Farwell City Council, at its regular monthly meeting Friday, Sept. 29, accepted the completion of new water lines installed in the city. A new line was installed from Avenue F to Avenue B between Fifth and Sixth streets. A line was replaced in the alley between First and Third streets on Avenue B.

Posters should be finished by Wednesday, Oct. 11, so that firemen may judge the posters that night at a meeting. First prize is \$15; second prize, \$10; and third prize, \$5.

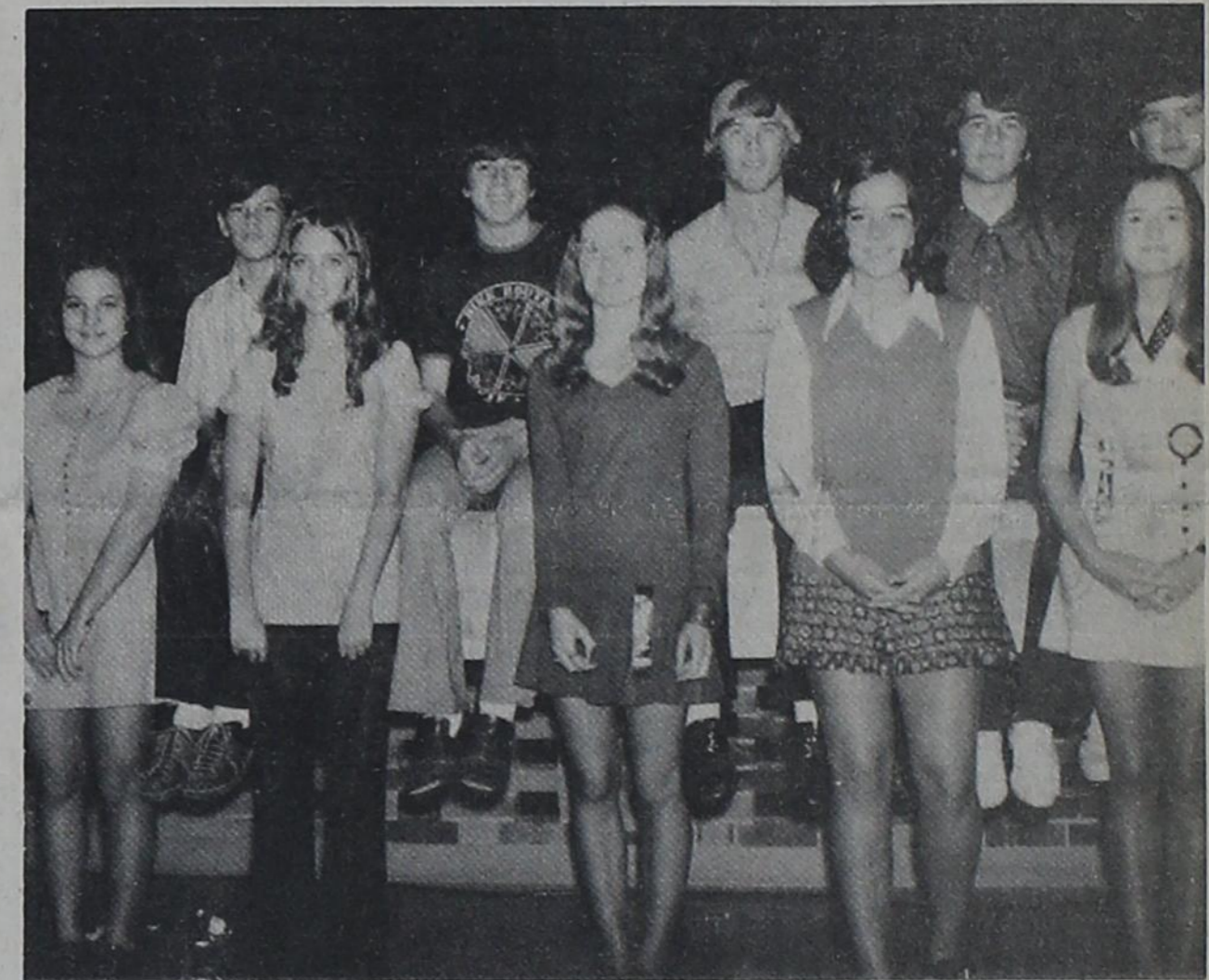

The group in attendance Tuesday night formed a steering committee. Another session has been scheduled Tuesday, Oct. 17, at 7:30 p.m. The location of the meeting will be released later.

Troy Ramsey of Eastern Plains Planning Council conducted the meeting. He was introduced by Manford Turnbough, Texico mayor. Ramsey introduced his wife and Eleanor Dominguez, public relations woman for the State Planning Office.

He explained that Eastern Plains Planning Council was set up to help particularly rural

areas plan for the future. The Council includes seven Eastern New Mexico counties.

He said that specific plans are available through federal programs plus money provided by the city initiating the plan. The first step in developing a plan for the city is to determine what steps have already taken in the areas of natural resources, physical needs and socio-economic needs by the city for its residents.

He suggested compiling these statistics and information on the present situation before making plans for a specific project. The group decided to let Ramsey

contact governmental funding agencies and gather the information already compiled in the areas mentioned.

Ramsey handed out questionnaires to the group. It was decided that these should be filled out and returned to the City Clerk's office by Friday, Oct. 13, so that a summary of specific goals and objectives may be ready at the next meeting of the Community Planning Committee.

All persons wishing to give their ideas on the goals and objectives they feel the City of Texico should pursue in the future, should study the list

printed below, put their ideas on paper, and turn them in to the Clerk's office by Oct. 13.

In this way, every resident in the City of Texico and within a three-mile radius, which is also included in the planning, may make their suggestions known to Texico City Council members and to the Community Planning Committee.

A semi-trailer "piggy-back" unit, driven by Charles Ross, Jr., of Dallas was literally split in half when a Santa Fe train hit it at the tracks between Texico and Farwell. The truck, leased to Whitfield Transportation, was westbound on Highways 70 & 84 when it was hit by the westbound Santa Fe freight train. The train

severed the first trailer approximately four feet from the cab as the truck crossed the tracks into New Mexico. Two-thirds of the first trailer and the second trailer were left behind in Texas. White paint, which was being transported in the truck, spewed onto the front of the train's engine when it plowed into the truck. Sandwich bags, drugs, sundries, paint and paint thinner littered the tracks. Ross was uninjured in the crash, but the tractor and the first trailer were termed a total loss.



## Steers To Host First District Foe Tonight

Farwell Steers will grapple with the Kress Kangaroos at Steer Stadium tonight (Friday) at 8 o'clock. The Steers hope to

show their stuff in their first district game. The next six games will determine who comes up with the District 3-A title.

Coach Toby Booth said the Kangaroos are crippled up, too. Farwell has been plagued during the season by injuries. He said they run the wishbone formation.

The Kangaroos' greatest asset, according to Booth, is their defense. "We hope to be able to move the ball and also to be able to stop it," he added. Kress has 14 lettermen returning which includes six offensive and six defensive starters. The Kangaroos bested District 3-A contenders last year for the title.

Despite personnel changes which have taken place in the Kress offensive backfield this year and reportedly a lack of speed, the Kangaroos are expected to be a tough team.

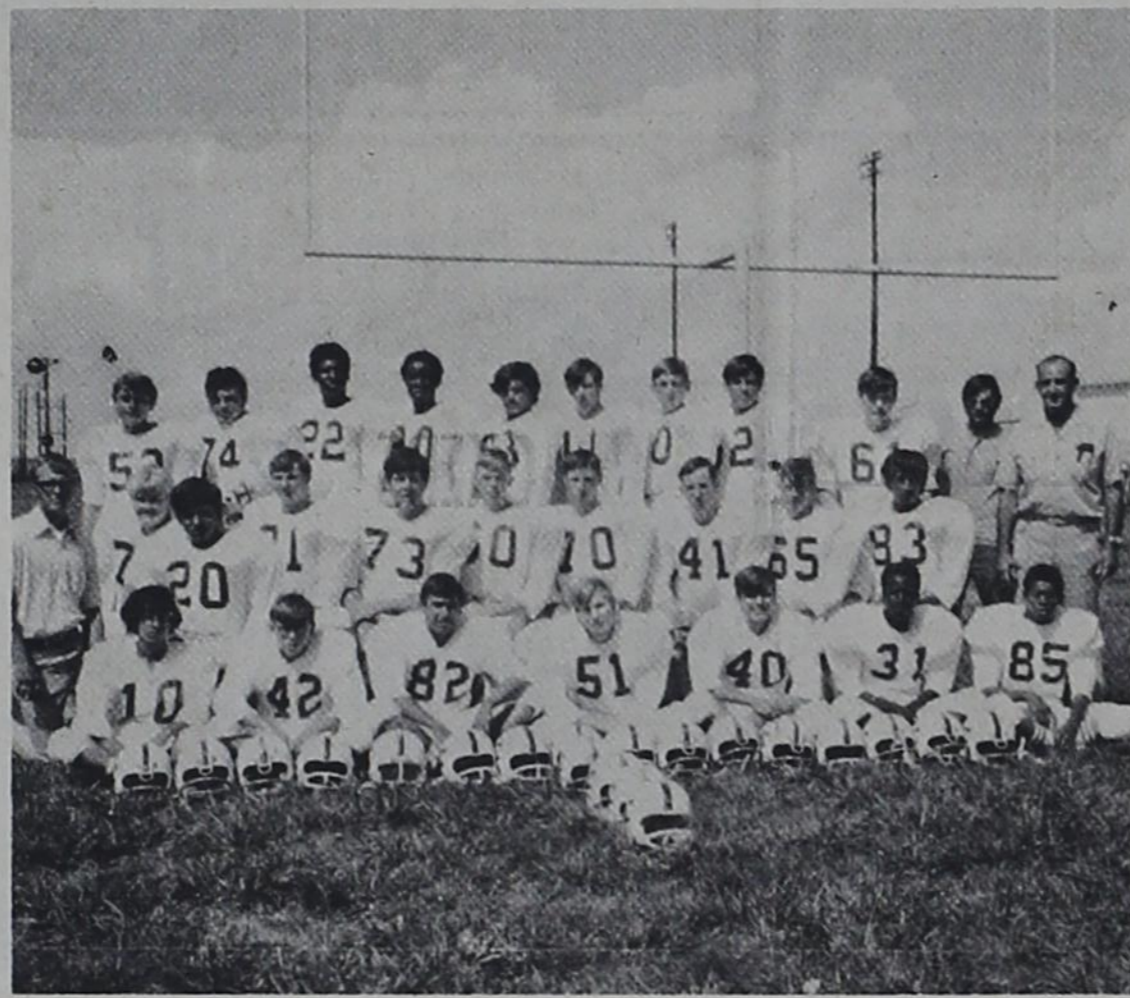
Senior High girls bested Floyd 21-0 after only four innings of play. Judy Yell was winning pitcher and Kim Pearce was catcher.

Coach Charles Stockton said the teams did really well. "We played everyone and even changed pitchers," he said.

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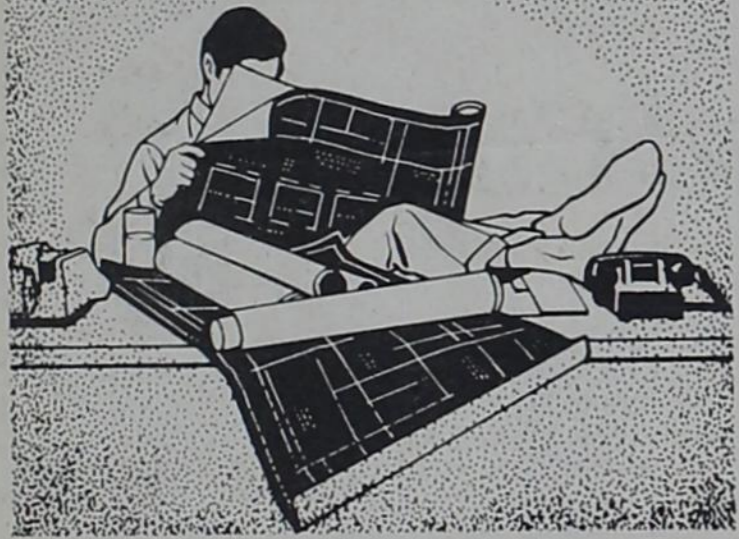

# Seagraves Eagles Fly Past Farwell Steers 43-13

Well, between the Eagles, referees, and linemen, Seagraves took a well-organized victory over Farwell. As for the statistics, Farwell should have won. The Eagles had 484 total yards to the Steers' 480. Farwell kept the ball longer than Seagraves but just wasn't able to get those 30 points. The Steers also led in first downs having 17 to the Eagles' 15. There weren't too many fans out, but Farwell played their best ballgame of the season considering all oppositions.

To start things off, the Steers kicked off to the Eagles for them to start play on their 33-yard line. Seagraves got only two plays until the ball was jarred loose with Farwell recovering and starting offensive play on Seagrave's 42. The Steers were not able to obtain a first down and the Eagles took it again on their own 34. Seagraves was forced to punt with Farwell taking it on our own 10.

On first down, Quarterback Kevin Hargrove kept the ball to run 81 yards and put the ball on Seagrave's nine-yard line. Three plays later, Ray Norton ran the ball four yards and over the goal line to give Farwell the first touchdown of the night.

Doug Johnston kicked the ball for the extra point straight through the goal posts to give Farwell seven points with 5:53 remaining in the first quarter. We had high aspirations of taking our first victory of the season with these first six minutes of the game.

In only seven plays and 66 yards, Seagraves made their first tally with a completed pass for the points after touchdown making it 8-7 with 3:14 remaining in the first quarter.

An onside kick was attempted by the Eagles but it failed and the Steers took over on our own 40. We were forced to punt and the Eagles started their drive again. Soon after the second quarter started, an Eagle ran 59 yards to be stopped by Carl Kirkland coming out of nowhere. Two plays later, they went over for another TD. The PAT kick was good and Seagraves led 15-7 with 10:58 left in the first half.

Farwell was forced to punt after the Eagle kickoff, but soon got it back with Carl Kirkland intercepting a pass, and offensive play started on Seagrave's

38-yard line. Four plays afterward, the Steers fumbled and the Eagles took over on their own 25. Two plays following, an Eagle ran 68 yards for another Seagraves TD. The PAT try failed and it was now 21-7 with 6:21 remaining in the second quarter.

Shortly after taking control of the ball, Hargrove was bugged up and since we only have one quarterback now with Johnny Boling out with knee trouble, David Dannheim went in as quarterback. Dannheim picked up 10 yards while quarterbacking, but since there was an earlier penalty it was not enough for a first down and the Steers were forced to punt. Seagraves traveled 55 yards for another TD and their try for extra points was good giving them eight points to make it 29-7 with 1:08 remaining in the first half.

Seagraves kicked off to start the second half. After each team exchanged punts, Farwell was back in possession until it was fumbled with Seagraves taking over again on Farwell's 28. After this, the ball changed from one team to the other eight times with fumbles, interceptions and forced punts. After Seagraves was finally able to hang onto the ball, an Eagle ran 46 yards for a TD. The extra point kick was good and Seagraves led 36-7 with 10:23 remaining in the game.

During the next nine plays of the Steers, they picked up 51 yards. There was an apparent five-yard penalty against the Steers, but then it was changed to a five-yard penalty against the Eagles.

Winfred Long picked up four yards to the Eagles' 3-yard-line but the play was questionable. The referees gave the ball to Seagraves saying the Eagles were in possession of the ball when it was blown dead.

The referee's action was strongly protested by Farwell, but it did no good. On top of this, they handed Farwell a 15-yard penalty for unsportsmanlike conduct, and Seagraves took over on their own 18-yard line.

If anyone was unsportsmanlike, as this writer sees it, it was the referees. The chant started, "We're from Farwell, couldn't be prouder..." and we meant it. There was 3:41 left in the ballgame at this time.

Seagraves was forced to punt and Farwell took over on our

own 38-yard line. It took the Steers only two plays to get those 62 yards. Hargrove connected with Kirkland on a pass to pick up 27 yards and then to Dannheim for 35 yards. Dannheim caught the pass while in the endzone. The try for extra points failed and this boosted Farwell's score to 13 with 2:04 remaining in the game.

An onside kick was tried but it failed and the Eagles took over on the Steer 43. It took Seagraves only three plays to get their 43 yards for another TD. Their PAT was good and the score stood 43-13 with 1:19 remaining.

After Farwell received the ball, the second play was a completed pass by QB Dannheim for 18 yards, and the next play Dannheim kept the ball for 21 yards. Time was running out for the Steers and there was an incomplete pass. The next play was a completed pass of 22 yards to Carl Kirkland putting the ball on Seagrave's one-yard line and the clock stopping with one second left to play. The Steers were unable to get another play underway and the buzzer sounded leaving the final score, Seagraves 43 and Farwell 13.

We hope to see all Steer supporters out as the Steers meet Kress in their first conference game tonight (Friday) at 8 o'clock.

Over 103,000 4-H'ers in the national 4-H food preservation program, sponsored by a well-known glass manufacturing company, enjoy preserving foods, as gifts for others and for quick and easy meals at home. And they find canning and freezing an economical way to use foods in season.

The 4-H'ers who enroll in the

program may preserve foods from their own gardens or realize savings by purchasing plentiful foods. They look for quality produce and then follow recommended preserving practices in assuring tasty, nutritious meals.

Besides projects which are led by 52 leaders in the county, aided by County Extension Agents Mack Heald and Jana Pronger, 4-H activities include food shows, livestock shows and dress revues where 4-H'ers can compete with each other and receive achievement awards for their accomplishments.

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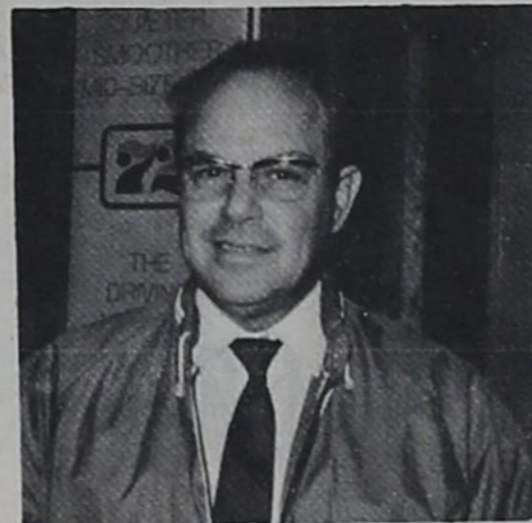

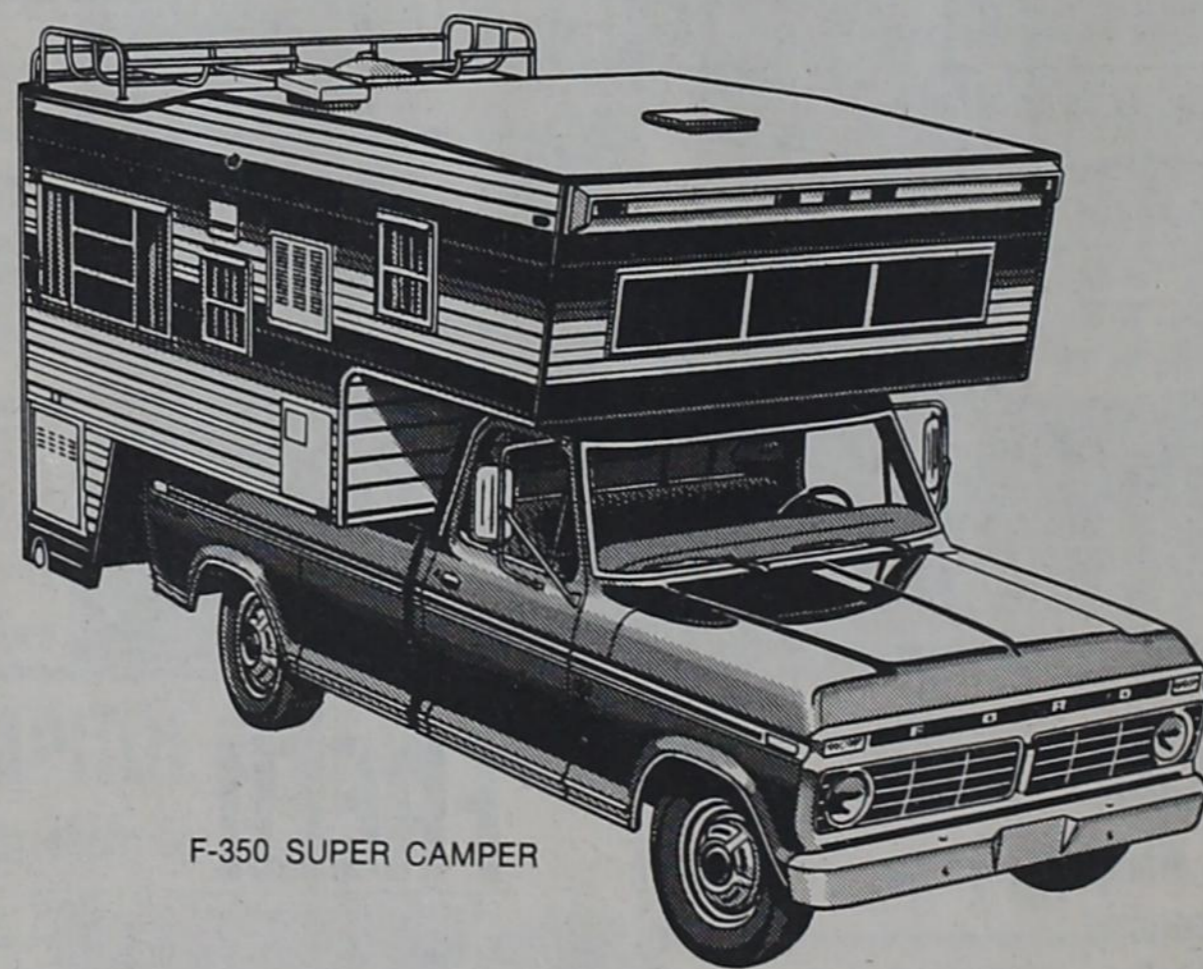

### PEANUT BRITTLE

Cream until sugar melts:  
2 c. sugar  
1 c. Karo (white)  
¼ c. water

Cook until 238 degrees Fahrenheit on candy thermometer. Add 2 cups raw peanuts. Cook until golden brown. Remove from heat and add 1 t. salt, 1 t. vanilla and 2 t. baking

soda. Pour quickly onto buttered cookie sheet. Cool. Then break into pieces.

### COCONUT POUND CAKE

2 c. sugar  
1 c. shortening  
1 t. vanilla  
1 t. butter  
6 eggs  
1 t. salt  
2 c. flour  
1 c. coconut

Mix ingredients in order, adding one egg at a time. Then coconut. Bake in 10 inch tube pan at 325 degrees for one hour and 20 minutes.

### SPANISH CHICKEN

½ lbs. fryer, cut up  
1 T. fat  
¼ c. minced onion  
1/8 c. minced green pepper  
½ lb. canned tomatoes  
½ bay leaf  
½ minced clove garlic  
¾ t. salt  
Dash pepper  
½ c. raw rice  
Grated cheese

Saute chicken in fat in dutch oven until well browned. Add onion and next six ingredients. Simmer covered 30 minutes. Add rice, cover. DO NOT STIR. Simmer 30 minutes longer or until all is tender. Top with grated cheese and let melt.

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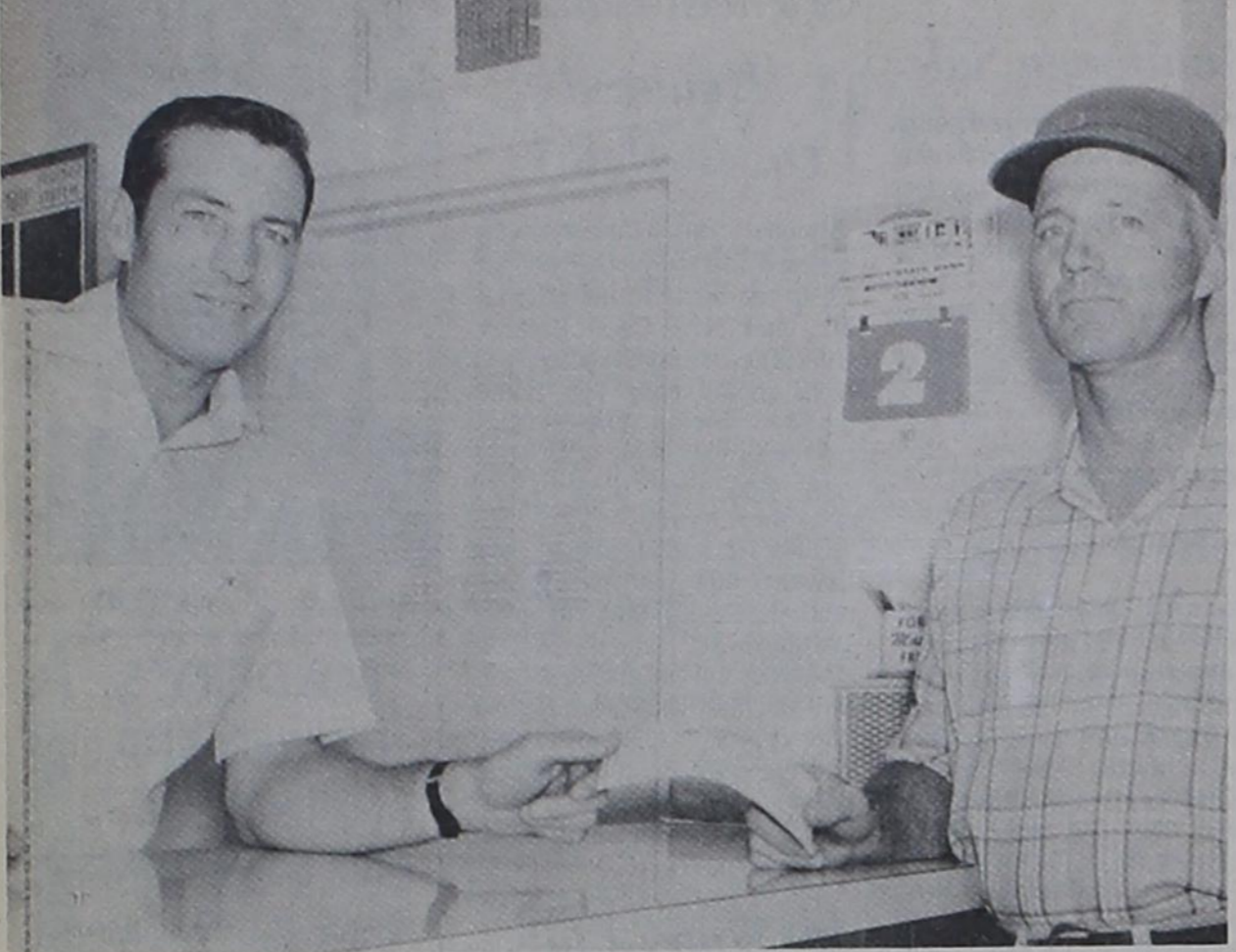

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## TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BEREAH BIBLE SOCIETY, CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60635

### DISCIPLES AND APOSTLES

"And when it was day, He called unto Him His disciples; and of them He chose twelve, whom also He named apostles" (Luke 6:13).

Many people fail to distinguish between our Lord's disciples: They suppose they are the same. This is incorrect, however, for our Lord had a multitude of disciples while He had only a few apostles. His apostles were chosen from among His disciples, as we learn from the above passage from Luke's gospel.

A disciple is a *follower*; an apostle is a *"sent one."* A disciple is a *learner*; an apostle is a *teacher*. There is a great lesson here for us all to learn.

We must come before we can go. We must follow before we can be sent. We must learn before we can teach. We must listen to the Lord before we can speak for the Lord.

"Thus saith the Lord," was the familiar phrase with which the Old Testament prophets began their messages. But at the head of the long list of Old Testament prophets we find Samuel, a young lad, saying: "Speak Lord, for Thy servant heareth" (1 Sam. 3:9).

Before we can do or say anything for God, then, we must listen to God. This explains why the reading and study of the Word of God is so important.

First, salvation itself comes by hearing and believing God's Word, especially about Christ, and His death for our sins. Rom. 10:17 says: "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God," and 1 Pet. 1:23: "Being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth forever." Then, having been saved, we can serve God acceptably only by diligent study of His Word. Perhaps the most important passage in the Bible on this subject is II Tim. 2:15: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth."

# Steers Of The Week

## Districts Favor Amendment

A statewide campaign in support of Amendment 9 has been launched by the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, headquartered in Temple.

Amendment No. 9 on the November General Election ballot would exempt soil and water conservation districts from the constitutional ban on dual office-holding.

Directors of Texas 192 soil and water conservation districts receive no salary. They are persons with farm or ranch interests elected by landowners to manage district affairs. They do, however, receive state per diem payments when on district business.

This reimbursement for expenses brings the office of soil and water conservation district director under the constitutional

prohibition against dual office-holding and dual compensation for state employees.

As Doyle Hutcheson of Weatherford, president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, points out:

"Our directors, who are leaders in their communities, are ineligible to serve on school boards, city councils or any other unpaid elective position. This often denies a community - particularly smaller communities - the services of its best and most qualified people."

Passage of Amendment 9 would not violate the spirit of the common law principle that no person should hold two or more public offices which pose a conflict of interest, Hutcheson said.

Lariat brought in the load which had a moisture content of around 14 per cent and a test weight of 55 lbs. He received a \$25 premium.

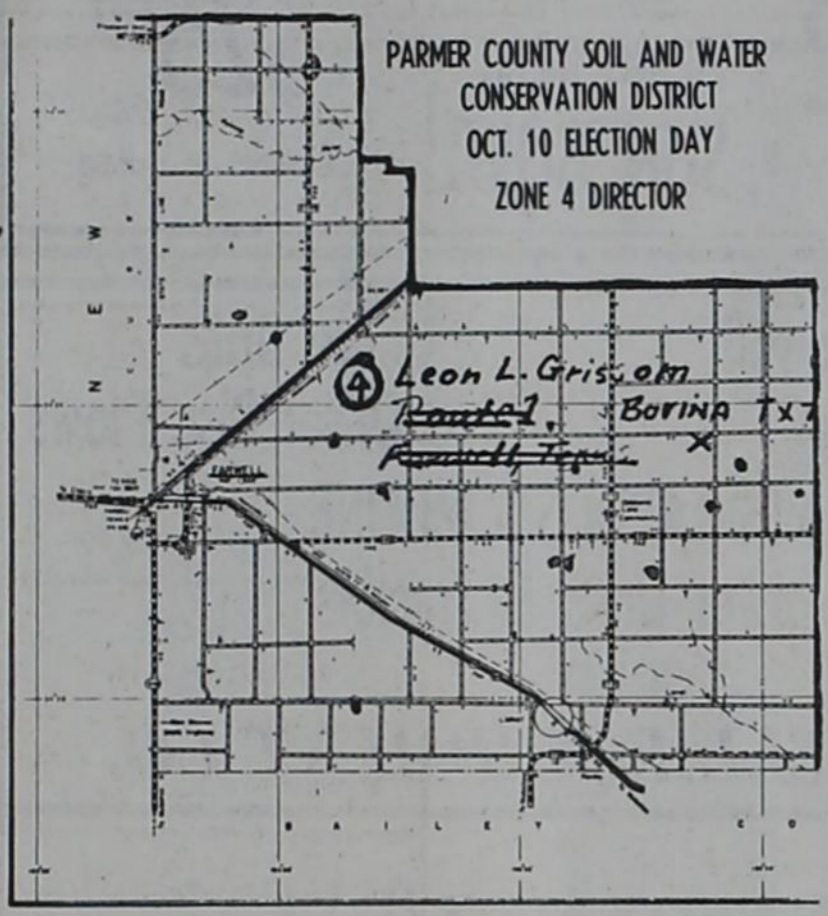

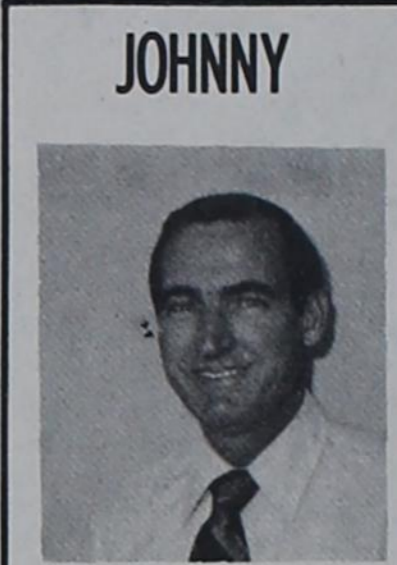
Mrs. Loren Wilson of Texico was released Saturday afternoon from Clovis hospital. She underwent surgery Friday-morning. She says she is doing very well.

Texico Fire Department sent a fire-fighting vehicle and an emergency vehicle to the site of the train-truck wreck Saturday around noon as a precautionary procedure.

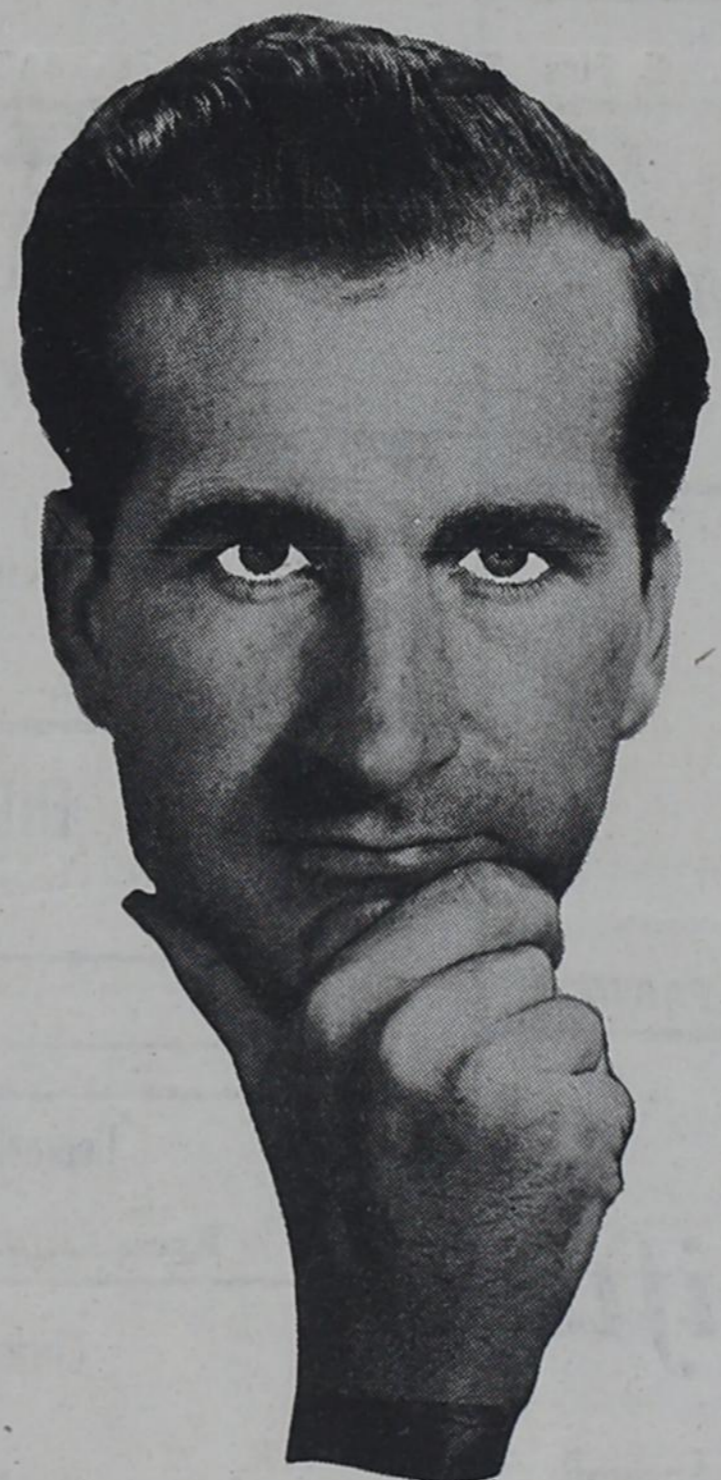
