

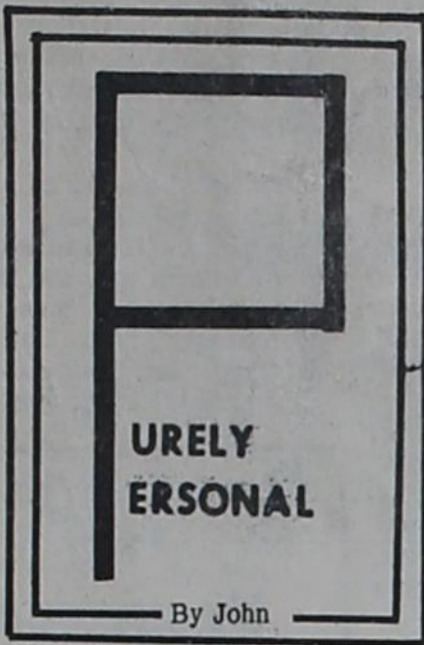

On Monday afternoon we were privileged to interview Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes on video tape for a later broadcast. This was a pleasure that we had looked forward to for some time, but as with most anticipated pleasures the consummation was less than the expectation.

Barnes is a striking person. He is rather tall, carries himself well, speaks in a modulated tone of voice suited to the audience and has an impressive shock of curly red hair. As with all successful politicians, he is a ready talker and thinks on his feet quickly and logically. This politician's trait, coupled with a 30 minute or slightly less time element, precluded much close questioning.

We can say with certainty that Barnes favors a four-year term for state office holders and also increased pay for legislators. He also favors annual session of the state legislature. This puts him at odds with Texas voters as these propositions have in the past been turned down in various elections.

We personally will go along with the Lieutenant Governor on the increased pay proposition and the four-year term of office, but still have reservations on the annual legislative session. We think that they raise taxes often enough by meeting every two years without contemplating what they might do if they had an annual whack at the long-suffering payer of public bills.

Ben, of course, was quite emphatic about his inability to be coupled with the recent Texas stock scandals and declared that he would run for the gubernatorial nomination on his record. This was rather stock-political talk and nothing startling.

He did say he was in favor of the lowering of the voting age to 18, but he did not know exactly how to do it. One qualified the 18-year-old voter might be over the unfranchised 17-year-old. It's funny but we haven't been given any real basis for drawing a line of demarcation in setting voting ages.

On summation, we think that Ben Barnes is apt to pick up all the Texas marbled next year and go on to greater political glories for himself and his constituents.

We note where the civic pride bug has bitten the Girl and Brownie Scouts. This is a good bite from this corner. The spots attacked by the vigorous girls were worthy of attention, and we all need to tip the hat to the girls and their leaders, Ole' Girls.

Joe McWilliams looks like the area's premier turnip producer. Joe is understandingly proud of his turnip patch, and he favored the publisher's family with a generous sample of his wares. However, Joe does suspect that maybe Jack Glenn might be laying behind the turnip leaf and not pulling any prize dandies until after the ground freezes hard.

We are told that the hardy root will grow until the ground really freezes, and they are not generally bothered by light frosts. From the look of Joe's crop, this is good turnip country and possibly we should investigate the possibility of wresting the turnip title away from Dogpatch.

Tonight, Friday, is the last football game of the Farwell Steers this season, and it is a home game. At this time we realize that we are not to enjoy a big winning season, but we also realize that our local boys have played to the best of their abilities.

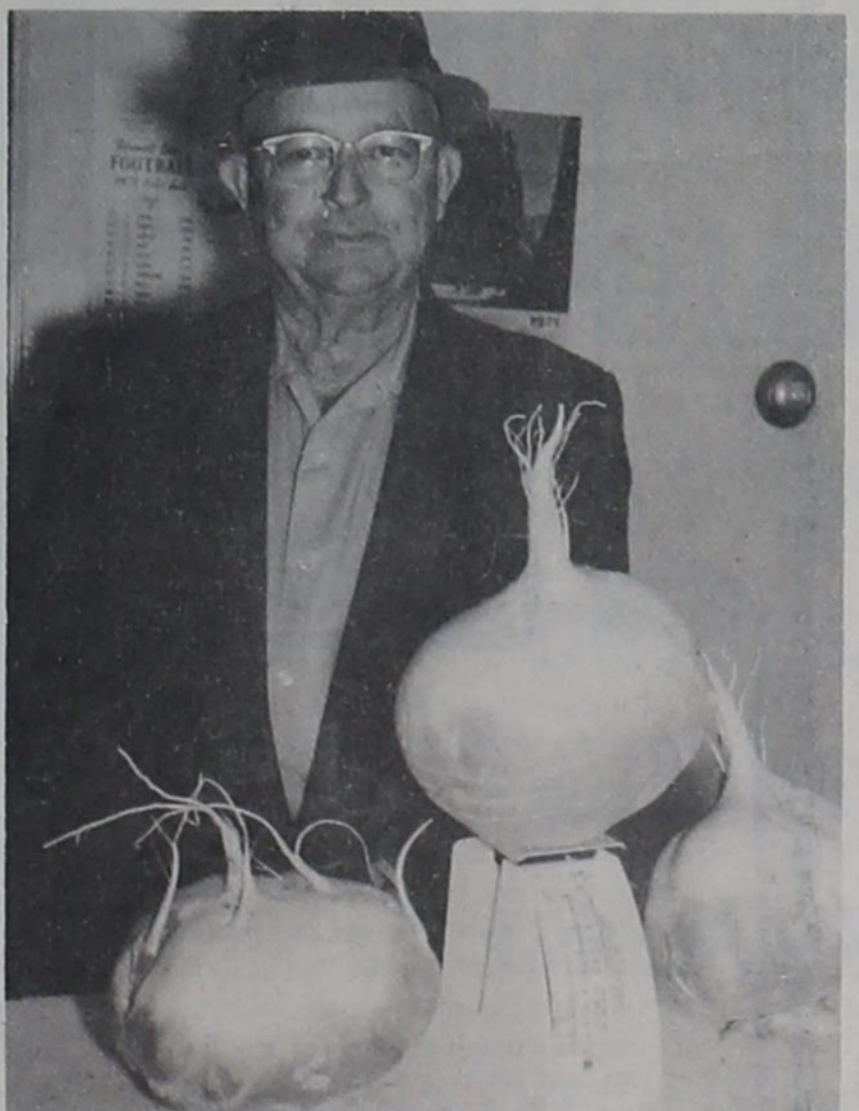
Farwell-Vega Vie Tilt

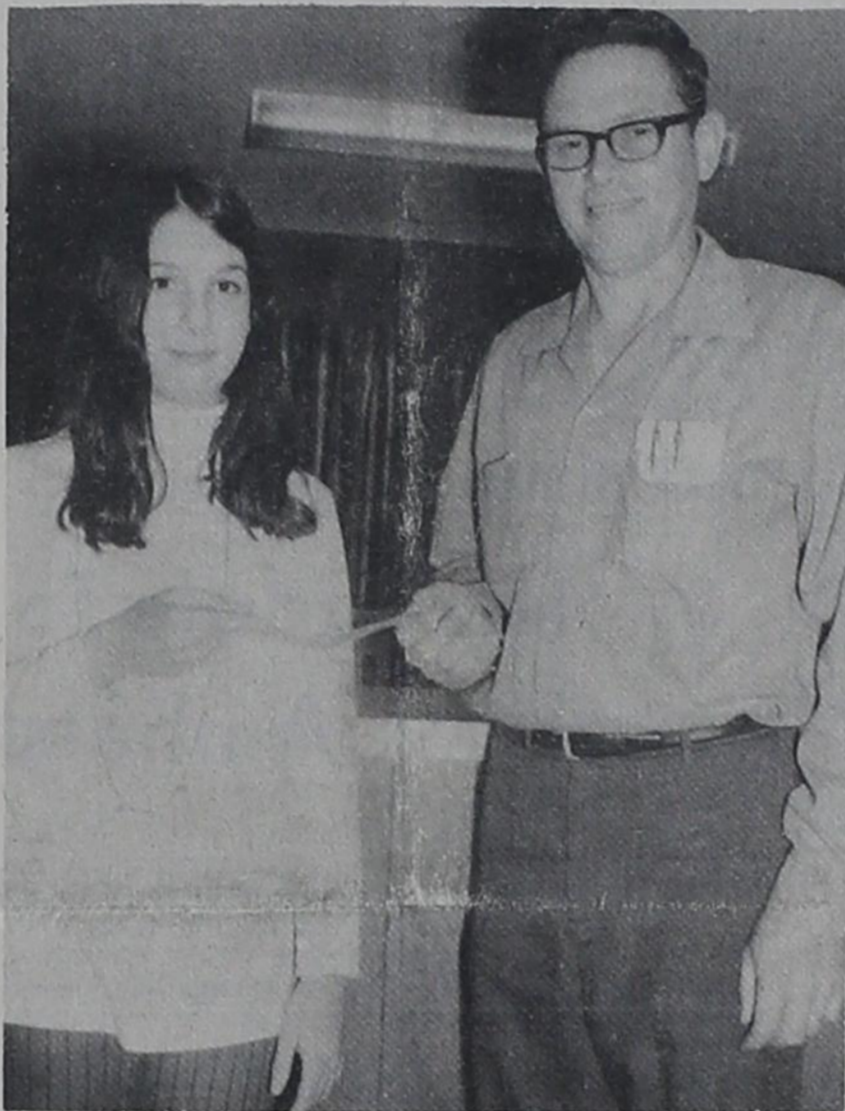

This Is Peak --

Harvest Going Full Blast

Milo producers are busily cutting their grain and transporting it to the elevators as warm, dry weather prevails on the Plains. Harvest has been tough and go for several weeks due to rains in the area, but the peak has finally been reached.

Elevator operators feel this will be their biggest week with predictions that from 50 to 75 per cent of the grain has been cut. Over 180,000 acres were planted in Parmer County.

Asa Smith, manager of Sherry-Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat said he thought there was approximately 10 to 15 per cent more milo being planted than last year.

According to Smith, he has passed the peak with about 80 per cent of the grain through the elevator, Thursday, Nov. 4, was his biggest day.

Smith figures producers in his area will be finished with harvest in another week if the weather holds. Yields have been about the same as last year, averaging around 6,000 to 8,000 lbs. per acre.

Test weight of the grain has been light with an average of 55 lbs. per bushel. According to Smith, moisture content has been very good, about 13 per cent. During the early part of the season moisture content was somewhat higher, but late yields have been pretty dry.

Milo prices are not running as good as they were last year, says Smith. "They are not as good as the farmers hoped with prices now at \$1.90 per hundred."

Fred Chandler of Sherry-Anderson-Pitman Elevators of

Texico-Farwell said approximately two-thirds of his milo is in. Yields are averaging 7,000 lbs. per acre with some reports of 5,000 to 9,200 lbs. per acre.

"There is more of the crop this year. Several people are making better yields," he said. "Our moisture content is real dry with an average of 12 1/2 per cent."

Test weight is averaging 55 lbs. According to Chandler, harvest in his area will be over by Thanksgiving. Depending on the weather, the height of the harvest should run through this week.

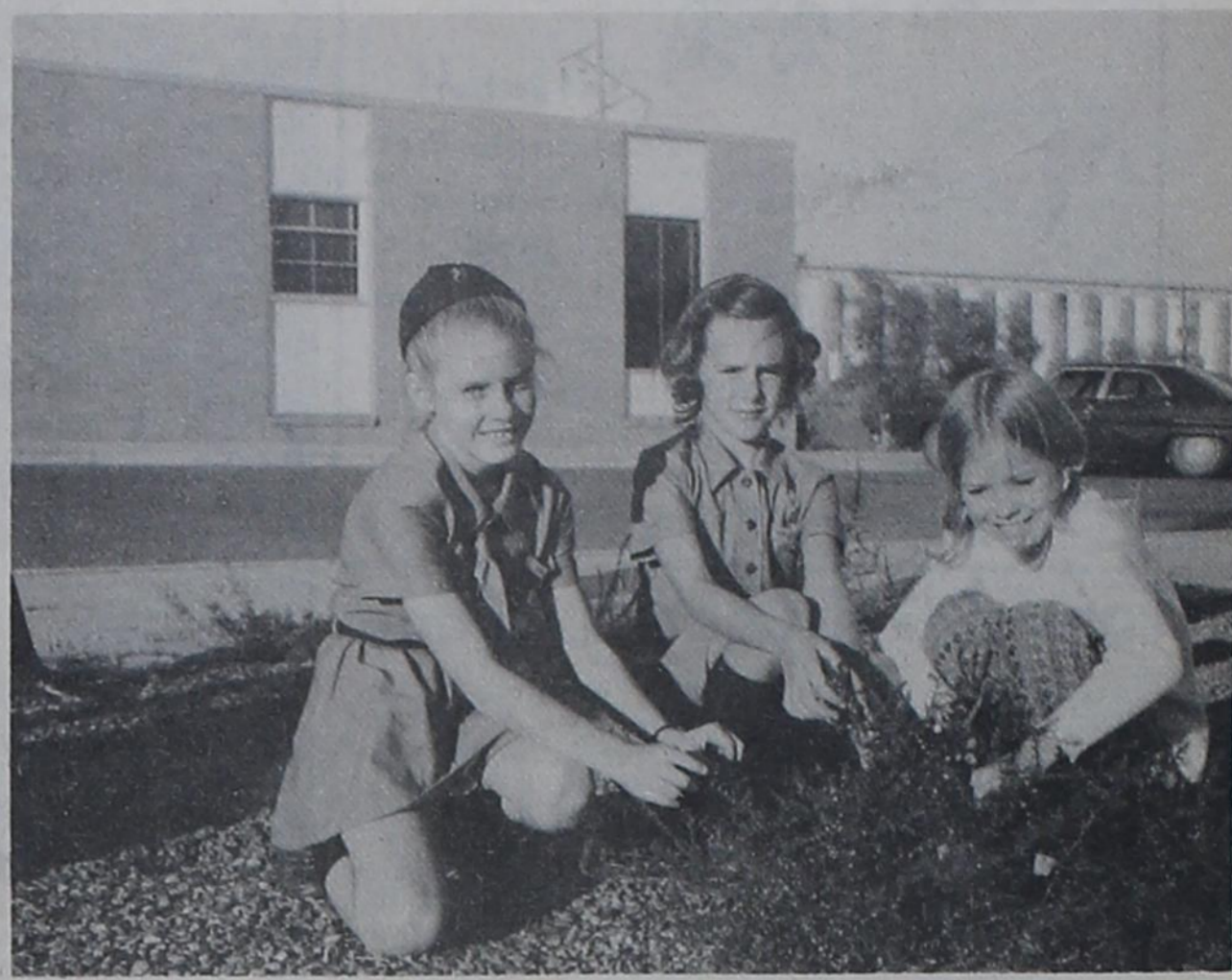
Bill Thigpen, manager of Worley Grain, says they are receiving grain in quantities well past what they received last year. "We're maybe 50 per cent through, but there is still a lot of grain."

Test weights are running from 50 to 59 lbs. per bushel, which is a little lighter than usual, Thigpen says. "Moisture content is in real good shape with an average of 12 per cent. Some have reported 11 per cent," he said.

Yields have fallen off this year with a decrease of 200 to 300 lbs. per acre reported. One report was received of a 1,500 lb. decrease.

Several good yields were reported of 5,000 to 8,700 lbs. per acre. Thigpen attributes the decrease to a lack of machines. "There just aren't enough harvesting machines in the area."

"If the weather holds out, I think we'll finish in a week to ten days. We're catching the biggest part of it now," he said.

City Lets Contract For New Fire Truck

At a recent meeting of Farwell City Council, a contract was let to Fire Appliance Company of Texas, Wichita Falls, for a new fire truck. Amount of the contract was \$24,630. The delivery date is 150 days.

Water rates for customers outside the Farwell city limits has been raised to \$3.25 for the first 2,000 gallons and 40 cents per thousand gallons thereafter, according to Janie

Bowery, city clerk. New rates are effective as of the November billing.

Council members are Elmer Hargrove, mayor; and Fred Chandler and L. R. "Jelly" Vincent, commissioners. The council is asking for bids for repairing and painting the city's water tanks. This business will be taken up at the council's next regular meeting on Nov. 26.

Farwell Tops Sudan 28-0

Farwell Steers broke a three-game losing streak and scored an impressive win over the Sudan Hornets in Farwell last Friday night, 28-0. Eager to avenge a loss to the Hornets last year, the Steers generally controlled the game.

Farwell had a total offense of 369 yards and 20 first downs against Sudan's 204 yards and 13 first downs. The bulk of the Steer offense came on the running of Larry Erwin with 82 yards, Ray Norton with 64 yards and Kevin Hardage with 50 yards.

Quarterback Brett Hargrove found an abundance of receivers in Larry Erwin, Kevin Hardage, Kevin Hargrove and Carl Kirkland. He completed seven of 20 passes for 134 yards. Sudan depended almost entirely on their ground game as they completed only two of 16 passes for 19 yards. The game was fairly even in penalties; Farwell suffering six for 69 yards, Sudan totalling seven for 53 yards.

The Steer defense had another good night, forcing three punts, four fumbles, two interceptions and five turnovers on downs by the Hornet offense as compared to six punts and four fumbles suffered by the Steers' offense.

The game started with a couple of punts that gave Farwell possession of the ball on their own 49. They drove from there to the two in seven plays on the running of Larry Erwin and Ray Norton and the running and passing of Brett Hargrove. Norton plunged over from there to give the Steers a lead of 7-0 after Andy Bowers' extra point.

On the next possession, the Hornets punted from the Steer 39 to force the Steers back into a hole on their own 4-yard line. The Hornets then picked off a Steer fumble to give themselves a first and goal on the six.

But the Steer defense, led by Brett Hargrove, David Dannheim and Harold Jones held them out to give the Steers possession on the one. Then the mighty Blue offense let loose and worked their way downfield to the Hornet 17 in 12 plays, steadily gaining ground on the stymied Hornet defense.

On the first play of the second quarter, Ray Norton broke

through the Hornet left and stormed the 17 yards for the second Steer TD. The rest of the half was a series of exchanges, neither side mounting an attack of more than 12 consecutive plays.

Sudan's offense seemed to be sharpening at the opening of the second half, with good runs by Ernest Jefferson, Mark Hanna and QB Bo Lance. But on every drive, the Hornets' hope of getting on the score board was cut short by the Farwell defense. Steers Mike Travis, Brett Hargrove, Larry Erwin, Mack and Kirk McFarland, Terry Craft and Mickey Lunsford came through with the big play on several different occasions.

Then Farwell struck again from 49 yards out, Hargrove put a pass into the waiting arms of sophomore Carl Kirkland who dashed to the goal line for another TD. After the two-point conversion failed, the Steers led 20-0 with 8:33 left in the game.

Kirk McFarland cut short the next Hornet drive with an interception on the 41. The Steers scored from there on the first play on a great run by Larry Erwin.

Dodging, twisting and breaking tackles, he worked his way steadily downfield until he crossed the goal. Hardage's run for two made the score 28-0 with minutes left on the clock. Finding their running game frozen by the Steer line, the Hornets went to the air and found that the Steer secondary wasn't too bad either. The rest

of the game was taken up by Sudan desperately trying to score before the clock ran out, but it was in vain, for at the final buzzer, the Steers held their 28-0 lead.

Head Coach Toby Booth commented on last week's win over Sudan by saying, "It was probably the best effort we've had from the team all year long."

Booth praised the offensive running of Larry Erwin, Ray Norton and Kevin Hardage. He also lauded the passing of Brett Hargrove, and receivers Carl Kirkland, Johnny Franse, Kevin Hardage and Kevin Hargrove for their outstanding efforts.

"Mike Travis, Mickey Lunsford and Terry Craft did an outstanding job of blocking in the line. Our entire defense should be praised. It was largely their help that give us the opportunity to shut out Sudan."

Booth particularly pointed out the efforts of Craft, Travis, Harold Jones, Mack McFarland, Kirk McFarland, Brett Hargrove and David Dannheim.

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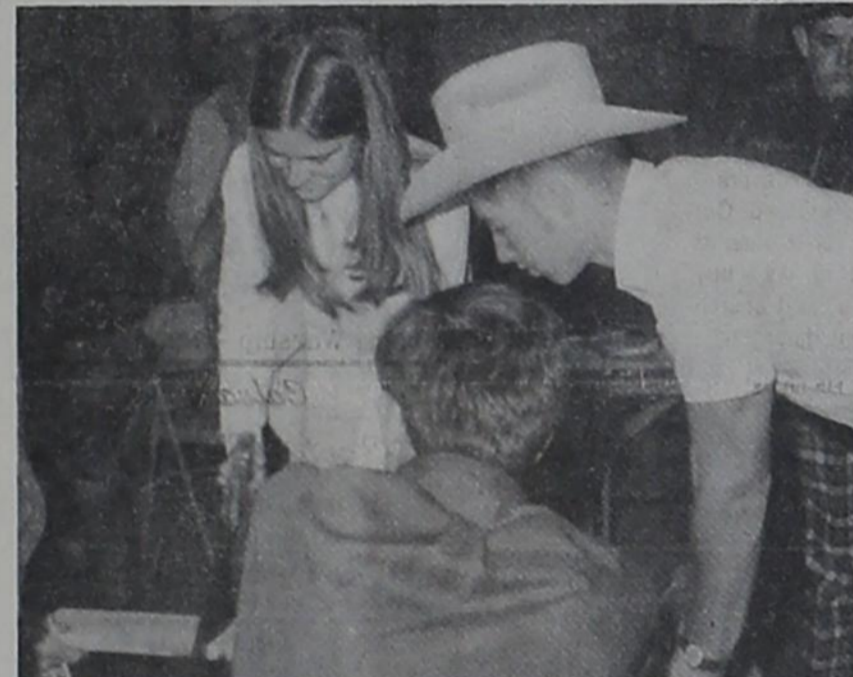

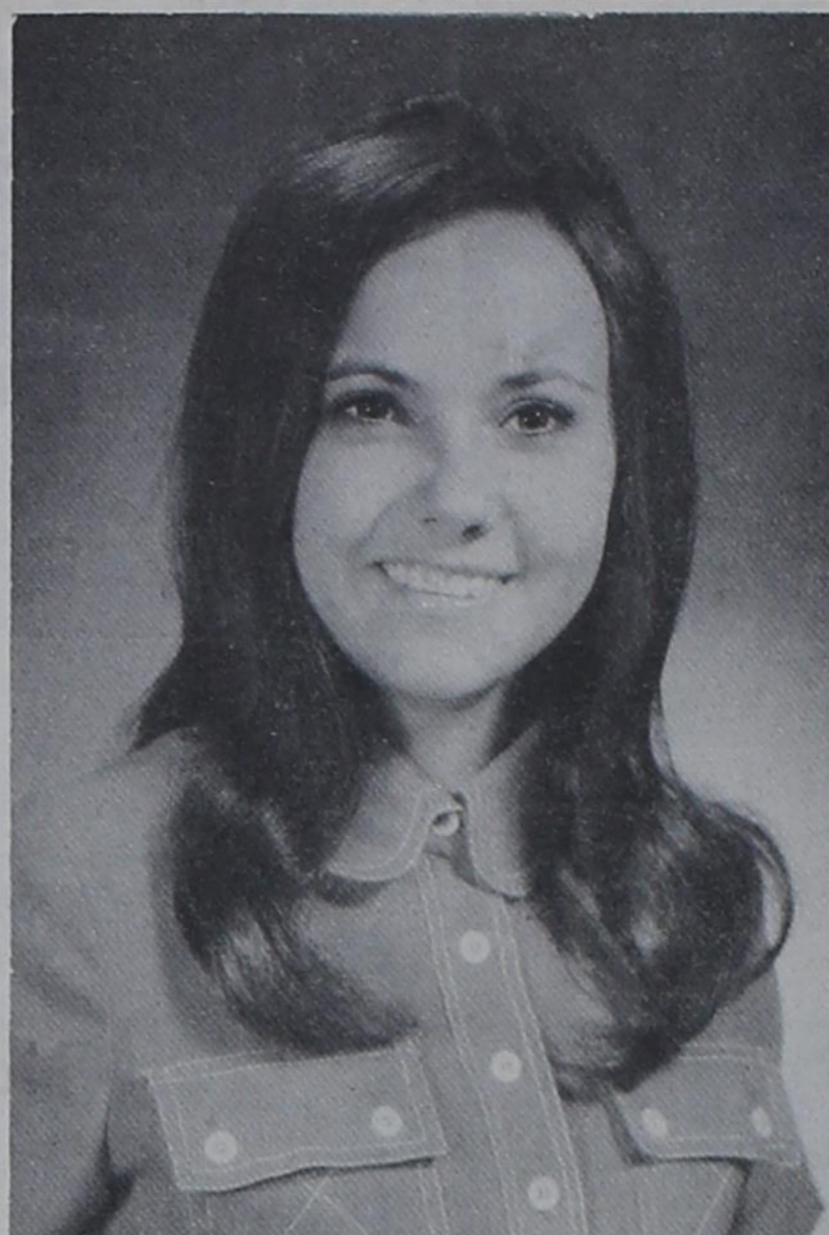
