In Curry County --

Lloyd Harrison's Named Farm Family Of The Year

Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Harrison and two-year-old daughter, Lori Michelle, who farm near Texico were recently named Curry County's Outstanding Farm Family of the Year by New Mexico Farmers Home Administration.

The Harrisons were presented with a certificate and plaque Wednesday, Nov. 17, by State FHA Director Carroll Hunton of Albuquerque and Bob Stewart, FHA county supervisor. The awards were sponsored by Clovis Chamber of Commerce.

Born in Levelland and raised in the Lubbock area, Harrison came to Curry County in 1958 with his parents. Having farmed for most of his life, Harrison began as a wage-earning farm hand. He now owns 480 acres of land on which he grows grain.

In making the presentation to Harrison, Hunton explained that all county FHA loan dockets are reviewed by an FHA board. The board, in turn, selects several individuals who meet award standards and a committee of local farm lenders selects one family as Outstanding Farm Family of the Year.

Harrison plans to purchase more land within the next couple of years. He also plans to start a registered cattle herd. "I'm looking into the possibility, but I really don't know yet what kind of cattle I want to raise," Harrison commented on the farming business by saying that raising capital was the hardest part of starting in farming. "Another thing which was hard was facing the fact I didn't know what I thought I knew," he said.

During his past two years of farming Harrison has relied mainly on himself to do all the work. This year he purchased a combine so he wouldn't have to get his grain custom harvested. "Without the help of God, I wouldn't be where I am now," he added.

Memorial Tower Raised Friday

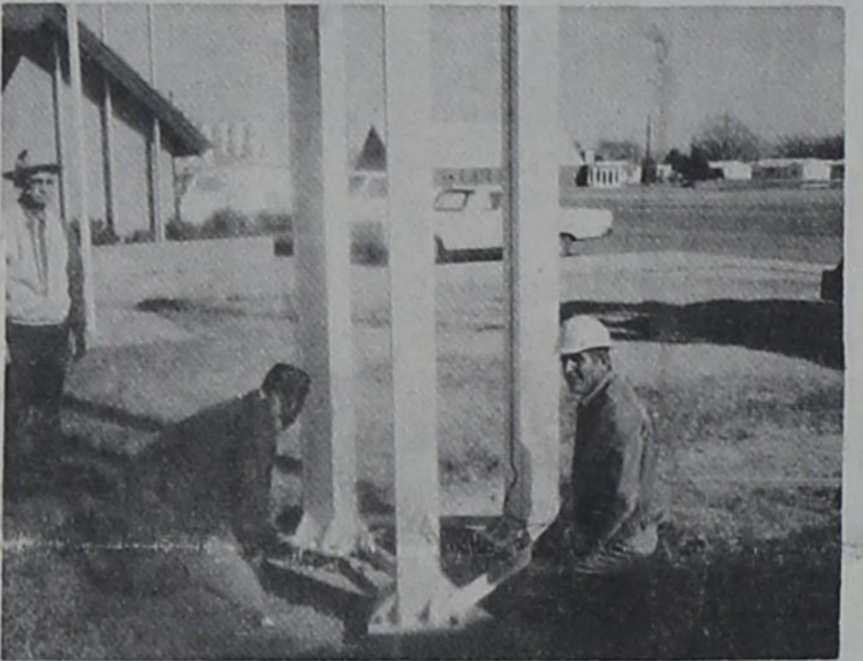
The Memorial Tower at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell was raised and leveled last Friday, Nov. 19, after members finally found a crane large enough to erect the tower.

Not only was finding a crane large enough to move the tower into place a problem, several weeks ago the bells which had been purchased to go in the tower were stolen. They were found two weeks ago four miles south-

east of Farwell in a maize field belonging to Duane Herington. Herington was combining at the time he found the bells.

The carillon system was purchased two years ago and the speakers were mounted on a temporary frame on the roof of the Educational Building of the church until a permanent tower could be designed and erected.

After a study of several such towers, the final selection was made and plans submitted to

Local Man Thrashes Watermelons For Seed

Don Williams of Farwell finished thrashing approximately 30 acres of watermelons last week. Williams, who grew the melons for commercial use, had already shipped his initial crop, when he decided to harvest his melons for seed.

Williams is using a machine made by Don Dobbs of Poolville, Okla. The machine consists of a thrasher which pulls the melons up with chains. The melons then fall down a trough

into a rotating trough where they are cut up by alternating bars. Watermelon seeds fall through to a seed bin while the meat and rind are thrown out the back or caught in the trough.

After he finishes harvesting his crop, Williams will take his seed to Lee Coffey in Littlefield for washing and drying. Coffey, who also thrashes watermelons, has a machine which washes the seed to get rid of the extra meat which might have stuck to the seed. He then dries the seed on screen racks. The seed is spread on the racks approximately one-half inch thick.

After the drying process is over, Williams will ship his seed to Poolville, Okla., where it will be sold for commercial melon-growing.

The program included a slide presentation entitled "Rural Credit In Action" which pointed out the need to eliminate environmental problems in New Mexico as well as in other states.

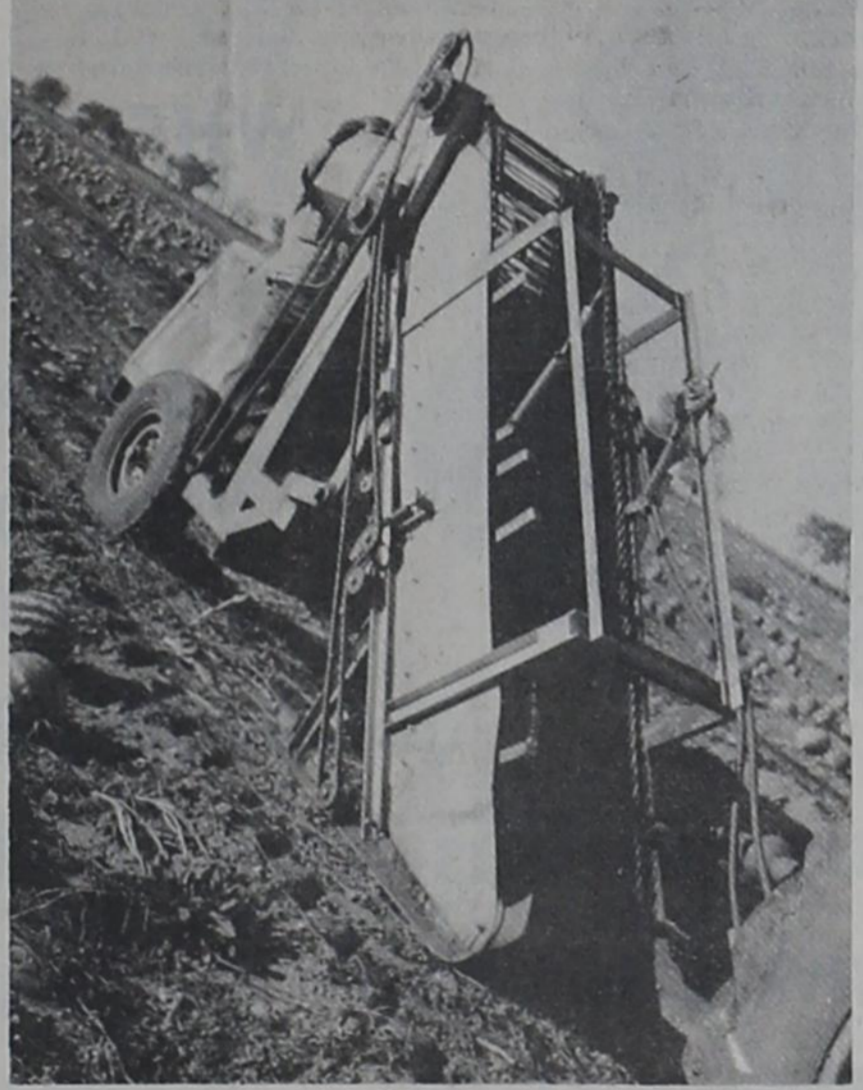
The meeting was opened with a prayer by Dewey Fogerson,

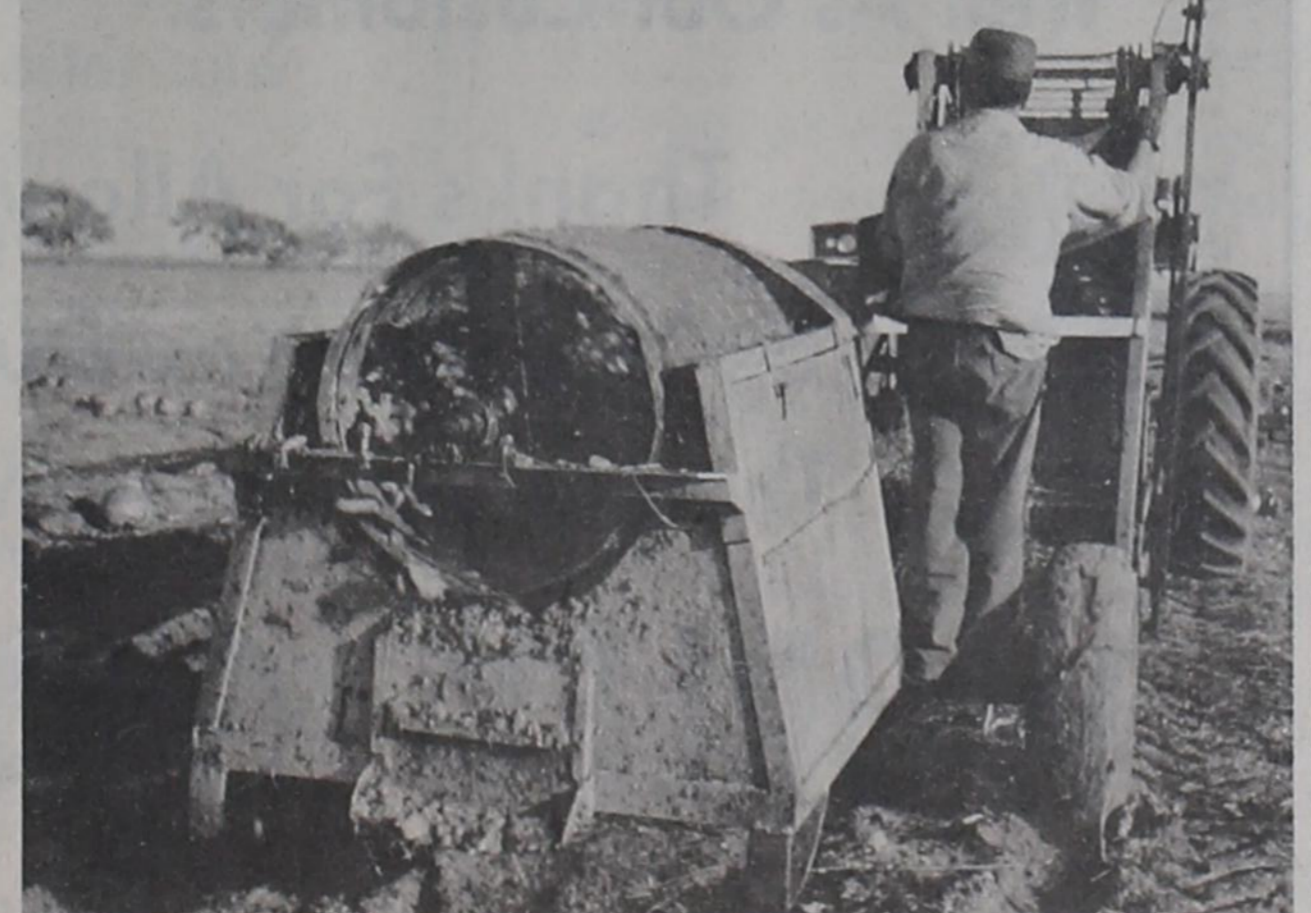
Pentecostal Holding Revival

Report On Water Survey

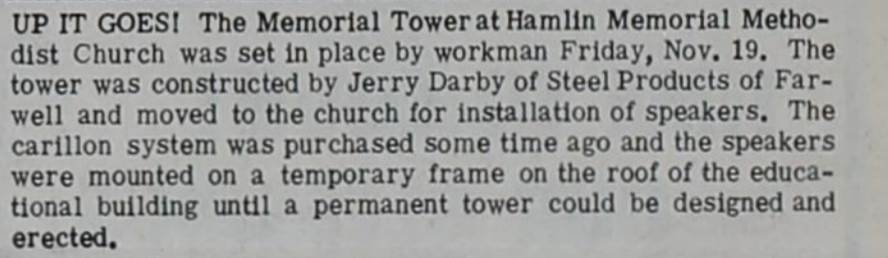
High Plains Underground Water Conservation District met Monday afternoon, Nov. 22, with Parmer County Commissioner's Court to report on a water survey done in Parmer County recently. According to County Judge Archie Tarter, water officials from Lubbock conducted the report.

The board claims that 29 percent of Parmer County's underground water supply has been depleted by irrigation since the last survey in 1940.

Main water source is located north of Black, southwest of Friona and south of Farwell, according to the officials. Three main streams running through Parmer County are located at these sites.

Sprinkler Systems Installed In Parmer County

The new farming methods used today have made new moisture and erosion control practices profitable as more and more sprinkler systems are being installed in Parmer County, according to Herb Evans, district supervisor of Parmer County SCS. This releases farmers from the old problem of having to run their rows downhill. Rows running up and down a hill cause excessive rainfall runoff and erosion. With the new flexibility gained by the use of sprinkler systems, erosion and runoff can be profitably controlled.

Joe Jones, Ed Schilling and Otho Whitefield are three of many farmers who believe that soil and water must be conserved and have installed parallel terraces. They know that parallel terraces can save enough rainfall during a year on a half section of land to equal the output of a six inch well.

These men have seen parallel terraces, liked what they saw, and installed their own. For more information on how you can profit from parallel terraces contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

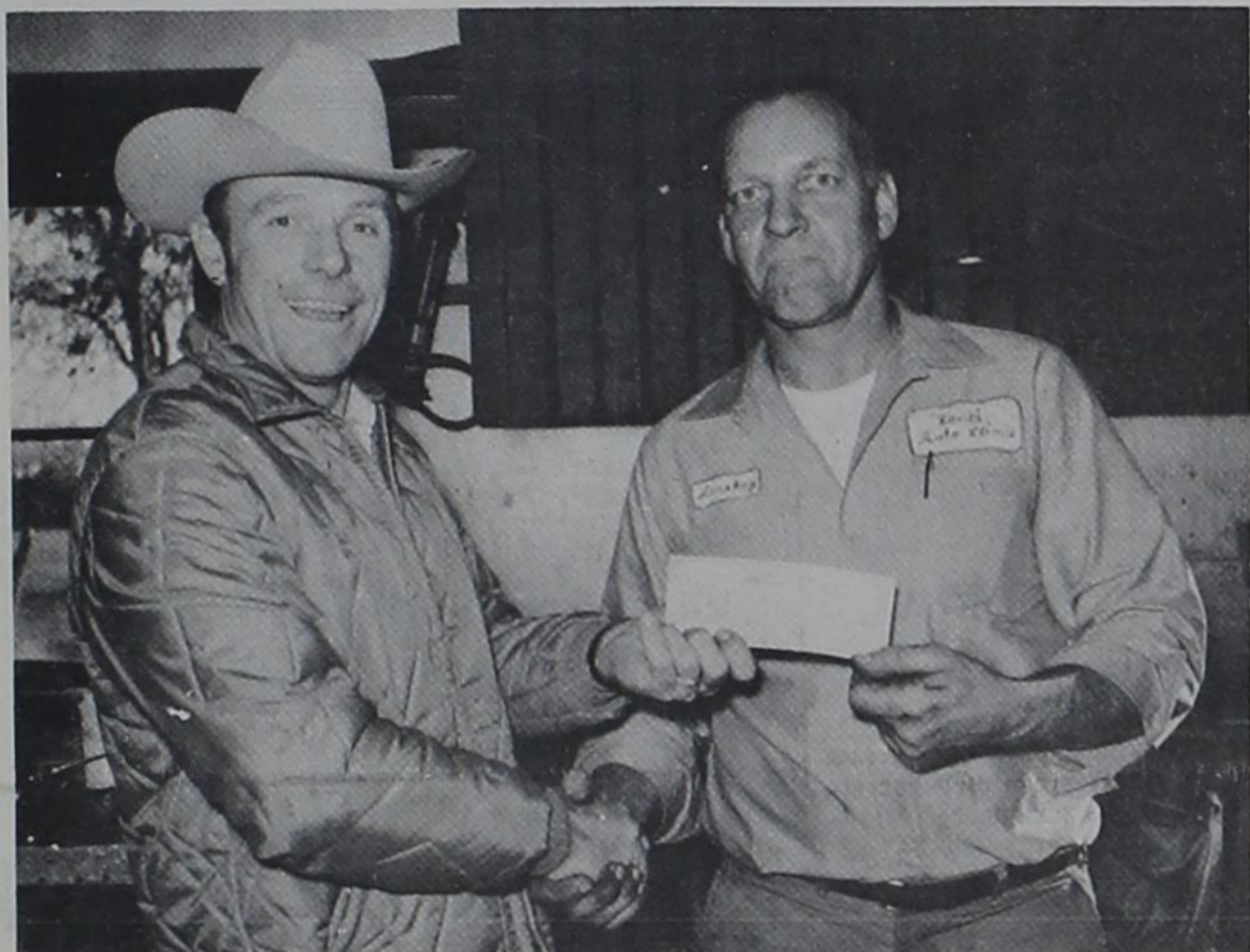

Yellow Jo, a Palomino gold and white Paint filly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Jamison of Lariat, was named national champion in the Paint Filly Halter Class of the 1971 American Paint Horse National Show. The competition was held last month in Tulsa, Okla.

The filly showed against 33 fillies from over the nation. The 1971 Paint Horse national finals included 750 entries with horses coming from 32 states and Canada.

Joy Underhill of Gainesville showed the Jamison horse. She has shown the horse in 15 horse shows since it began competition. To date, Yellow Jo

has won 10 first places, two second places, one third place, a reserve championship, and now, the national championship.

A year old in January, the horse has been judged by 15 different judges and has accumulated 47 points to her credit and has placed no less than third during competition in 1971. According to Jamison, Joy Underhill has Yellow Jo stabled at her place in Gainesville. She plans to show the horse at shows in Denver, Colo., and Fort Worth, San Antonio and Houston in the next three months.

Jamison began showing horses in 1960 and has hand-

led approximately 20 head since then. Two of his horses which have been sold also placed in the National show.

One, Miss Yellowbonnett, a three-year-old mare and full sister to Yellow Jo, placed in the western pleasure class during the National show.

Jamison sold Yellow Jo's sire, Yellow Mount, for \$10,000 in 1966. Yellow Mount is currently in the standing at Iowa Park, Tex. Jamison says Yellow Jo has brought in more honors than any other horse he has shown. He also owns two Paint mares which are not being shown.
