### At Home In Parmer County

With canning season upon us maybe you have wondered why some of last years canned goods didn't keep.

Have you had problems of spoilage of home canned foods?

Take a look at the jars and lids you have been using.

Do the jars have chips or nicks at the top? If they do this can cause a poor seal - thus spoilage. Do not use these jars for canning.

Do you tighten the two-piece lid as tight as you can get it before and after processing? If you do, this can cause the sealing material to be broken - and again spoilage.

What can you do? Run your finger around the tops of jars and inspect them visibly to make sure they are smooth and free from nicks and cracks.

If two-piece, self-seal lids are used, follow the manufacturer's instructions in adjusting the lid and tightening the metal ring. After processing, when the canned product is thoroughly cool, take off the metal ring if possible, without forcing. If the ring sticks, cover it with a hot, damp cloth for a minute or two to loosen. Then wash them to prevent rust and they may be used again. However, the lid may be used only once.

And protect yourself! Use tempered glass jars, those made especially for canning. You can tell as they have a glass company name imprinted in the side. They are made in such a way as to withstand the heat and pressure of the canning processing.

### Feed Yards Ask To Divert Wastes

The Texas Water Quality Board was to conduct a public hearing Thursday May 31, on an application from Far-Tex Feed Yard, Inc. and Bovina Feeders, Inc., both of Farwell, for amendments to their existing Waste Control Order No. 01665 and No. 01438, respectively, pertaining to a variable amount of rainfall runoff water containing wastes from their feedlot operations. Far-Tex Feed Yard has 15,000 head and is located on State Highway 348, two and one-half miles south of Farwell. Bovina Feeders has a capacity of 40,000 head and is located five miles west of the intersection of State Highway 214 and FM Road 145, approximately 10.5 miles southeast of Bovina.

If the application is approved, the wastewater will be diverted into playa lake and utilized for irrigation.

## 'New Eyes For Needy' Helps People World-Wide

What do you do if you're eight-years-old, have no old eyeglasses to give, but feel strongly you want to help other people see better?

For Harriet, a third-grader in a suburban school, the solution was simple . . . she sold some of her toys.

That's how "New Eyes For The Needy", a volunteer Short Hills, N. J. organization, wound up with \$13.75 in the mail one day.

What makes the happening even more unusual is the fact that in its 40-year history,

"New Eyes" has never had a fund drive. It solicits, instead, old eyeglasses, precious metal scrap, silverware, dentures with bits of gold and silver, and antique and costume jewelry.

The glasses, almost a million pairs received last year alone, are graded and sorted and bring new sight to impoverished people all over the world.

The precious metal scrap is melted down, and the money from the reclamation, plus the sale of usable jewelry and silverware, goes to "New Eyes" funds established in 80 hospitals all over the country, Canada and Puerto Rico to pay for new prescription glasses, or if needed, artificial eyes.

That's where Harriet's \$13.75 went. The plastic framed glasses are used to fill orders from medical missions in such far off places as the Philippines, Guam, and Africa.

Though "New Eyes" has an international reputation, few know it is run by a small group of about 250 persons - mostly housewives. When the organization was incorporated in 1947, its entire treasury consisted of 47 cents.

Nobody can really say how

many lives have been brightened because hundreds of thousands of strangers have thoughtfully sent their old eyeglasses to "New Eyes". But every now and then the mailbag provides a clue:

"You have made this a beautiful new world for me. Again I thank you and all who made this wonderful miracle available."

Salt  
Pepper

Steaks cut 2 inches thick should be placed three to five inches from heat. When one side is browned, turn, season and finish cooking on second side. Season.

Steaks cut 1 inch thick require approximately 15 to 20 minutes for rare and 20 to 25 minutes for medium. Steaks cut 2 inches thick require approximately 30 to 35 minutes

- 2 1/2 lbs. ground beef (browned and drained)
- 2 c. chopped onion
- 1 c. chopped green pepper
- 6 garlic cloves, chopped
- 3 (1 lb.) cans Italian tomatoes
- 3 (6 oz.) cans tomato paste
- 2 (15 oz.) cans tomato sauce
- 5 t. oregano
- 5 t. basil
- 1 1/2 c. water
- 1/2 c. chopped parsley
- 2 t. thyme
- 1 bay leaf, crumbled

Add all ingredients and simmer four to six hours. Add 1/2 cup dry red wine last. Serve with spaghetti and Parmesan cheese.

### STRAWBERRY SPARKLE CAKE

- 1 pkg. angel food cake mix
- 1 c. boiling water
- 1 pkg. (3 oz.) strawberry flavored gelatin
- Red food coloring
- 1 pkg. (1 lb.) frozen sliced strawberries
- 1/2 pt. whipped cream
- 2 T. sugar

Bake cake as directed on package and cool. Dissolve gelatin in water and add frozen block of strawberries, stirring to break up and mix berries.

Place cake, widest side down, on serving plate. Cut a one inch layer across the top of the cake and set aside. Cut around cake one inch from the outer edge to one inch from the bottom. Gently remove center section of cake. Tear this portion into small pieces.

Fold pieces of cake into strawberry mixture and pour into cake's shell. Place reserved layer on top. Whip cream until thick. Stir in sugar and add two or three drops of red food coloring. Spread

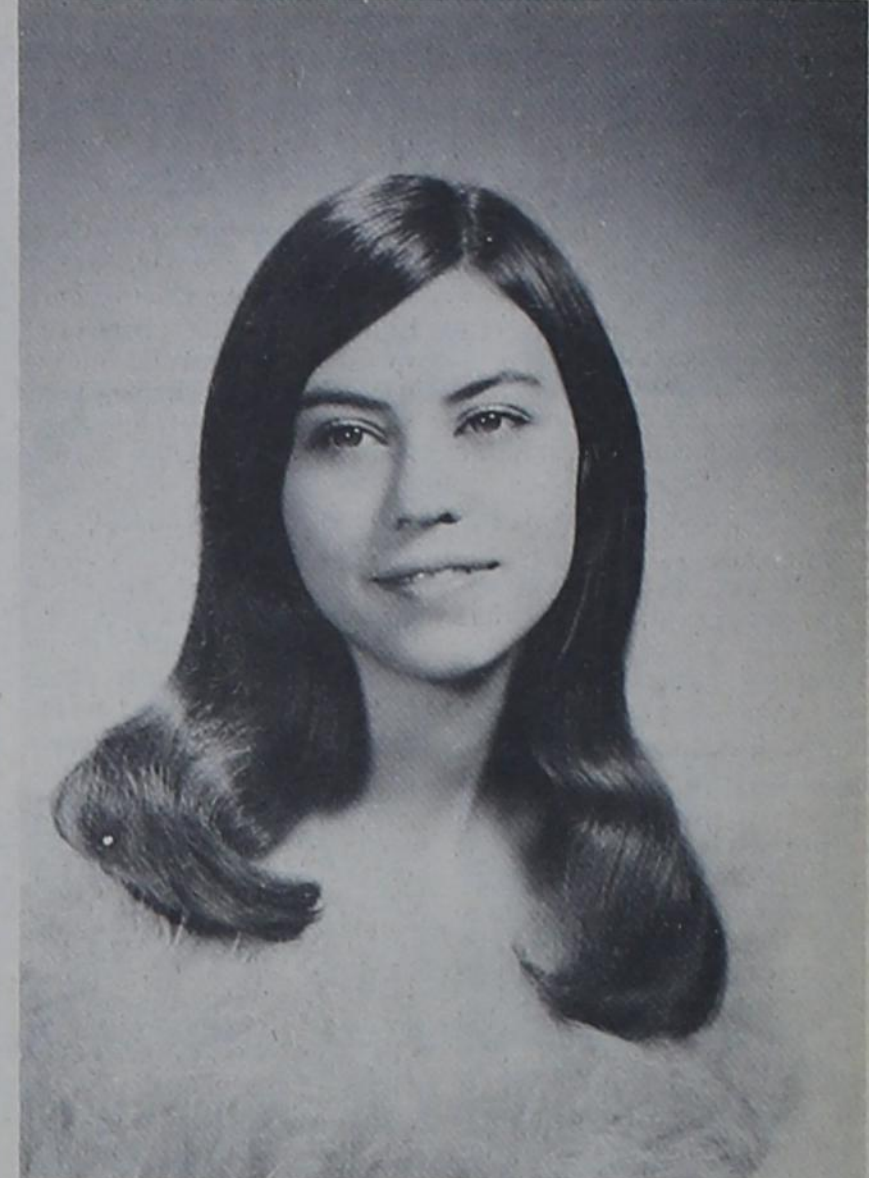

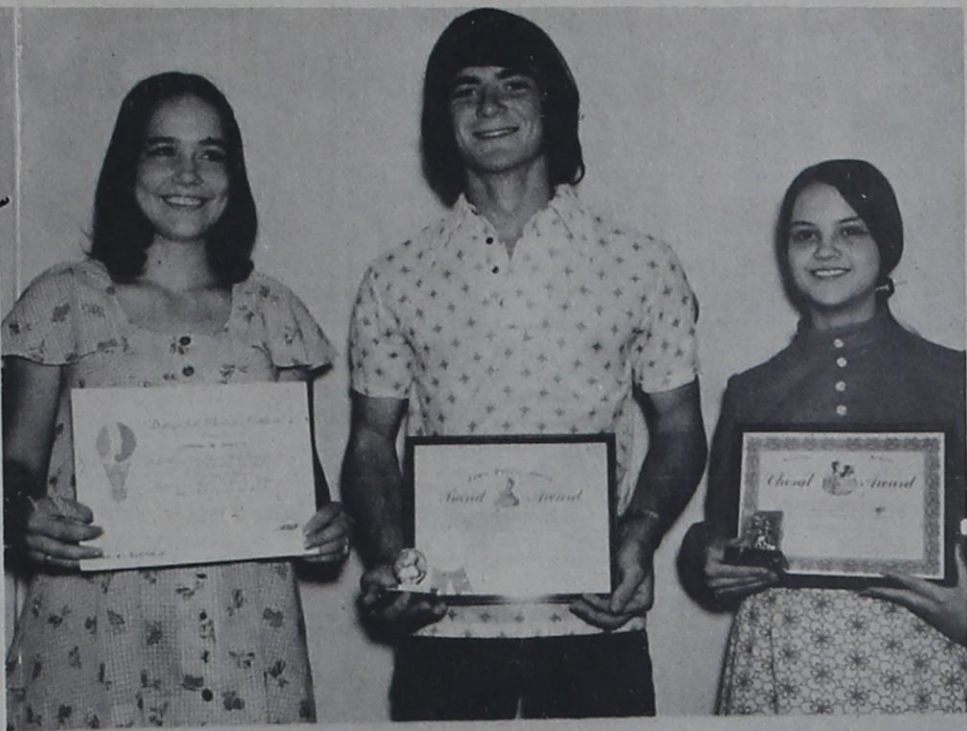

**Boy's Basketball Clinic At South Plains College**

Mrs. Mark Liethen of Farwell continues in fair condition at Lubbock Methodist Hospital. She was admitted May 17 to the hospital.

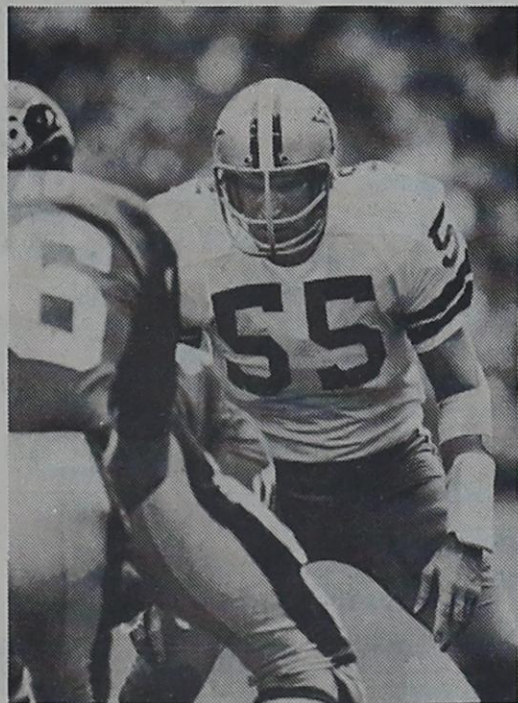
Mrs. Edgar Blain of Farwell is doing well in Memorial Hospital. She underwent surgery May 17 and has been hospitalized since May 15.
