# Area Churches Plan Christmas Programs

## Board Accepts Resignation

Texico School Board met in special session Nov. 30 to accept the resignation of Mrs. Winnie Cobb of Clovis as senior high English teacher.

The board accepted Mrs. Cobb's resignation and hired Mrs. Carol Cool of Clovis to take her place. Mrs. Cobb gave health reasons as a basis for resigning.

Most of the new space is incorporated into the Medallion Room, a community meeting place which will be available to local groups for meetings, exhibits and other community-boosting uses. One of its features is a beautiful demonstration kitchen, equipped with the latest appliances available. The face lift and addition of the meeting room are the first major changes to the building since it was erected 22 years ago. Deaf Smith REC was organized in 1937 with six employees, and presently employs 42.

James T. Hull, general manager for Deaf Smith REC, feels the cooperative is very fortunate in having Mr. Hamil as its guest Sunday. Hamil started his tenure as administrator of REA under the Eisenhower administration in June 1956 and served until February 1961. He was reappointed in January of 1969 and continues to serve in that capacity.

The administrator, since college days, has been a

rancher engaged in the cattle-feeding business in Logan County, Colo., where he was born Dec. 2, 1908. He and a brother operate 4,500 acres, of which about 1,000 are irrigated. Their principal business is the fattening of cattle with about 5,000 head on hand at all times. They also are producers of sugar beets, alfalfa and corn.

At the time of his appointment as REA Administrator in 1956, Hamil was speaker of the Colorado House of Representatives, a position he had held until 1951. He was first elected to the Colorado General Assembly in 1938 and except for two years he had served it continuously.

He was appointed as executive Director of the Department of Institutions in January, 1963, by Governor John Love and served in that capacity until taking over the reins of REA in the Department of Agriculture again in January, 1969.

### At Home In Parmer County

The upcoming holiday season means traveling for a lot of people. Of course, traveling involves money. Although there is always some danger of losing money, the hustle and bustle of the season can make it even more so. Eliminate that worry by using travelers checks. It is possible to have them replaced at a moment's notice, no matter what has happened to them.

However, the user does have some responsibility. For instance, he must keep track of the checks he has spent. This is simple to do. A purchase agreement is furnished when the checks are bought. The serial number of each check is given and a space provided to record the date and place each check was cashed.

For safety, the purchase agreement should be kept separate from the checks. Thus, if the checks are lost, the person has an identification of the checks and a reference to the ones already spent. Then the number of missing checks can be accurately reported.

In order to have a better idea of what to do in case of lost checks, one should know the specific location of the nearest refund center. Also, he needs to know the center closest to his destination and all along the route. These centers are located worldwide.

Gift shopping by mail can mean many advantages to customers as Christmas draws nearer.

Holiday buyers may save time and money shopping by mail, but first certain precautions are in order.

Wise shoppers will compare prices and goods at other kinds of stores, discount or wholesale stores and department stores, before buying by mail. A catalogue price isn't necessarily the lowest price available.

Also, the customer must order well in advance. Goods may suffer damages, be the wrong merchandise (not what was ordered), or not arrive at all. They even could be unsuitable due to misleading advertisements.

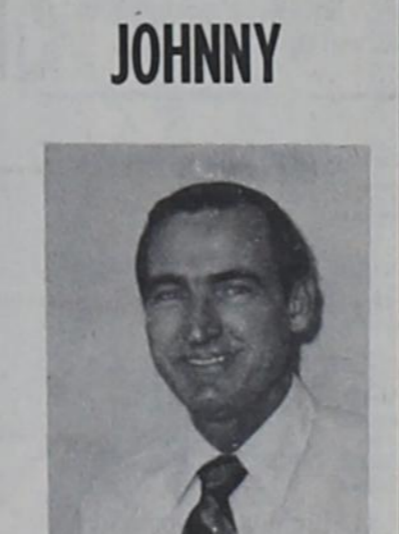

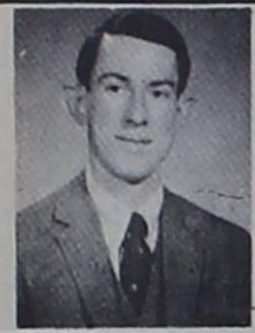

**On The Farm  
In Farmer  
County**

By R. MACK HEALD

Just arrived in my office is the 1973 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide. You may not be interested in this at the present time; however, copies will be available.

Also available are applications for windbreak seedlings and pine seedlings. If you are interested in setting out some trees, I would suggest getting these applications in before January 1, 1973.

Winter annual weeds are beginning to make their appearance, especially in early planted fields of wheat and other small grains. Now is the time to start making plans for spraying these weeds before they utilize moisture and nutrients needed by the grain crop. Tansy mustard and kochia are the weeds most commonly encountered in this area. They can be easily controlled with 1/2 pound of 2,4-D applied either by air or ground spray equipment. It is important that the small grain plants are fully tilled before 2,4-D is applied. Yield losses and plant deformity may result if the plants are too young.

Not all wheat fields require spraying as good stands of vigorous wheat shade the ground early and discourage germination and growth of weeds. In late planted fields or those that did not receive moisture until recently the weeds may not appear until January or February so fields should be checked carefully. The weeds are easiest to kill while they are in a rosette stage with a diameter approximately the size of a half-dollar. If the weeds are elongated and yellow blossoms have begun to appear, you waited too long. They have already caused a reduction in potential grain yield.

Research on weed competition has been conducted by Dr. Allen F. Wiese at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland. His studies indicate that one weed per square foot can reduce wheat yields by 10 per cent. If a potential yield of 40 bushels per acre is assumed, the yield loss would be about four bushels or about \$7.00 at current prices. With an estimated spray cost of \$1.50 this could mean an extra \$5.00 per acre as a result on controlling the weeds. When two weeds are present per square foot the

estimated yield loss is 20 per cent. Assuming a 15 bushel per acre yield potential under dryland conditions the loss caused by weed competition would be about three bushels. In this situation the farmer could pay the spray cost of \$1.50 and realize an additional \$4.00 per acre from the weed control practice.

One-half pound of 2,4-D will control most winter annual broadleaf weeds; however, treacle mustard is showing up in some fields in the Northern High Plains. This weed is more difficult to kill and requires one pound of 2,4-D for effective control.

## HOW THE SPIRIT HELPS

"The Spirit helpeth our infirmities" (Rom. 8:26).

A chain is no stronger than its weakest link. If one link in a chain will hold one hundred pounds, another fifty, and another ten, the chain as a whole will hold ten pounds, no more. This is why James 2:10 says:

"For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all."

Many people suppose that we will be saved or lost according to how good or bad we have been. This is not so. It is not a question of how good or bad we have been, but of whether or not we have sinned. A man need commit only one robbery to be an arsonist. Kill only one human being to be a murderer—and commit only one sin to be a sinner. This is why the Word of God says that all are sinners (Rom. 3:23).

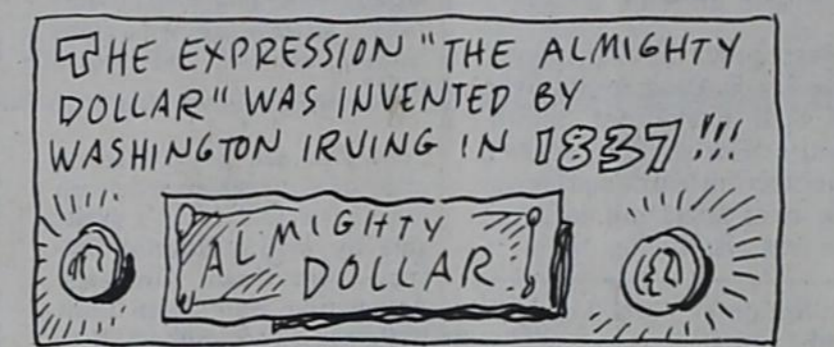
**SCS Discusses Blowing Snow**

Winter has blasted in with snow and all the trimmings. It looks as if the winter is going to be long and active. The expected snows will be a tremendous asset to the farmer who can keep it where it falls, says Soil Conservation Service officials.

Blowing snow can be quite a nuisance. It can drift across roads making them impassible. It can drift in fields causing wet and dry spots in the field making farming operations difficult. All in all, snow can be either a friend or a headache, depending on its management.

The easiest way to "nail down" snow is the management of crop residues. With standing residues in the field, snow will not blow even if there is quite a bit of wind. Coupled with snow management, the residues are also efficient erosion control and soil builders.
