He was appointed Justice of the Peace at Texico in 1946. Two years ago, the municipal judgeship expired, but Lewis still performed the duties of Police Magistrate.


The board of trustees are required to appoint someone to the position until the next city election which will be in March, 1974. If anyone is interested in the position, they
