## W. H. Jarrell Buried Mon.

Funeral services for Mr. William Harvey Jarrell, Sr., were Monday morning at Steed Memorial Chapel in Clovis. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery. Rev. J. L. Bass of Odessa officiated.

Mr. Jarrell passed away Saturday at 2 a.m. in Retirement Ranch in Clovis. He was 103 years old, having been born Sept. 3, 1869 in Lake Charles, La., to Johnathan Printess Jarrell and Bell Barton Jarrell.

Mr. Jarrell and his wife, who preceded him in death, had 10 children. Five of the children have preceded him in death.

The five living children are Ayera Jarrell of Texico, Mrs. Tom Crews of Coleman, Tex., Joe and Spencer Jarrell of Clovis and Mrs. John Hightower of Texico. Others surviving are 23 grandchildren, 48 great-grandchildren and 22 great-great-grandchildren.

Mr. Jarrell came to Farwell in 1918 and settled nine miles north of town. He farmed there many years before retiring and moving to California where he resided 18 years. He returned to this area in January, 1962. On Jan. 18, 1962, Mr. Jarrell made his home at Retirement Ranch.

He was a member of the Baptist Church, actively participating in helping the church.

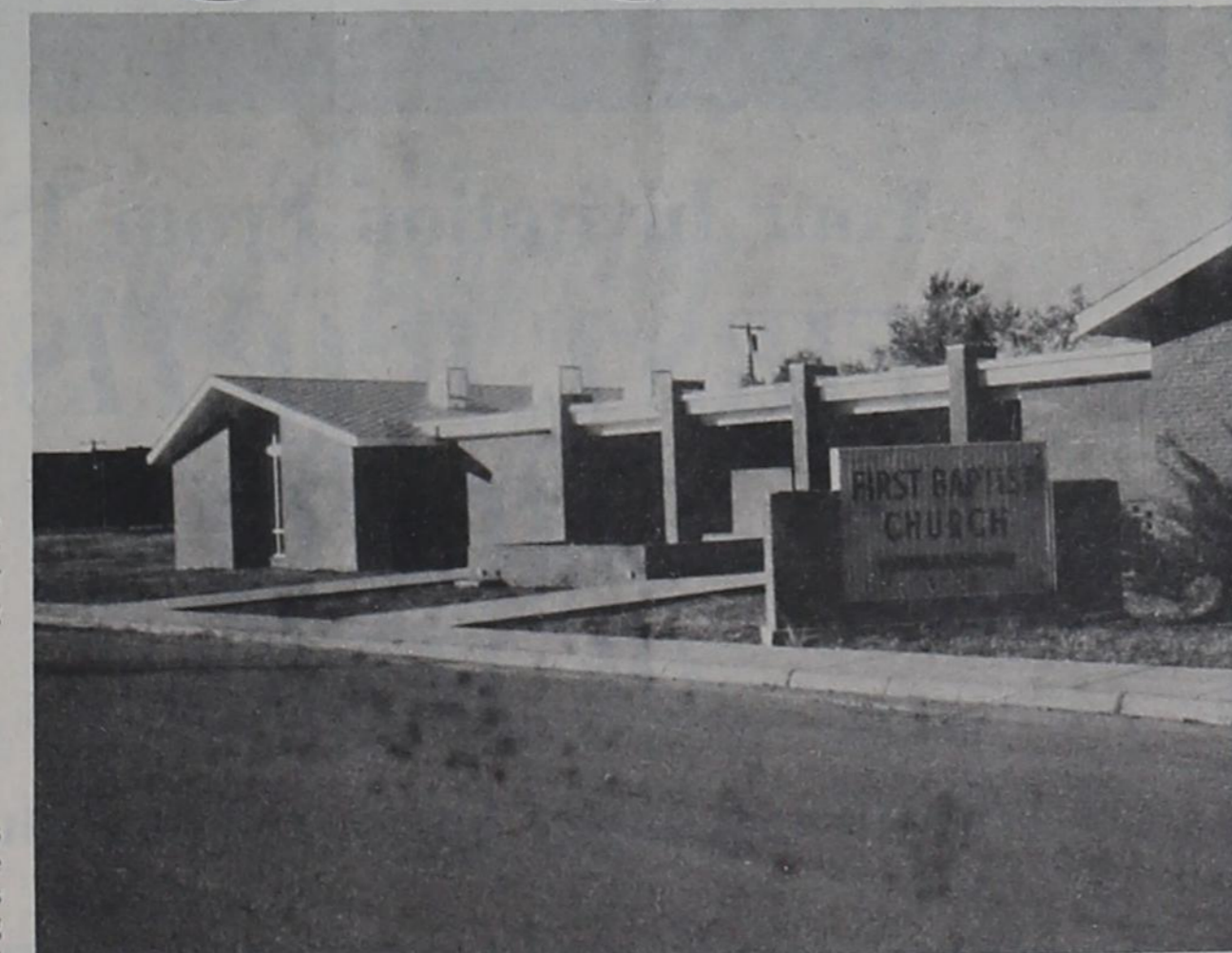

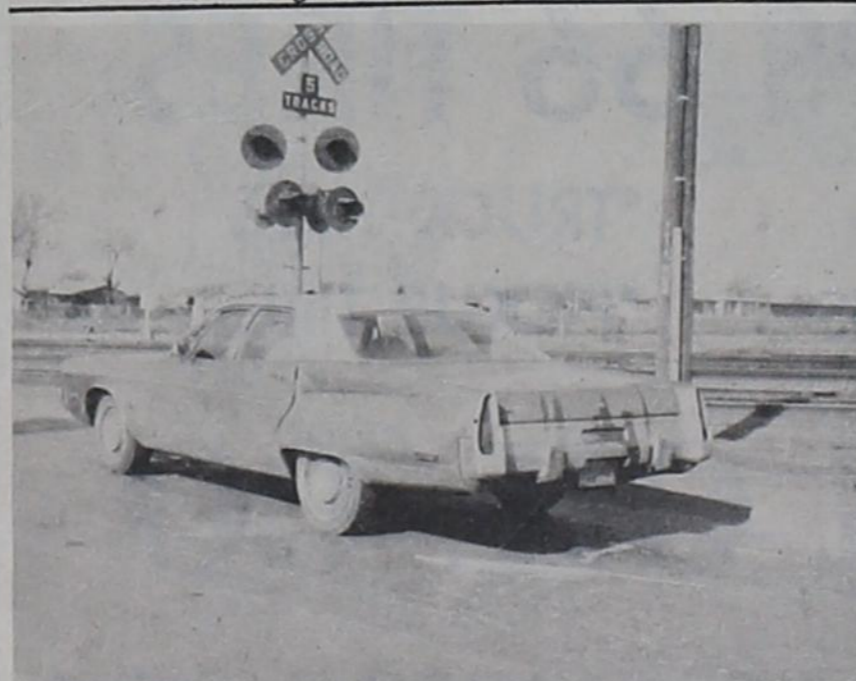



## In Library - - Texico Elementary Gets An Aquarium

Texico Elementary School children have found something new to marvel at these days. Two weeks ago, on Nov. 14, an aquarium was installed in the library at the school.

Two days later, on Nov. 16, the aquarium was stocked with 14 fish of various shapes, sizes and colors. Since that time three of the fish have died, but 13 more fish have been added.

The first fish stocked in the 50-gallon aquarium included a pair of Jack Dempseys, a pair of green Swordtails, a pair of Corydoras catfish, three black Mollies, one paradise fish, a pair of black Tetras and a pair of Danios.

The next day after the first fish were turned into the aquarium, the two Jack Dempsey fish were found on the library floor. For some unknown reason, they had jumped out of the tank.

A black Mollie fish, which was pregnant, also died. Principal Jim Rogers later read that expectant mother fish should be not be moved.

The second batch of fish to come to live in the aquarium includes a Chinese scavenger, three Neon fish, two more Mollies, two more Swordtails, two more catfish, two Angel fish and a Siamese fighting fish.

Mrs. Betsy Autrey, school secretary, says each morning a group of children gathers around the tank before they go to class. Another group usually flocks around when they come to get their meal tickets.

At library time, the teachers have been letting a few students at a time watch the fish while others are checking out books. The aquarium is creating much interest at the school, especially since it was purchased with funds raised by Texico Elementary at the recent Texico School Carnival.

After \$15.50 was made from the Fish Pond and \$112.36 from the Country Store at the Carnival, one representative from each elementary school room and two adults got together to decide what to do with the money.

They decided an aquarium would be of great value to the school and provide the students with tangible result of their efforts in the Carnival.

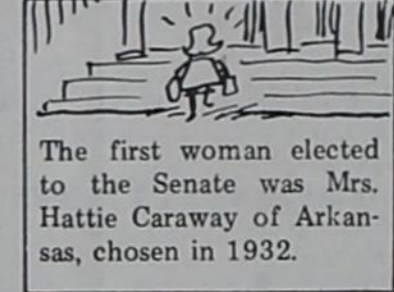

Nov. 21, 62-32. Sharon Booth was high point individual with 23 points.

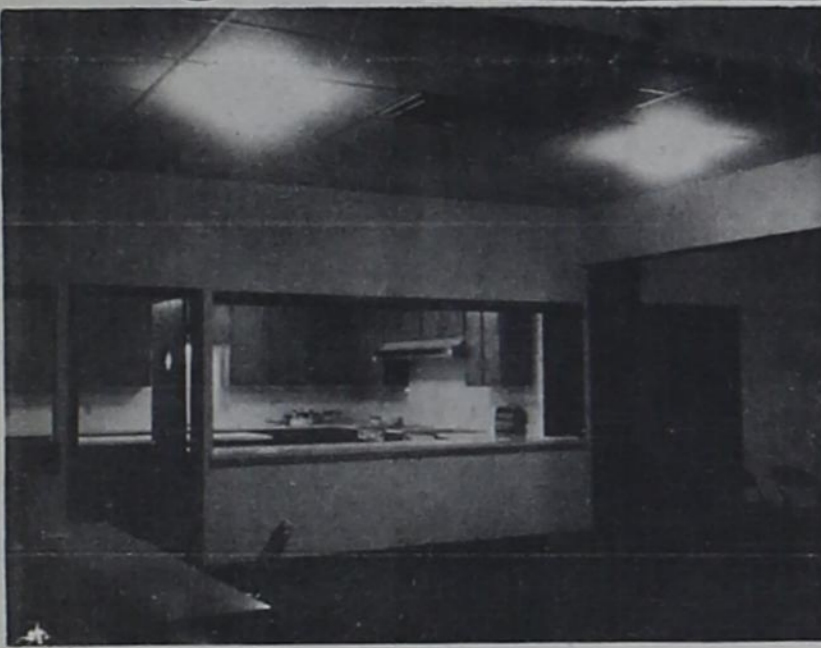

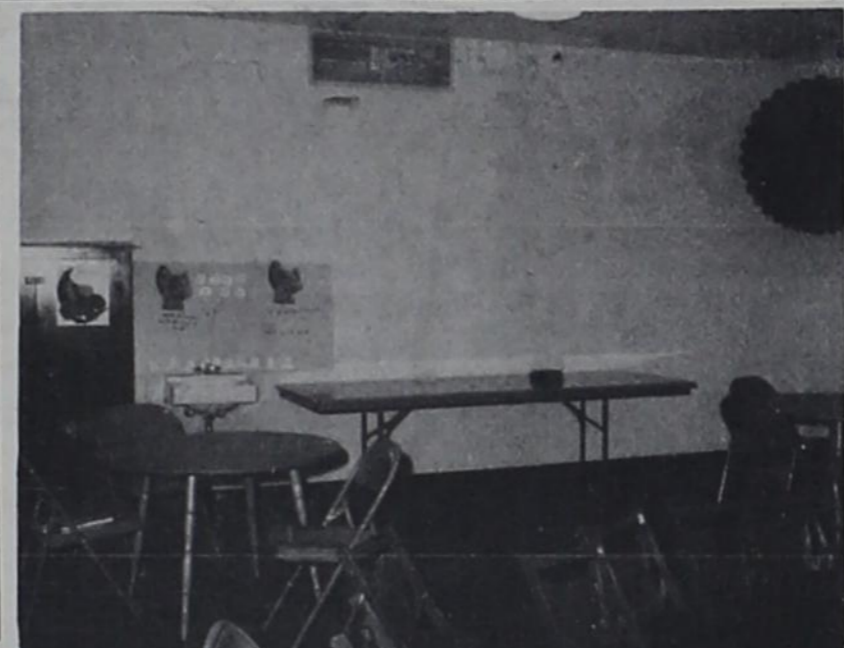

## If Steak Is Too Expensive Buy A Cheaper Cut Of Beef

**COLLEGE STATION** - So you think steak is too expensive?

"If you complain to me about the price of steaks - I suggest that you buy a cheaper cut of beef," said Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"There are plenty of low-priced cuts of beef available to you, such as hamburger, stewing, short ribs and others."

Uvacek listed three factors which account for the increased demand for beef - higher per capita incomes, beef is a luxury food, and the change in tastes and preferences of Americans.


The specialist has some significant observations concerning beef prices. "Relative to other foods, beef is now actually cheaper than it was in the early 1950's or early 1960's. Relative to your income, beef is cheaper today than it has ever been in history."

The livestock industry has tried to produce more beef, but during 1971 and 1972 production has not been able to keep up with the rising demand. From 1950 to 1970 beef production increased 127 percent in an effort to meet demands - that's 6.4 percent per year.

In 1971, beef production increased only two percent above the 1970 level. The result was a reduction in beef consumption during 1971. It was the largest drop in per capita beef consumption in 13 years. The ultimate reaction was obvious - higher beef prices.

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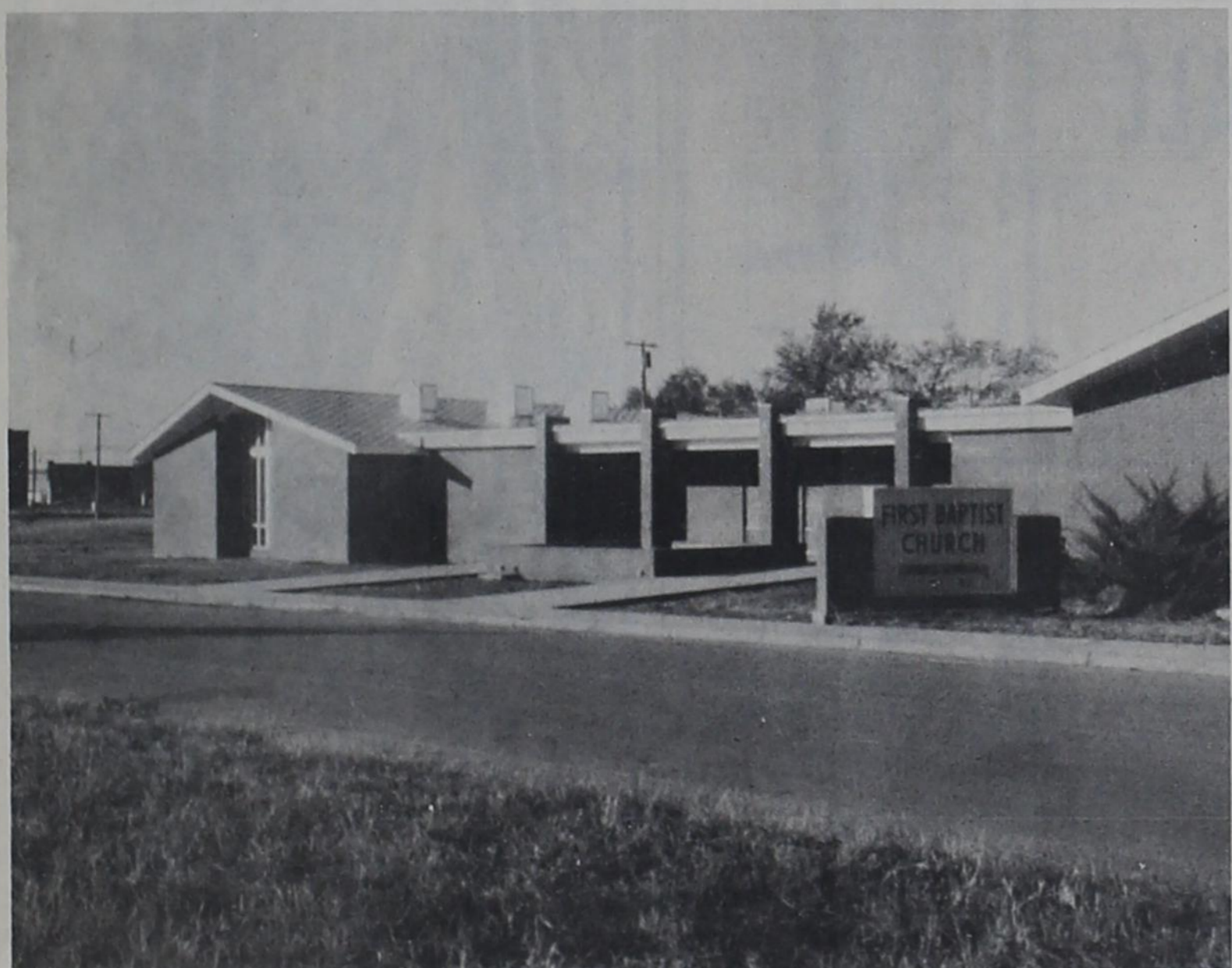

# At Home In Parmer County

By Jana Pronger  
County HD Agent

Understanding and cooperation between the hunter and the cook are two ingredients for tasty deer.

A good flavor is characteristic of wild game, but the undesirable "gamey" flavors of meat ruined before it hits the kitchen is another matter.

Flavor is a result of three factors - conditions of the game, handling in the field and cooking procedure.

Old, poor animals will be less tender than young ones, but range conditions are reported good throughout Texas this year, so it is likely game will be in good condition.

Proper handling in the field centers on proper cleaning and quick cooling. Hunters generally agree that proper cleaning demands a well-placed shot in a vital area that doesn't rupture intestines or paunch.

Quick cooling delays spoilage, so the animal should be drawn at once. Move the animal so its head is uphill. Make a ventral cut from the base of the tail to the breastbone and roll the viscera out. Avoid slashing the intestines or stomach. Wipe the body cavity with clean cloths or paper towels, but don't use water.

Hanging the carcass will hasten cooling. Protect meat from flies and dust with muslin or cheesecloth bags which let air circulate. Heavy tarpaulins and airtight game bags keep body heat in and slow down cooling.

Proper loading and transporting the animal is essential to handling, most hunters caution. Carrying the animal - still wrapped in the protective cloth - on top of the car is recommended. Also, on cool days, the car trunk offers a safe place.

## TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM PRES. BEREAN BIBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60635

### GOD HATH SPOKEN

In his farewell address to the nation Israel, Moses said: "Ask now of the days that are past . . . since the day that God created man upon the earth, and ask from one side of heaven to the other, whether there hath been any such thing as this great thing is, or hath been heard like it? Did ever people hear the voice of God speaking out of the midst of the fire as thou hast heard . . .?"

Moses referred, of course, to the givings of the law, when God spoke to Israel by word of mouth amid the lightnings and thunders of Sinai. In Israel's case alone "God spake all these words" audibly. Never before had He undertaken to address a nation personally.

This was indeed a great honor for Israel, but God has since spoken to all mankind in an even more striking manner, for in Heb. 1:1,2 we read:

"God . . . hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son . . . when He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high."

At Sinai God spoke the words of the law; but now, in Christ, He speaks of mercy and grace. There He spoke of the righteousness which He demands; but here He tells of the righteousness which He provides in Christ.

Some suppose that the absence of miraculous demonstrations, the want of divine intervention in the affairs of men, etc., indicate indifference on God's part, but actually this apparent indifference speaks to us of His love and grace.

Remember, the Psalms and all prophecy had predicted God's judgment upon men for their rejection of Christ, yet today the Son still voluntarily remains a royal Exile from the world, while neither He nor the Father do anything to avenge His cruel crucifixion. Meanwhile, still lingering in mercy, He sends His ambassadors to offer reconciliation to His enemies by grace through faith. Thus His silence actually cries: "The door of grace is still open. Be reconciled while you may. Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved."

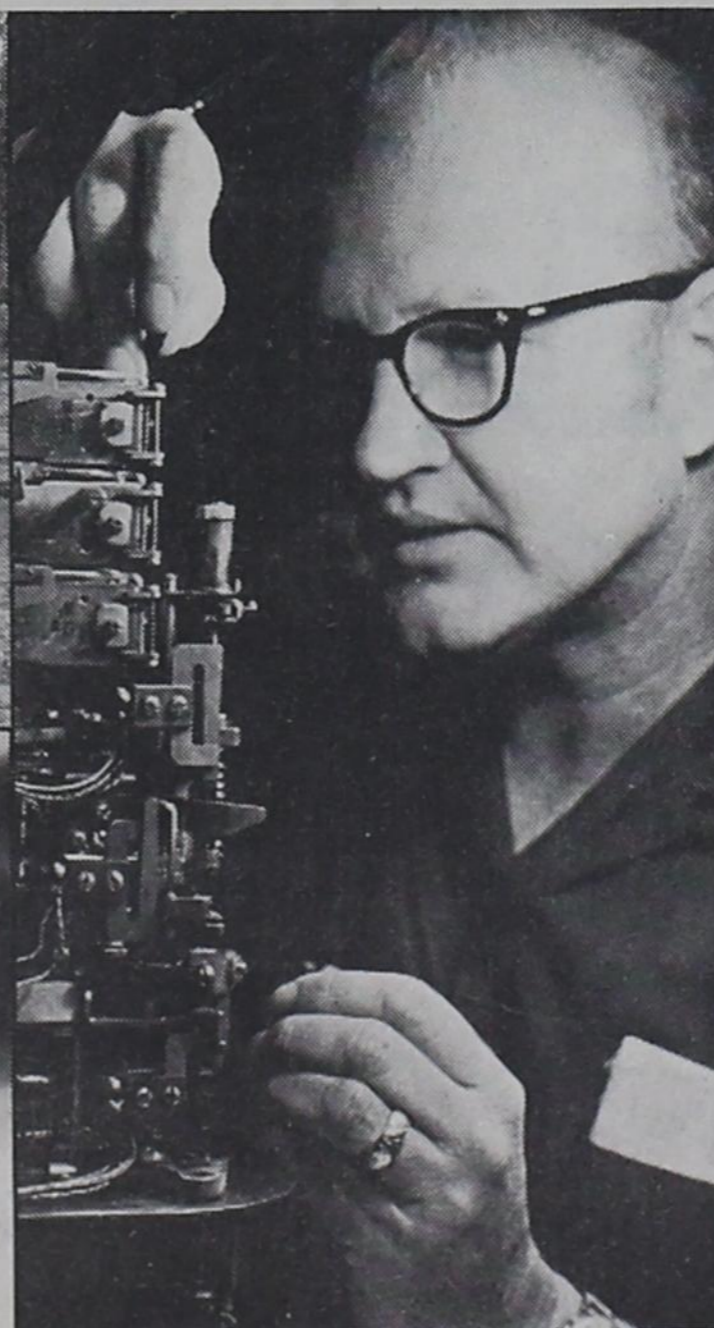
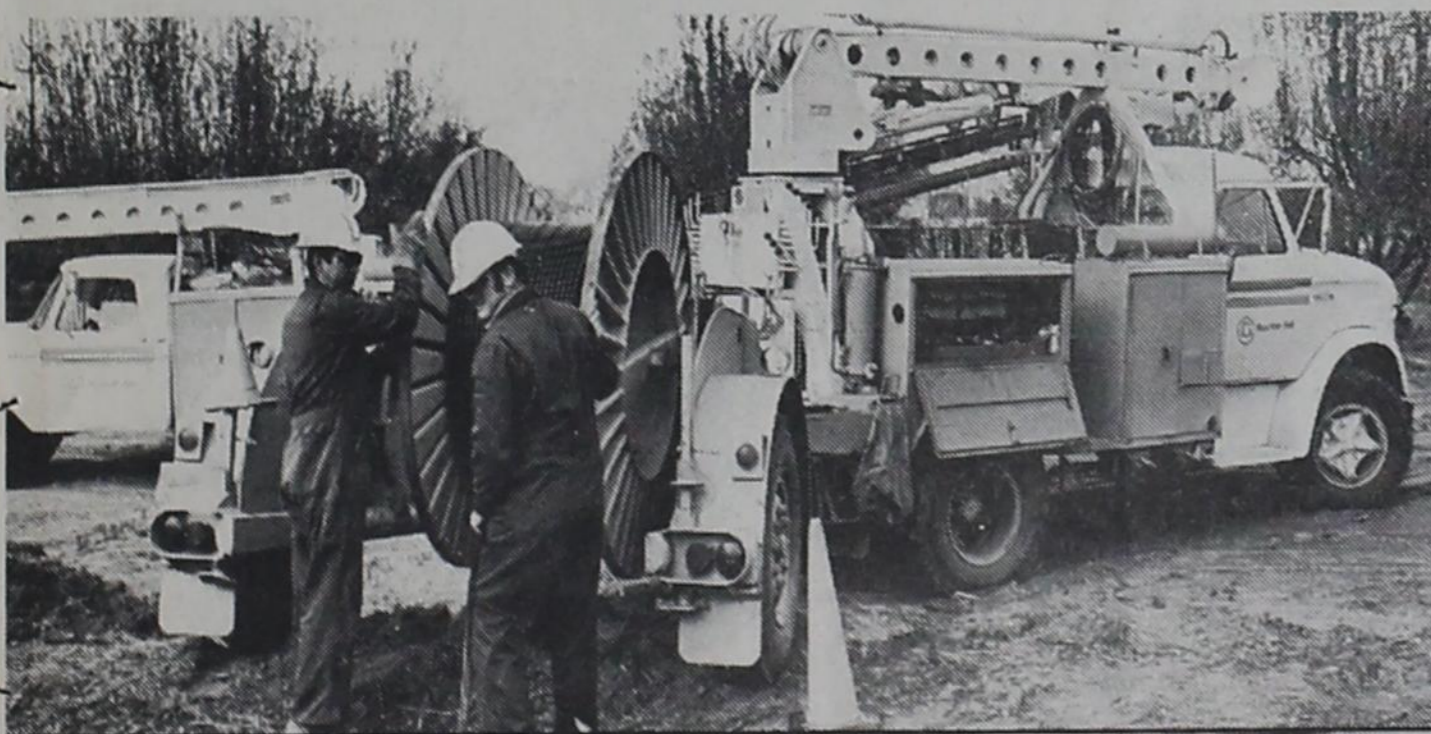

**NEW BRAKE  
AND LIGHTING  
REQUIREMENTS FOR  
COTTON TRAILERS**

New lighting and brake requirements for cotton trailers have been enacted by the special session of the Texas Legislature, replacing a law passed in August, 1971.

An analysis by the Department of Public Safety lists the following specific provisions for cotton trailers.

Trailers under 15,000 pounds gross weight when operated during the daytime with visibility more than 1,000 feet:

Trailers less than 80 inches in width and under 30 feet in length:

Two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers less than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

One amber reflector on each side centrally located on trailer body.

Two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

Two amber reflectors, one on each side near the front. One amber reflector on each side centrally located on the trailer body. Two red reflectors, one on each side near the rear. Two red reflectors, one on each side of the rear.

Trailers that are operated at night and when visibility is less than 1,000 feet are required to have the following electric lights and reflectors:

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and under 30 feet in length:

Two amber clearance lamps on front, one on each side near corner.

Two amber side marker lamps, one on each side near front. Two amber reflectors, one on each side near front. Two red side marker lamps, one on each side near the rear. Two red reflectors, one on each side near the rear. Two red stop lamps, one on each side on the

rear. Two red tail lamps, one on each side on the rear. Two red reflectors, one on each side on the rear. One white lamp on rear to illuminate license plate. Electric turn signal lamps on rear. Two red or amber flashing hazard warning lamps, one on each side on rear.

Trailers more than 80 inches in width and more than 30 feet in length:

All lamps described for shorter trailer plus: One amber reflector on each side centrally located on trailer body. One amber side marker lamp on each side centrally located on trailer body. (A combination lamp will fulfill several lighting requirements. For example, one lighting unit is available to fit on the corners of the trailer body which furnishes front and side clearance and marker lamps.)

The requirement for the three identification lamps was eliminated from the law.

Brakes are not required on trailers up to 15,000 pounds gross weight when operated under 30 miles per hour. The combination of trailers and towing vehicle must be capable of stopping within 50 feet when traveling 20 miles per hour. Slow Moving Vehicle emblems are required only on trailers towed by vehicles which by design go slower than 25 miles per hour (trailers towed by pickup trucks would not require the SMV emblem; those towed by tractors would have to have the SMV sign.)

Trailers weighing over 15,000 pounds gross weight require brakes on all wheels.

Trailer owners are urged to check their vehicles, installing new equipment if necessary in order to conform to the 1972 law. For information about the new enactment, trailer owners can contact the nearest Department of Public Safety office.

High Plains Packing Company, Inc. of Clovis opened the doors of its new and modern custom meat processing plant on November 13. The new company is a consolidation of Durand's Meat Co. and Plains Packing Co. The location of the plant is 802 South Hull and Brady streets, just south of the Ranchers and Farmers Livestock Auction.

The new building and plant meets all the latest federal standards for meat processing plants. At the present time a New Mexico State Sanitation inspector is on duty all the time. This inspector makes a complete survey each morning before the plant begins operations, and if anything is noted that is not up to standard the plant does not begin the day's work until the deficiency is corrected.

The new facility has the most modern kill and dressing out room in the area. Before animals are admitted to the kill room they are marked with a number that follows the animal or the meat throughout the entire process to the final freezing rooms where it awaits the customer.

The plant features a separate dripping and cooling room where the carcass hangs 24 hours before it moves to the aging room where it hangs and ages for tenderness. It goes from the aging room to the custom cutting room where the meat

is cut, prepared and packaged according to the customer's exact specifications. Following the packaging it goes to the quick freeze room where the temperature is kept at 20 degrees below zero. It then is placed in the zero degree holding room until the customer picks it up.

In addition to the custom work, the new business is featuring a retail meat department working under the latest federal standards of sanitation. It will feature all the meat cuts on a retail basis from a package at a time to special cuts for the home freezer.

The plant is managed by the company president, John Wheeler, and the retail meat department is supervised by company vice-president, Bill Jamison.

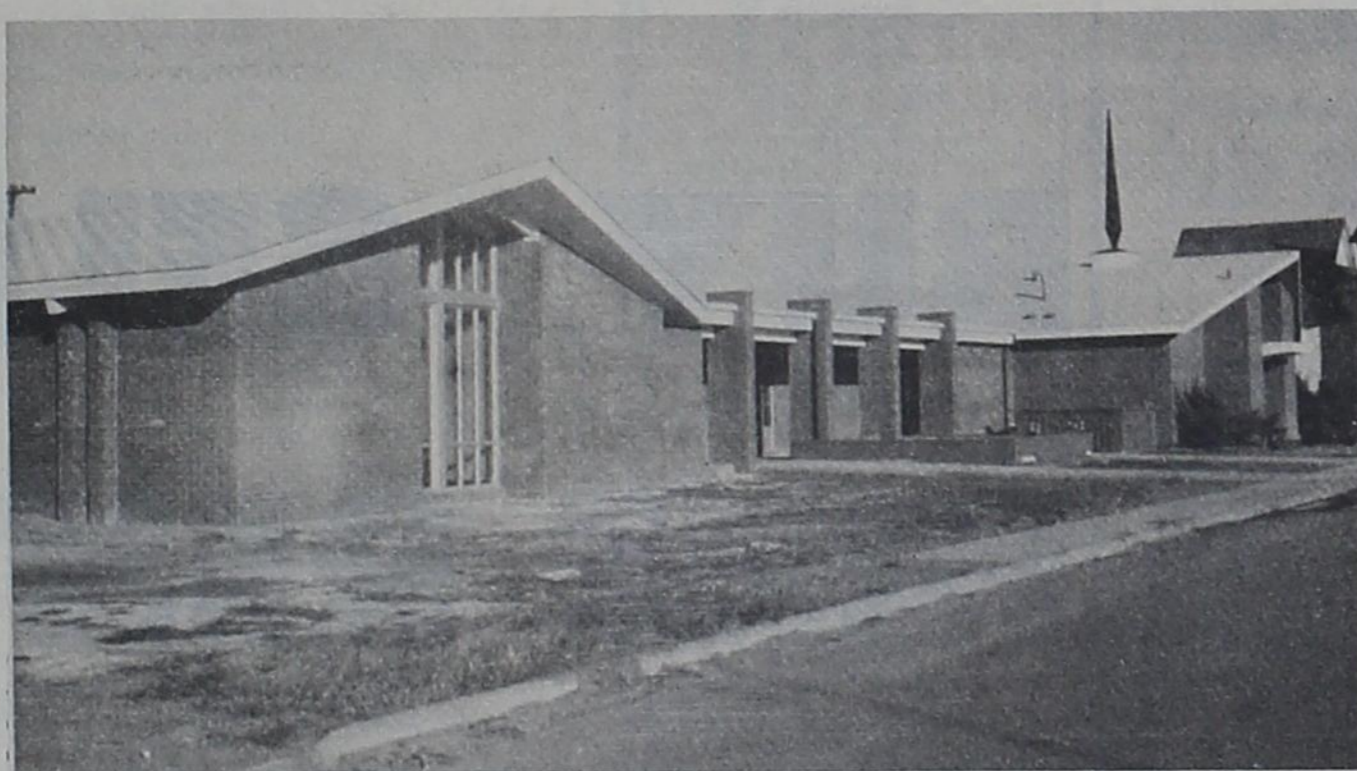
