### Twin Cities Undergo Pressures Of Change

#### Building Progress Made

The year 1972 was one of changes, beginning with a tremendous fire which resulted in a new seed-cleaning plant for Kelly Green Seed Co., the induction of a composing room for the State Line Tribune complete with computerized machines, and the erection of two important buildings in Texico, a gymnasium-auditorium complex at Texico Schools and a new education building for Texico First Baptist Church.

A cold front bringing gusting wind and snow to the area gave the new year a zing to start it off, but major fires to the James Ensor home and S.I.B. Gin offered a sad note. Many Farwell individuals were valuable in completing a

cinder track at Farwell High School. Later on in the month, Farwell Steers had their 40-game district win streak broken by Vega, and Dolph Briscoe visited Farwell to seek Democratic support.

At the end of the month, Jan. 24 to be exact, Farwell residents viewed the largest fire in the community in quite some time. Kelly Green elevator was declared a total loss after an apparent dust explosion sparked a fire.

In February, the big news was Texico's Homecoming. Farwell Steers beat Vega twice in a best-two-out-of-three district championship series for their fourth consecutive district title.

Mac Langford exhibited the Grand Champion Steer at Farwell Junior Livestock Show.

In that same month, the Steers, dubbed the "Cardiac Kids", topped Lorenzo in a bi-district tilt. The score was an electrifying 73-70.

Mark Haseloff showed the Grand Champion Steer at Parmer County Junior Livestock Show. It was the first time in the 25-year history of the show that a crossbred steer had won a championship.

Farwell's city offices were moved from the old city hall to the old Security State Bank building next door to the drugstore. Texico Senior High girls basketball team finished second in district.

Texico-Farwell Cub Scouts started the month of March with their Blue and Gold Banquet. The Steers started the month by losing to Sanford-Fritch in regional basketball play.

Texico Wolverines won second place in the District 6-AA Tournament and advanced to regional tournament where they were shut out by San Jon, 55-52.

In a city election on March 7, Manford Turnbough was elected mayor of Texico. Bill Thippen and Bill Christian were elected trustees and Sam Lewis was re-elected municipal judge.

Five Farwell students were named to All-District teams during March. They were Brett Hargrove, Larry Erwin and Kevin Hardage, Steers; and LaShawn Sheets and Debra Foster, Steerettes.

Texico Schools proudly opened the doors to their newly-constructed gymnasium-auditorium. Kent Armstrong showed the Grand Champion Hog at the Spring Swine Show in Texico.

Outstanding athletes from Farwell High School were recognized at the annual Athletic Banquet. Gene Mayfield, head football coach and athletic director at West Texas State University, addressed the banquet goers.

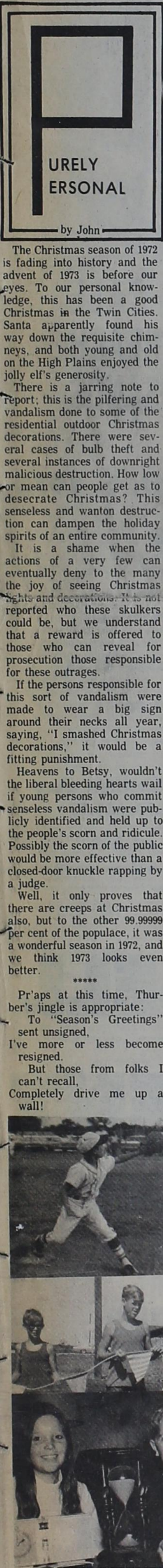

## At Home In Parmer County

Recent ice storms may have damaged trees in your landscape. However, with careful and proper pruning, these trees can be saved.

First, survey the damage and plan for corrective pruning. Remove damaged limbs at the point of origin or just above a good side branch. Don't leave stubs unless absolutely necessary.

If, due to severe damage, a branch or main trunk must be stubbed back, paint the wound with a tree wound dressing that is available at any garden center or nursery. Orange shellac may be used as a temporary wound dressing. Continual pruning and attention is necessary under these conditions to prevent sucker growth at the end of the stub.

If a trunk or main scaffold branch has split due to the excessive weight of ice, remove the trunk that has broken away. Cables and bolts may be used to pull the damaged trunk together, but this can be best accomplished by a professional tree man.

Where a broken limb has pulled loose back along the side of a trunk, smooth the torn area with a sharp knife or chisel and paint all exposed cuts or wounds with a tree wound dressing.

Since the winter season is just starting, homeowners may want to provide some protection for landscape plants and shrubs to prevent or reduce cold weather damage. Plastic covers may be used to protect plants but they must be removed as soon as severe cold conditions have passed.

Be on the lookout for overloaded electrical circuits in your home during the Christmas season.

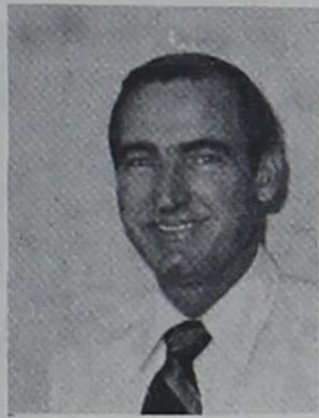
Many baking and cooking jobs are now done with specialized small appliances. Also, small portable electrical heaters are often used for guest rooms. All this equipment is operated on 120-volt branch circuits which can become dangerously overloaded if not properly protected by the correct size fuse or circuit breaker.

Remember that each 120-volt branch circuit must be number 12 wire. Each circuit should be protected with a fuse or circuit breaker not larger than 20 amperes (amps). With this circuit, it will be possible to use around 1900 watts on each circuit without blowing a fuse or tripping a breaker.

If a fuse blows because the wattage is too high, don't put in a larger fuse. You need to take some of the load off the circuit.

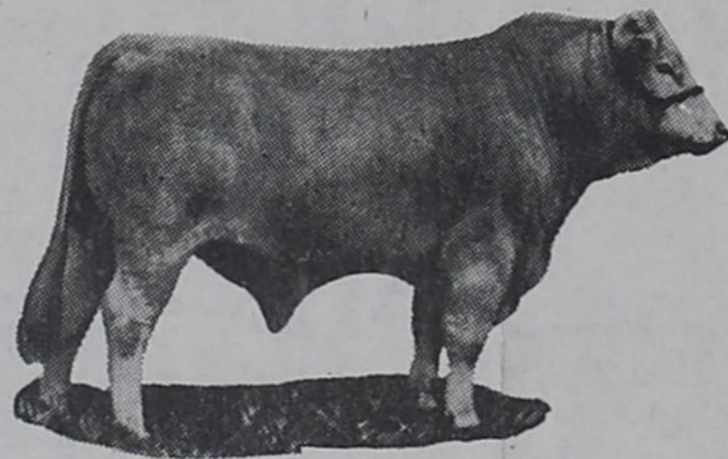

## European Travels Enjoyed To Utmost

Bob Wiman of Farwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wiman, left Sept. 22 by plane from New York City headed for Europe. Wiman landed in Stockholm, Sweden, and spent three weeks visiting Sten Westerberg and his family.

Westerberg lived with Wiman's family in Farwell for a year as an exchange student. He is currently attending the School of Economics in Stockholm. Wiman says the school is the third best business school in the world. "I would call it Europe's Harvard," he says.

After visiting the Westerbergs, Wiman, who took out a semester from Texas Tech where he was majoring in history, struck out for other parts of Europe.

"I traveled on my own through Europe. I had a train pass which was good for two months and I went through all the western European countries," he said.

"I didn't meet any Texans, which was strange, but most of the young people traveling by themselves were from Canada. The English-speaking travelers, usually sporting backpacks, formed an automatic brotherhood," he added.

Wiman said one thing which was made clear to him during his travels was Americans' misuse of automobiles. "By not having an automobile and doing a lot of walking, I realized how much we're abusing the atmosphere and our bodies. I guess it's just the way our society is," he said.

"Europeans are either walking their babies or walking their dogs," he added.

Wiman generally spent his time sightseeing at famous spots throughout Europe. "I

# Portraying Area Homemakers

Mrs. Willie (Emma) Ronquillo of Texico, as area homemakers go, is a rather unusual person. Most area homemakers we've come in contact with have been reared in the United States and are familiar with this particular area's culture.

Mrs. Ronquillo is different. She came to this county from Germany, which is not an easy adjustment, especially when English is difficult and for her almost impossible to understand.

Emma was not only baffled by English, but she felt completely left out by her Spanish-speaking in-laws. She had met Willie Ronquillo when he was stationed with the U.S. Army in Germany. They married 15 years ago on Nov. 25.

"When I came to the United States in 1959, it was to a small town in New Mexico between Ft. Sumner and Vaughn. The house looked to me like a chicken house," she said.

"I cried and cried. Then I went in and my mother-in-law was cooking beans. I was shocked. I couldn't speak Spanish or English," she added.

To show how Mrs. Ronquillo has adjusted to the bewildering environment she found in the United States, we noticed that a pot of beans was on the stove when we visited her. She also has mastered English and says she does even better speaking Spanish than she does English.

Mrs. Ronquillo has also learned how to drive and has been an American citizen for six years. She is proud of the fact that she can vote.

Sounds like the Americanization of Emma is complete, but her family thinks differently. Mrs. Ronquillo recently went back to Germany. "I wasn't as Americanized as they (her brothers) had hoped. They thought my hair would be blonde and I would be wearing hot pants," she laughed.

Until recently, Mrs. Ronquillo has worked in nursing homes in Clovis. When the family lived in Santa Rosa, before coming to Texico, she worked at Santa Rosa Guadalupe Hospital.

She enjoys getting together with German women in Clovis in a Kaffee Klatsch. The women see each other every Thursday. At these get-togethers, Emma and her friends slip back into their native tongue.

Emma's husband, Willie, is Texico City Marshal. Prior to this job, Ronquillo worked for Gifford-Hill. He served as City Marshal previously when the family lived in Santa Rosa.

The Ronquillos have two children, Cindy Lou, nine years old, and Willie, Jr., 14. Both attend school at Texico.

At first, Emma found Mexican dishes too greasy, but now she can prepare almost any type of Mexican food. She still enjoys making German dishes and cooks other types of food, too. "You name it, I cook it," she said.

She has consented to give us recipes for two complete meals: one German, one Mexican.

refrigerate about 36 hours, turn meat at least twice daily.

When ready to cook, remove meat and wipe dry. Brown in 2 T. hot fat. Add marinade. (Remove lemon slices). Cover and cook slowly two hours or until tender. Remove meat.

For each cup of gravy, combine  $\frac{1}{4}$  c. strained marinade and  $\frac{1}{4}$  c. water. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  c. broken gingersnaps. Cook and stir a few minutes to thicken. Serve with dumplings and red cabbage. Serves 10.

### DUMPLINGS

1 loaf French bread  
4-5 cooked potatoes  
1 c. flour  
2 eggs  
salt to taste  
marjoram

Cut the French bread sideways in thin strips. Put a little water with it to make it soft. Then press out and add potatoes. Press potatoes out with presser first. Add flour, eggs, salt and marjoram. Mix everything good with your hands and form round balls.

Always keep hands moist with water. Put dumplings in boiling salt water, but don't add all of them at once. If the balls are swimming on the top, keep them in the water a few minutes longer so they will be ready. Dish is excellent with sauerbraten.

### RED CABBAGE

2 T. bacon drippings  
4 c. shredded red cabbage  
2 c. cubed, unpared apple  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  c. brown sugar  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  c. vinegar  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  c. water  
 $\frac{1}{4}$  t. salt  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  t. caraway seed

Heat drippings in skillet. Add remaining ingredients and a dash of pepper. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally. For crisp cabbage, cook 15 minutes; for tender, 25-30 minutes. Makes four or five servings.

cup flour,  $\frac{1}{4}$  t. salt to each cup flour, enough lukewarm water to knead.

Knead stiff, not soft. Roll out thin, cut and deep fry in 400 degrees heat.

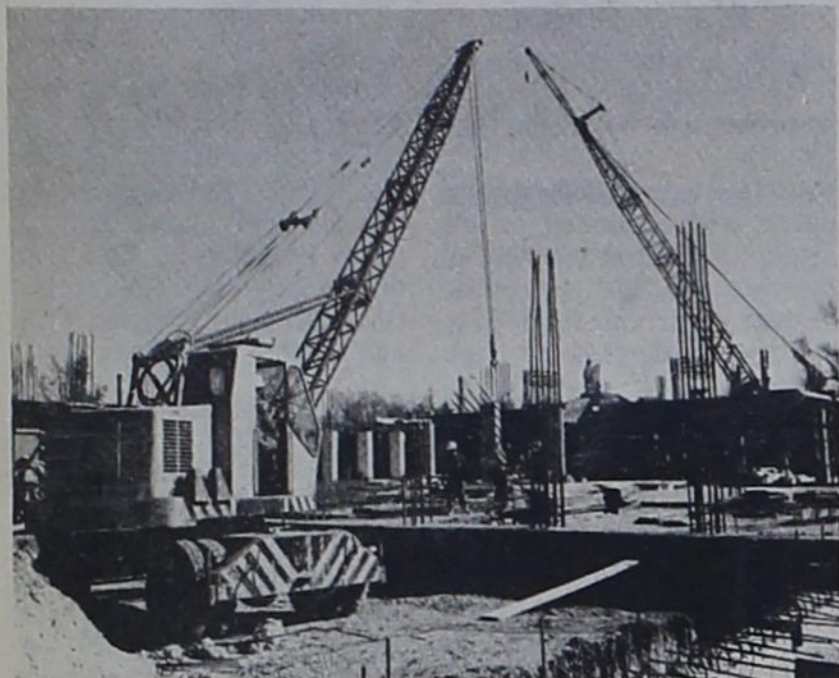

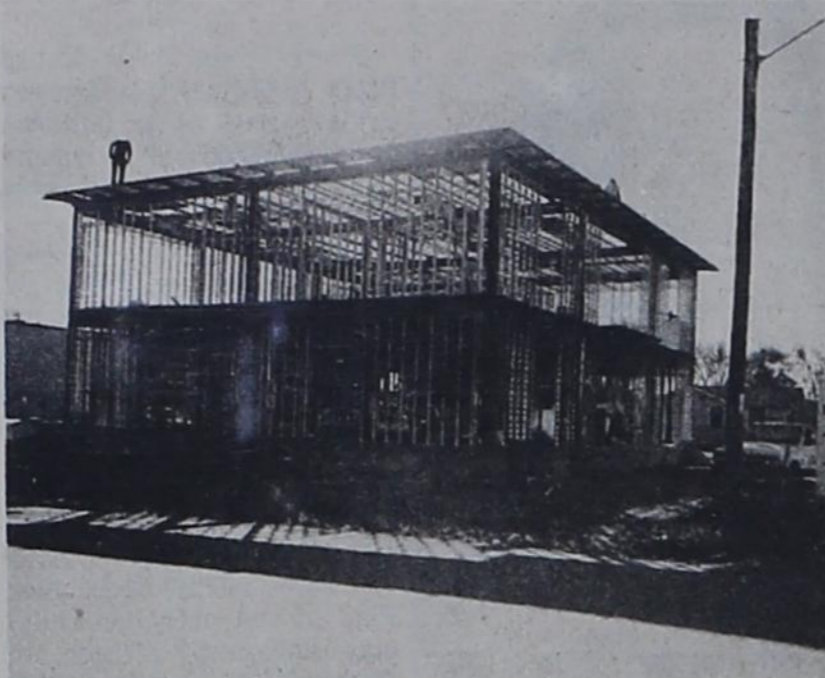

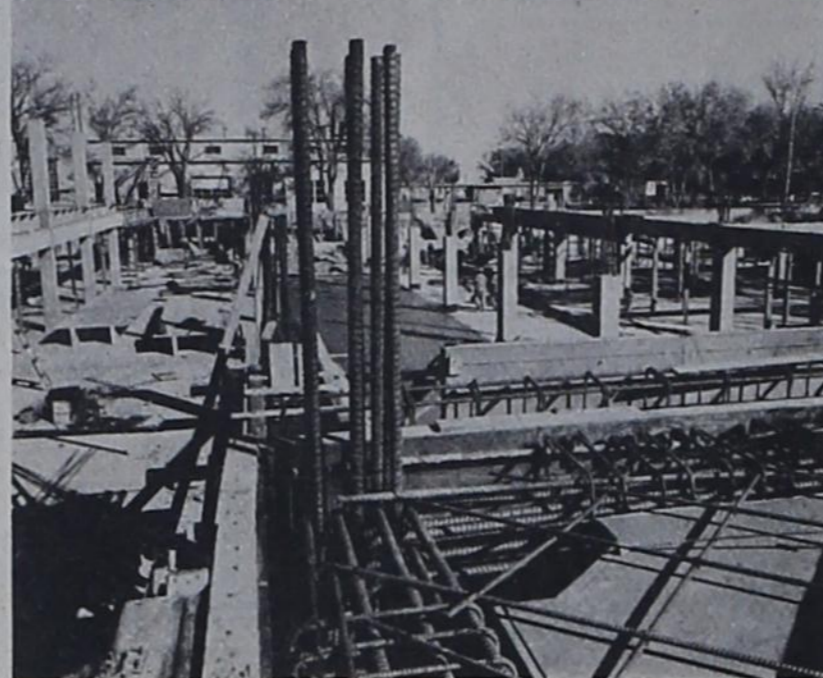
