

May 25 Deadline On Wheat Bonus

Able Speakers Feature School Closings

Using as his subject, "Changing Attitudes in a Changing World," J. T. Carter of Lubbock, former superintendent of the Farwell schools, brought an inspiring commencement address to the members of the graduating class as the closing exercises of the local school took place last Friday evening.

Using many timely illustrations to drive home his message, Mr. Carter held the members of the class to good attention as he drove home his points.

"Today you are boys and girls which compose the graduating class of the Farwell High School; but tomorrow you will be, so to speak, living in an entirely different world. It will be up to you to set your goal and reach it in the future." He went on to say that each individual must choose his place in life, and he urged the Seniors not to stop with a high school education, "but to continue in higher heights and deeper depths."

Resorting again to stories for illustrations, the speaker told of three men who were lodging on the 60th floor of a hotel. The elevator operators went on a strike and it was up to the roomers to climb the stairs or seek another hotel. The three elected to mount the stairs, and nearing the end of their climb, one man observed that he had left the key to his room downstairs. He used this story to illustrate the importance of "being sure before you start."

He stressed the importance of not "looking backwards, but always forward, because the best of everything is always ahead."

In conclusion, he turned again to another fable of an old man, who on being approached by a group of boys with one of the lads clutching a bird in his closed hand. "Is the bird dead or alive?" quierred one of the boys to the old gentleman.

The old man, realizing that the lad had the power to crush the bird and let it fall at his feet, or loose it alive and let it fly away, looked into the distance, then to the lad and replied, "As thou wilt." And from this point the former superintendent stressed the importance of the phrase "as thou wilt" in governing the destinies of their lives.

Mrs. C. M. Henderson gave the processional and the recessional, and the invocation was offered by Supt. H. A. Clift. Joe Threet gave the salutatory address and Tommie Randol followed with the valedictory.

Donald Ray Summers was presented with the trophy for the best all-round student for the year, plus a \$25.00 check from the Roberts Seed Company.

HERE FOR GRADUATION

Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Field, and Mr. and Mrs. M. Wildman, all of Vici, Oklahoma, were here last Thursday night for graduation exercises at the Texico school. The Fields are grandparents, and the Wildmans great-grandparents of Misses Beryl and Evelyn Brown, who were Texico valedictorian and salutatorian in the exercises held last week.

Speaking on "The kind of world you will face tomorrow, and its problems," Dean H. C. Gossard, of The Eastern New Mexico College, Portales, addressed the seniors of the Texico school Thursday night, when commencement exercises were observed.

Gossard prefaced his main subject by remarking that "gatherings such of as this are typical of America—it expresses our deep belief in the value of education as the foundation of life—democracy is based on education—there is nothing like the American idea of education in the entire world."

Turning then to his theme, the speaker first listed the problem of physical environment which faces the residents of the world of tomorrow. "It seems that we only answer one problem, to be faced by two more," he remarked, illustrating with the tremendous advances made in weather predictions, the harnessing of some of the energy of the sun, and the sun, and the preliminary steps of use of the atom. To these illustrations, Dr. Gossard added "We must now learn how to direct the energy which we have unleashed in spitting the atom," and admonished the students, "You are on the verge of a completely new physical area."

"Man knows less about himself than he does anything else in the world," Dr. Gossard remarked as the opening to his discussion of human personality. He went on here to take up the use of psychiatry in healing diseased minds, adding "because we know so little about much of this mind-reading, clairvoyance, thought transference, we are inclined to look upon it all as a hoax, but I point out to you that we have only touched the surface on these things, and when we can understand them, pull them down to earth, so to speak, we will find that they are believable and usable."

The final phase of his talk dealt with social relationships, in which he pointed out that "if we could see the world through the other fellow's glasses, many of our urgent problems could be solved." He illustrated the differences that have unfolded between the delegates of the United Nations, in conferences designed to set a peaceful stage for the world, and emphasized, "unless we can make democracy truly work here at home, we cannot expect to lead other people to it."

"International relationships cannot be based on suspicion, but must be founded on tolerance, understanding, and the will to get along together," he stressed, concluding with a direct admonition to the class, "the future lies in your progress. If you can make a better world, only then will you be worthy of our democratic foundation of education."

Preceding the speaker, Miss Mabel Davis played the processional for the class members, and the invocation was offered by Rev. B. N. Graham. Misses Beryl Brown and Evelyn Brown, sisters, gave the valedictory and salutatory addresses, respectively, while music was provided by the girls' chorus, which sang "Indian Love Call," and "Just a Wearyin' for You."

Board president, R. H. Paul presented the diplomas to Harry and Harriet Baker, Evelyn and Beryl Brown, Peggie Flye, Bill Johnson, Belvin Freeman, Robert May, Wanda Huber, Francis Smotherman, Mozelle May Kirby, Mary Cervantez, George Paul, Kenneth Jaquess and Calvin Blian, and special awards were presented by Supt. B. A. Rogers. Minister J. E. Randol gave the benediction, and the class marched in recessional with Miss Davis at the piano.

John B. Martin, Parmer County AAA Administrator, today advised that the farmers who have old wheat crop on hand should deliver it to an elevator for purchase by the CCC before May 26, since the present regulations provide that the 30c per bushel will not be paid on wheat delivered subsequent to that date.

He said that until May 26 wheat delivered to the CCC under the Emergency Wheat Purchase Program will be purchased at the OPA ceiling price established for the various grades of wheat, such prices being: for Farwell and Bovina, \$1.71½ per bushel for No. 1 grade; No. 2 grade, ½c off; No. 3 grade, 3c off. The ceiling prices for all grades delivered to Friona are ½c per bushel higher, Martin added.

Martin went on to explain that by adding 30c bonus to the above prices, the producer would receive \$2.03½ per bushel, No. 1 basis for wheat delivered to Farwell.

He said that at present Texas was far short of the State Quota of 500,000 bushels and he urged every farmer who has wheat stored, either on his farm or in the elevator, to deliver same to CCC by May 25, regardless of how small the amount.

Each bushel of wheat delivered before the final bonus date, he said, not only means more money to the producer, but he is also doing his part in helping to save the lives of millions of starving human beings.

"This is on program where the farmers will not have to wait for months to get his pay," Martin added, going on to explain that the local AAA office is issuing "sight drafts" immediately on all wheat delivered under this program.

"The farmer has the option of cash plans of settlement," Martin continued, "which will be explained to him when he brings his Delivery Receipt, issued by the Warehouseman to the AAA office."

To date, Martin said, the local AAA office has issued drafts totaling \$88,783.88, representing 44,047.87 bushels of wheat to farmers in Parmer county.

Lazbuddy Section Gets Rain Sunday Night

Rains, ranging from a quarter to a full inch, are reported to have visited the Lazbuddy section, in the southeastern corner of the county, on Sunday night, while the rest of the county went rainless, except for a light trace of moisture.

The heaviest rain fell south and east of the Lazbuddy section, it is reported, with little moisture being received to the north and west. This is the second good shower that has visited that community in recent weeks and farmers are reported to be putting their spring crops in the ground.

Some rather destructive hail is reported to the east of Friona, with a heavy fall being recorded in the Black settlement, doing damage to some wheat fields.

Roping Matches At Bovina, Sunday

The Bovina Roping Club has scheduled two calf roping matches and a jack pot roping to be held there Sunday afternoon, May 26, starting at 2:30 o' clock.

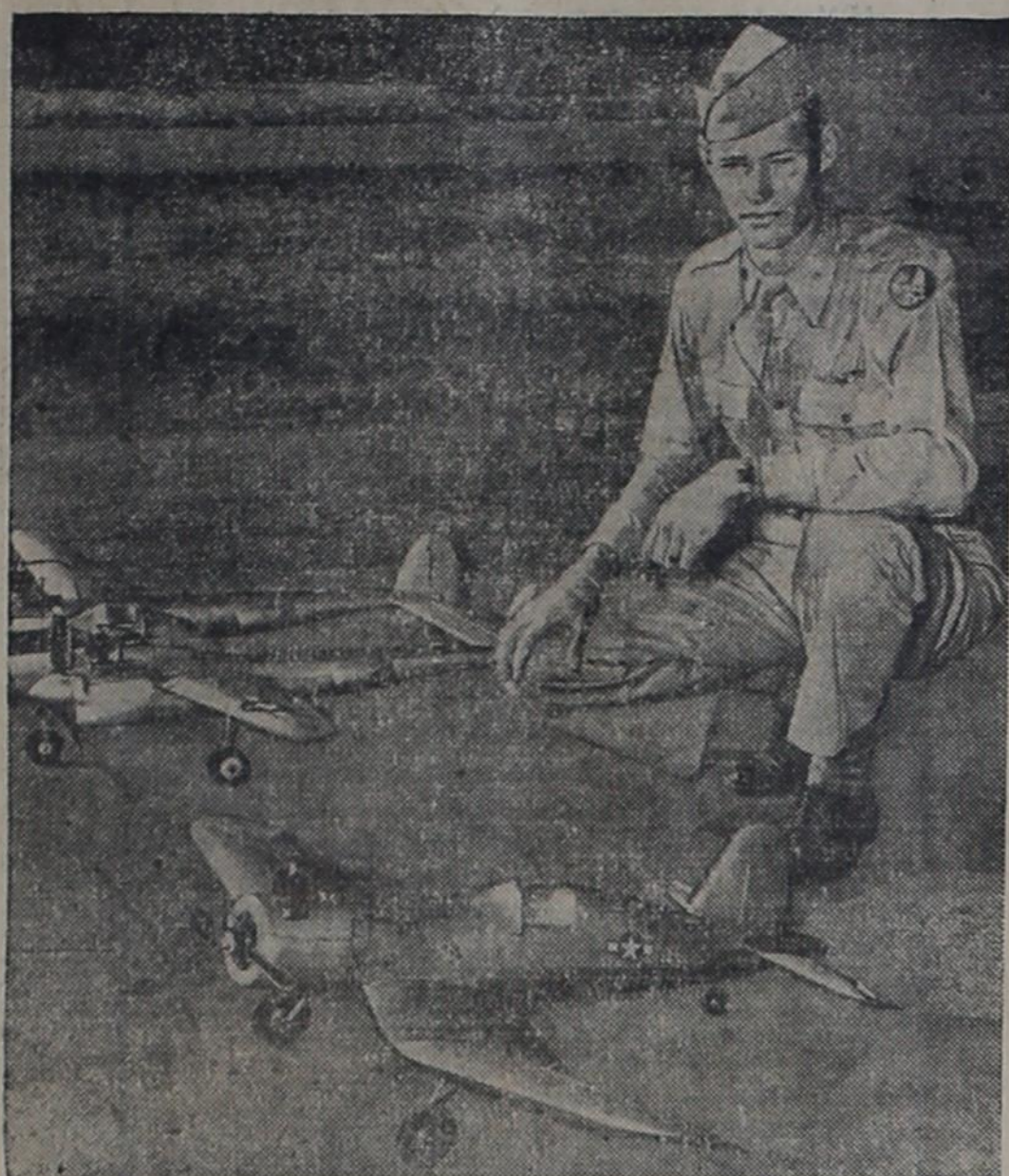

He is making his home at Olton, the former County seat of Lamb County. "I believe I know what the people of the district want and need, and I propose to look after their interests if elected to the legislature," he said.

The 120 District is composed of seven counties, Parmer, Swisher, Hale, Lamb, Bailey, Castro and Floyd.

Drafting of 18-19 Year Lads Halted

The local office of Selective Service announced today that "pending further promulgation of Selective Service regulations" the drafting of 18 and 19 year-old lads has been halted.

Mrs. Bessie Lee Henneman, local board clerk, said that the regulation applies to single boys in this age group who were facing introduction of pre-induction physical examinations. And she added that the four 18-year-old lads sent from here for their pre-induction physicals just last week would not be processed further for induction, "unless we receive amended regulations later on." Fathers who are going under 20 are now being classified in 3-A, she said. "We will continue registering 18-year-old boys," she said, adding that lads attaining the age of 18 would be required to register at the office of their local boards as in the past.

Enlistments of lads 20 and over are still being received, she added.

Single Term of Ten Weeks at WTSTC

CANYON—West Texas State's summer session opening June 4th will be limited to a single term of ten weeks and will feature one-hour classes and a five-day week.

The current long session will close May 30th.

The percentage of World War II veterans will continue to rise, for these the summer sessions will be merely a continuation of their work. Summer students will be permitted to earn credit amounting to twelve semester hours.

Two large fields of graduate study will be open to summer students. One of these leads to careers in education; the other to careers in business and industry. Degrees offered are the Master of Arts and the Master of Business Administration.

Undergraduate work will include terminal courses for those wishing to take employment as soon as possible, pre-professional work and courses leading to the B. A., B. S., and B. B. A. degrees. Many courses of particular interest to veterans will be available. Guidance will be stressed at all levels.

Workshop courses will be stressed in the coming summer term. Supervised teaching will be available in the Demonstration School and West Texas High School.

Recreation and supervised play will be stressed in the summer activity program. Also scheduled are lyceum numbers, lectures, picnics, forums, educational movies, dances, swimming, receptions and book reviews.

FACTS ON YOUR RIGHTS IN BUYING SURPLUS PROPERTY

To improve veterans' priorities in the purchase of war surpluses, Congress has amended the Surplus Property Act. So that you as a veteran may have the facts direct, the War Assets Administration is taking this means to address you.

WAR ASSETS ADMINISTRATION WASHINGTON 25, D. C.

May 3, 1946

TO ALL VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II:

As a veteran you are anxious to get all the benefits you can from war surplus. It is our desire to give you every possible preference, under the law, in purchasing the items you want.

By amendment to the Surplus Property Act of 1944, the War Assets Administrator has been authorized to reserve certain items for exclusive sale to you. They are listed below, but in fairness, we must tell you that quantities are not large, the demand is tremendous and you may not always be able to buy exactly what you want. Every veteran, however, will have the satisfaction of knowing that all items placed on the reserve or "set-aside" list are going to veterans like himself.

Subject to availability, you may purchase these items for your personal use, as well as for your business, professional, or agricultural enterprise. You may be sure that only World War II veterans will be entitled to purchase them.

The amended Act contains a second provision that further improves your buying position for your business, professional or agricultural enterprise. For items not included in this list, only Federal agencies buying for their own use may purchase ahead of you. This gives you, for business use, an advantage over State and local Governments, tax-supported institutions, certified non-veteran small business enterprises and all other potential buyers except Federal agencies. For a specified period after the Federal agencies have had an opportunity to purchase surplus, all available items which do not appear on the reserve list will be available to you to purchase for your own business.

Under the amended Act you still must be certified to purchase war surplus, as thousands have done since the original Act was passed. The certification procedure has now been simplified, as explained at the right.

The War Assets Administration will make every effort to see to it that you receive the benefits Congress intends you to have. Your patience and cooperation will aid in the difficult task we face in trying to satisfy the needs of every veteran who wants to buy surplus property.

HOW YOU CAN QUALIFY FOR YOUR PRIORITY

If You Are Already Certified:

Thousands of veterans of World War II have already been certified to purchase surplus items. Such certifications remain valid and may be used to purchase items for which you are certified whether the item is on your reserve or "set-aside" list or on other surplus lists. You will be notified either by mail or by public local announcement where and when to make purchases.

If you are not certified, or if you wish to change your certification to items on the "set-aside" list:

- STEP 1. Take your honorable discharge from the armed services of World War II and apply at any of the offices listed below for a veteran's certificate for the item you desire.
STEP 2. Wait for mail or local public notice that the item for which you are certified is available and may be purchased. You may be sure that you will be notified and that you do not need to call in person to check the availability of the items you wish. You will be told where and when to buy.
STEP 3. Make sure that you follow up promptly the notice of availability when it reaches you by either mail or public notice.

Social Security Cards Should be Checked

The beginning of the summer vacation for school children will cause an increase in the number of applications for Social Security Account Number Cards, according to a state-

ment of J. R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office. Mr. Sanderson recommends to students who have had a card, or have lost their original cards: Do not apply for a card unless it is actually needed. Be sure to ask for a duplicate card if the original card has been lost, as each person should have only one number

for his whole working life; and, finally, be sure to show the card to each employer for whom you work, so he can copy down for his records your name and number exactly as they appear on the card.

In the Texas Panhandle Area, applications for cards (which may be obtained at the Amarillo Field Office, from the United States Employment Service Office, or from the post office) should be mailed or brought to the Social Security Board Field Office, 324 New Post Office Building, Amarillo, Texas.

Supplies of Fats, Oils Still Short

The total supply of fats and oils still is not sufficient to meet present requirements, Charles L. Howell, Acting District Director, said this week in urging housewives to continue collecting and turning in used kitchen fats.

While the world quantity of fats and oils available this year will be one billion pounds more than last, this remains 2.5 billion pounds short of the pre-war average, he said. Supplies will not improve greatly until production in the Far East is restored and shipments are resumed in volume. So far, only limited quantities of copra have been received from the oil-rich Philippines.

Used kitchen fats, no longer suitable for cooking purposes, are needed now to speed up soap production and to keep soap shortages from getting worse he said. Most dealers still pay four cents for each pound.

Any complaints or breakdown in local movement of used fats should be reported to his office at once, Howell said, by addressing such complaints to P. O. Box 2129, Amarillo, Texas, or by calling telephone number, 2-4577.

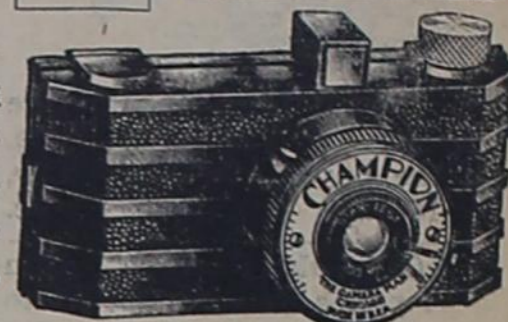

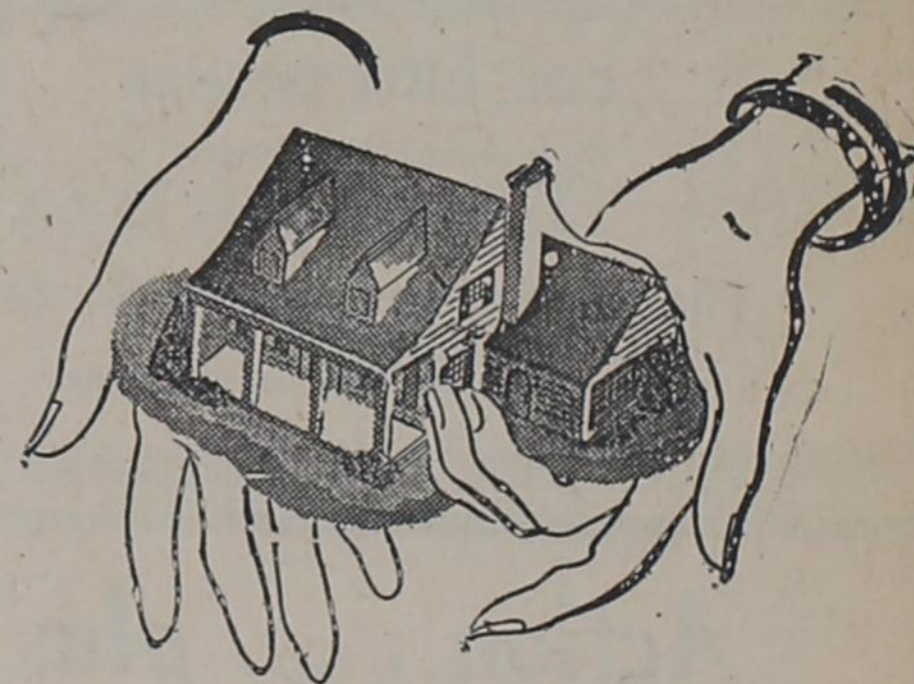

School-Age Exhibitors Will Be Kings at Texas State Fair

DALLAS—School-age exhibitors of livestock will be kings of the show the first four days of the State Fair of Texas, to be held in Dallas Oct. 5-20, with all the barns and pens at the disposal of 4H, Future Farmer, and other youthful showmen.

R. L. Thornton, president of the State Fair Association, announced this week that the Junior Livestock show would be held Oct. 5-8, with a senior division following on the 9th. He stated that this was a new, streamlined procedure that would make more room in the arenas for exhibitors of both groups. Also, he pointed out, this shortened exhibiting time would enable boys and girls to return to school with a minimum of time lost.

This is the first year, according to Ray Wilson, chairman of the Junior Ranch committee that is planning the younger-aged exhibits, that boys and girls have had all facilities turned over to them to house and show livestock.

Wilson stated that the plan was adopted in order to alleviate crowded conditions that have resulted in former years when animals to be shown in both the junior and senior divisions were brought in at the beginning of the Fair and kept until the last days.

Plans call for the judging of animals entered in the junior division to be completed by noon of the 4th day. During the afternoon of the same day the livestock will be marketed and the exhibitors will be free to return to schools or to follow a program of their own making.

Roy Rupard, Fair secretary, stated that the premium list and instructions would be ready for distribution about July 1.

About Raticides

COLLEGE STATION.—Scientists have developed some excellent raticides recently, but they're still too deadly and too potent to be released generally to the public.

Until these can be made available safely, folks should make the best use of the controls they have at hand, advises J. E. Poore, assistant district agent for the Rodent Control Service. 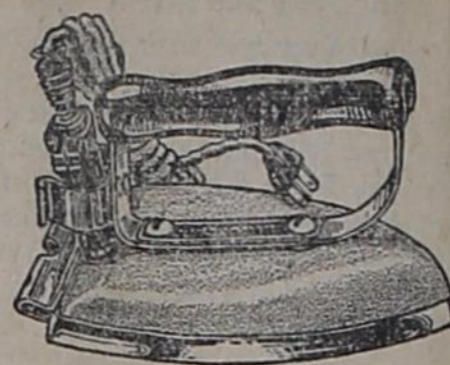

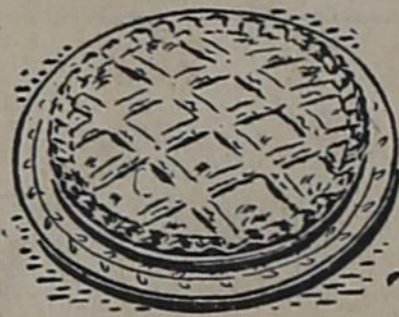

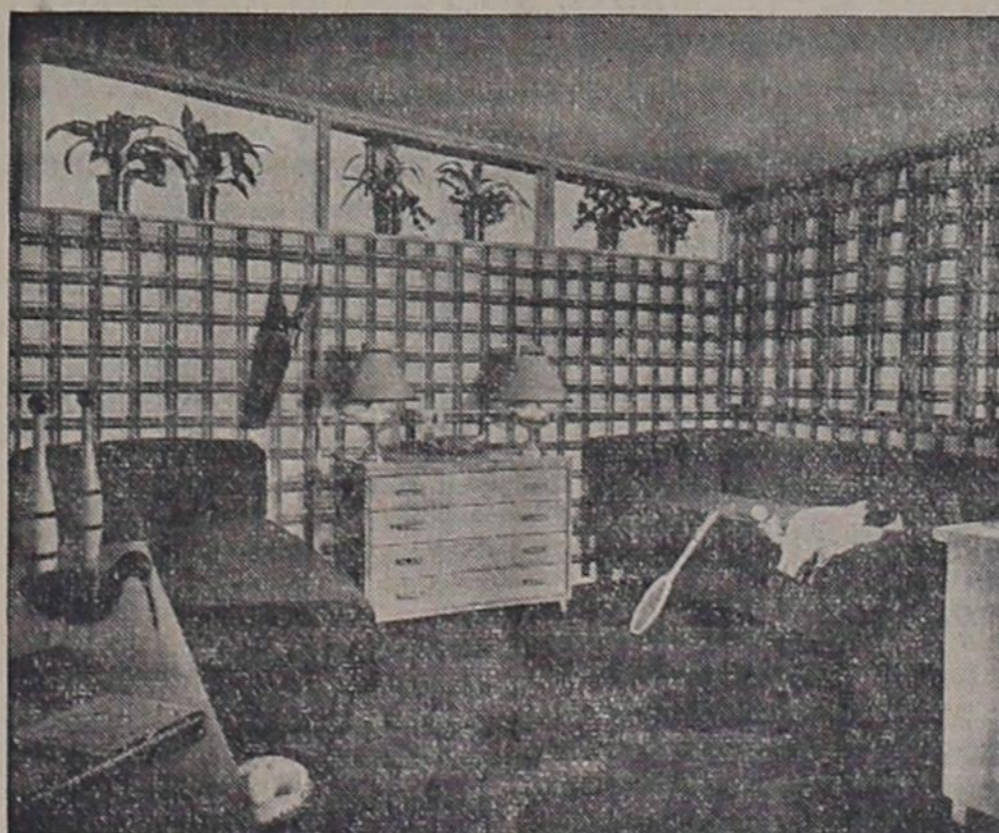
Bill the Butcher Says

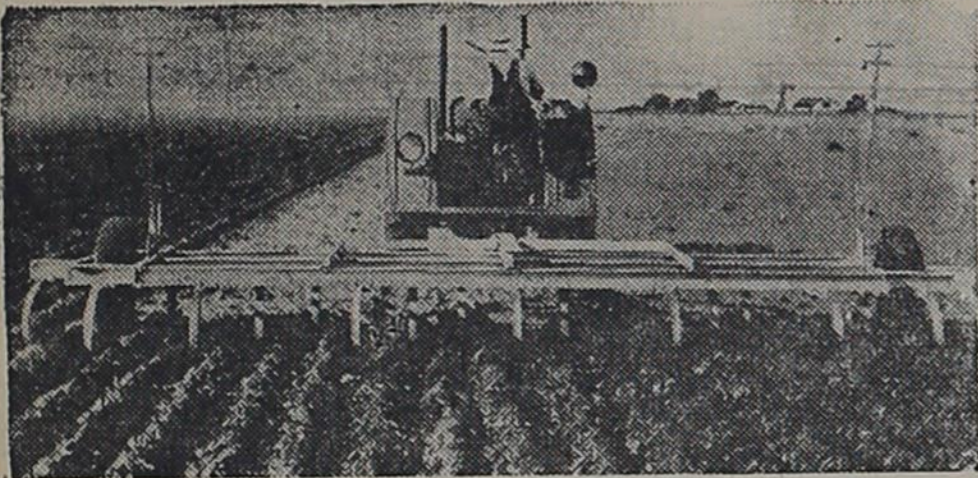

Health Notes

By Texas Department of Health

AUSTIN.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued the following suggestions and statements concerning the control and prevention of poliomyelitis which is now occurring in certain sections of the State.

Until recently it was generally believed that this infection is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis may be another of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must include clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation.

Strict sanitary measures must be observed in all communities. Stringent efforts should be made to eliminate the house-fly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must

be eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute approved garbage collection systems immediately. Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate municipal sewage disposal systems are not in operation, it is vitally important to promote and maintain sanitary septic tanks and outdoor privies.

All swimming pools should, under rigid supervision, maintain those standards approved by the Texas State Department of Health. This necessarily includes maintenance of proper chlorine level. Where such standards are not maintained, those pools should be closed immediately.

All raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use and protected from flies, filth and insects. All eating and food handling establishments should adhere strictly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes and utensils. Those restaurants with insufficient personnel to maintain approved sanitation should close one or two hours a day so that employees can assist in maintaining cleanliness and high sanitary standards.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated. Maintain in the home the same sanitary things that are necessary in community life. Particular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should be handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typhoid fever or bacillary dysentery.

Over-exertion in children should be avoided. Children should not visit homes where there is illness. Polio cases should be quarantined for 14 days and adults who work in food establishments should be particularly instructed in personal hygiene. It is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts, especially in children during an outbreak of this disease. It is not advocated that schools, churches, and theaters, be closed.

Early symptoms of infantile paralysis are headache, fever, vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. When suspicious symptoms appear, a physician should be called immediately.
