## Wolverines Advance To Regional Tourney

Texico Wolverines won the right to advance to the regional tournament in Tucumcari, which was to start Wednesday, when they won second place in the District 6-AA Tournament in Portales.

The Wolverines are scheduled to play San Jon Thursday (tonight) at 8:15 p.m. MST, San Jon won third place in District 7-AA.

If the Wolverines win their first game, they will then play the winner of the Santa Rosa-Elida clash which is to be played prior to the Wolverines' first game. The second game will be played Friday at 8:15 p.m. MST. "We've got to get by San Jon first in order to get anywhere in regional, we beat them earlier in the season, but they've come a long way. It will be a tough game," said Coach Bucky Walters.

The Wolverines slid past Causey in their first tournament game Wednesday night, Feb. 23, in a low-scoring defensive game. Texico won the tilt 39-30.

Terry Yell and Curtis Lindley were both in double figures for Texico with 14 and 10 points, Joe Gardner made 15 points for Causey. Texico took an early lead, scoring 14 points to Causey's four in the first quarter of play. Causey rallied in the second quarter and was trailing only by four points at the end of the first half, 18-14.

Both teams scored eight points in the third quarter, but Texico surged ahead in the last quarter to score 13 points to Causey's eight, giving them a 39-30 win.

In their second game on Thursday with Elida, the Wolverines were involved in a scoring struggle which allowed them only two points over their opponent in the last quarter of play.

The final score was 52-50.

Again Terry Yell was high pointer for Texico with 20. There were two men in double figures for Elida, John Rains with 24 points and Barry Lambirth with 12.

Playing a game of "switcheroo" the Wolverines could manage only a one-point lead by the end of the first quarter, 11-10. Both teams scored 15 points in the second quarter adding to the tension of the game.

Texico widened the gap in the third quarter with a three-point lead, 38-35, although Elida kept up their fight until the last minute. Texico tacked on 14 more points in the fourth quarter to Elida's 15 to slip past them, 52-50.

The Wolverines slayed Tatum in their third tournament game on Friday with a 46-27 win. Doug Harrison scored 16 points as Texico's high pointer. Martin made seven points for Tatum.

Texico whipped through the game with a 11-4 lead at the end of the first quarter, a 25-10 lead at halftime and a 35-21 lead at the end of third quarter. In the home stretch of the fourth quarter, Texico tacked on another 11 points while Tatum only scored six for a 46-27 Wolverine victory.

During their fourth and final game of the tournament on Saturday, the Wolverines began to show their fatigue when they met No. 1 ranked Ft. Sumner.

Ft. Sumner stopped the Wolverines from winning the tournament by beating them 60-38. Terry Yell with 21 points and Doug Harrison with 10 points were Texico's double figure men. Terry Sweet, 23 points; Martinez, 11; and Shaw, 10 were high scorers for Ft. Sumner.

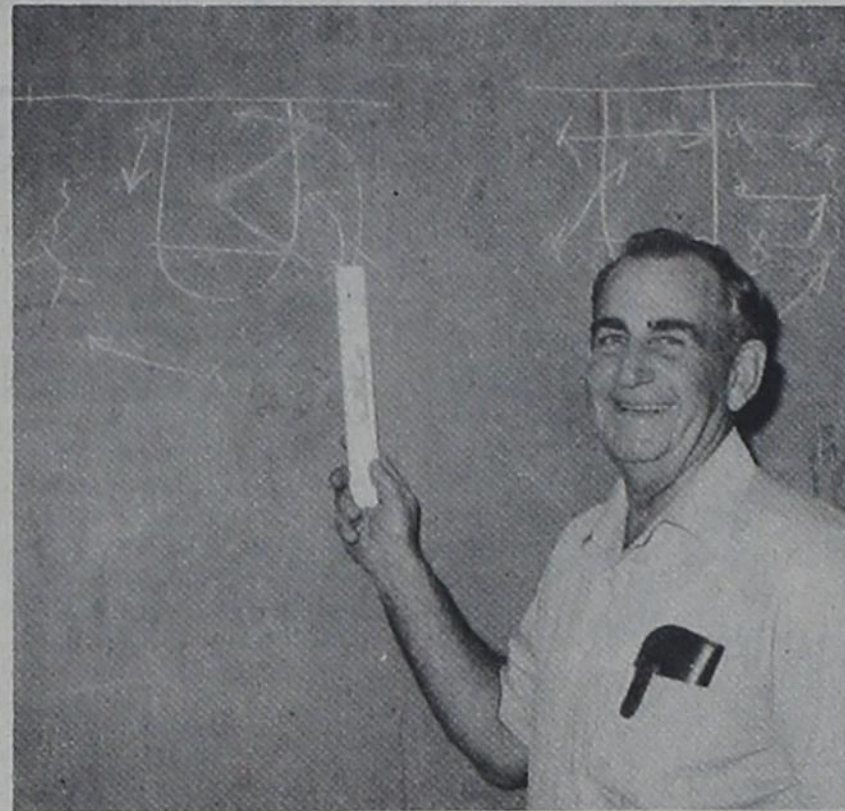
By the end of the first quarter...

ter, Ft. Sumner held only a slight lead over Texico, 10-7, but the Wolverines failed to keep up. By the end of the half, Ft. Sumner was leading 26-15. Unable to make a comeback the Wolverines trailed 41-25 by the end of the third quarter. In the fourth quarter Ft. Sumner scored 19 points to Texico's 13 defeating the Green and White with a 60-38 score.

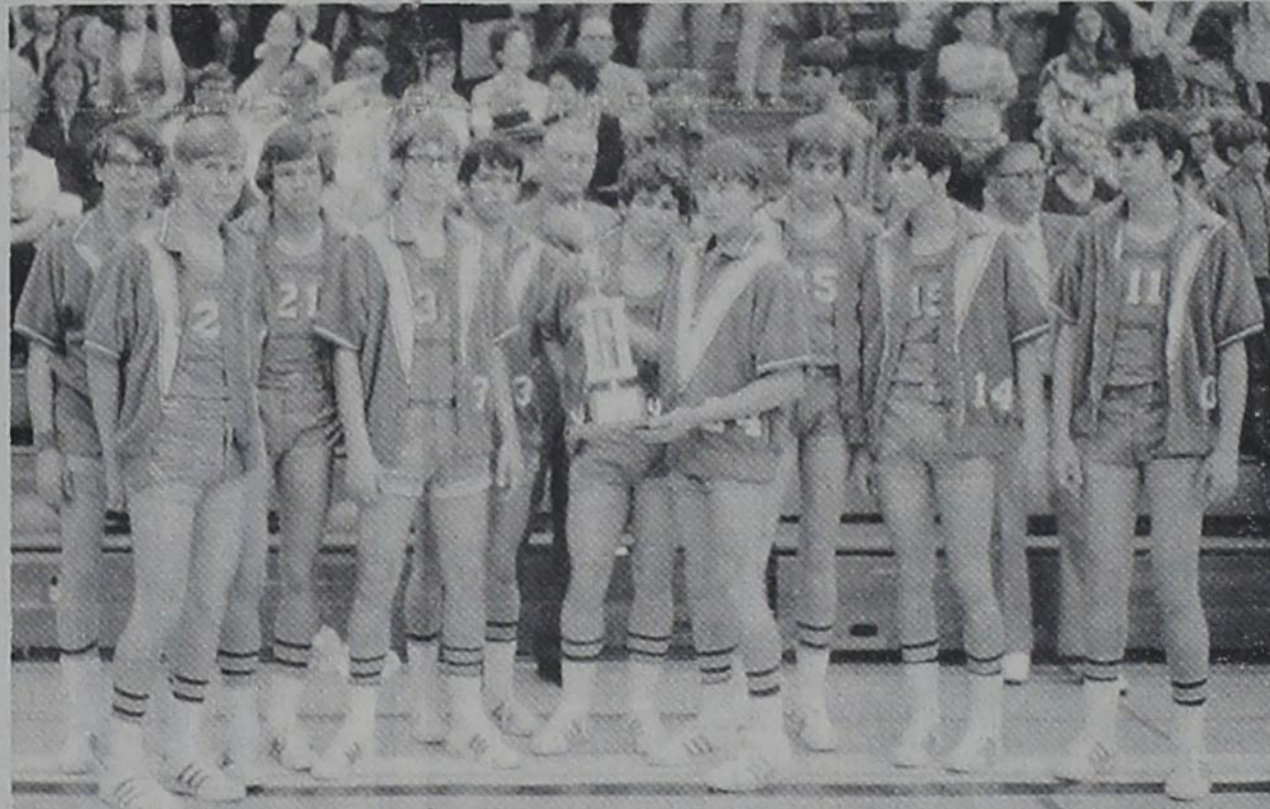
Coach Bucky Walters said, "We played well all during the tournament, but we were tired that last game. We started out well in the first quarter, but we let them get to us bad throughout the rest of the game."

Ft. Sumner played its first and only tournament game against Texico since the team was seeded first.

"The tournament itself was very exciting with three games going into overtime and one into double overtime. Tatum had the poorest record of any of the teams in the district, but they ended up in third place. They won their first tournament game over Dora, who was seeded second," the coach added.

## Sanford-Fritch Stops Farwell

Farwell Steers' bid for the Class A basketball championship of Region I and a chance to advance to the state finals was abruptly stopped Saturday night in Lubbock when Sanford-Fritch defeated the Steers 63-59.

Farwell sailed past Petrolia during their first bout Saturday morning in the regional tournament. The Steers led Petrolia pass them only one time during the game. Petrolia held a one point lead, 51-50, with 7:05 to go in the fourth quarter.

Otherwise, the Steers stamped the Pirates, leading 17-9 at the end of the first quarter, 32-28 at the half and 50-46 at the end of the third quarter. Only seconds after the Pirates held their slight edge in the fourth quarter, the Steers bombarded the board with points to win the game with a 73-65 score.

Brett Hargrove amassed 27 points against Petrolia and had 21 rebounds. Kevin Harbage scored 15 points, Larry Erwin and David Dannheim, 10 each; Kevin Hargrove, nine; and Randy Gregory, two for Farwell. Darrie Massie scored 30 points for Petrolia.

Coach Vernon Scott said, "We played a good ball game against Petrolia." In their final tournament game with Sanford-Fritch,

semifinal winner over Seagraves, the Steers ran into trouble. The Eagles darted out in front of the Steers 17-15 in the first quarter. By the end of the half, they had widened the gap to 33-27.

The Steers, not an easy team to discourage, kept the Eagles from gaining more than a six-point lead by the end of the third quarter, although they did have an 11-point lead at one time during the game.

In the fourth quarter Farwell rallied as they have done in the last several games of the struggle to obtain the district crown and the bi-district title. With 2:24 left in the game, Sanford-Fritch led 59-49, but the Steers rapidly began to narrow the gap. However, time ran out and as the final buzzer sounded, Larry Erwin ripped the basket with the final two points for Farwell. The Eagles had finished their kill to win the Region I Class A championship and a chance at the state title with the score of 63-59.

Named to the Class A All-Tournament team were Brett Hargrove of Farwell who led the balloting, Darrie Massie of Petrolia, Mike Cayce of Seagraves, and Mike Dunham and Bob Dennis, both of Sanford-Fritch.

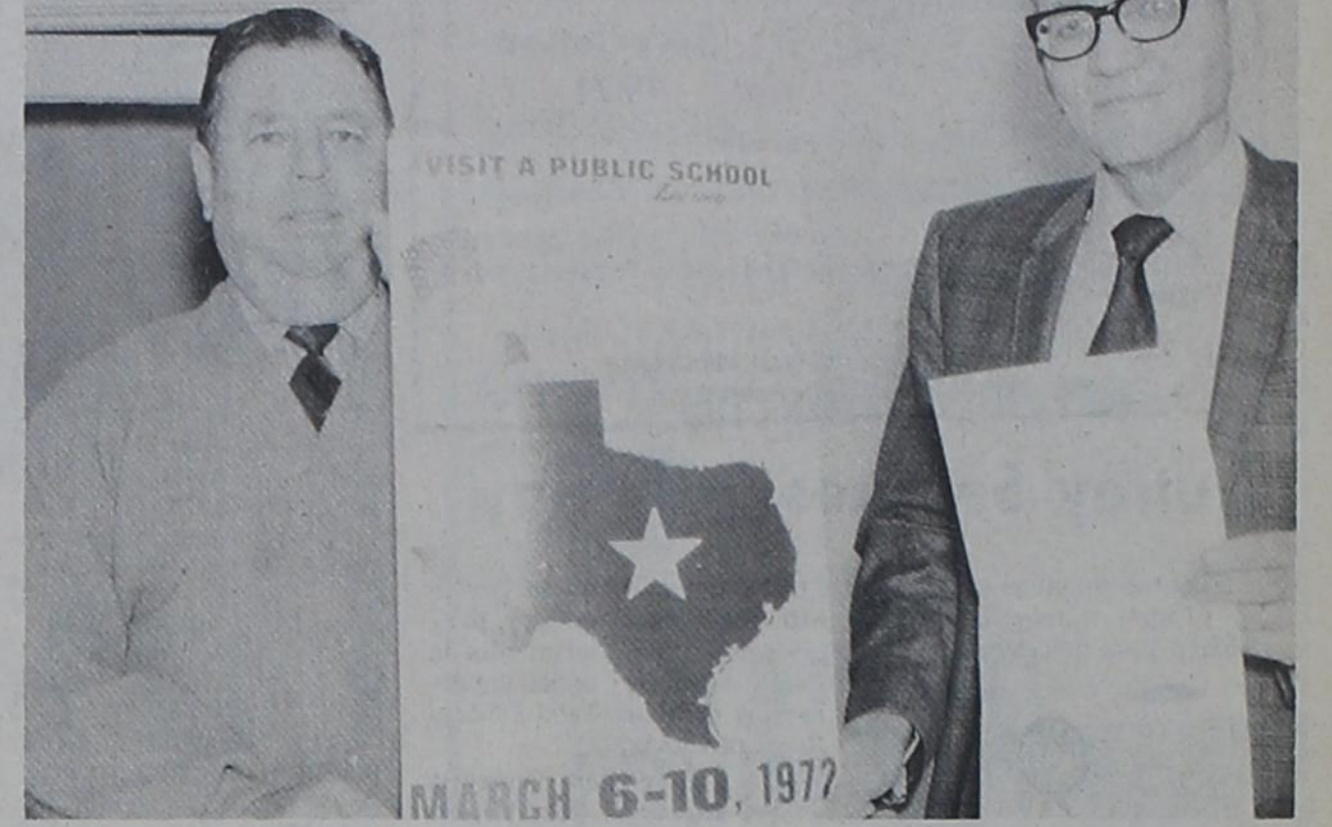
Fritch is a very good team. They beat us, and we wish them the best of luck in the finals," said Scott.

"Our five seniors, Brett Hargrove, Larry Erwin, Rod Johnston, Randy Gregory and Mike Travis, have been directly responsible for what success we have had. Their leadership and character have been very important to our team. It will be difficult to fill those five pairs of shoes," he said.

"Thank goodness for next year. We are very anxious to begin again. We are looking forward to playing as hard to gether next year as we did this year," he added.

Scott said the Steers received several letters and communications from area schools prior to the tournament which were expressing the Steers' fine sportsmanship and a hope that the team would go "all the way." Scott specifically mentioned a letter from Lorenzo, their bi-district opponent, and the support of Lorenzo fans in the stands Saturday and their visits to the dressing rooms. "We really appreciate the compliments we received and the support which was given," he said.

Farwell also received the nets from Vega after winning the district title.

The difference is that the Steers' season is now over but the Texico townsfolk can cheer for their team as they play in the New Mexico Regional Tournament.

When it comes to sports, there is just no place like the Twin Cities. Aren't you glad you live here?

Careful, careful, careful! Have you noticed how many grass fires we have had lately? You haven't! Well ask your neighborhood fireman; he can tell you.

The standard of culture in communist nations has been reduced to a stereotyped plot. It revolves around a boy meets girl, boy inspires girl, girl inspires boy and both dash off and exceed their farm or factory working quotas. We just love to get a good mad on before we go to bed, when our ulcers are acting up we sleep better, so to flagellate ourselves we watched this predictable farce as it unfolded for a nauseous audience. Sure enough, at the end, the dedicated, understanding liberal hero philosophized by saying that love of country was not bad, only when carried to the extreme. Guess who was the extremist.

The plot, if it could be graced with the term, could have had one of several settings. For example: The kindly, dedicated judge could have been of conservative persuasion. The villain could have been a man-of-the-cloth activist or pinko who framed, or shot as it has been done in real life, the dedicated and conservative jurist.

**Cub Scouts Honored At Blue And Gold Banquet**

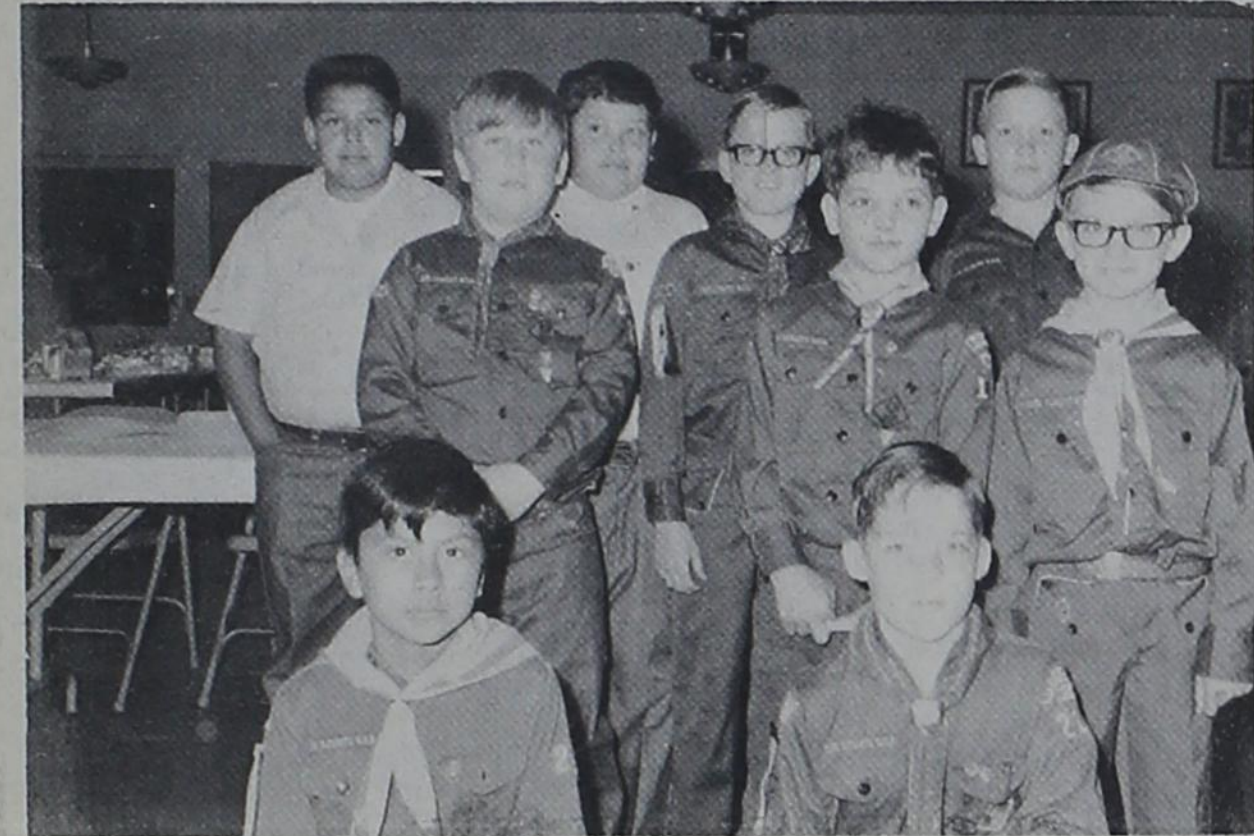

### TOLL HOUSE COOKIES

- 1 1/2 c. sifted flour
  - 1 t. soda
  - 1 t. salt
  - 1 c. shortening
  - 3/4 c. brown sugar (packed)
  - 3/4 c. granulated sugar
  - 2 eggs (unbeaten)
  - 1 t. hot water
  - 1 c. pecans
  - 1 pkg. chocolate chips
  - 2 c. oatmeal (uncooked)
  - 1 t. vanilla
- Sift flour, soda and salt. Cream shortening and add sugar gradually. Beat until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each. Add hot water and vanilla. Add dry ingredients

and mix thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls on greased cookie sheet and bake 8-10 minutes at 375 degrees.

### MEXICAN CANDY

- 2 c. brown sugar
  - 1 T. butter
  - pinch of salt
  - 1/2 c. rich milk
  - 1 c. pecans
- Cook sugar, butter, salt and milk until it forms a soft ball in water, stirring constantly until it boils. When done, add nuts and beat until creamy. Drop by spoonfuls on waxed paper.

### REFRIGERATOR SWIRL COOKIES

- 1/2 c. butter or oleo
  - 1/4 c. sugar
  - 1/4 c. brown sugar (packed)
  - 1 egg
  - 1 3/4 c. flour
  - 1/4 t. soda
  - 1/4 t. salt
  - 3/4 t. vanilla
- Cream butter, sugars and vanilla -- beat in egg. Combine dry ingredients and add gradually to creamed mixture. Chill about an hour. Divide in half and roll into rectangles about 6 X 12 inches. Spread with filling, roll and chill. Bake 8-10 minutes at 375 degrees.

### FILLING:

- 2/3 c. instant cocoa mix
  - 1/3 c. pecans (finely chopped)
  - 1 T. sugar
  - 1/4 c. oleo (melted)
- Mix well.

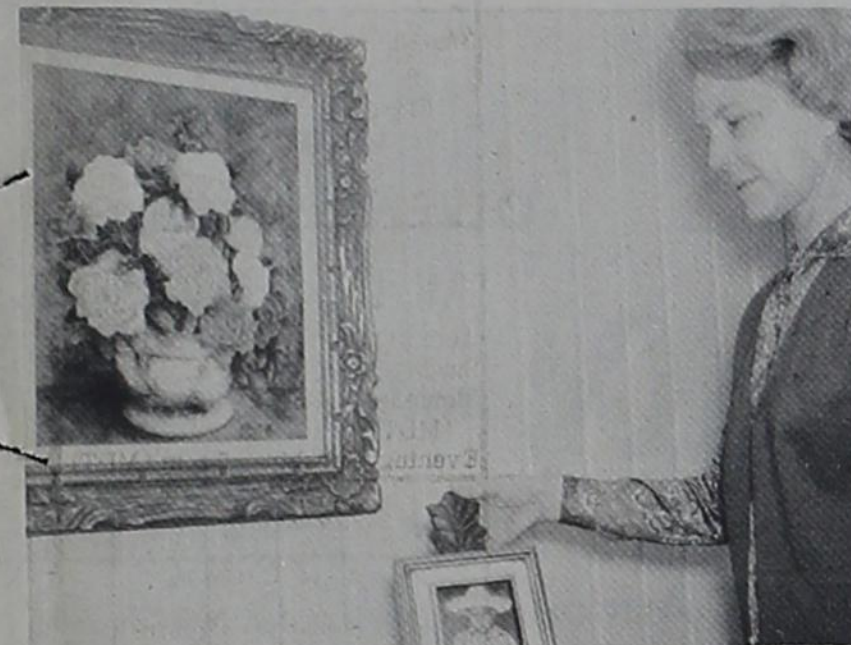
