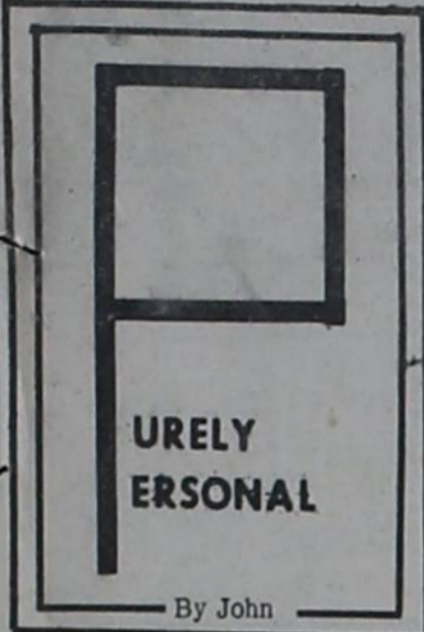


John Tower To Arrive April 21

United States Senator John Tower will be arriving in Farwell on Friday, Apr. 21. He will be speaking to the public during a barbecue to be held at Farwell school cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. Tower's visit is sponsored by friends of John Tower.

He is currently seeking reelection to his U. S. Senate seat. He became the first Republican ever to be elected to the U. S. Senate from Texas when he won the seat in a special election in 1961 to fill the seat vacated by Lyndon Baines Johnson when he was elected Vice President under Kennedy in the fall of 1960. Tower was in the runoff election against Democrat Bill Blakely. He carried Parmer County by a 573 to 487 margin.

Tower won his first full term as Senator in 1966 when he defeated Democrat Waggoner Carr in the fall general elections. At that time, Tower carried the county 1084 to 651. In 1970, he became the senior Senator when Lloyd Bentsen defeated the Democratic incumbent Ralph Yarborough. He completes his 11th year in the United States Senate on June 15, 1972. A former educator, when he was first elected at age 35, he was the Senate's youngest member.

Things happen fast in the Texas legislature -- when it wants them to, that is. For example, the legislature in its very short session also included the 27th amendment to the U. S. Constitution on women's rights. The legislators made Texas the eighth state to ratify this amendment. This is a piece of legislation that seems to have many pros and cons which have been expressed by both sexes.

In fact, we wonder if limiting the legislative meetings to three days every two years might not be a great pocketbook saving for the overtaxed public.

Lest we be accused of unjustly pillorying our great state's legislature, let us quote a few lines from the Texas Baptist News, a release of the Baptist General Convention of Texas:

"In the report being received this week by Texas Baptists, fifteen crucial issues are analyzed, said Dr. James M. Dunn, Secretary of the Christian Life Commission. . . . A cover letter accompanying the analysis reveals: Prairie dogs were declared a public nuisance, but five years' work on major revision of family law died without a hearing on the floor. Lawmakers decided to study cattle branding but refused to authorize a study on care for the mentally retarded. The House could not find \$500,000 to save 420 Texans who die each year from kidney disease. It found \$1,000,000 for the LBJ park when only \$100,000 had been requested."

Say, you older folk, are you missing something or is yed's old mind slipping. We cannot recall anything for which this country should "belatedly" honor Charlie Chaplin. In fact, our doddering recall system only serves to dredge up some rather unpleasant things about the fellow.

Farmers Reminded Of Program Deadlines

Farmers participating in one or more of the 1972 farm programs have a number of dates to remember and deadlines to meet, according to Parmer County ASCS officials.

1. May 1 is the final date for reporting wheat, barley and set-aside.
2. May 3 is final date for completing cotton transfers.
3. April 30 is the date on which 1971 crop wheat loans mature.
4. April 17 through April 28 is sign-up period for cost-share meet, according to REAP - conservation program.
5. July 15 is final date for reporting all feed grain and cotton acreages.
6. June 10 is final date for sugarbeet producers to report 1972 planted acres.

A part of the above mentioned dates are important to all farmers in this area and some to only a few. The people at the ASCS Office suggest that farmers might do well to set up a "Farm Program Calendar" for themselves as these dates are so important, and failure to observe one of them usually results in a financial loss to the persons involved.

The big one to remember is the first one listed above -- May 1. This date is very important to practically every farmer in this area. This is the one that most program payments hinge upon, say officials.

'Carl Sandburg' Play Slated For Tonight

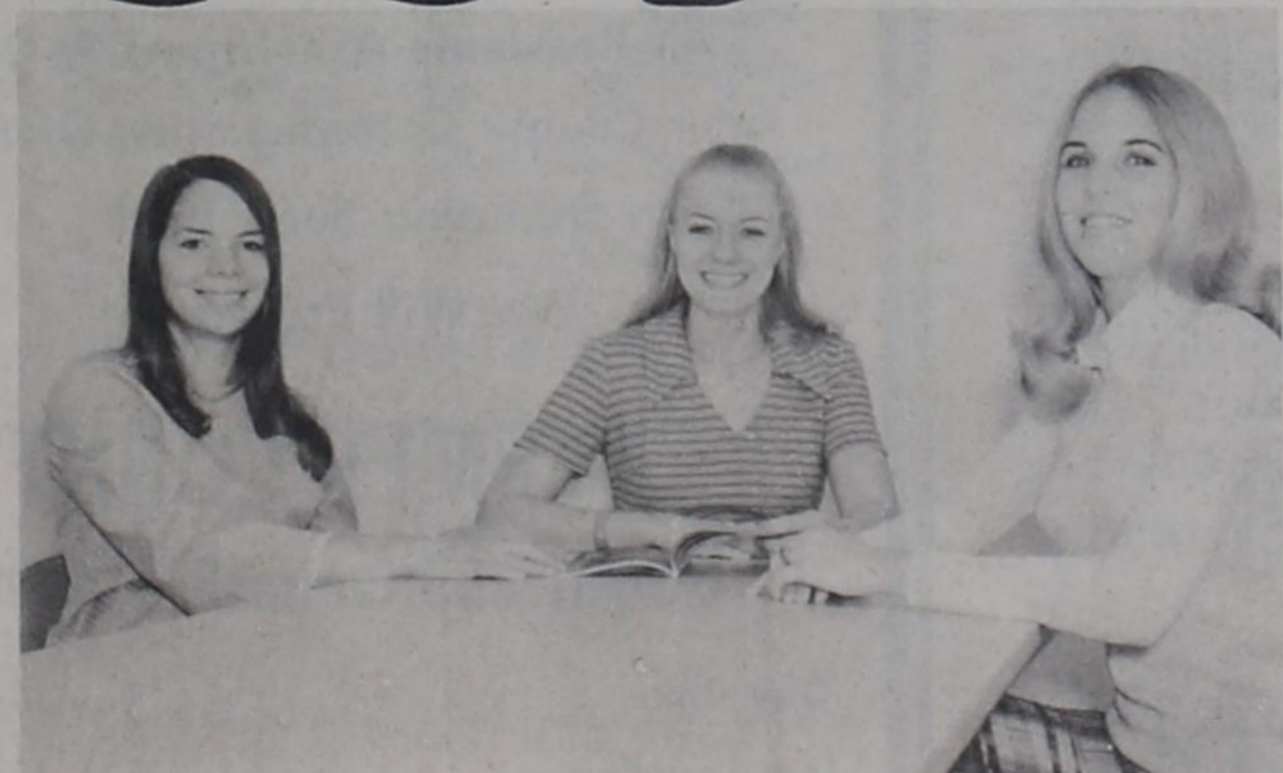

They also discussed prosecuting violators of a state law prohibiting dumping of trash along public road rights of way. A fine of \$10-\$200 will be levied on persons found guilty.

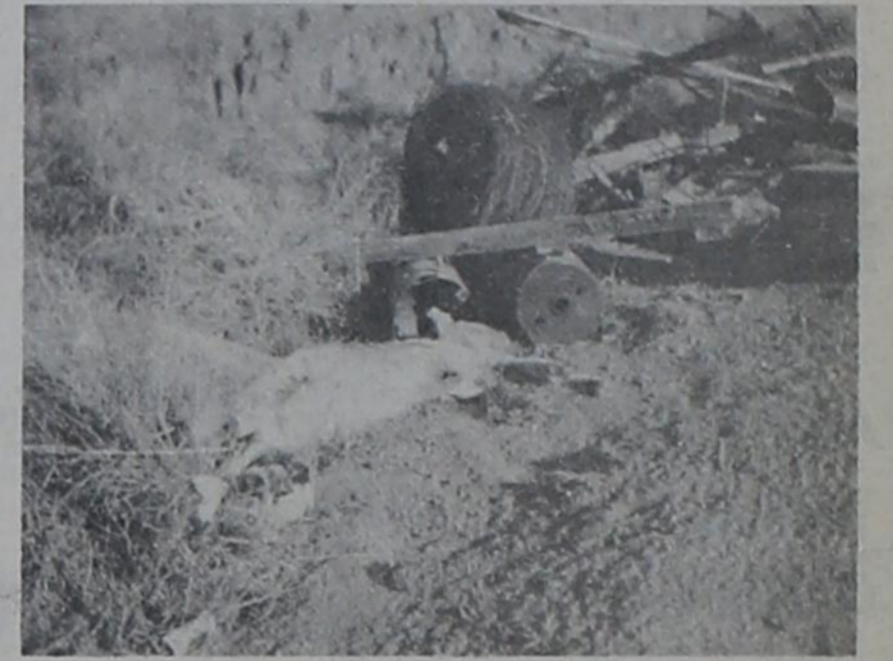

UNLAWFUL DUMPING OF TRASH along the roads surrounding the Lazbuddie community has worsened over the past three months. Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and discussed the problem caused by the large amount of sewage, car bodies, animal carcasses and appliances being discarded in ditches along the roads owned by the county and state. They



decided to take immediate action in prosecuting violators of a state law which prohibits the dumping of such items within 300 feet of a public highway. A fine of \$10-\$200 will be levied on those found guilty of such an act. Persons witnessing such dumping or who have knowledge of such an act should contact one of the commissioners.

\$10-\$200 Fine --

County Residents Warned Against Dumping Trash

Parmer County residents are warned that there is a \$10-\$200 fine for dumping trash on roads or highways. A state law prohibits dumping of trash within 300 feet of roads, Parmer County Judge Archie Tarter says the ditches along the roads are owned by the county and the state.

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and discussed a situation which has worsened in the past three months along roads in the Lazbuddie community. Commissioner Raymond Treider said that although the trash being dumped along roadsides had been occurring for several years, it had not been so noticeable until the past few months. "We find all sorts of items

dumped along the roads surrounding Lazbuddie. The items include dead animals, discarded appliances, wiring, sewage, car bodies and other junk that people are trying to get rid of," he said.

He noted that there was an open dumping ground one mile east and a half mile south of Lazbuddie for the purpose of dumping trash. "We clean the dump ground once a month," he added.

Treider explained that many of the ditches in which trash has been discarded are along Running Water Draw. "When the ditches are full of water, that trash will be carried along with it, ruining fields and property belonging to others," he said. Another problem which

plagues the roads around Lazbuddie is electrical grazing fences that are being built in the ditches. Treider emphasized the danger involved to vehicles traveling along the road, especially farm vehicles that take up space wider than the cement pavement.

County commissioners decided the only way to clean up the refuse dumped along the roads in the county would be to prosecute offenders according to the state law. Persons knowing of any unlawful act of dumping going on should contact any one of

the four commissioners, Raymond Treider, Tom Lewellen, Charlie Jefferson and Guy Cox, or Judge Archie Tarter.

The state law prohibits the dumping of refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on any public highway within 300 feet of the road. It classifies refuse, garbage, rubbish and junk to be all decayable and non-decayable wastes, such as vegetable, animal and fish carcasses, worn-out, worthless and discarded material including old iron or other metal, glass, paper, cordage or other materials.

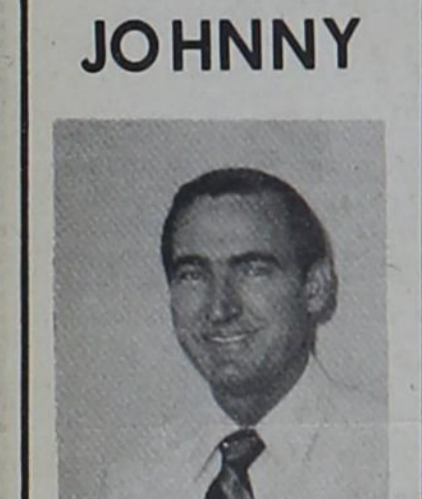

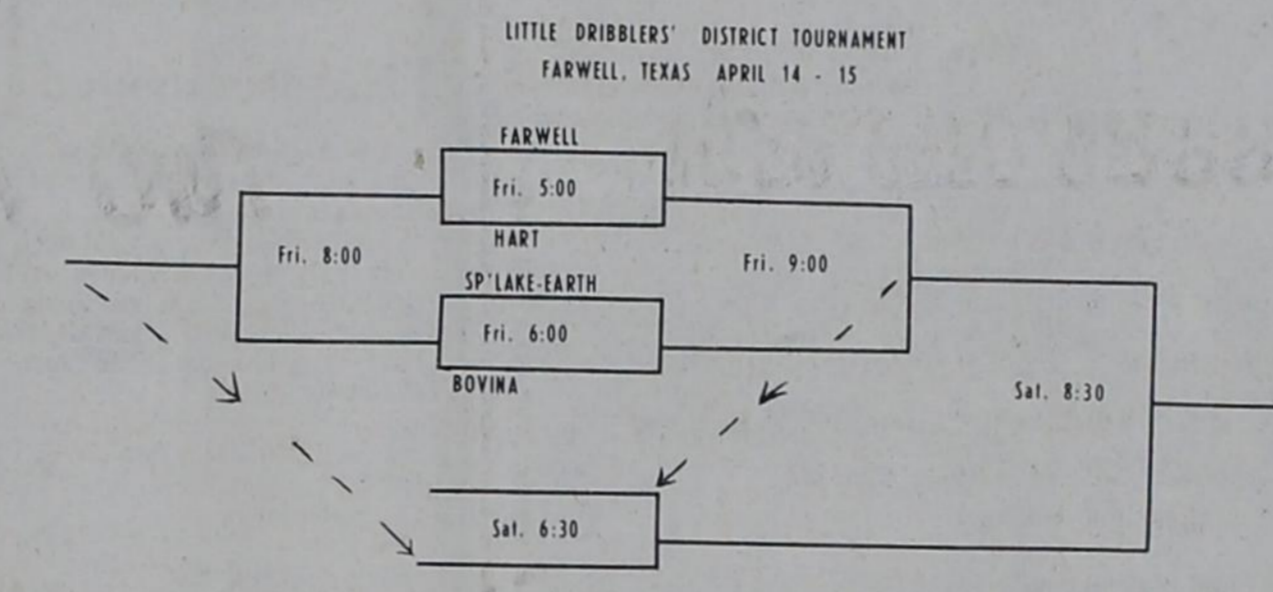

They place the cans in a line under the pickup tires and back over them until they flatten out. Kittle Warren, Alan's sister, takes the credit for coming up with the beer can idea.

Another Scout, Dwain Obenshain, didn't particularly care for the idea of running over the cans so he proceeded to build his own machine for doing the job. The hand or leg-operated machine consists of a thick board lever connected to a board frame by a hinge. Young Obenshain and his father fashioned the large hinge from scrap metal.

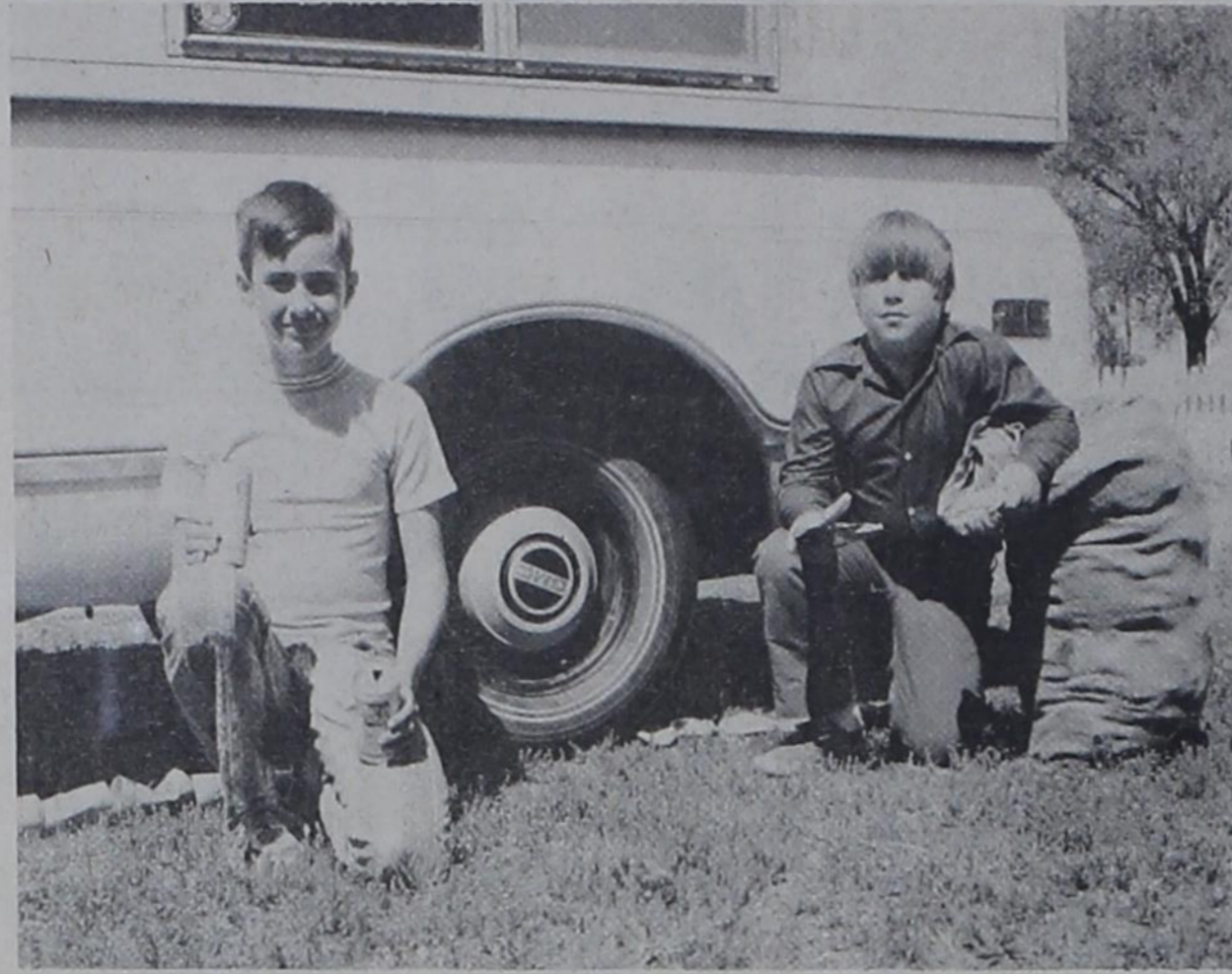
The boys receive a half cent for each all aluminum beer can they take to the recycling plant. They usually gather up the cans

in tow sacks or boxes picking them up along the highway and anywhere else they can find them.

Jack Rose got a different kind of brainstorm this past summer as he surveyed a pile of used, dirty bricks. Young Rose cleaned the brick and stacked them. He then sold them for two cents a brick. Other projects which Rose has been working on during the past two years include washing windows, shoveling sidewalks and doing odd jobs around his father's drug store and at home. He made over \$100 toward the trip.

Allan has been selling recipe cards in addition to his beer can recycling project. Guy, his partner, has been involved in cleaning yards, mowing lawns and selling greeting cards. Dwain has been working for a neighbor woman for several months bringing her mail and doing other errands as well as summer yard work.

Out of 25 boys who are planning to go to Alaska this summer, these four boys are probably not the only ones who have worked on individual projects, but they are probably among the busiest.

On The Farm In Palmer County

Cattle numbers can be expected to increase again during 1972.

According to the latest figures from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, major gains across the United States in 1971 were in beef cow numbers and beef heifers. From January 1, 1971 to January 1, 1972, beef cow numbers increased about three per cent while beef heifers 500 pounds and over being kept for cow replacements increased six per cent.

This holdback of heifers emphasizes that the expansion of beef herds is coming soon.

In recent years, cattle numbers have increased primarily due to the increased demands for feeder cattle by feedlots. In 1955 only about 10 million head of cattle were fed in the 23 major feeding states compared with 25.3 million head last year.

Furthermore, cattle feeding should continue to grow. Consumers are now demanding grain finished cattle instead of those finished on grass. In other words, they are demanding a higher quality of beef. This can be illustrated by the fact that 59 per cent of all the beef produced in the U. S. in 1970 graded USDA Choice while back in 1955 only about one-third was equivalent to that grade.

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission are sounding an alarm to livestock owners throughout Texas. Screwworm cases continue to mount and totaled 188 as of April 5, or 73 thus far in April. At the end of April last year, only 21 cases had been confirmed, and no cases were recorded during the first three months of 1970. Twenty-nine cases were recorded on Monday of this week, 28 on Tuesday and 16 on Wednesday. Case outbreaks moved up from South Texas through the Hill Country into

the Big Bend Counties of Terrell and Brester this week, and into Hamilton County, in Central Texas. With the most critical months ahead, 1972 is predicted to be a rough year. Mexico cases are far ahead of those reported a year ago, following a mild winter when many fertile fly populations survived, officials added. Hot-spotting of all known cases is underway, officials said, urging livestock owners to check their animals regularly and to treat all wounds. Containers and information for mailing worm samples may be obtained from county agricultural agents.

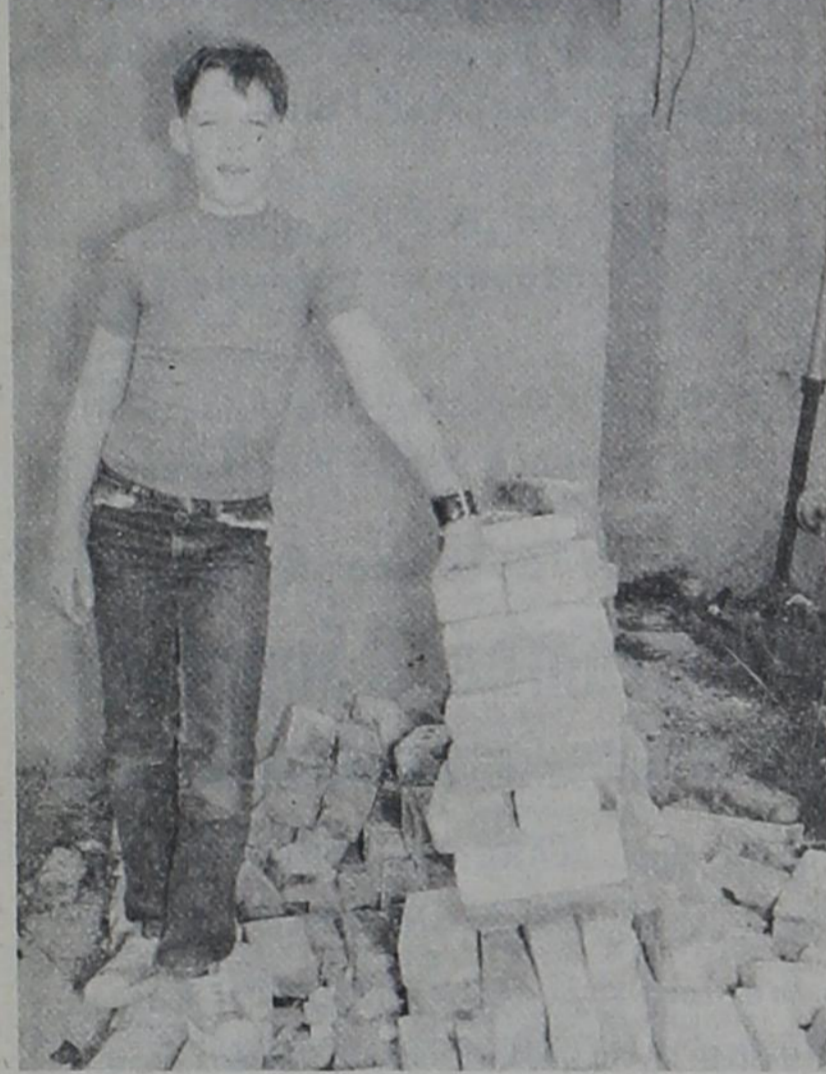
