Football Contest Starts 14th Year

Recently the weather has been giving us a touch of fall. The calendar is now in the ninth month and tonight, Friday, the Texico Wolverines uncork the 1972 football season in the Twin Cities. Next week the Steers enter the lists by taking on cross-county rival Friona. By that time you can rest assured that the transition from summer to fall will have been over and done with. It has always seemed to us that while winter just slides into spring and spring just sort of melts into summer, fall always comes right out and says "I'm here" and on with the ball games.

Texico opens with Hagerman at Wolverine Stadium and this promises to be a game worth seeing. Hagerman is one of the more powerful Class A teams in New Mexico and Texico will be going into its fourth season of football with some experience in back of it. Head knocking should be the rule tonight in Texico.

Tonight also is scrimmage and watermelon time in Steer land. Hereford provides the scrimmage opponents and the Booster Club will provide the melons for an after-game feast. Everyone is invited to come to Steer Stadium and watch the game, eat watermelon, meet the players and coaches and incidentally, have the opportunity to join the local booster club.

Along with this thrilling season each year comes the Tribune's Merchant Madness Football Contest sponsored by a host of local and area businesses.

The contest is in its 14th year with 401 entrants recorded last year. The number of entrants was a record number since the contest began in 1959. A forerunner of area football contests, 30 entrants were recorded in 1959.

The contest starts next week

and runs for a 12-week period during which hundreds of persons try their luck at prognosticating the outcome of games in each of the categories mentioned above.

Ten games are listed in the Tribune each week. Entrants must circle or otherwise indicate their choice of winner for each game. A Game of the Week will be listed each week on the entry blank - during Steer season, Farwell football games will be used as the tie-breaker.

Entrants must guess the scores of the Game of the Week in order to determine the weekly winners in case of a tie. The point-spread method will

be used. Whether an entrant predicts the winner of the Game of the Week right or wrong, it will not be counted.

Rules of the contest include picking winners for each of the 10 games listed on the entry blank, choosing a score on the Game of the Week and placing the entry blanks in the Tribune office by 5 p.m. each Friday. Entries mailed in must be postmarked by 5 p.m. Friday in order to be accepted.

Tabulation of individual entrants will be kept all season and will be available for public inspection.

Contestants must be 12 years old or over in order to submit entry blanks. Only one entry blank will be accepted from an

individual each week.

Final Acre Celebration At Parmerton Tuesday

Everyone has been invited by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District to attend the Final Acre Celebration at Parmerton at 2 o'clock Tuesday, Sept. 5. Edward E. Thomas, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, will address the group on this occasion.

Earl Blakley, Field Specialist - Soils, and Herbert Bruns, local Soil Scientist, will map the last acre at this time. Parmerton is located between Friona and Bovina on U.S. Highway 60.

Tuesday, Sept. 5, will see the completion of a four-year project that will have dollar-and-cents value to every

resident of the county, according to Soil Conservation Service officials. Parmer County Soil Survey will be complete, and it will yield maps of valuable soil information on every acre of land in the county, they added.

The survey was a joint project of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, Parmer

County Soil and Water Conservation District and Texas A&M Extension Service. Herbert Bruns, SCS soil scientist from Hereford, was in charge of the survey.

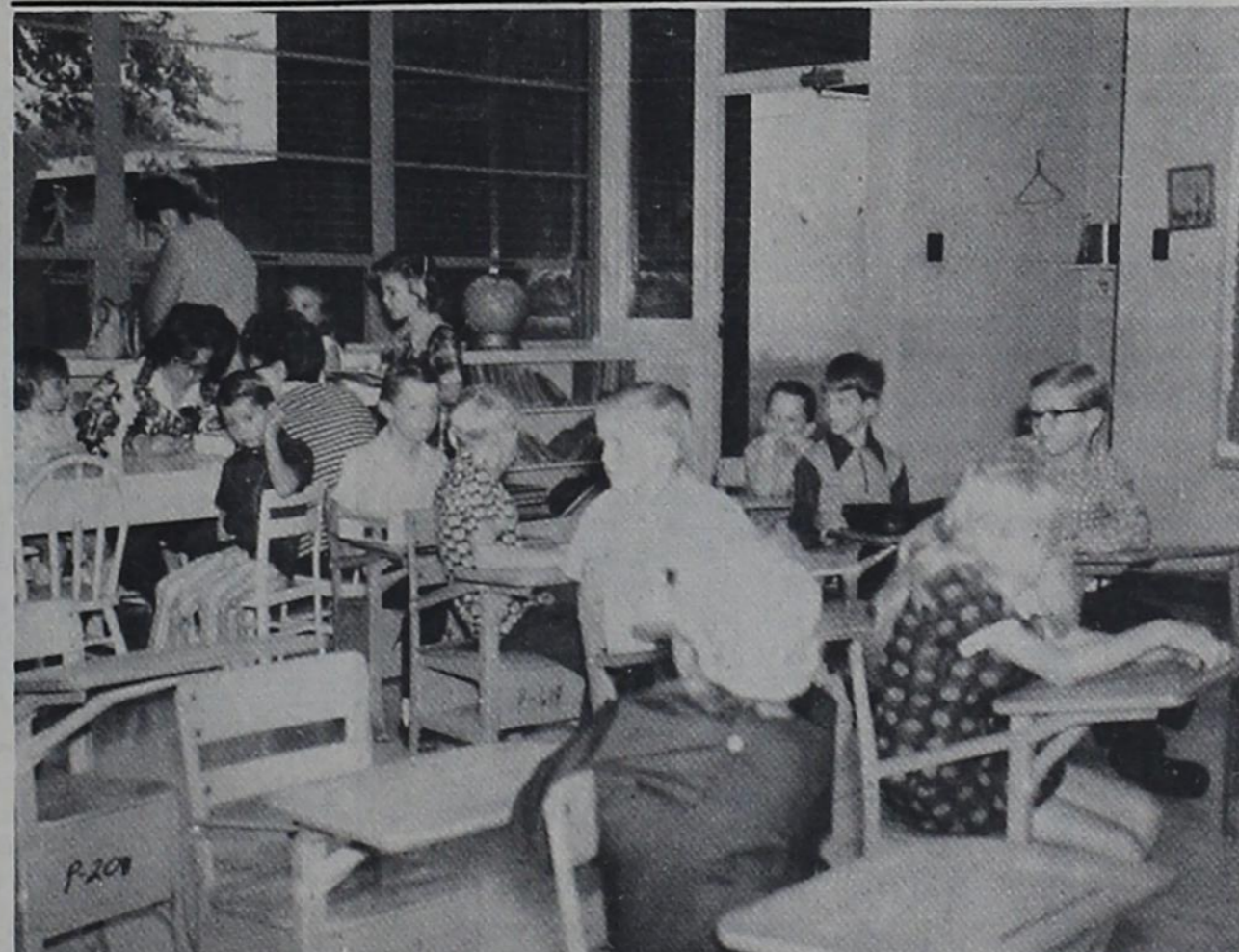
The completion of the project means there are now maps available to tell you what kind of soil you'll find on every acre of land in Parmer County, say officials.

Primarily, the survey will enable the Soil Conservation Service here to work with farm operators and land owners on a farm-by-farm basis in planning conservation programs. But, the information contained in the survey also is important to fertilizer companies, banks, real estate agents, developers, farm renters, land buyers, tax evaluators, highway planners, private contractors, school districts and many others, according to officials.

The maps - showing the county's variations lines superimposed on aerial photos - will be kept at the Soil Conservation Office, where they will be available to the public.

They yield information on the soil's texture, permeability, slope, severe erosion areas, depth of soil, amounts of sand, silt and clay in each layer, water holding capacity and other data. The survey maps cover both city land and rural acreage.

Texico, Lazbuddie Enrollment Down

Both Texico and Lazbuddie schools reported total enrollments Monday which were down from last year on the first day of school. Texico High School, however, reported 226 students enrolled, the largest number ever enrolled by the end of the first day.

High School Principal Jim Pierce said pre-enrollment procedures, begun for the first time this year, could have been beneficial in getting larger numbers of students registered earlier than usual. He also said there were just more kids going to high school this year. Last year 220 students were registered by the end of the first day.

Texico Elementary School enrolled 215 students; that number is seven less than the number registered by the end of the first day last year. Elementary 3 students had the largest enrollment with 28 students. Texico High School's largest enrollment was in the seventh grade.

Texico students will have a holiday Monday since no classes are to be held on Labor Day. They will return to school at the regular time Tuesday.

Lazbuddie's total enrollment was 310, 10 less students than were enrolled by the end of the first day last year. Approximately 90 students were enrolled in high school with the rest of the enrollment shared in junior high and elementary.

Over Weekend - -

Cool Temperatures, Muddy Fields Accompany Rains

Thunderstorms the beginning of last week had worn out their fire by the end of the week and turned to slow, drizzling rain over the area.

Last Monday night, Aug. 21, Texico-Farwell area residents were treated to spectacular lightning displays and thunderstorms. At one time, Bailey County, our neighboring county to the east, was under a tornado warning, and ominous black clouds moving in from the west were plentiful. More showers last Tuesday were recorded.

Beginning last Thursday, the showers were less frightening but produced more moisture for the area. Skies began clearing up Tuesday after a long weekend of drizzling rain accompanied by cool temperatures.

Although harvest was slowed somewhat by muddy fields, farmers, in general, were proud of the moisture. The only crop which did not seem to benefit from the moisture was cotton, especially when some had already been watered.

Last Monday night, Elmer Langford, north of Texico, reported .65 of moisture. The city of Texico received only .25 inch rainfall. That same amount was recorded in Lariat by Asa Smith.

Reporting for Farwell proper, Fred Chandler received .1 inch of moisture last Monday night. He said on his farm east of Farwell there was .4 inch of rain recorded.

On the Ted Magness farm south of Farwell, there were "two inches of thunder and lightning, and .75 inch of rain",

according to Magness. Another farmer, Dee Brown south of Texico, said he received only a shower.

Last Tuesday night's rainfall reports included from .2 to .7 inch, south of Farwell; .2 inch, Lariat; .55 inch, north of Texico; and .10 inch, Farwell.

Rainfall measurements for a period from last Thursday to Tuesday morning ranged from .60 to .65 inch north of Texico to 3 inches south of Texico.

On the Mark Leithen farm three and a half miles southwest of Farwell, nearly four inches were recorded.

At Lariat, 2.2 inches of rain were recorded over the period from Thursday through Tuesday. In Farwell only 1.3 to 1.5 of moisture were recorded over the long weekend. South of Farwell over 2 inches were reported.

The city of Texico recorded almost two inches for the same time period. The rain gauges are located at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator in Farwell and B. A. Rogers home in Texico.

Texico Feedlot reported a total of 2.2 inches of moisture for Thursday through Tuesday.

Wolverines Face First Foe Of Football Season

Texico Wolverines face their first opponent of the season, Hagerman, N.M., at Wolverine Stadium tonight at 8 o'clock. Wolverine Coach Bucky Walters says Hagerman was runner-up in state last year in Class A and that "they have the biggest part of their team back this year."

According to Walters, Hagerman is considered one of the top teams in the state in Class A, if not the top team. "They're pretty good and they have a lot of good boys," he added.

Although Walters said there had been good response in pre-season workouts, he said the Wolverines had trouble

staying with Ft. Sumner last Friday at the scrimmage. "They (Ft. Sumner) were just too tough," he added.

Walters commented that several of his players are suffering from bruises, hurt shoulders and other injuries. He said most of the injuries resulted from Wolverine practice and not from the scrimmage.

"Some of our newcomers are looking good. Raymond Cantu, a newcomer to football, is coming through for us. Ernest Woods, another newcomer, may be a defensive starter," he said.

"At the scrimmage, we mostly just ran our stuff to see

what we could do. I even substituted some men. We were just pretty banged up," he added.

Walters said his starters depended on who's going to be well enough to play Friday night. He is still deciding on some positions. According to him, the senior lettermen will be depended upon for their experience and leadership.

Walters mentioned Gerald Whitener, Allan Haile, Fulgencio Ortiz, Eugene Wallace, Randy Harrison and Curtis Lindley as players he is particularly depending upon. He said he hopes Lindley will be able to play Friday since he received a hand injury recently.

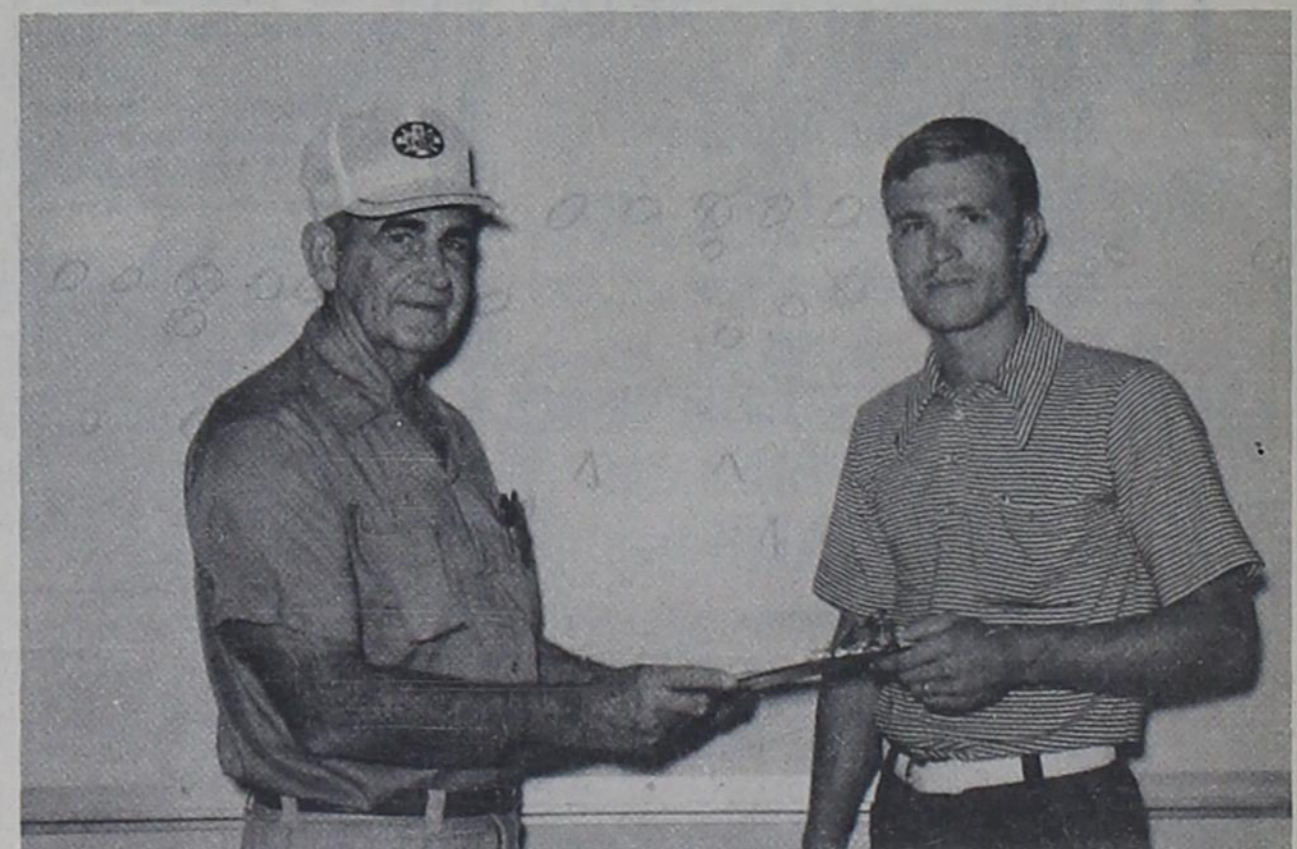
Watermelon Feed Scrimmage Tonight

Tim Smith - Sophomore tackle Smith is young, but he has the desire. He will probably see a lot of action this year.

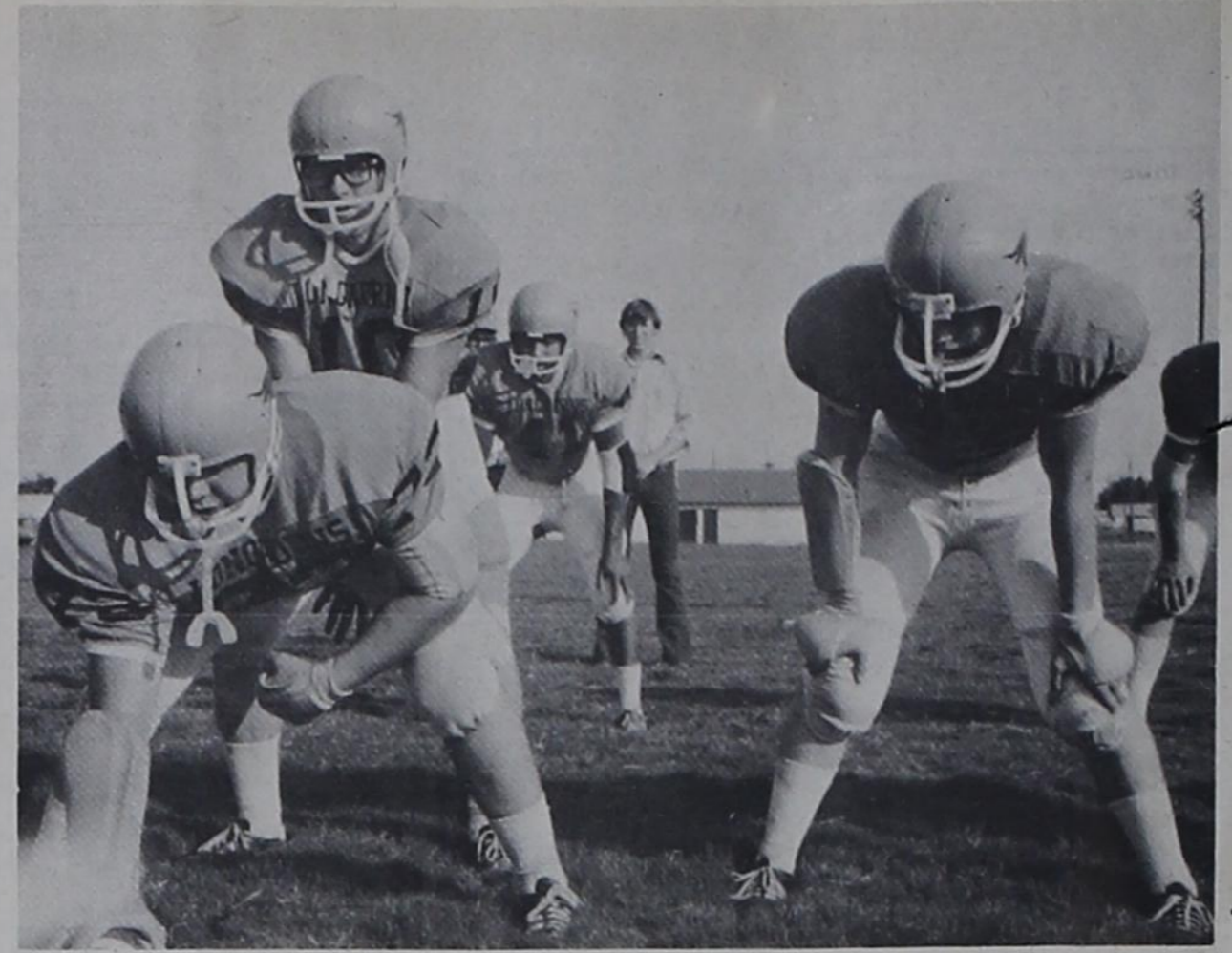
Bart Burnett - Sophomore end Burnett is inexperienced, but he has a lot of desire. He, too, will see a lot of action.

"In the city, of course, we can't map the soil with the intensity that contractors sometimes need," Bruns said. "But our maps do give a builder an indication of how much the city soil is likely to expand or contract during weather changes or other valuable data about the soil."

Next step is for the U.S. Government Printing Office to produce 1,500 or more copies of the Parmer County Survey book, complete with maps. But Bruns said the printing is still about three years away.

"The criticism we hear most often concerns the length of time between the completion of the survey and the publication of the report book," Bruns said. "This is a matter of budgeting - we don't have too much money to work with, and it takes several years to get the funds for the printing."

When published, the book will give 50 to 60 pages of text on the county's soil descriptions, soil percentages by types, soil use and management, best conservation practices for the types of soil found here, range management, engineering applications, classification of soils and the general nature of the area.

The main part of the book will be fold-out maps with soil "type lines" superimposed on aerial photos and soil areas classified by symbols. These are available now, but require a trip to the Soil Conservation Office.

When published, 1,500 or more soil survey books will be made available to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District through the office of our congressman, Bruns said.

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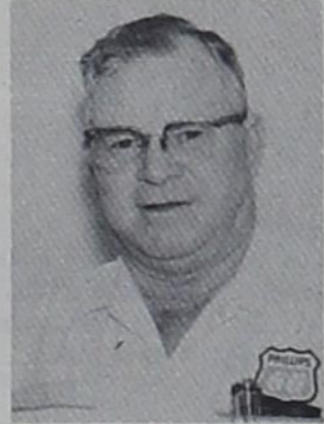

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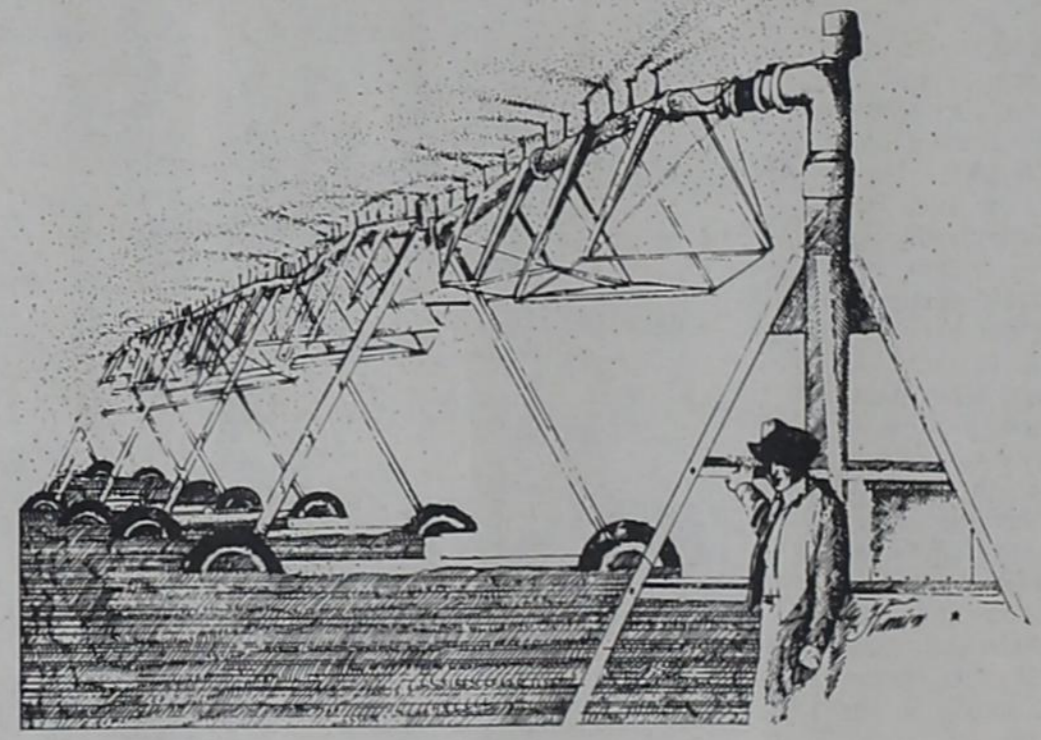
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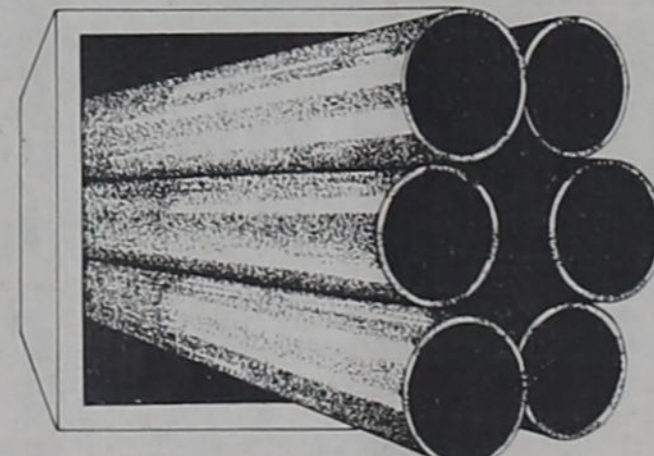

Amos Tatum - -

Completes First Week As Elementary Teacher

Amos Tatum has completed his first week at Farwell Elementary School as a math teacher in the third, fourth and fifth grades, having returned to the teaching profession this year after a year's leave of absence.

Tatum, who served as principal at Farwell High School 15 years before he became ill with cancer, is no stranger to grade school, although most of his teaching career has been spent as a high school principal.

Tatum began teaching in a small, rural elementary school in southeastern Oklahoma, teaching for two years before World War II came along. He served in the armed forces four years prior to returning to Oklahoma to teach in grade school another year.

He then spent four years as a high school principal in Oklahoma before he became a civil service educational specialist with the Air Force early in 1951.

He served in that position until August, 1956, when he came to Farwell to take over as high school principal.

Tatum's wife, Louise, has taught in the same schools as her husband. When they came to Farwell, she taught third and fourth grades in elementary and seventh and eighth grade English in junior high. She now serves as high school librarian.

The Tatum's have one daughter, Mrs. Patty Chandler of Canyon. She is a copywriter

for KGNC radio in Amarillo.

While Tatum is beginning a new era in his career, he feels very much at home. "If you know kids and know what to expect, then it's no problem," he says.

"Small kids are more enthusiastic and lively. Their attention span is much shorter, though," he adds.

Tatum feels that his years of experience in handling students, enjoying teaching, and understanding the maturity and attention spans of children in each grade makes the job more satisfying.

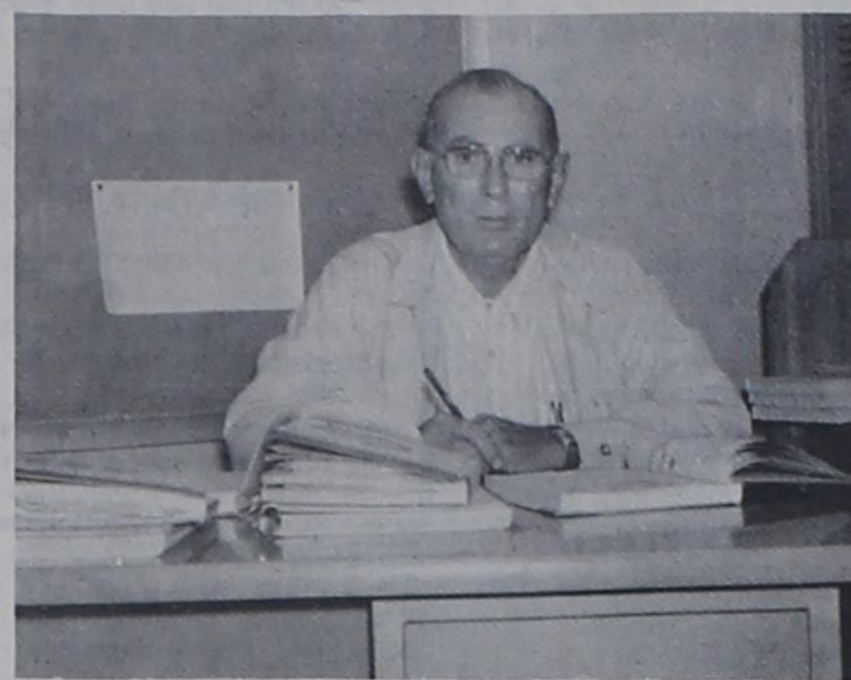

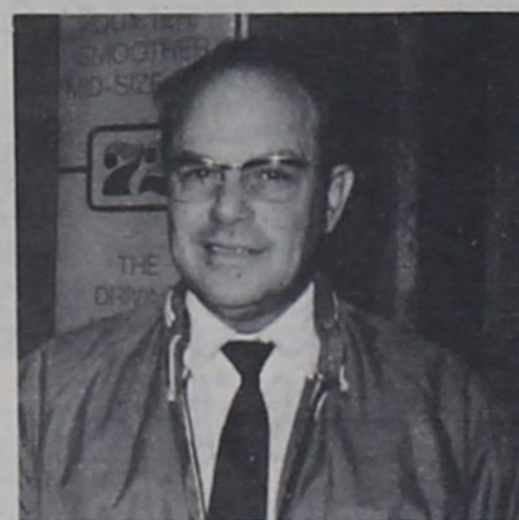

A RANSOM FOR ALL
"For there is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the Man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time" (1 Tim. 2:5,6).
Man, in his present condition is not fit to stand in the presence of a holy God. If we are honest with ourselves we will feel the need of a mediator - a go-between - who can represent us in the presence of God. Job felt this when, realizing this need, he cried: "There is no daysman who can lay his hand upon us both" (Job 9:33).
Thank God, a "daysman" or "mediator" has been provided for sinful men - a go-between, who can represent us before a holy God. This Mediator is Christ, Son of God and Son of man.
What a blessing to know that the Son of God became the Son of man so that the sons of men might become the sons of God! Though perfect and sinless, He died in disgrace upon Calvary's cross as a malefactor so that His payment for sin might be credited to our account

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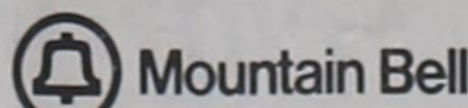

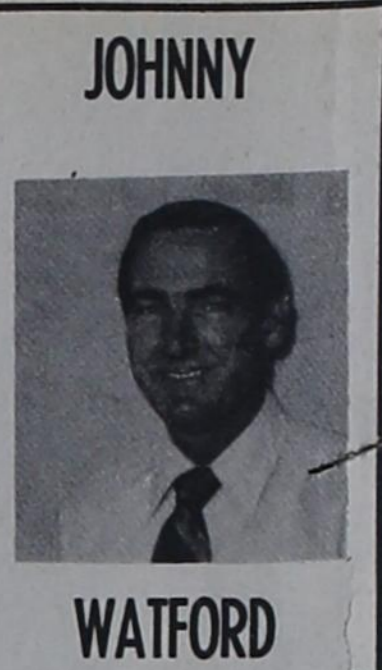
Last year he worked as a teaching assistant at Texas Tech University while working on his Ph.D in mathematics.

Car, Motorcycle Collide In Texico

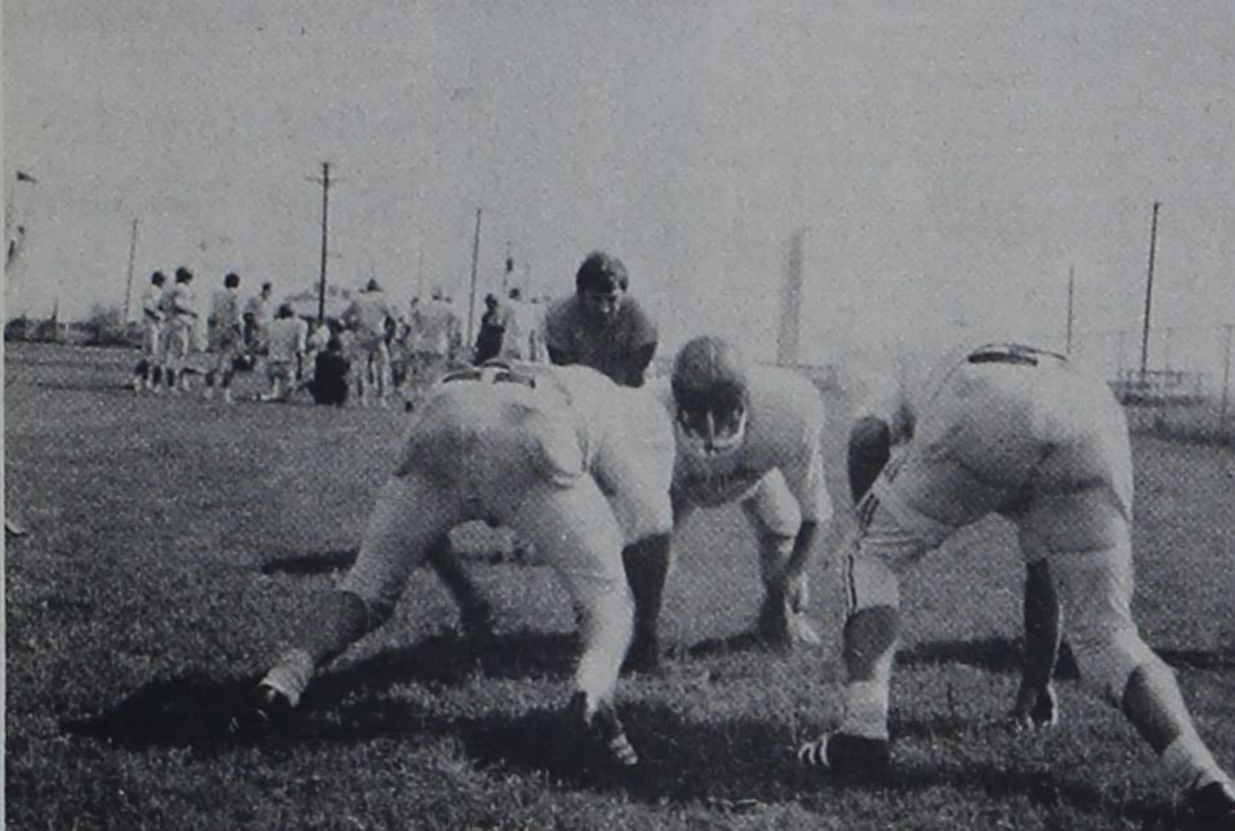
