In Organizational Meeting --

Little Dribblers Elect Officers, Make Plans

Approximately 20 interested parents attended an organizational meeting of Little Dribblers, Inc. Thursday night, Feb. 3, in the Security State Bank community room.

Officers for the coming year were elected, Vernon Scott, president; Troy Christian, vice-president; Richard Deel, secretary; and Jerry D. Owen, player agent; were re-elected to the offices which they held last year.

Newly-elected officers are Don Gerles, director; Fred Chandler, in charge of concession stand; and Tally Kelso, in charge of officials.

Deel reported that \$251.65 in donations had been received at the gate during last year's games. Plans were made to form four teams from fifth and sixth grade boys at Farwell Elementary School. Eleven- and twelve-year-olds will be eligible to play in the national tournament which will be held in April at Level-land.

Provisions were made for third and fourth grade boys to sign up for farm teams. These teams will play on the same nights as the Little Dribblers teams. Plans were made to purchase uniforms for these teams.

The group decided that the season should begin on Tuesday Feb. 22, with two farm team games and two Little Dribbler games being played each Tuesday and Thursday nights. Each Saturday morning from 10-12 p.m., workouts will be held.

Purpose of the meeting will be to place boys on teams, says Vernon Scott. Boys who haven't signed up yet but want to play should sign up by Saturday morning, he said.

Varsity basketball players are being asked to coach these teams, according to Scott, but anyone interested in coaching a team is asked to talk with Owen, the player agent.

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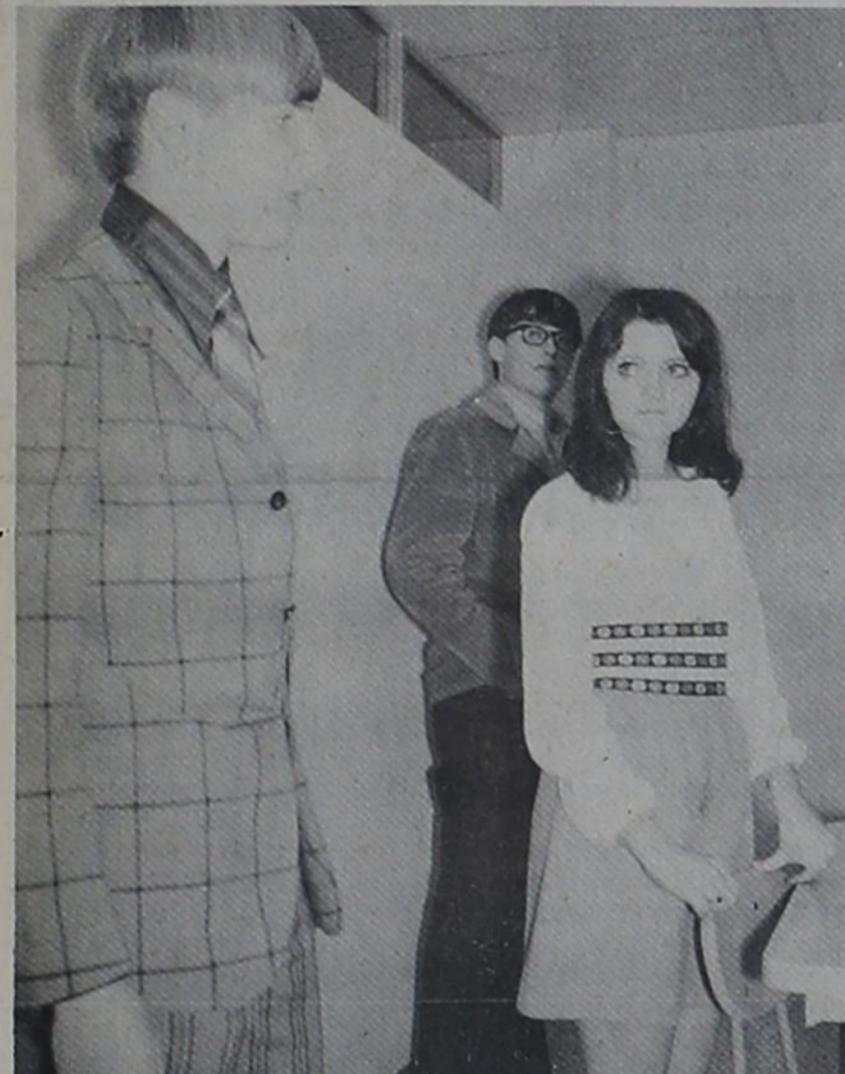

At Texico Elementary --

Voluntary Gym Class Is Very Successful

Take a very active elementary physical education teacher, add several dozen energetic kids and you have the ingredients for a highly successful voluntary gymnastics class that takes place Tuesday through Friday mornings each week at Texico Elementary School beginning at 8:15 a.m. and ending

before school starts at 9 a.m. Last year at this time, Jim Starkey, p.e. teacher at the school, was holding voluntary gym classes for boys in elementary school. This year he decided to include the girls and ended up with 60 children on the first day of class Tuesday, Jan. 25. On the second day, 75 children attended which is al-

most one-third of the total enrollment of 240 students.

The class, which Starkey on his own time, is not part of the school physical education program, but tumbling and other exercises taught in school p.e. classes are also taught in the voluntary class. They include tumbling exercises such as back bends, forward and backward rolls, head stands and hand springs. As the class advances, the children will learn more complicated feats.

Starkey earned his bachelor's degree in physical education at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales in 1956. In 1962 he earned his master's degree in education at the university. He previously taught at La Casita Elementary School in Clovis where he organized gymnastics teams who performed for college gym classes to show the correct techniques of tumbling.

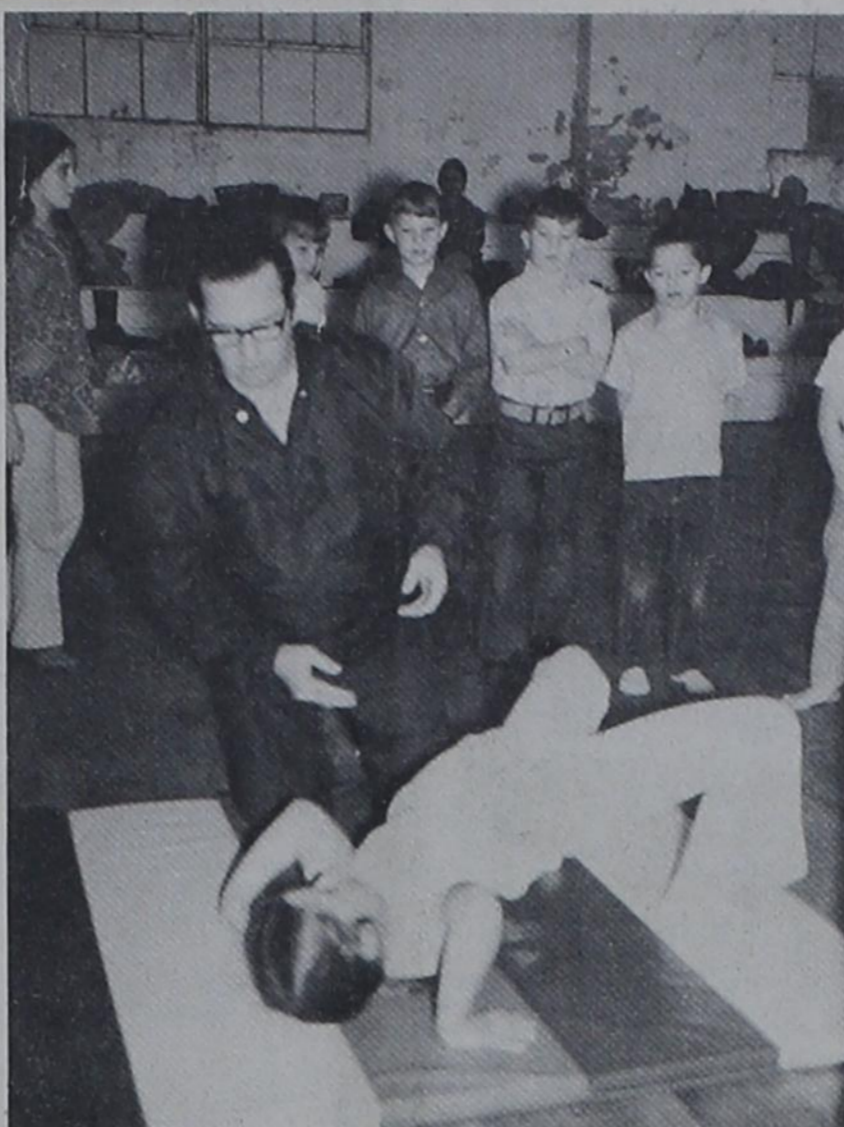
A veteran of the Korean War, Starkey has also been an elementary school principal and served as director of the Job Corp in Albuquerque. As an official, he has refereed several important sports events in New Mexico including all-star basketball games and acted as umpire for the state baseball tournament.

Starkey, who lives in Clovis with his wife and three children, says he enjoys working with the children because he believes gymnastics to be an important part of growing up. He enjoys seeing the satisfaction on the faces of the children when they perform the tricks as they should be done.

Starkey hopes by the end of the school year to organize a team of 20 to 25 children so they can put on programs for the public. Texico Elementary School Principal Jim Rogers says of Starkey, "We are very happy to have him with us. He is one of the finest physical education teachers anywhere."

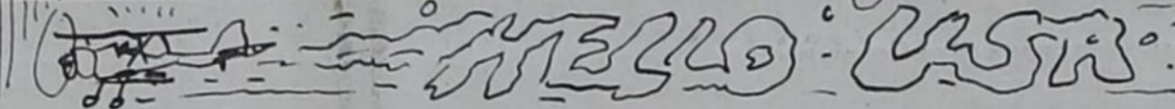

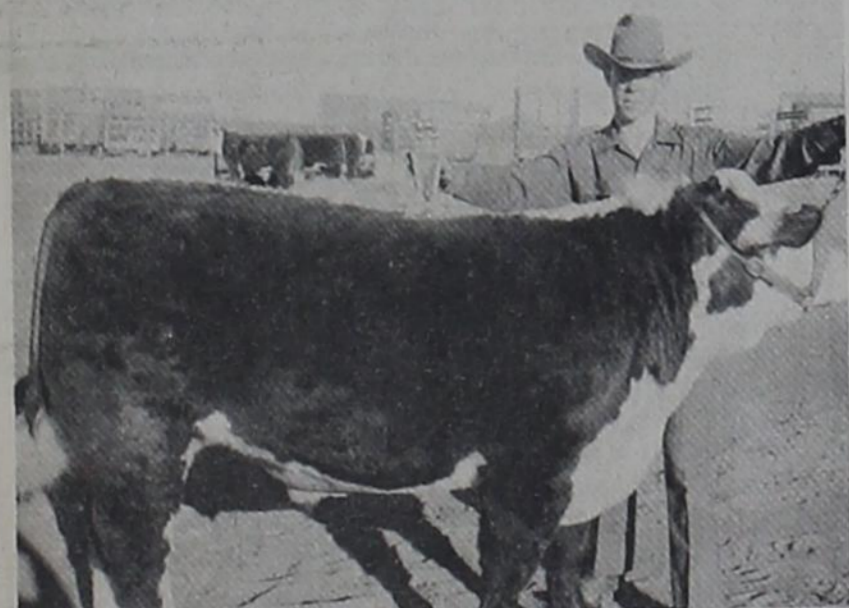
