

Steers 3-A District Champs Again

Defense Is Key --

Battle Lorenzo In Bi-District

Hurrah! The Steers did it again -- won the district basketball championship.

Well we had predicted this turn of events several weeks ago but with the Vega Longhorns leading the Farwell Steers by a point and less than six minutes left in the 14th and final district game, we must admit we felt a twinge of reality that possibly we could have been wrong.

We are sure that at that precise moment the Vega supporters were looking forward to finally winning a 3-A basketball crown, but in the next several seconds the Blue and White kicked the first leg out from under the Longhorns and went on to completely demolish the Vega myth of Class 3-A invincibility.

The playoff series was hard fought, physical and demanding. Coach Vernon Scott provided the leadership and the players responded with two tremendous team efforts to keep the Farwell district win streak at four consecutive championships.

In our four games with Vega, we noted and appreciated the sportsmanship displayed by both groups of boys. In the boiler room of championship play we have observed in the past some teams have come apart and fell victim to frustration and unsportsmanlike conduct. Vega did not and they are worthy of our friendship and continued good feeling. Next year we can shake hands again and come out for another round of thrilling basketball.

Our desks are practically awash with "vital" news releases from the political aspirants in Texas. Generally they extol the virtues of the candidates and proclaim that they are offering themselves on the altar of public duty. We find that they make excellent tinder to start our trash fire in the Tribune Incinerator as well as lining the puppy's convenience box, so all is not lost.

However, through the fog of political oratory, there occasionally bursts a ray of sunshine and refreshing candor. Such a bit of honesty is put forth by one Connie Lawson, candidate for a seat on the Railroad Commission. Lawson has a mad on with the Commission and is running for the post because he feels he has been done "dirty" by the present Commission.

The press release we received states the following: "Lawson is a determined man. Five years ago he sought a permit from the Texas Railroad Commission that would allow him to operate a trucking company he had bought in his hometown of Taylor.

"But the Railroad Commission said no. Lawson would not be serving the 'public convenience and necessity,' the commissioners said.

"Even though the man Lawson bought the trucking outfit from had operated out of Taylor for a number of years under a Railroad Commission permit.

"Even though there is no trucking company located now in Taylor that can move household goods from there to other places in Texas.

"Even though two of the four big moving companies that objected to Lawson getting a permit offered him one of their own permits -- providing Lawson would sign over 15 to 40 per cent of his gross receipts," Unquote.

We don't know all the ramifications of Lawson's hassle with the Railroad Commission and are not prepared to pass judgment on the validity of Lawson's claims, but we are impressed from two standpoints. First, here is a candidate who has a mad on and wants to do something about it. Most people today caught in the web of bureaucracy roll over and play dead. Secondly, here is a man fighting the Railroad Commission which has the same membership that practically eliminated railroad passenger service in Texas. This automatically puts us in his corner.

Lawson also mentions a cute trick we had missed. He notes that every time an incumbent Commissioner comes up for re-election he manages to run as the Commission Chairman. Neat huh?

Farwell Steers sweated out a best two-out-of-three playoff series with Vega Friday and Monday night to come up District 3-A champions for the fourth consecutive year.

The Steers, who had 40 consecutive district wins under their belt when they met up with Vega during the first half of district play, were stymied by the Longhorns. Not a group to be put down, the team coached by Vernon Scott, returned to defeat Vega in their last district and season game requiring a playoff for district.

Scott, who has been coaching the Steers since 1964 as head basketball coach, has seen his team win district titles seven times in the last nine years. They won in 1964, 1965, 1967, 1969, 1970, 1971 and again became champs this year.

Not only have the Steers captured the district title since 1964, but they laid claim to it 11 times in the past 14 years.

An even more impressive record is the amount of district wins the team has compiled over the years. The record now stands at 47 out of the last 48 district games or one district loss in 50 if the playoff games are counted.

The Steers are now preparing for their bi-district bout with 4-A district champion

Lorenzo. The game will be played Tuesday, Feb. 22, at 7:30 p.m. in the new gymnasium at Wayland College in Plainview. The new gym is located on the campus.

Farwell will be the home team. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for students.

The Steers will play a practice game with Spearman Thursday (tonight) at 7:30 p.m. at the West Texas State University field house in Canyon.

Defense was the name of the game both Friday night and Monday night as the Steers befuddled Vega's attempts to gain the district title.

Friday night the Steers trampled over the Longhorns 59-42 by gaining an early lead which widened the margin of scoring between the two teams to 21 points at one time during the game.

Farwell carried a 14-5 lead over Vega in the first quarter of play. They were leading 30-15 by the end of the first half. At the end of the third quarter, Farwell led 41-25 finishing with a 59-42 score when the final buzzer rang.

Brett Hargrove scored 16 points and Kevin Hardage scored 15 points for Farwell. Scott commented, "We played a super ball game Friday night.

We played the best basketball we've played all year."

The Steers clinched the district title Monday night in Vega beating the Longhorns 47-43 in a spine-chilling game which had the fans sitting on the edges of their seats.

Vega led in scoring 12-10 at the end of the first quarter, but the Steers had the game tied up 21-21 when the first half was over.

Farwell made their move in the third quarter of play ripping past Vega 34-29. Although Vega scored several points in the fourth quarter, Farwell's defenders refused to give them the sweet taste which victory gives and crushed their hopes of playing a third playoff game.

Brett Hargrove scored 20 points and Kevin Hardage scored 11 for Farwell. Scott said, "This was a very hard game. We didn't play well, but we played hard. David Dannheim came off the bench to do a super job for us." Farwell's strong point besides defense, is its bench. All the men on the 10-man squad are well-rounded basketball players. All of the team members win and lose as a team, said Scott.

"We faced elimination four weeks ago, but we finally won. It was really difficult to beat one team three times in seven days, but our team did it. We're glad it's over now," he added.

County Stock Show Is This Weekend

The 16th annual Parmer County Livestock Show will start today, Friday, Feb. 18, in the Friona Bus Barn. The show is co-sponsored by Friona Young Farmers and the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show Association.

Future Farmers of America chapter members and 4-H Club members from four schools in Parmer County -- Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie -- will be participating in the show.

Youngsters will be challeng-

ing Lazbuddie's outstanding record of entering the Grand Champion Barrow for 11 consecutive years, and 14 years in the last 18.

Dwain Menefee and Larry "Butch" Fairchild of Friona are co-chairmen of the show. Redge Priest of Friona is superintendent of the steer show, assisted by Calvin Meissner of Farwell and Phillip Weatherly of Friona. Darrell Mason of Lazbuddie and Johnny Miller of Friona are in charge of the sheep show. Joe Tarter is chairman of the barrow show.

Barrows will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. Friday (today). Sheep judging begins at 1:30 p.m. Friday. Steers will

be judged beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Trophies and rosettes will be awarded to top animals courtesy of the Parmer County Farm Bureau. Showmanship awards are given in each of the show's three divisions.

An auction sale of all of the top animals will be held beginning at 1 p.m. Saturday. The sale annually ranks among much larger shows for the gross amount, exceeding \$40,000 the past few years.

Judging the sheep and barrow shows will be Jerry Stockton of Frenship High School, Justin McBride, Deaf Smith County agricultural agent, will judge the steers.

Texico-Farwell residents are reminded that a dog clinic will be held Friday, Feb. 18, from 1 to 5 p.m. CST in Friona City Hall. Dr. B. L. Russell, veterinarian, will be giving rabies shots.

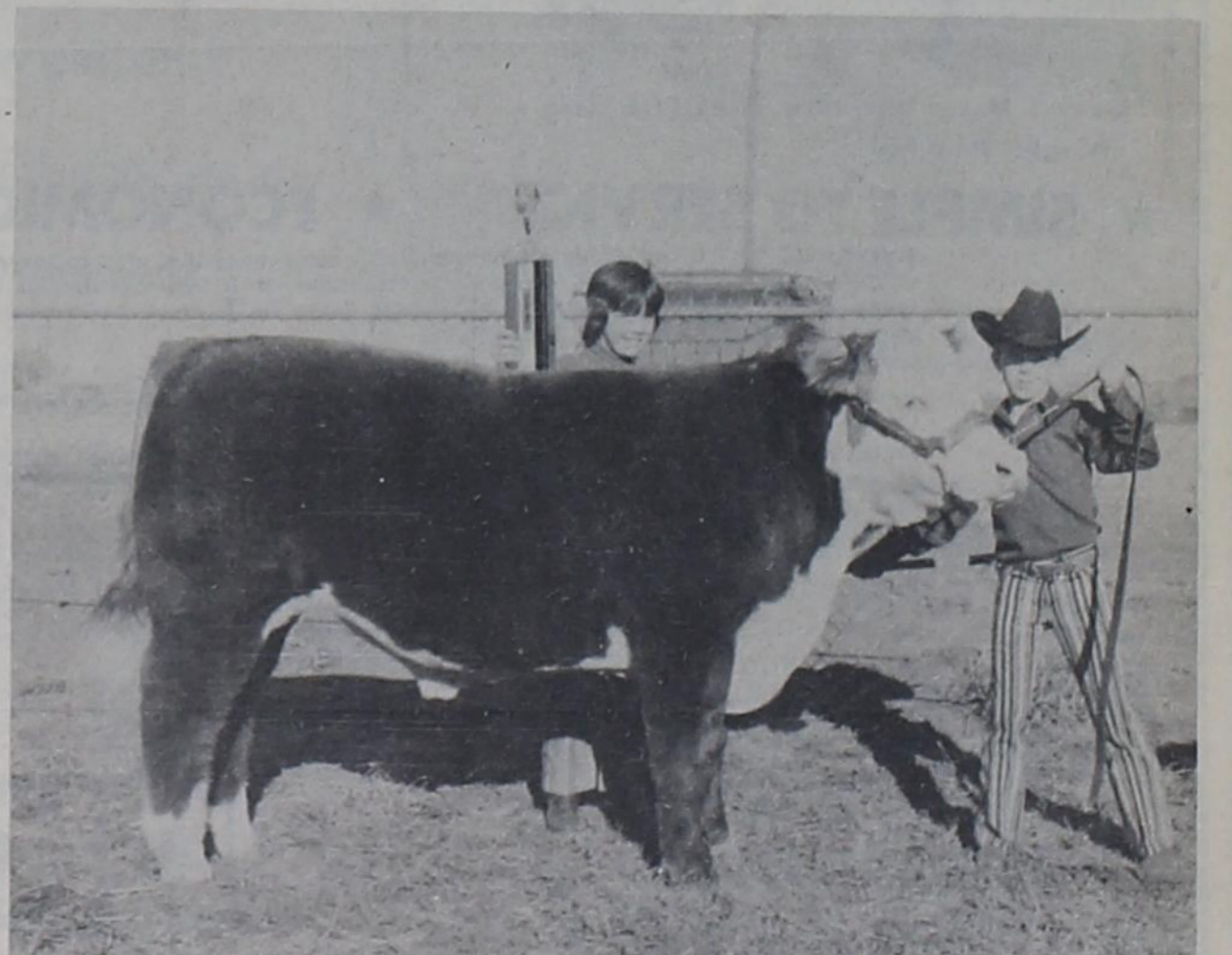

The program was sponsored by Parmer County Home Demonstration Clubs. At this time the women from Lubbock are planning to return Thursday, April 6, and Thursday, April 12, at 7 p.m. to present workshop sessions on construction of men's knit pants and sport coats in the Community Room of the First State Bank in Bovina.

The first session will be for men's pants at a cost of \$6 per person. The session on the 13th will be on sport coats at a cost of \$7 per person.

Any interested person in the county is invited to attend either one or both sessions, as we must have a minimum of 20 enrolled to hold a class.

The sessions will be from 3 to 3 1/2 hours in length with a fabric store representative demonstrating various construction techniques. She will also bring special sewing equipment and notions for sewing on knits and manuals of sewing tips and instructions for knit sewing, which may be purchased at the workshop.

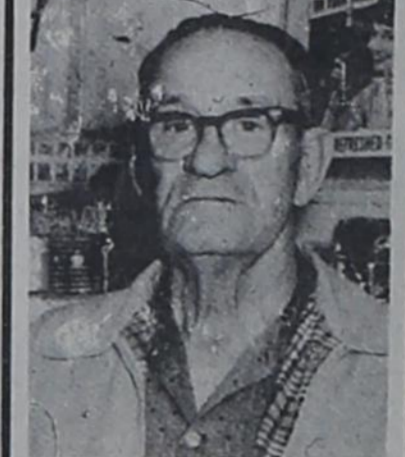

Smaller doses of radiation inhibit the sprouting of potatoes and onions. And this treatment costs less than one cent for 100 pounds of potatoes. Radiation treatments can also slow the ripening of bananas, tomatoes and papayas.

Preserving foods by irradiation

tion is such a new process that the U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has to approve each new food before it may be marketed. It's predicted, however, that by the end of the 70's, a large number of foods preserved by radiation treatment will be approved for marketing in the United States.

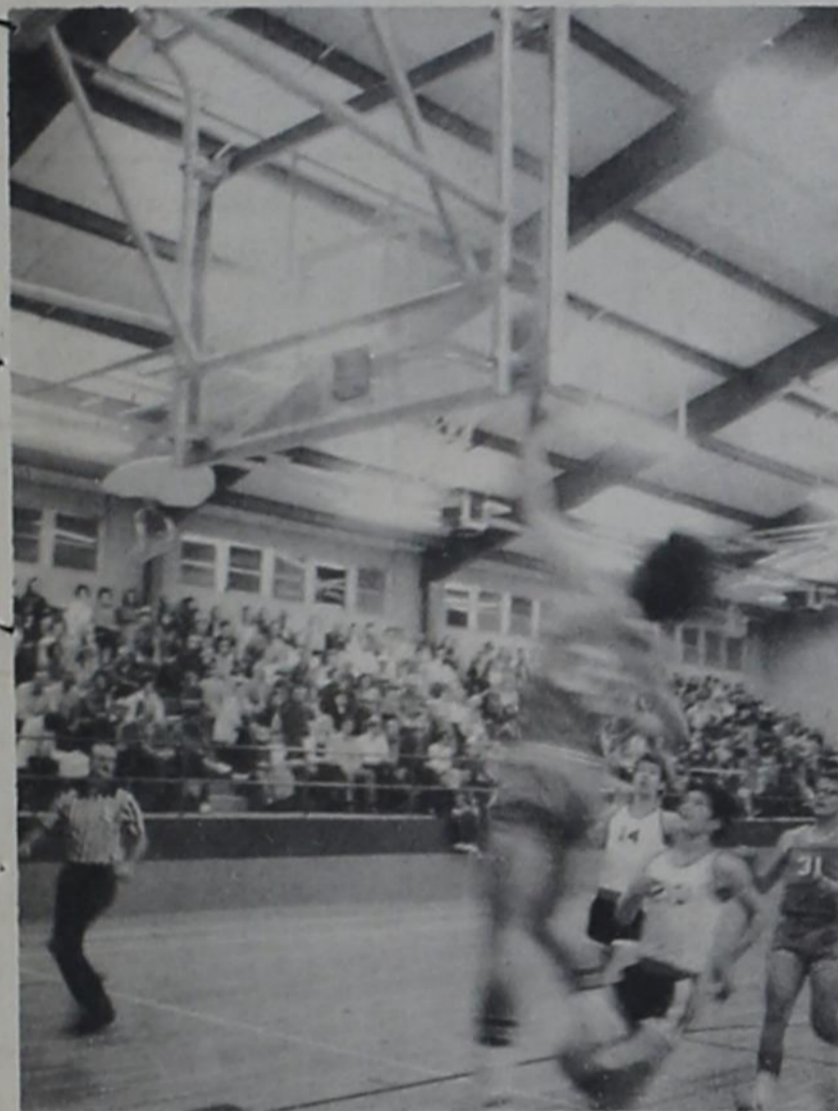

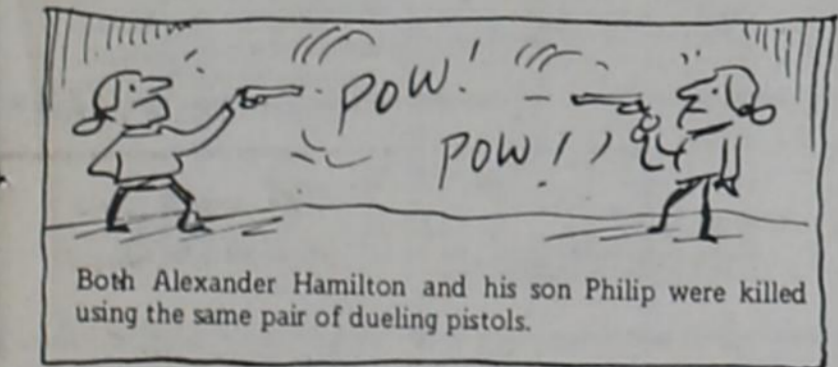
