

## 'Russian Roulette' Is Feeding Molded Feed

Have you ever heard of 'Mycotoxicosis Russian Roulette"? You may not have, but chances are you're playing that deadly game if you feed molded feeds to your pigs.

According to Dr. Gene Cope, extension veterinarian, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Amarillo, mycotoxicosis is a two-dollar word which means "poisoning of the host following entrance into the body of one or more toxicants produced by a mold." While the condition has been recognized for years, serious research was not initiated until the last decade.

The problem is complex, says Dr. Cope, because the production of toxin is influenced by many factors:

1. The strain of fungus: not all fungus produces toxin.

2. The temperature at which it grows; the best environment for



Texas will receive some \$276,000 for expanding its 4-H program. 
