Gas Shortage Felt
By Local Stations

The much-discussed gas shortage has confronted local service station operators, but most service station personnel in Texico and Farwell are optimistic about the outcome. Although one station will start closing one day a week beginning this week, most of the service station operators say they will continue to do business at the same rate. That is, unless the gas shortage continues and more problems arise.

problems in getting gas, but several operators commented they hoped they would continue to get as much as they are now. One gas company regulation provides for each service station to receive as much gas as they were receiving last year during the corresponding month.

The same regulation provides for the same situation in distributing diesel fuel. The problem involved here is that a number of local companies have been having some trouble obtaining diesel. According to one company manager, farmers in the area are also receiving the same amount of

diesel they received during the corresponding month last year. He also noted the law is subject to change.

One service station which services diesel trucks on a large scale admitted to running out of diesel recently and being forced to obtain diesel from another source.

The shortage doesn't seem as immediate in regard to gas. Only a small portion of service stations surveyed were concerned with losing their supplies of gas. Most were not looking toward having to close their stations one day a week, providing the gas shortage doesn't get worse.

Self-service stations seem to be the hardest hit. One station manager noted that he is not getting gas as regularly as he used to and that he is getting less.

Speculation on the gas shortage is not limited to any individual, so Texico-Farwell residents may form their own opinions on what will happen in the future. There is some evidence, though, that the gas shortage is being felt by local service stations.

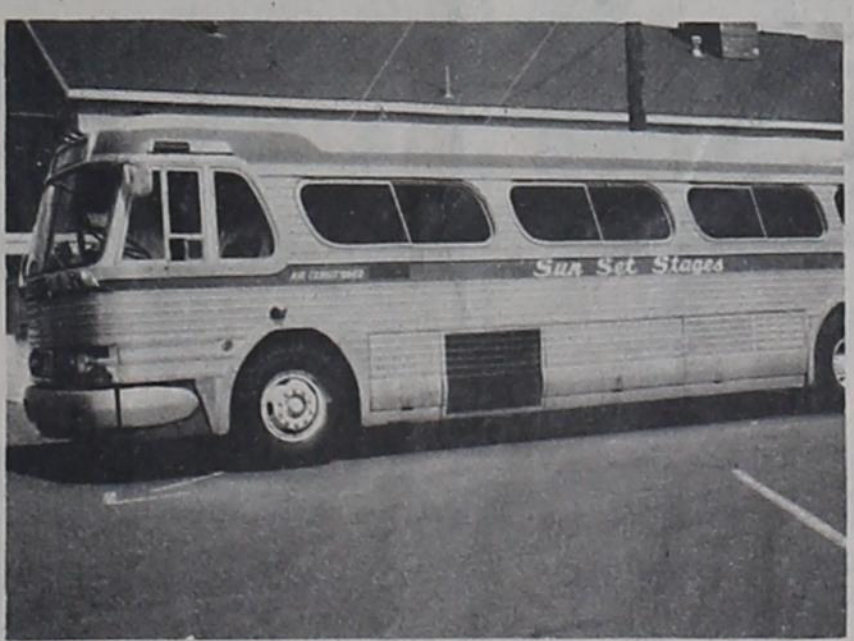

Herbicide Use - -

Complaints Filed With
Parmer Co. Attorney

Raymond Houtchens, supervisor for District I of Texas Department of Agriculture, has announced several complaints have been filed with Parmer County Attorney Hurschel Harding regarding the misuse of hormone-type herbicides in Parmer County.

Houtchens explained that there is a penalty of \$100-\$2,000 which can carry a 30-day jail term for the agricultural use of hormone-type herbicides. He noted that the regulation is being enforced by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Hormone-type herbicides include 2/4/D and its derivatives. Permits to distribute this type of herbicide can be obtained by writing the District I office, 1924 34th Street in Lubbock, or calling (806) 747-1656.

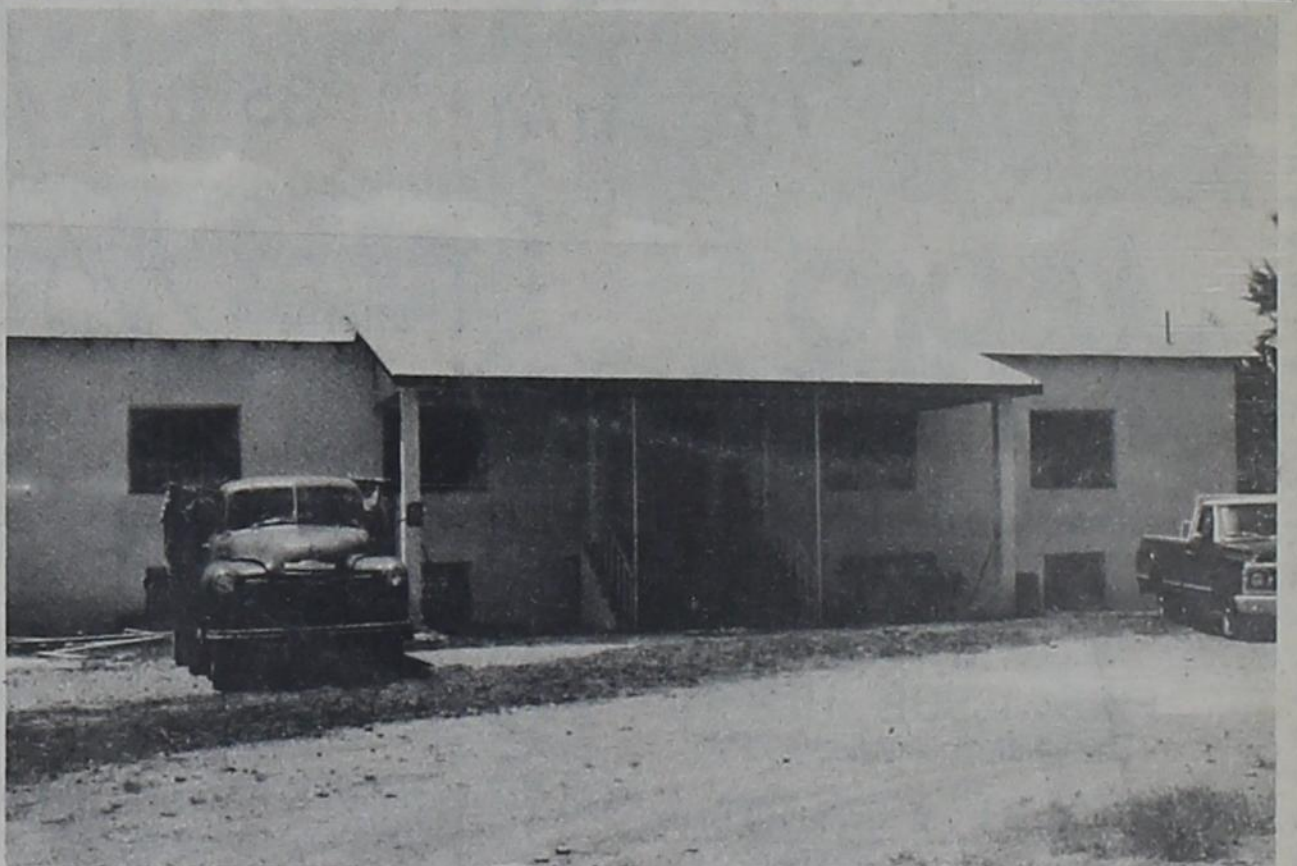
Houtchens said it was necessary for anyone wishing to use a hormone-type herbicide to obtain a permit before he would be able to apply it.

He added that the regulation primarily covers agricultural use of the herbicide which would include field crops, fence rows and other areas. He also said there were qualifications on the number of acres involved. Questions on the use of the hormone-type herbicides should be directed to the District office.

Houtchens said there would be a representative of the Texas Department of Agricul-

ture in Parmer County next month investigating herbicide use in the county. He urges all

persons using herbicides which are controlled to comply with the regulations.

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The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN - You've probably heard the complaint from a friend: "It wasn't the money that worried me when I lost my wallet. It was the fact that I had my credit cards in it!"

The average Texan has at least one credit card, and some carry several - issued by oil companies, retail merchants, charge services, or banks.

The credit card is a great convenience for the consumer - handy way to buy at a bargain and pay later; the means to take a trip and pay for it over an extended period of time, and its use provides a methodical system for keeping business and tax records.

A person who is issued a credit card usually contracts to pay the issuing firm for the goods and services received upon billing. In some cases, the credit card usage enables the consumer to spread out the payments over a specified time (such as six, twelve, or eighteen months for an airline ticket), or - as in the case of many retail or bank services - put the payments on a "revolving credit" basis.

In the latter event, federal law requires the card issuer to make full disclosure to the customer of the payments requirement. Under Texas law, the merchant can charge an interest or "service" rate of up to 1 1/2 percent per month of the unpaid monthly balance.

Yes, credit cards are a convenience, but as the Texas Bankers Association warns, they should be used with "self discipline," or they can become more of a burden than a boon. One of the procedures for safe and sane credit card use urged by the businesses which issue

them is to keep a careful record of the cards you hold, together with the number of each, in case of loss or theft.

To be doubly safe, make duplicate copies and put one in your strong box, and one in an easily accessible place. If the card issuer has notified you of a number to call in case of loss, write that down, too.

The U. S. Congress and the Texas Legislature have attempted to protect the credit card holder from some of the problems he could encounter if he lost his card.

The Truth-in Lending law limits the liability of the holder to \$50 if his card is lost or stolen and someone else makes charges on the account. Under that law, the company issuing you the card must notify you of that liability limitation, and furnish you with a means of identifying proof of ownership. That is the reason most companies now provide a space for your own signature on the credit card.

Under Texas Law, it is a felony - punishable by a penalty of up to \$1,000 and/or two years in the penitentiary to steal, counterfeit or forge a credit card, or to buy or knowingly use a lost or stolen or expired credit card.

Texas statistics on credit card "black marketing" are not available at the present time, but law enforcement officials are aware of the problem. In Illinois, a recent legislative investigation revealed that illegal practices cost companies issuing credit cards in that state more than \$20 million in a three-year period.

In one Texas city not long ago, police seized several hundred credit cards which had been stolen through an organized crime operation. And while bank card officials say far more credit cards are lost than stolen, they also say there is an illicit market for fraudulent use of the lost "plastic."

So, play it safe. Watch your credit card as closely as you guard your cash.

If you lost it, or suspect that it has been stolen, report the loss immediately to the issuing company.

As pointed out, the state law prohibiting use of missing credit cards has good sharp teeth. Do not hesitate to seek the assistance of your local district attorney, or the Attorney General's office.

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Test Dates Scheduled

Persons interested in receiving college credit through the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) may take exams on June 16 or July 21 at South Plains College. Don Melton, Director of Guidance at the college is in charge of the testing program.

CLEP is a program which provides credit by examination for a number of college courses. This program allows students to obtain credit for courses by providing their knowledge of the course material on an examination approved by the department under which the course is offered.

General Examinations are objective tests that measure achievement in five basic areas of the liberal arts: English Composition, Humanities, Mathematics, Natural Sciences, and Social Sciences - History. Approximately 33 Subject Examinations are offered which measure achievement in specific college courses.

Students who score satisfactorily on one or more of these tests will be given credit for the course covered by the examination.

There is a charge of \$15 for each examination taken. The testing program is open to students who are currently enrolled in classes at SPC or to high school graduates who plan to

enter South Plains College. Results of the test being administered in June and July will be made available before the beginning of the 1973 Fall term at SPC.

Complete information concerning the examination program will be provided upon request by the Registrar's Office or Director of Guidance at South Plains College.

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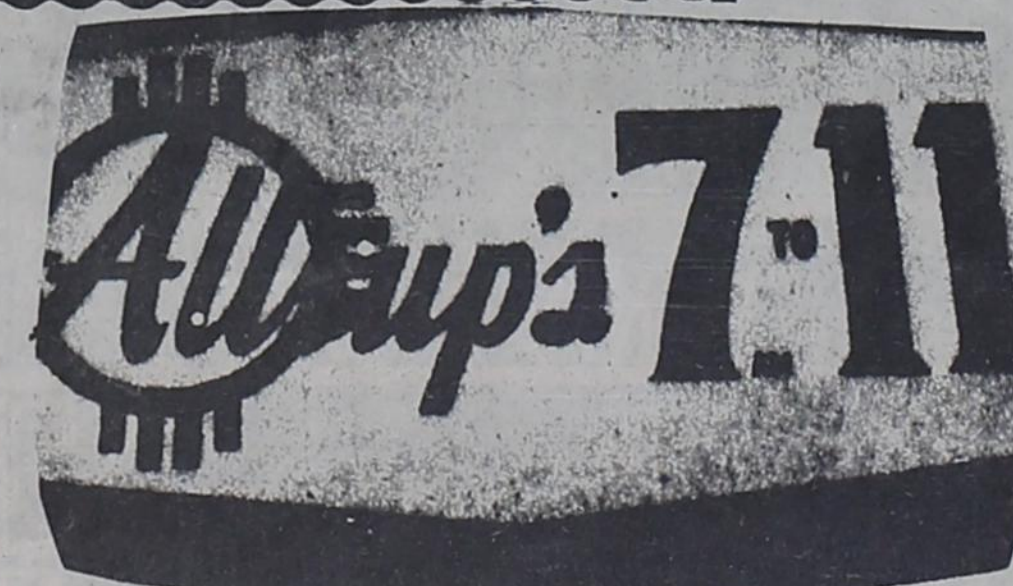

delight in cooking, but the recipes she is sharing with our readers include two breads and dill pickles. These are her family's favorites, she says.

OATMEAL BREAD

Makes 2 loaves.

- 3 c. whole wheat
- 3 c. flour (enriched)
- 2 1/2 t. salt
- 2 T. butter
- 1/2 c. honey
- 2 c. boiling water
- 2 pkgs. yeast
- 1/2 c. lukewarm water
- 1 c. old fashioned oats

In a large bowl, pour boiling water over rolled oats. Cover and let stand until barely warm. While you wait, mix honey, salt and butter.

Dissolve yeast in 1/2 c. lukewarm water, add to honey mixture. Then add all ingredients to oatmeal mixture. Add flour - two cups at a time.

This will make a sticky dough, she says. Cover and let rise double. Cut down with knives. It's too sticky to knead, she adds. Divide into two loaves and let rise. Bake at 325 degrees for 30-45 minutes.

The crust will be nice and crusty brown when you remove it from the oven. Butter crust liberally.

APRICOT BREAD

- 1 c. dried apricots
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. brown sugar
- 2 T. butter
- 1 egg
- 1/4 c. water
- 1/2 c. orange juice
- 2 c. flour
- 2 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. soda
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/2 to 1 c. nuts

Soak apricots 30 minutes. Drain, then cut up. Mix sugars, butter, egg, water and juice. Sift dry ingredients and blend into creamed mixture.

Stir in nuts and apricots. Bake one hour at 350 degrees or until done.

KOSHER DILL PICKLES

- 20 to 25 4-inch cucumbers
- 1/8 t. powdered alum
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 hot red pepper
- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 1 c. coarse-medium salt
- 3 quarts water
- Grape leaves

Wash cucumbers; let stand in cold water overnight. Pack into hot, sterilized jars. To each quart add above amount alum, garlic, dill and red pepper. Combine vinegar, salt, water; heat to a boil; fill jars. Put grape leaf in each jar; seal. Makes 6 to 8 quarts.



At Home In Parmer County

With so many people using credit today, the possibility of billing errors increases greatly.

When an error occurs, a consumer may have difficulty locating the cause of error and the right person to correct it.

Should an error occur, the following steps are suggested by an extension service specialist to correct it:

1. Notify the store immediately, informing them of the error.

2. Obtain the name of the person contacted, making a note of it and date contacted. This information is helpful in case of necessary future contacts.

3. If contact is made in writing, don't send it with the bill - and don't write on the bill itself. Keep a copy of any letters sent for future reference.

4. Send a registered letter to the credit manager or company president if you experience difficulty obtaining adjustments on legitimate complaints. In the letter, explain complaint in complete detail and give facts in a courteous manner. Also request that the post office furnish the signature of the person receiving the letter.

5. If still unable to settle a complaint, write the local Credit Bureau and Better Business Bureau. Provide details and copies of bills, receipts, cancelled checks or other evidence that prove your point. Also send a carbon copy of this contact to the merchant involved.

Usually with accurate records and a business-like manner, consumers can correct billing errors.

Legitimate businesses are anxious to retain the consumer's good will - and keep him as a customer.

There are several things

consumers can do to help prevent billing errors in the first place.

- Use a credit card when charging merchandise.

- Examine sales slips to insure all spaces are correctly filled in and no unnecessary marks included.

- Before signing a bill, make sure the total is correct and in the right place.

- Save duplicate sales slips and check bills against them.

- Know when billing dates are and make or mail payments in time to arrive before deadlines.

- Return the correct portion of a bill with remittance.

- Check bills for errors as soon as they're received.

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Area Farmers Offer Ways To Save Water

"My crops look great and I'm using less irrigation water." This is a statement heard more and more around Farmer County. A few "pioneers" who were concerned about wasting irrigation water have shown their neighbors there is a better way to irrigate crops, say Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District officials.

W. L. "Preach" Edelman of Friona found that bench leveling and more around Farmer County. A few "pioneers" who were concerned about wasting irrigation water have shown their neighbors there is a better way to irrigate crops, say Farmer County Soil and Water Conservation District officials.

For Max Self, who farms north of Bovina, the answer was simpler and cheaper. He found that row lengths which are coordinated with the slope of the land works on flatter land.

Jan Ward, who farms close to Farwell, feels his operation needs to be diversified. His answer to eroding soil and irrigation water waste was to install a circle sprinkler system and alfalfa on his land with steeper slopes.

Frank Hinkson of Lazbuddie agrees with Ward about the usefulness of circle sprinkler systems, but improved pasture grasses and small grains fit his operation more and protect the land just as well.

These men have different needs for their farming operations, but they all have a common goal - conservation of natural resources. It has paid off for them and it will pay off for you, too.

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

GO, AND SIN NO MORE

The self-righteous Pharisees had brought a fallen woman to Jesus and "when they had set her in the midst," they began to accuse her, saying: "Now Moses in the Law commanded us that such a should be stoned, but what sayest thou?" (John 8:5).

They were using this fallen woman to embarrass the Lord into agreeing that this woman should be stoned, or else leaving Himself open to a charge of repudiating Moses' Law.

At first He made "as though He heard them not," but when they continued asking they got what they asked for! Simply answering: "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her," the Lord turned away again to let that sentence do its work. They had "set her in the midst." Now He had set them in the midst and, "convicted by their consciences," they alone before Him: a great sinner and a great Savior. Since none of the Pharisees had dared to cast a stone at her, the Lord said:

"Neither do I condemn thee. Go, and sin no more" (Ver. 11).

Thus the Lord graciously forgave the sinner-woman, yet without ignoring the demand of the Law. He had not denied that the woman deserved punishment. He had only pointed out that the Pharisees themselves were sinners; that they, like she, needed a SAVIOR.

Tested Tips To Help You

Never pour a concentrated fabric softener directly on fabrics as this may cause staining; add it to the rinse water, or better yet, dilute it with water before adding to the rinse water. If stains do occur, remove by rubbing with bar soap or soaking in a double-strength detergent solution, rewash in the normal manner.

In some cases the use of too much fabric softener may result in a loss of absorbency. If this occurs, simply skip the use of fabric softener for one or two washings.

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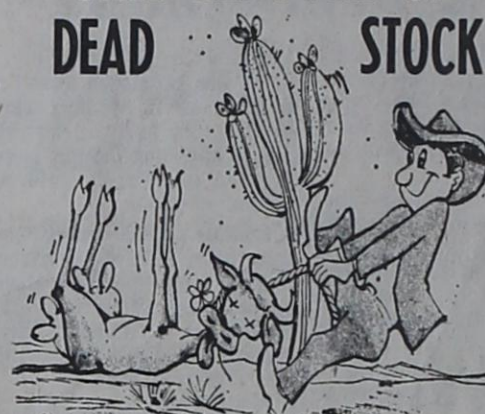

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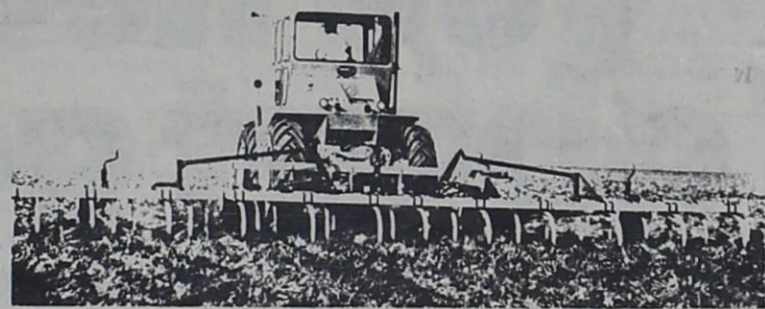
