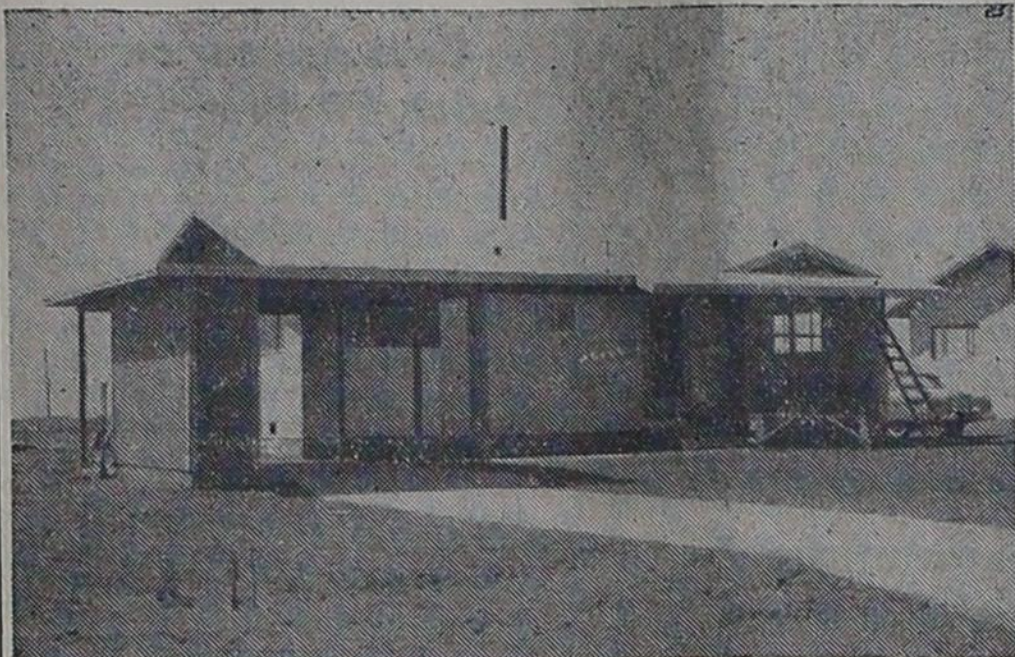
Door Prizes Feature Letay Open House

Two grand prizes and a prize every hour on Sunday will highlight the activities when the two new show homes of Hillcrest Addition will be open for public inspection Saturday and Sunday, says Doug Ragsdale, construction foreman, who is also in charge of sales, for the project.

Open house is planned Saturday afternoon from 1 to 8 o'clock in the evening and on Sunday, hours will be from 1 to 10 o'clock in the evening.

One of the houses will be furnished throughout by the Furniture Mart in Texico; and the other home will show furniture from Montgomery Ward Co. of Clovis.

Saturday and Sunday will be big days in Farwell, for those interested in purchasing new homes. Residents who have been watching for the opening dates of the show homes for two developers, Letay Construction Co. of Dallas, and a local contractor, Harry Ray Jesko, will have an opportunity to view the homes this weekend.

Both the Letay project and the Jesko homes had hoped for earlier dates for the showing of the houses, but due to holdup in materials, open houses were postponed.

The showing of the Letay homes will be the culmination of a long series of plans and red tape. An-

ouncement of the Hillcrest Addition was first made back in January of 1955 when Jack Stagner of Clovis, announced his intentions of building a home addition in Farwell.

But legal complications ensnared the prospect and after lots were laid out, and paving installed, the work was at a standstill for months.

The Hillcrest addition was then taken over by Letay Construction Co. of Dallas and actual construction of the homes began early this year. Two show homes are now ready for inspection.

Jesko also began his building operations the first part of last

year, when he built one two-bedroom and a three-bedroom home for sale. Carrying out long-range plans, a third home was constructed, adjacent to the first two houses. These three homes have already been sold.

Now the total of Jesko homes has reached five, with the two newest homes to be shown Saturday and Sunday, in open houses. The local builder has no standard plan for the houses which he has constructed, but plans each home individually.

All of the homes to be on exhibit this weekend are located in the southwestern part of Farwell.

Farwell Contemplates Purchase Of Fire Truck; Leases Legion Hall

Thirty Farwell men met with the city commissioners Friday afternoon at the office of Mayor Johnnie Williams, and studied the needs for the city in the way of fire fighting equipment, plus a permanent home for city offices.

The men were asked to the meeting by commissioners in order that opinions might be heard on what the city should do to meet municipal demands in these fields.

Everyone who expressed himself at the meeting Friday was in favor of purchasing fire fighting equipment, the original outlay to be around \$11,000 for a 500-gallon pumper truck fully equipped.

Otis Huggins, who had secured quotations from Howe Equipment Company, described the truck in detail and gave it as his opinion that it was the best investment for the city's present needs.

How to pay for the investment occupied the minds of those at the meeting for a while, and all endorsed a raise in city tax rates to accommodate repayment of a loan which probably will be made the city to buy the truck.

Farwell's tax rate is now 60

cents per \$100 valuation. It can be raised by the commissioners to \$1.50 without an election—although city dads are sure such a hike will not be required. Somewhere between 75 cents and \$1 has been discussed unofficially.

The truck probably will be ordered in the very near future and will be temporarily housed until the matter of a city hall can be cared for.

Most men at the meeting Friday indicated a willingness to encourage the city to build a new city hall and fire station, but by the first of this week, commissioners had decided to go ahead and accept the offer of the Legion to lease that building and convert it for municipal use.

City Clerk Wilfred Quickel says some partitions will be installed and

considerable remodeling done to prepare the hall for occupancy by the city, and a garage for the fire truck will be built alongside.

From \$3,000 to \$5,500 will be spent on fixing the hall to suit the city's needs, depending on what course the city will take. No bond election is anticipated.

Children's Clinic Is Saturday

In the final phase of preparations before conducting the first Children's Clinic in Hereford, registrations are being received, lunch menus are being planned and the transportation committee is lining up cars while doctors, dentists and optometrists prepare to examine the handicapped children of this area.

The clinic will begin at 9 a. m. Saturday in the offices of the Hereford Clinic. It is under the sponsorship of the Scottish Rite Club, men who have long believed, "A man never stands straighter than when he stoops to help a child."

Four County Area Open to children throughout Deaf Smith, Oldham, Castro and PARMER Counties, it is available to any child, regardless of his creed, color, race or his economic level and any child from birth to 19 years of age is eligible to attend.

There is no charge. Registrations are already pouring in to Scottish Rite members, cards that record the name, age and general description of his ailment or disorder. So far they have included such handicaps as disorders of bone, heart, eyes, hearing, speech and nervous system.

"Any child with a suspected disturbance of any type is invited to be examined at this time," said Dr. L. B. Barnett, staff member of the Hereford Clinic and president of the Scottish Rite Club.

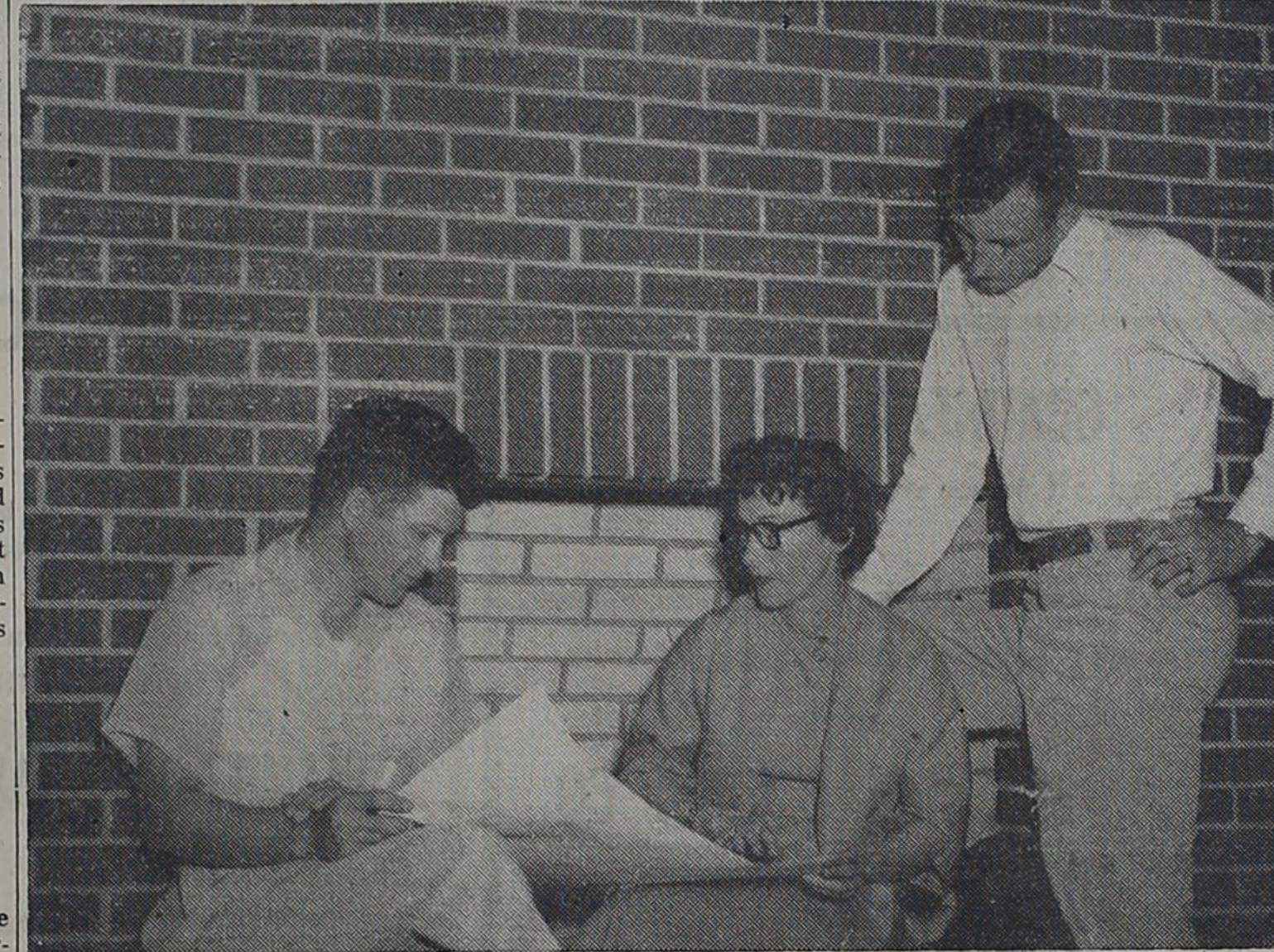
Diagnostic Clinic He emphasized that this is a free diagnostic clinic whose purpose is not treatment, but determination of ailment. Suggested treatments will be offered and also information about facilities available for treating them.

Anyone May Register Anyone may register a child and anyone knowing of a handicapped child is asked to notify either of these registration centers.

Specialists To Be Present A corp of doctors, including physicians, dentists, and optometrists from the four county area, will be supplemented by specialists from Lubbock and Dallas who will be here especially for the event.

They include Dr. Tom Nash, of Dallas, neurologist; Dr. James E. Loveless, Lubbock, orthopedist; Dr. Roy Sheffield, Lubbock, heart and lungs and Dr. Louis C. Aden, Dallas, ear, nose and throat.

Others participating are Drs. R. R. Willis, L. B. Barnett, Millard Nobles, Roy Grubbs, A. T. Mims, Bill Lawrence, Paul Spring, Pete Spence, J. W. Barnett, H. A. Cavness and Milton Adams.

Farwell is showing some signs of community responsibility in pushing for the purchase of fire fighting equipment and the building of a city hall.

We have never yet seen a town that amounted to much which didn't have the ability or desire to provide itself with fire protection and a seat of local government.

Local citizens have had a hard time forgetting the money that was lost when donations for a truck were taken up for the department in Texico long ago, but the intervening years in which Farwell has had full protection at the expense of New Mexico taxpayers has certainly more than made up for that unfortunate occurrence.

Texico and Farwell have both grown to such an extent that more equipment than is presently on hand in the Texico department is needed to adequately protect the community.

Then, too, with five heavily traveled railroad tracks isolating the presently located department from fully half of the community, who knows what catastrophe might result while the trucks were helplessly waiting the passage of a couple of long freights?

Finally, it is only through the good will of the citizens of Texico that Farwell residents have enjoyed the use of the splendid equipment housed in the Texico department.

New Mexico statutes do not provide that state-supported departments furnish protection for communities out of the state. In cases of emergency, certainly they would be more than glad to help, but as a regular matter we suspect that state officials would take a dim view of New Mexico paid-for equipment providing Farwell with its only protection.

A department in Texico and a department in Farwell is the only sensible solution to the needs of this growing community, and there is no reason why the two should not be able to work together for the safety and betterment of all concerned.

Two or three weeks ago we were in Clovis talking with the journalism students of Mrs. Earl Booth, a former local resident and instructor in Farwell Schools.

We attempted to tell them about the opportunities for young graduates in community journalism, and in preparing our ideas on the subject, we realized that we had been overlooking many of these opportunities ourselves.

Many young men and women, upon their graduation from high school, enjoy writing, and continue their studies along this line with journalism majors in college.

Precious few, however, recognize the opportunities of weekly newspapering, and after receiving their degrees, they trickle off into jobs on larger newspapers, do free-lance writing, or enter the field of public relations.

Weekly newspapers as a whole have sadly underpromoted themselves. In fact, we seem to enjoy impressing on people how hard our work is, and how little we get out of it for a living.

Seldom is mentioned the soul-lifting effect of seeing YOUR newspaper roll from the presses and into the homes of your friends in your community.

Seldom is mentioned the pleasures of knowing hundreds of wonderful people by their first names. Seldom is mentioned the personal satisfaction that community journalism gives week after week to a country editor. This is "pay" of a different kind.

With the great emphasis being placed on technological progress, it is small wonder that so many of our boys and girls are being siphoned into the fields of engineering.

And with the demand today for jobs that pay more, the fields of engineering look especially attractive with their high starting salaries. The trick is, however, that most of these starting salaries turn out to be permanent salaries, or nearly so.

Weekly newspapering, in comparison, offers a chance to GROW from a modest stipend to a horizon that is limited only by the individual's ability, aggressiveness, and ingenuity.

The day of fortune-making is about over for everybody, but we honestly believe that a young man or woman intent on building for the future can't do better than to aim at entering the weekly newspaper field, where he or she may someday become owner of a community paper.

After repeated personal checking into the whisper-whisper stories concerning the alleged linking of Gov. Allan Shivers to the veterans' land scandals and other goings-on at the Texas state capitol the past few years, we reached the conclusion (with a sign of relief) that Shivers has NOT participated in malpractices for his personal gain. We didn't ask the guy across the street about this either. We went to Kenneth Towery of Cuero, who won a Pulitzer Prize for exposing the land scandals and Karo Brown of Alice, who also won a Pulitzer for work on the George Parr enterprises, for their honest opinions.

And although we personally disagree—on Christian principles—with the theory of segregation, we do support the governor's idea that it ought to be left up to individual communities to settle their own problems concerning this and other controversial issues.

The federal government (or the state government) has no business in forcing social revolutions on traditions that are deep as the roots of the South's oak trees. And this applies to the field of federal price fixing, and federal aid to schools, and federal this and federal that. Allan Shivers stands for state's rights and so do we. Government control needs to be kept as close to the people as possible, and Austin, about 600 miles distant, is still a heck of a lot closer than Washington.

Some way or another, people have gotten the misconception fixed in their minds that Allan Shivers and Lyndon Johnson are political incompatibles. Now, how can that be? The only way a person can ever come to this conclusion is by listening to the bellowing of that master political opportunist and current champion of the "spend and
