for dove and quail are approaching for most parts of Texas. Although dove season has opened in the northern zone, elsewhere the seasons don't begin until later.

Dove and quail make tasty wild game treats when properly dressed and prepared.

Age quail and dove at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 28 hours to remove some of the gamey flavor which might detract from eating pleasure.

Dry-plucking the birds has been recommended rather than skinning them, to conserve flavor and moisture. After they are plucked, singe them over a flame to remove the down.

Next, make a cut along or across he back to split the bird apart and remove the entrails. Then remove the head, claws and feet. Wipe the body cavity clean with a damp cloth.

Once dressed this way, they are ready for immediate use or for freezing.

Frying is a popular way to prepare quail and dove. First dredge the birds in flour, salt and pepper them and fry in deep fat. Brown each bird on both sides. Then lower the temperature, cover the skillet and cook slowly for about 20 minutes.

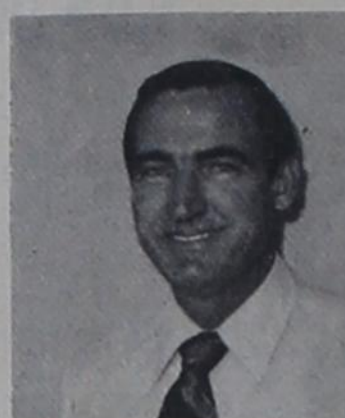

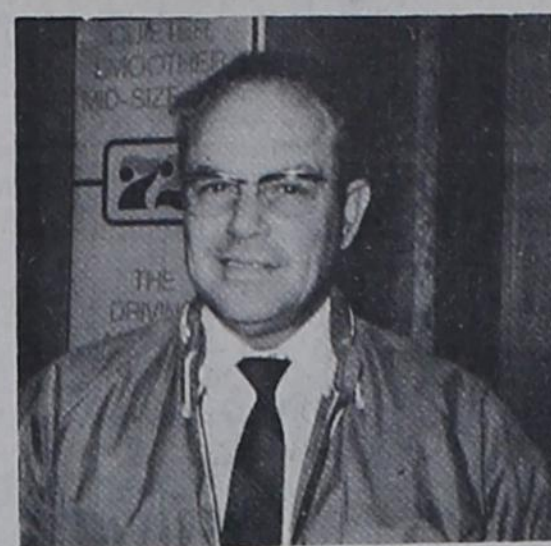
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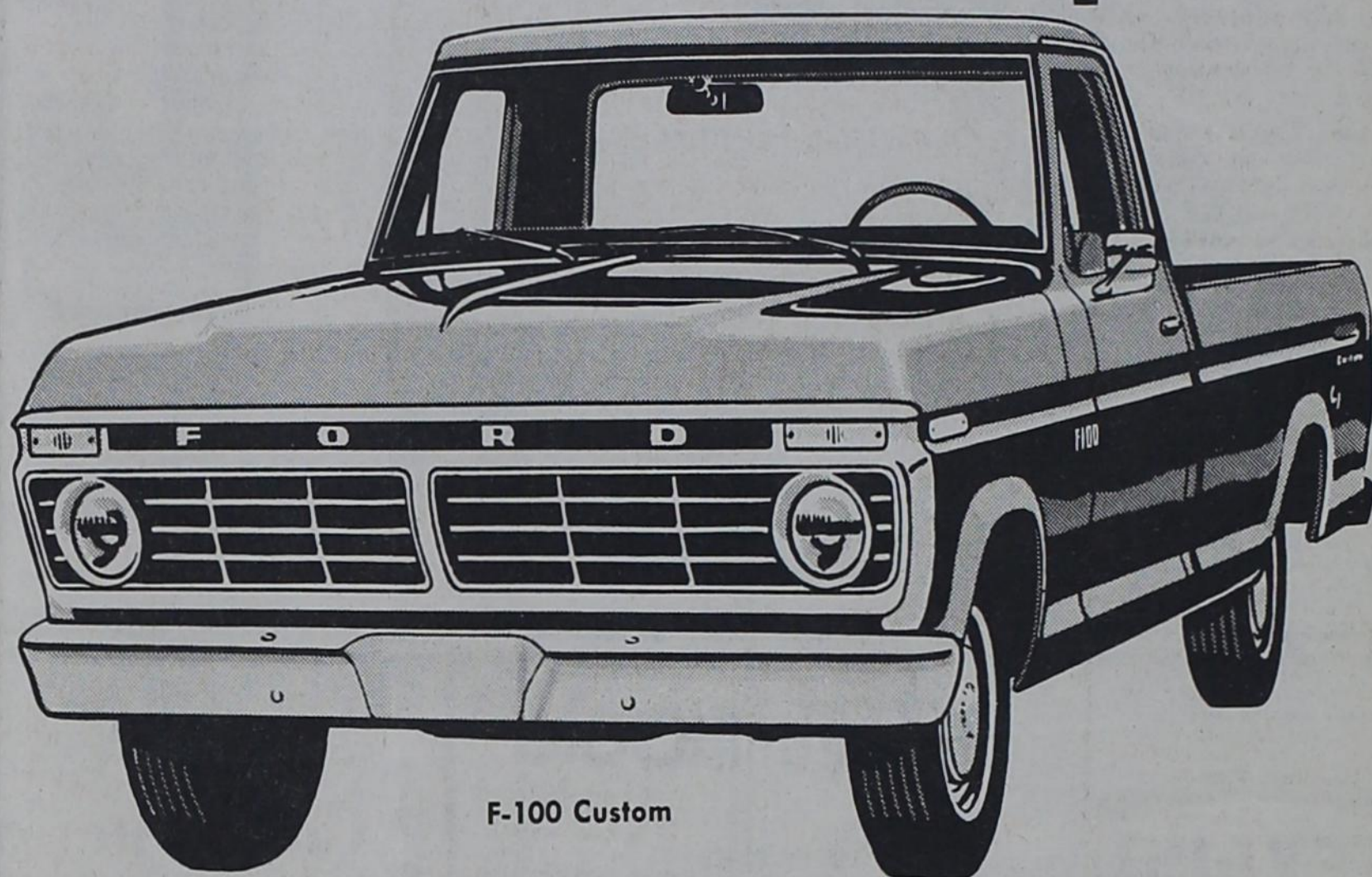
