'Girl Scouts Together' That Is Their Creed

The Girl Scouts will be celebrating their 60th national anniversary as well as a local anniversary of five years this month. A special activity for the local Girl Scouts is visitation to local civic clubs and attendance at Farwell Church of Christ morning worship services Sunday.

As Girl Scout Week (March 12-18) approaches, the local troops find themselves busily preparing for their annual Parent-Scout Banquet March 25 and working on Girl Scout cookie sales.

They are planning a special activity during the week which will be visitation to all civic clubs in the Twin Cities to explain Scouting and relate their various activities. They will also attend church services on Sunday, March 12, at Farwell Church of Christ.

Girl Scout Week is set aside each year to celebrate the birthday of national Girl Scouting. This year, Girl Scouts across the nation will be celebrating the 60th anniversary of the first Girl Scout meeting in the United States held by Juliet Gordon Lowe.

The local Senior, Cadette, Junior and Brownie troops will be celebrating their fifth anniversary on May 20, 1972. There are 61 girls currently registered in the local program with 15 adult leaders.

For the first time in local history, a Senior Girl Scout

troop is active, completing the family of Girl Scouting in the community. These Seniors have been busy this year with a Welcome Wagon for newcomers to the community. They served soft drinks at the Parmerton Historic Marker dedication.

They have also taken part in all Scouting projects for the community. Three of the Senior scouts, Pam Nance, Kittle Warren and Jaquetta Crook, have been selected to go to "Our Cabana" in Mexico. The residential center is owned and operated by the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts.

The Senior girls are presently working on Interest Patches, Panorama is their first choice as a troop activity. Panorama touches on the other Interest Patches. The Seniors are also active members of the Senior Planning Board to plan council-wide senior activities.

Cadette Troop 109 has been busy this past year working on badges and challenges. They gave a special party for the

Junior troop and presented its members with a scrapbook depicting the history of the troop.

They gave a baby shower for their leader, Mrs. Charles Aycock, planning games, refreshments and invitations. These activities helped the girls on requirements to achieve a Social Dependability Challenge.

At the present time, the girls are working on Emergency Preparedness Challenge and looking forward to a council-sponsored trip to the Texas capitol building in Austin.

Junior Troop 121 made tray favors this past year for Mule-shoe Nursing Home which they delivered personally and visited with persons living in the home. The troop members are planning an outdoor camp-out in a few months.

In preparing for the camp-out, they held an "overnight" so that they would get experience in shopping and cooking for a large group. Making "vagabond stoves" and cooking on them, the girls learned outdoor skills.

Girls working on the Dabblers badge made hand puppets, while girls working on the Drawing and Painting badge did watercolor paintings. To com-

plete requirements on a World Games badge, the troop hosted a party for a Bovina Junior Troop.

Brownie Troop 143 worked on several projects during the past year including making a "Brownie Helper Can" to store parts of their Brownie uniform. The project, along with a "wise old owl" hanger, were to help the Brownies keep their rooms clean.

The troop made hospital favors during the Thanksgiving holidays and hosted a Valentine party for special guests. The most important activity accomplished by the troop this year was learning the flag ceremony.

Each week the Brownie meeting is opened with the flag ceremony. The girls learn how to carry, fold, store and in all ways to care for the flag.

Not only does each troop in Girl Scouting have its own activities, the local girl scouts live up to their creed by working together to improve their community.

Projects in which all the troops worked together include cleaning up the baseball park before the All-Star games, designing and creating the first prize float in the Border Town Days parade, engineering a clean-up campaign in which the girls picked up litter around the Farwell Post Office and city park.

Seeing a need for more trash barrels, the girls obtained 10 barrels which they cleaned and painted before distributing in the park. Christmas caroling was another of the many activities which the local girl scouts enjoyed doing together.

Turnbough Wins Mayoral Election

Seventy-five ballots were cast in Texico's city election held Tuesday, M. E. Turnbough gathered 31 votes to become Texico's new mayor.

Write-in candidate Howard Billingsley proved to be a strong contender for the mayorship by acquiring 27 votes. Outgoing mayor, Perry Winkles, who was not on the ballot for re-election, received part of the vote as a write-in candidate with 12 supporters.

A total of 70 votes went to the position of mayor, while 138

votes were cast in the trustee election. Here again, write-in candidate Perry Winkles captured 11 votes.

Bill Thigpen and Bill Christian received strong support in their bids for the two trustee terms that were open. Thigpen received 57 votes, while

Christian tallied 55, Charles A. Bourlon got 15 of the trustee votes.

Sam N. Lewis was named again to the municipal judgeship by a total of 53 votes. Norma Lee Sanders received seven votes as a write-in candidate for the position.

Absentee Voting To Start On March 13

Absentee balloting for school trustees in both Farwell and Lazbuddie Independent School Districts will begin on Monday, March 13. Two trustees will be chosen in each district to fill positions of members whose terms are expiring. The elections will be held Saturday, April 1.

Absentee balloting for the Farwell election will be held in the Parmar County clerk's office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day until March 28. Bonnie Warren will serve as absentee clerk.

Absentee balloting for the Lazbuddie election will be held in the school superintendent's office from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. each day until March 31. Mrs. Murrell Johns will serve as absentee clerk.

The terms of Harry Sheets and Donald Watkins are expiring on the Farwell School Board of Trustees. Names of those persons who are seeking to fill the two vacancies are Charles Aycock, Don Gerles, Leamon Stancell, Donald Watkins, Walter Hughes and Waverly F. Coates. Wendol Christian is seeking the position of county trustee at large.

Heald Urges --

VEE Vaccine Should Be Administered

Horseowners throughout Texas are urged to "get the jump" on VEE (Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis), that deadly sleeping sickness of horses, says Parmar County Agricultural Agent Mack Heald.

"All horses that were not vaccinated last year should be vaccinated as soon as possible," he urges. It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path.

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules and donkeys) not vaccinated last year. In addition to Texas, the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated "high risk" states by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, says Heald.

There are four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now -- (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the state; (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive; (3) foals vaccinated under six months of age; (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So, it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes which transmit the disease emerge in the warm months ahead, he says.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer. If there is some doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, Heald says it is best to vaccinate again.

There were two puppy classes and the terrier won its class and then won out over the winner of the other puppy class. This is the first time the dog has ever been showed.

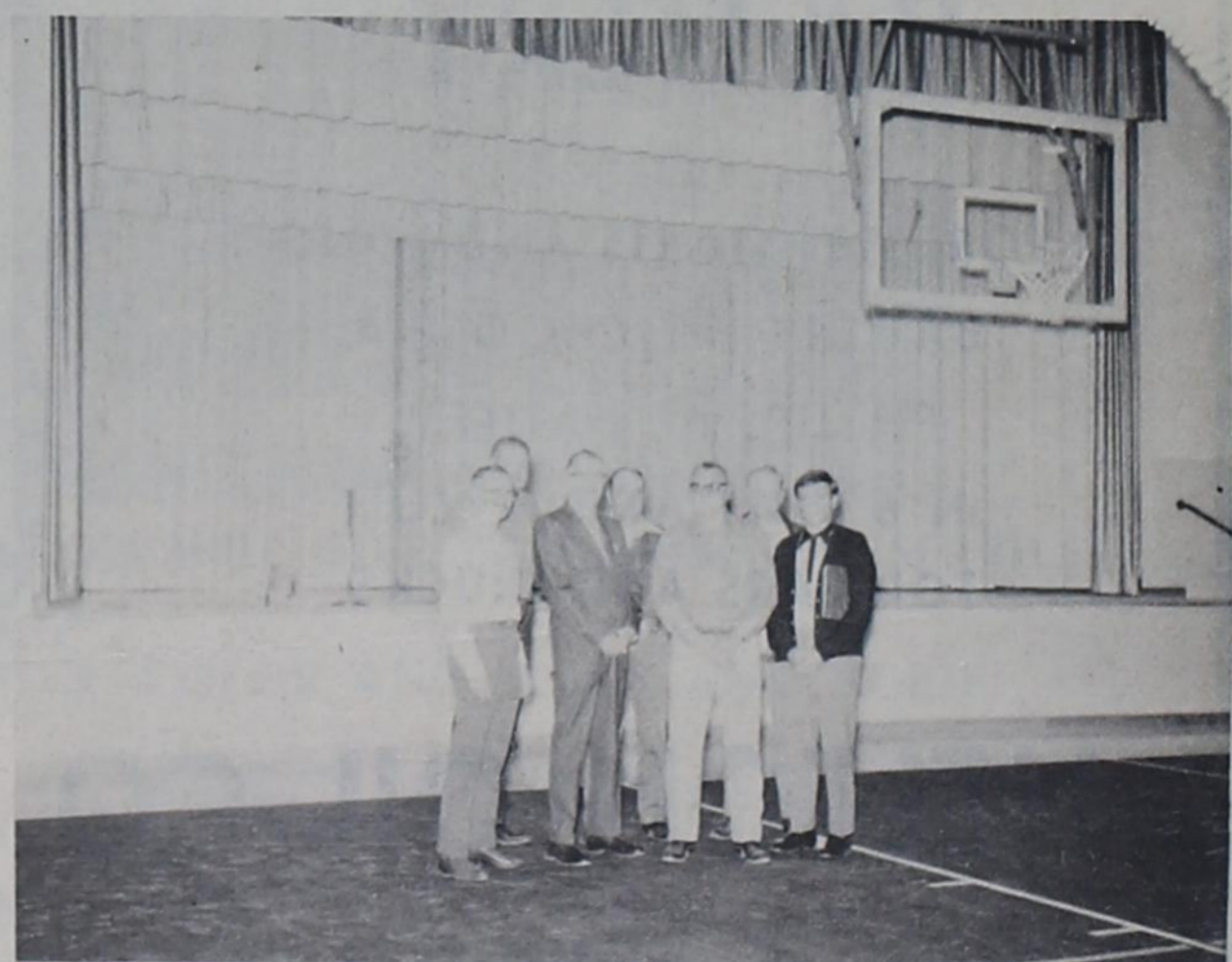
Mother of the puppy is Champion Wagtails Highland Mist which has won many shows and is owned by the Johnsons.

Dogs are a man's best friend; well, up to a point. This point seems to have been reached by several homeowners in town lately. The male dog's well-known proclivity for frequent and indiscriminate relief is apparently taking a toll of some of our better kept arbors and flower beds.

This is not a new complaint for those who earnestly strive for a better kept lawn. This question of the family friend running loose is one that is hard to solve. Most dog owners, and we are one, feel that a person can lie, cheat or steal from them, but don't, oh don't, kick my dog.

Over the millennium of mankind, the canine has occupied a unique place as friend, companion, guardian and faithful worker. No other animal will leave its own kind voluntarily and come to seek man's companionship. This is a unique trait that has cemented the centuries-old bond between man and animal. However, as man's style of living has changed, so must his choice of canine friends change.

Today it looks as if the town dweller must forsake the larger breeds and select one compatible with the size of the owner's personal property. This restriction of dogs to the owner's property is almost a universal city dwelling requirement. It is so in the Twin Cities, too. This, next to prohibition, has been probably the most widely disregarded law in any community. It seems to be here, also.

We realize that enforcement of our dog ordinances is almost impossible in a community of this size, but the understanding and help of dog owners could go a long way to alleviate the problem.

It has been requested that owners particularly help in keeping dogs away from the school yards. A fencing of the home yard by owners would be valuable in alleviating Fido's depredations. Here is a good chance for us all to actively cooperate to solve a vexing civic problem.

It's no secret that the cost of living has escalated drastically in the last several years. As a result of this, many little things that we did not use to pay much heed to are now part of our "a penny saved is a penny earned" attitude.

An example in the newspaper business is the dramatic rise in the cost of newspaper stock. Newsprint was, up until several years ago, a relative minor item in the cost of a newspaper. Today, newsprint is literally doled out and only the exact number of papers which is ordered is printed. The day of the several hundred copies over press run is gone. This type of savings is apparent in all businesses and is one which should be a part of every homemaker's budget plans.

An item of escalating expense to the householder in Farwell is the cost of fire insurance. This was brought to our attention last week by a very irate citizen. His cost of insurance for his house and furnishings had risen for 1972-73 by 67 per cent over his previous policy. On a one-year basis, this amounted to the sum of \$81.93 -- a not so inconsequential amount.

We have had substantial insurance losses in Farwell in the last several years. For example, last year's hail forced the re-roofing of almost every house in town. The large majority of this cost was born by the insurance companies, so their increases can be somewhat understood if not appreciated.

We, as a community can begin to offset this extreme rise in local insurance by an attack on our community household problems. Namely, work for a substantial reduction in insurance premiums by renovating our method of water distribution.

Farwell needs almost a whole new water distribution system. The present patchwork of old, inadequate and rusty water mains will not serve the needs of a growing community. We must have adequate water distribution if we are to keep up even the pretext of town progress. Another disaster of the Kelly Green magnitude might well swamp the town. It surely swamped what is loosely referred to as our water mains.

The bright side of the picture is that we can continue civic progress by replacing our present inadequate system as we more than pay for it out of re-

McDaniel Buried Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday at First Christian Church in Clovis for Mr. Clyde McDaniel, longtime resident of the Texico area. Rodney Conover officiated.

Mr. McDaniel, 65, was a retired farmer. He died March 1 in Clovis Memorial Hospital. He came to this area in 1908 from Missouri with his family. He was born July 30, 1906, in Missouri.

One of the early settlers in this area, Mr. McDaniel sent all of his children to the school in Texico.

He was a member of First Christian Church in Clovis and a member of the Curry County "42" League. Burial was in Texico Cemetery with Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis in charge.

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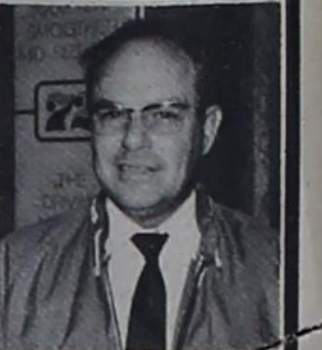

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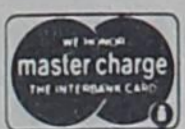

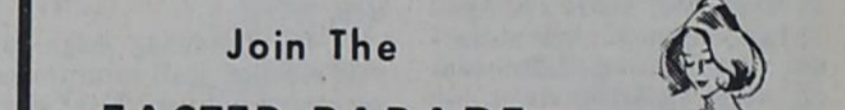

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

"WASHED, SANCTIFIED AND JUSTIFIED"

"And such were some of you, but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified, in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God" (1 Cor. 6:11).

The preceding verses of 1 Cor. 6 contain a long list of vile sins and vices into which men have fallen, and the apostle adds: "And such were some of you." God's Church is not made up of "good people" who have never fallen into sin. It is rather made up of sinners, saved by grace, through the infinite payment made for sin by Christ on Calvary's cross.

"And such were some of you." Had the apostle included the more "refined" sins, such as pride, self-righteousness, etc., he would have had to say: "And such were all of you."

Note further that the apostle says: "And such WERE some of you."

Thank God, he goes on to say of those who had been stained with sin: "But ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified, in

the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God."

How beautiful these three phrases: "But ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified." The word "but" appearing before each phrase indicates that each should be considered separately. Such vile creatures were some of you, "but ye are washed," cleansed from the sin that contaminated you. "But ye are sanctified," Having been cleansed you are now set apart as sacred for His glory. "But ye are justified." When God justifies us, who can condemn? "Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth; who is he that condemneth?"

All this is done for the believing sinner, as our verse says, "in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God." It is because Christ died for us that we can now claim cleansing, sanctification and justification, and it is "by the Spirit" that all this is applied to our lives.

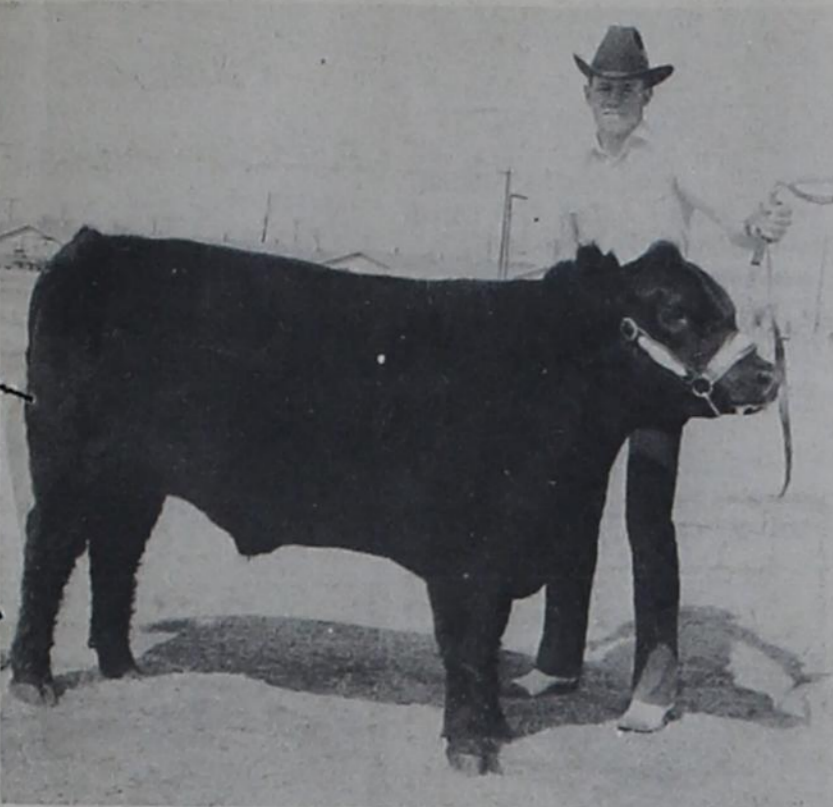

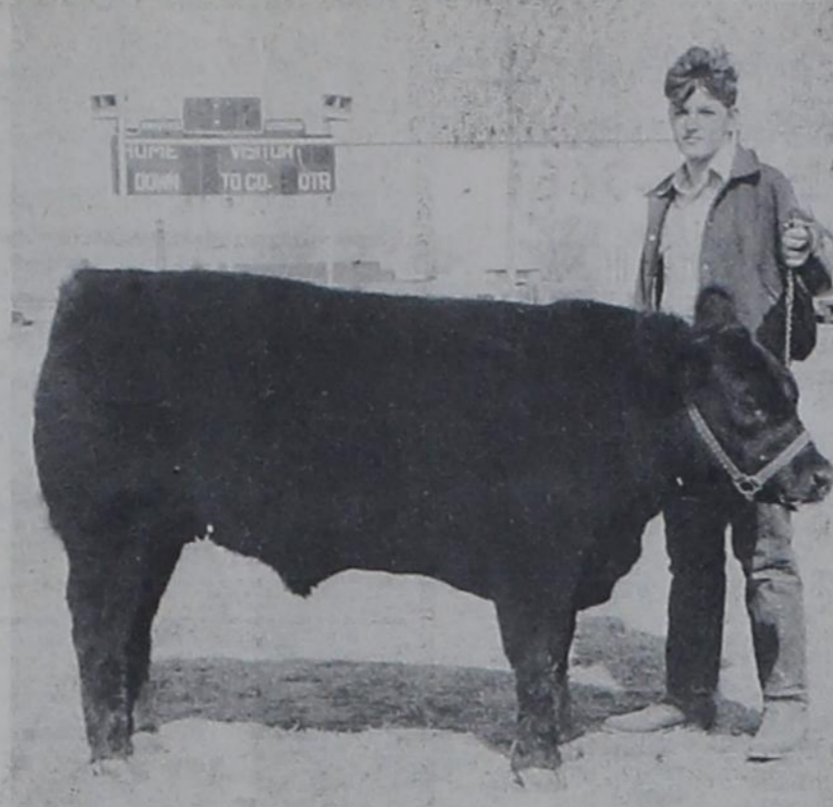

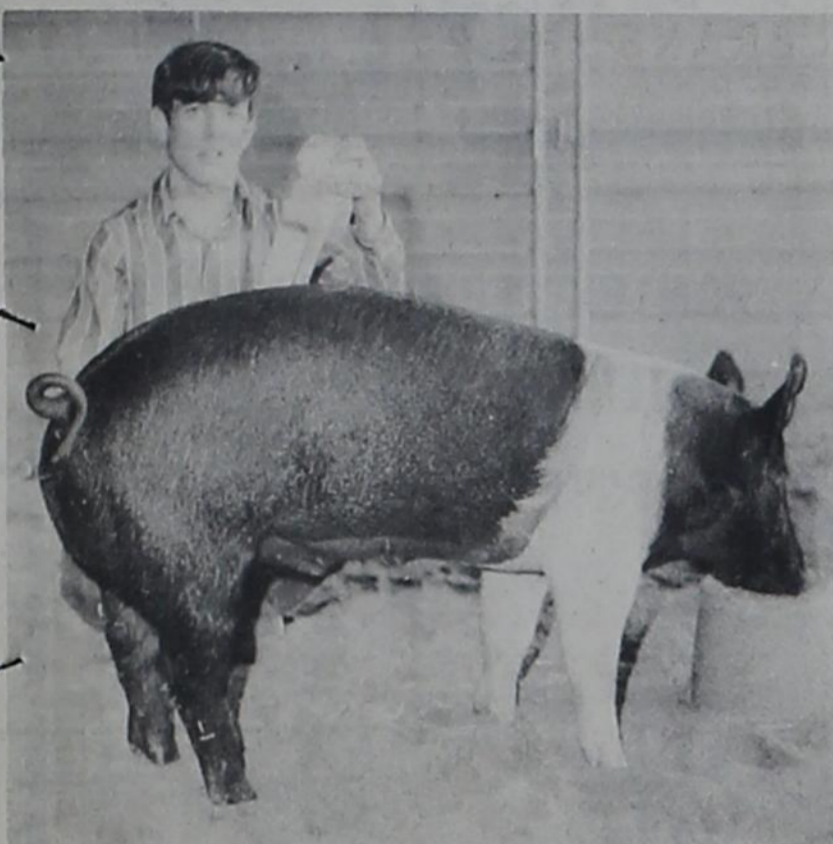

GREEN ENCHILADAS

12 tortillas
1/2 c. chopped onions
1 c. cheese (longhorn)
Mix together and bring to boil:
1 c. milk
1 c. soup (cream of chicken or mushroom)
1 c. green chilies
Layer tortillas, onions and cheese with mixture on top or between layers. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 or 40 minutes.

MARTHA WASHINGTON CANDY

1 can sweetened condensed milk
2 boxes powdered sugar
1 1/2 c. coconut
1 t. vanilla
1 cube butter or oleo
1 1/2 c. chopped nuts
Mix together in large bowl and form into very small balls. Cover with:
12 oz. bag chocolate chips
1/2 block paraffin
Melt these together.

BANANA NUT CAKE

1 1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. butter
3 mashed bananas
2 c. flour
1 t. soda
4 T. or 1/4 c. buttermilk
2 eggs
3/4 c. chopped nuts
1 t. vanilla
pinch salt
Cream sugar and butter together; add mashed bananas and beaten eggs; sift together dry ingredients and add alternately

with milk. Add vanilla and nuts. Bake in 375 degree oven for 35 minutes in a greased, floured layer cake pan. An oblong pan can also be used.

ICING

1/4 c. butter
2 mashed bananas
1 box powdered sugar
1 t. vanilla
1 c. chopped nuts
Cream together soft butter, mashed bananas and vanilla; add powdered sugar and nuts.

Have trouble with your income tax?

Save yourself a lot of frustration and money, too, by getting organized now for this time next year.

Keeping a few simple tax record of tax-deductible items has been suggested by Extension Specialists.

Sometimes a notebook serves a better purpose and is easier to keep than a printed record book. Simply divide the book into categories of spending or money outlay for those items that are tax-deductible when expenses are itemized.

You never know at the beginning of the year just how much some of these expenses will be.

Medical expenses aren't certain until you get sick. Then it may be too late to be able to record all of them. Start the year off by keeping up with all of them by setting aside a portion of your book to record them. Separate medicines and drugs from other medical expenses. Since these expenses are handled separately on the tax form, it saves time to keep them separate from the beginning.

At the end of the year, the columns may be added quickly to determine if medicines and drugs total more than one per cent of a person's adjusted gross income.

One-half of premiums on health insurance, up to a limit of \$150, may be deducted, even though medical expenses don't exceed three per cent of income and can't be claimed.

Cost of travel to get medical or dental care may be counted as medical expense, subject to the three per cent limitations. If you use your car, you may claim either out-of-pocket expenses or six cents a mile. If you claim mileage, it's a good

idea to keep speedometer readings as proof of travel.

When breakfast is skipped, many times the body has gone without food for as long as 15 hours. This impairs to some degree muscular fitness, perception, and the ability to stand up under wearying kinds of work activity. The first thing to consider in planning breakfast is the amount of energy it provides measured in calories. A second consideration is how much protein your breakfast provides. Many nutritionists suggest that this meal should supply 1/4 to 1/3 of the recommended daily amounts of nutrients. Therefore, a good breakfast is one that includes selections from the four food groups: milk, meat, fruit and vegetable, plus the cereal and bread groups.

Finger foods encourage the preschool child to eat. Large pieces of food such as lettuce leaves, wedges of cabbage, carrot and turnip sticks, cubes of cooked meat, and long beans help youngsters eat a variety of foods. They can handle them with more ease and comfort when eaten with the fingers.

By keeping a simple record it's very easy to total these deductions and determine where you stand.

Costs of travel as a volunteer for church or charity are deductible. Using your car, you may claim either out-of-pocket expenses or six cents a mile. Again, speedometer readings would be advisable to have in your records.

Interest paid on home mortgage, charge accounts, installment contracts and loans for personal and household use are also deductible items that should be recorded. Early in 1971 the Internal Revenue Service rules that all finance charges in credit cards and charge accounts are deductible as interest when deductions are itemized. Receipts showing amounts of interest paid should be kept for proof of payment.

When deductions are itemized, taxes on personal property, sales taxes and gasoline taxes are deductible.

Desserts and snacks are a necessary part of the diet. However, they should be selected in such a way that they help provide some nutritive value as well as taste and eye appeal. Desserts which are made with milk and eggs -- custards and pudding -- are good additions to the menu. And snacks made from cereals, peanut butter, and raisins also contribute necessary nutrients.

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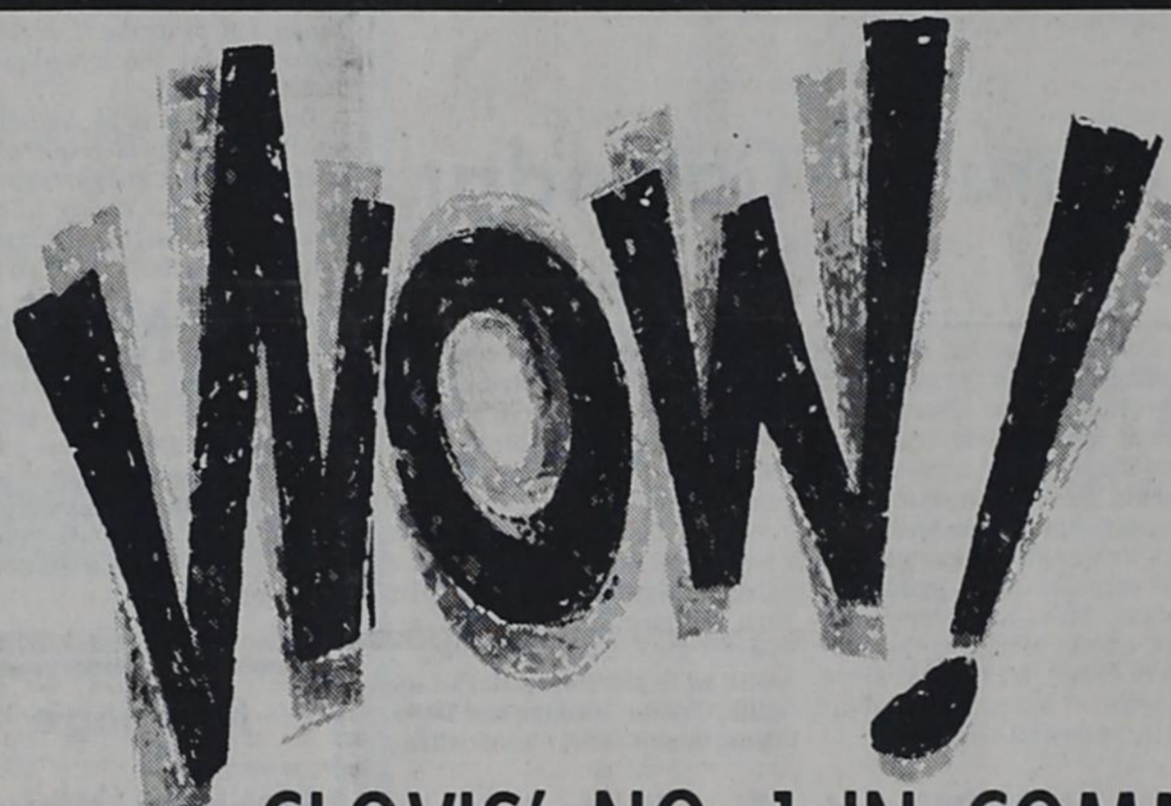
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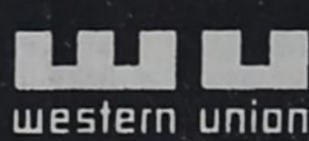
