major gains across the United uary 1, 1972, beef cow numbers increased about three per cent while beef heifers 500 pounds and over being kept for cow replacements increased six per cent.

This holdback of heifers emphasizes that the expansion of beef herds is coming soon.

In recent years, cattle numbers have increased primarily due to the increased demands for feeder cattle by feedlots. In 1955 only about 10 million head of cattle were fed in the 23 major feeding states compared with 25,3 million head last

Furthermore, cattle feeding should continue to grow. Consumers are now demanding grain finished cattle instead of those finished on grass. In other words, they are demanding a higher quality of beef. This can be illustrated by the fact that 59 per cent of all the beef produced in the U.S. in 1970 graded USDA Choice while back in 1955 only about one-third was equivalent to that grade.

Officials of the Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission are sounding an alarm to livestock owners throughout Texas. Screwworm cases continue to mount and totaled 188 as of April 5, or 73 thus far in Aoril. At the end of April last year, only 21 cases had been confirmed, and no cases were recorded during the first three months of 1970. Twenty-nine cases were recorded on Monday of this week, 28 on Tuesday and 16 on Wednesday. Case outbreaks moved up from South Texas through the Hill Country into
