Wolverines Wipe Out Moriarty's Pintos

by Steve Osborn. Texico Wolverines pulled the blinders on Moriarty Pintos Friday night for a 14-0 victory. Despite the cold weather, the Wolverines rounded up 300 total yards to the Pintos' 116 yards.

In the first quarter, Texico's Randy Harrison completed a long pass to Curtis Lindley who took the ball and ran 50 yards for a touchdown. He also was responsible for tacking on the extra point.

During the remainder of the first quarter, the Wolverines were held by the Pintos to only 44 yards, but they managed to make five more first downs.

After the Pintos took possession of the ball, they succeeded in gaining sufficient yardage for one first down, but the Wolverines held them off for the rest of the first quarter.

Most of the time, the Pintos were stuck down in their own territory. They managed to get close to the goal line only once, and that was to the 10-yard line.

In the second quarter, the Pintos fought hard and recovered several Wolverine fumbles, but failed to score due to the outstanding defensive effort of the Wolverines.

Near the end of the second quarter, the entire Wolverine team executed a beautiful play on a punt return, said Coach

Bucky Walters. The Pintos kicked the ball and almost immediately their line and backfield were chopped down, leaving a clear-cut path for Curtis Lindley to take the ball and run for another TD.

Playing on the line for Texico were Alan Haile, Gerald Whitener, Craig Chumley, Dwayne Kelley, Jeff Brown and Raymond Cantu. Lindley again kicked the extra point giving the Wolverines a 14-0 lead at halftime.

In the third quarter, the Pintos stepped up their yardage by making a fast 25-yard run for a first down followed by a completed six-yard pass play, but they were still unable to score against a strong Wolverine defense.

During the entire game, Texico chalked up 15 first downs while Moriarty only managed five. The Wolverines rushed for 250 yards to 110 for the Pintos.

Five of the 15 first downs made by the Wolverines came in the third quarter. One of the outstanding plays of the evening was a pass interception by Texico's Fulgencio Ortiz in the third quarter.

Even though the Wolverines were plagued by penalties, their key plays were executed smoothly and resulted in the second season win for the Texico squad. The Wolverines

First District Game - -

Kangaroos Hop By Steers 15 - 13

We started off our district play last Friday night with an exciting but fruitless game, falling to Kress 15-13. Again the Steers dominated the statistics having 346 total yards to the Kangaroo's 226. The total first downs was just opposite the score, with Farwell having 15 and Kress 13.

The game was on the go from the opening kickoff to the final 32 seconds. There was a great homecoming crowd out showing the Steers its support and the fans got a very exciting ball game.

The Steers kicked off to the Kangaroos to get things going. After making only six yards advancement, Kress was forced to punt. There was a clipping penalty against Farwell making it first down and 25 to go. The Steers started offensive play on their own 30-yard line. In 13 plays Farwell got to the Kress 7-yard line but were unable to make the touchdown. Doug Johnston attempted a field goal but it failed and Kress took back over on their own 20.

After only two plays Kress fumbled with Freddie Dale recovering and Farwell took over again on the Kress 20. It took Quarterback Kevin Hargrove only one play to connect on a pass to Doug Johnston with a pickup of 20 yards and a Steer touchdown. Johnston also kicked for the extra point making the score Farwell 7 and Kress 0, with 2:19 remaining in the first quarter.

After Kress had ten plays, they were unable to obtain another first down and the Steers took over on their own 16-yard line. On Farwell's second play, Hargrove completed a pass to Doug Johnston for another TD for the Steers. It was a pass play of 84 yards, which is the longest this season. The score now stood 13-0 with the point after touchdown try failing. We really had the Kangaroos nervous at this point with 10:31 remaining in the first half of the ball game.

Kress started again on their 20 and after only five plays, Johnston intercepted a Kangaroo pass and Farwell took over again. After two Steer plays there was a fumble with a Kangaroo on it for them to take over on the Steer 10-yard line. Again after two Kress plays there was a fumble with Farwell taking back over on its own 5-yard line. The next Steer play showed another fumble with Kress taking over on their 9-yard line.

Farwell was determined not to let Kress have a touchdown and held them for four plays to get the ball back on our own 7-yard line. We finally got out of that rut but were soon forced to punt with the Kangaroos taking over on Farwell's 48.

It took eleven hard plays for Kress to get those 48 yards and they timed it just right as the clock ran out during the touchdown play. A Kangaroo hopped over the line for the extra points and this made the score 13-8 with no time remaining in the first half.

After each team exchanged punts, Kress intercepted a Farwell pass and it took the Kangaroos only four plays to go 49 yards for their second TD. The extra point kick was good and Kress went in the lead 15-13 with 7:07 remaining in the third quarter.

Hargrove picked up enough and the Steers continued. Two plays later, Hargrove connected with Johnston for a pickup of 15 yards with 1:32 remaining.

A fourth down situation again arose with Farwell lacking nine yards for a touchdown. A field goal was attempted but it failed; however, there was a penalty against Kress and this moved to ball up to the Kress 4-yard line. The decision was finally made to try the field goal again. The second attempt failed and Kress took possession on their own 20 with 32 seconds remaining.

Thus ended the ball game 15-13 with Kress taking the first district game victory.

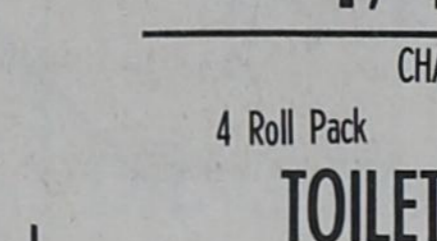

Overall game discipline proved important to the eighth grade team since squabbles were prevalent. Conduct of the Yearlings was exceptionally good during the game.

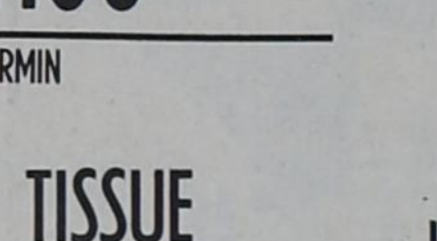
Maltos, Mike Goettsch and Castillo were credited with the scores rung up by the Yearlings during the game.

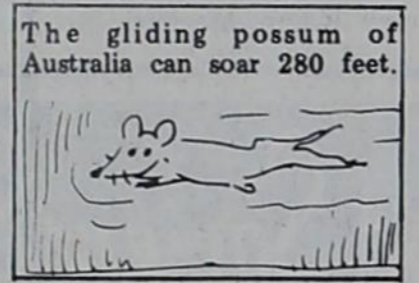

Pavilion at the State Fair.

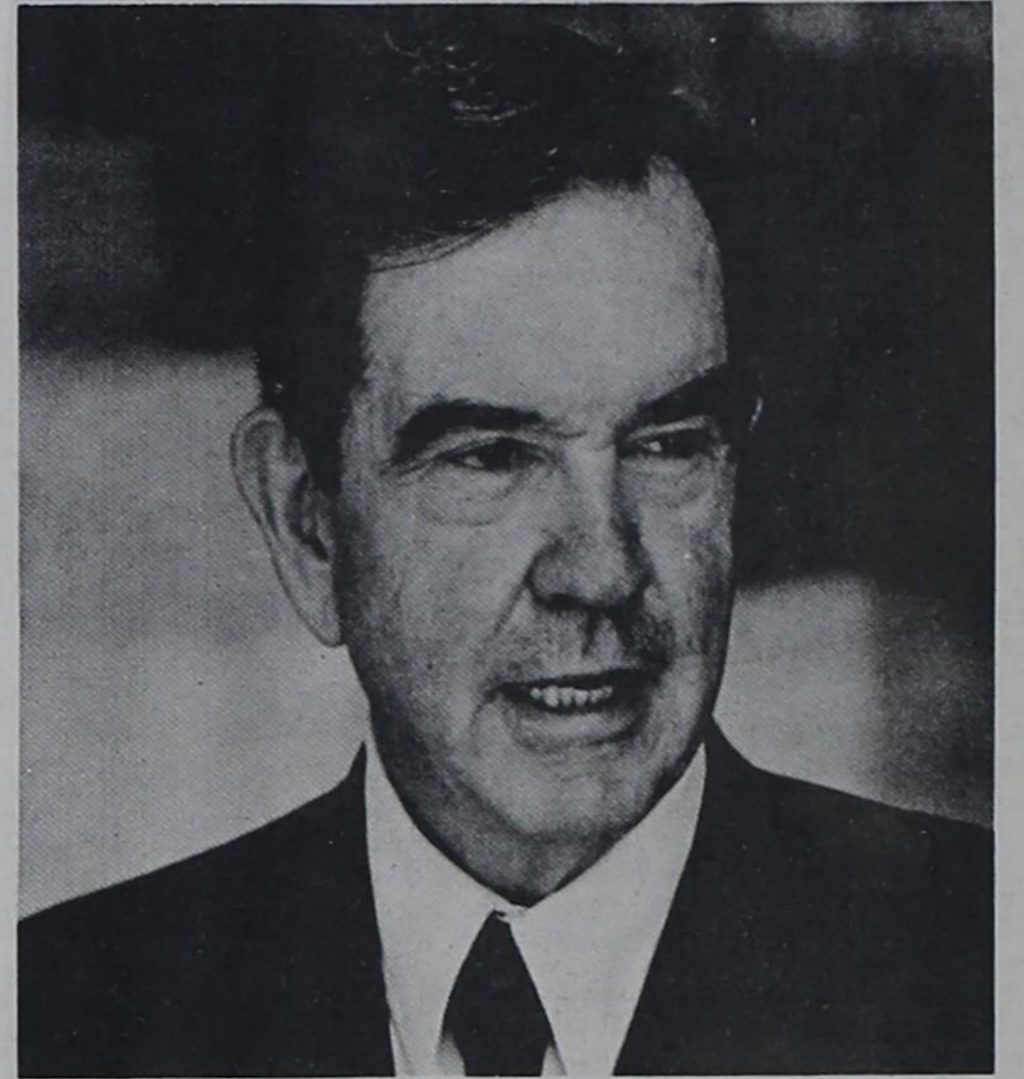
LeJean Hill of Dalhart, one of the five entrants from District I, the district which includes Parmer County, was winner of the State Dress Revue.

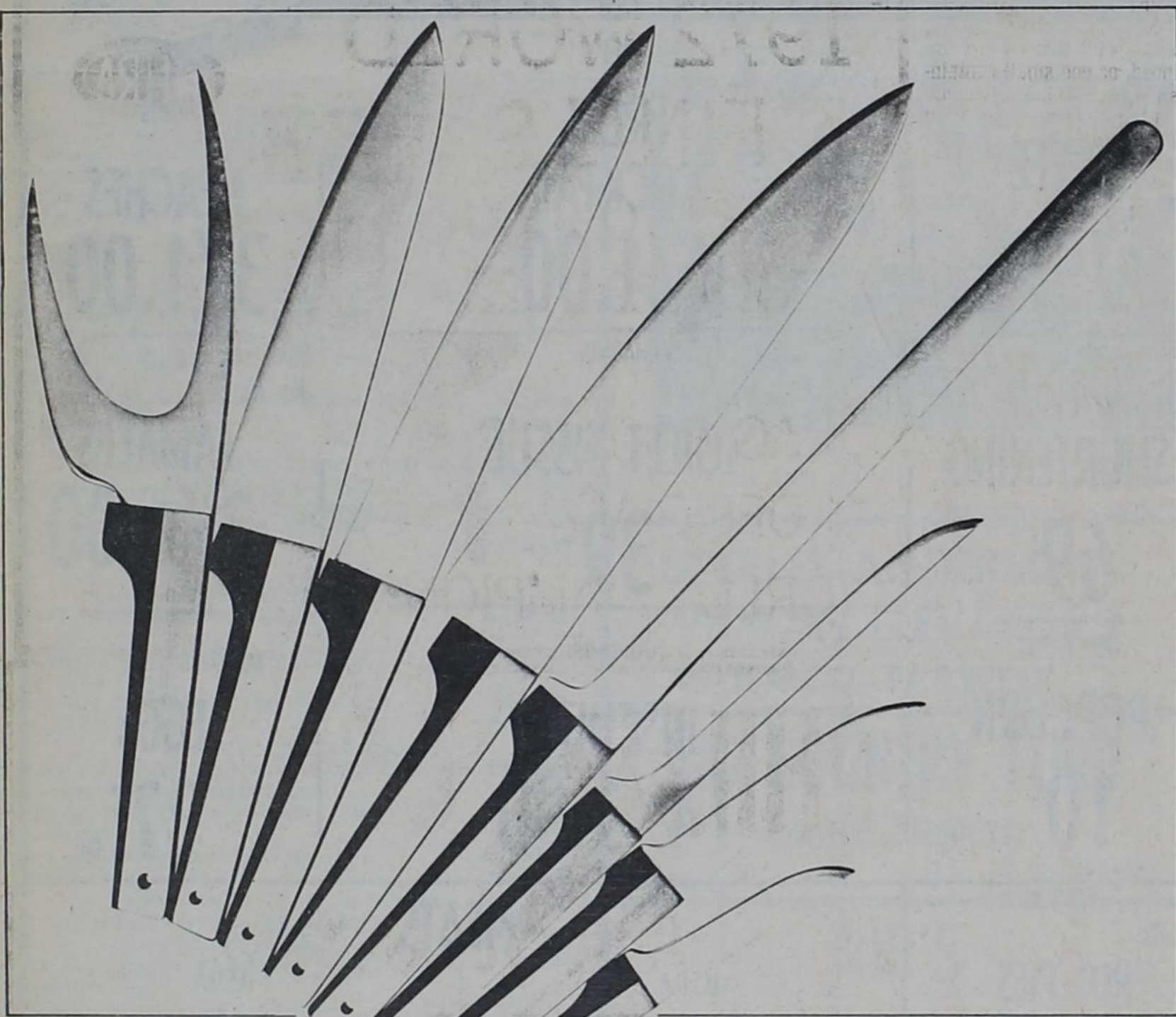

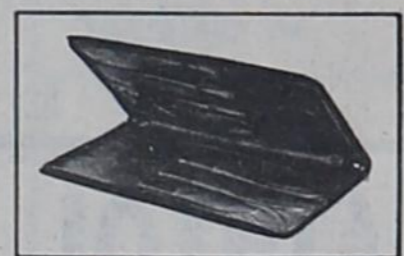

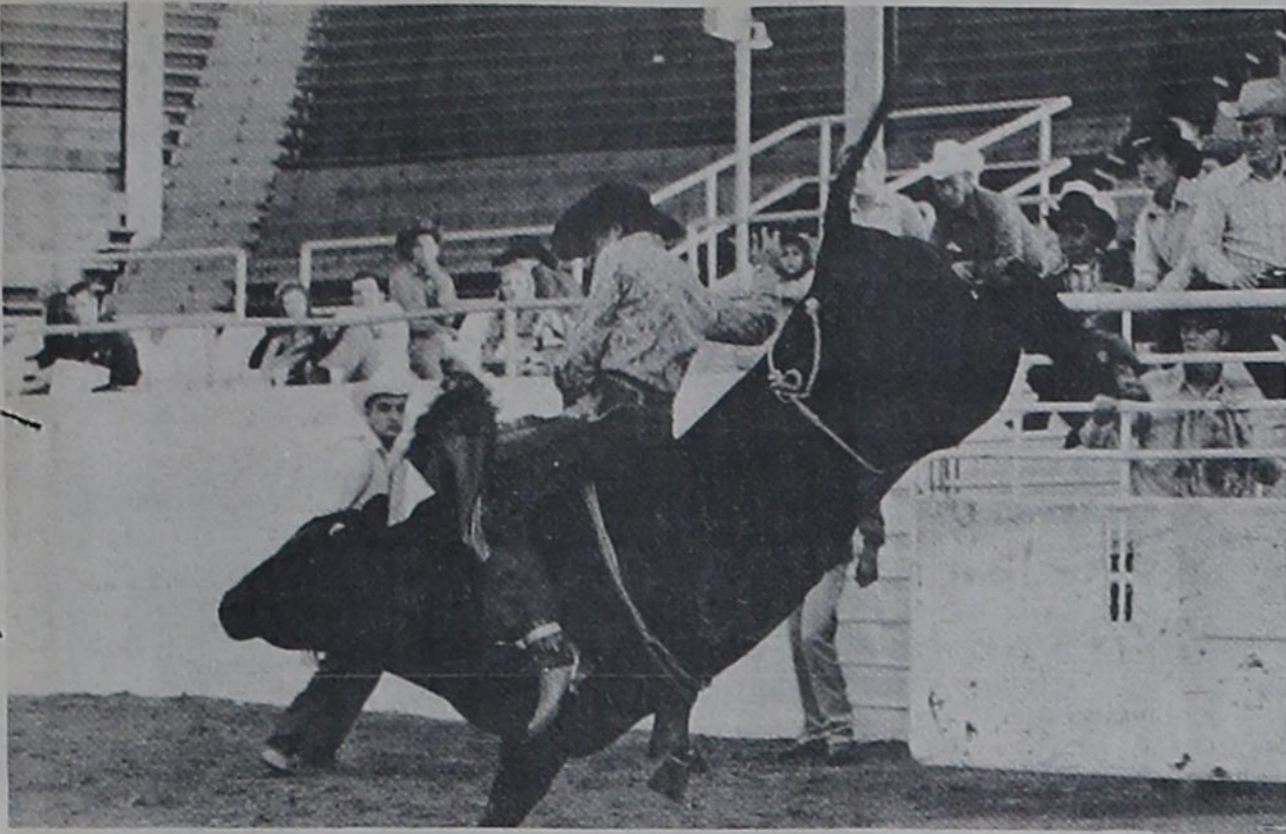

On The Farm In Parmer County

Cattle fever ticks have been found in several South Texas counties, and livestock producers are cautioned to be on the lookout for the costly livestock pest.

Fever ticks were first reported near Alice several weeks ago and have since spread to neighboring counties. Infested counties that are under state quarantine include Jim Wells, Duval, McMullen, Live Oak, Nueces and Brooks.

All infestations have been traced to cattle shipped from the infested herd near Alice. Therefore, cattlemen who have purchased cattle from that area are especially urged to check these animals for fever ticks.

Federal and state livestock inspectors are engaged in checking cattle herds to pinpoint infestations and initiate eradication procedures. A Cattle Fever Tick Eradication Center has been established in Alice.

Officials of the Texas Animal Health Commission have labeled the outbreak as the most serious in the last 30 years.

However, eradication measures have been effective and officials believe the outbreak is under control. Should the tick infestation spread, eradication could become a long-term process due to the life cycle of the insect.

The cattle fever tick can cause a fever or disease called babesiosis or piroplasmosis. Symptoms of the disease are similar to anaplasmosis.

If ticks are found, a sample should be placed in alcohol in a screwvial and sent to Austin for identification. The mailing address is: State-Federal Brucellosis Testing Laboratory, 702 Colorado Street, Room 301, Austin, Texas 78701.

The cooperation of all producers is vital so that all infestations of the cattle fever tick can be traced back to the original infestation where eradication procedures can be initiated. This action is essential to minimize the spread of the fever tick.

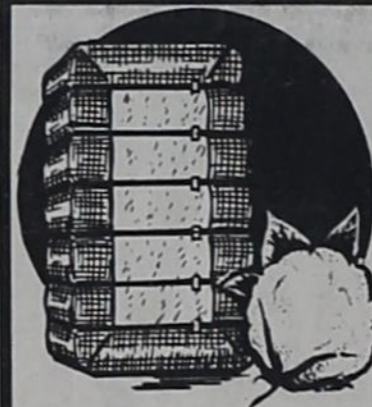
