



#### **Paving A Sound Investment** For Any Community

The Texas Health Department would cry out in dismay to think such a thing should ever appear in print, but a fellow recently said, "If I had to make a choice, I'd give up my city sewer service before I would let the paving go that's in front of my house."

He was a local person, and can remember not too long ago when neither paving nor sewer service was available, and he knows the value of both. His statement, however, goes to prove how much people think of paved streets when they finally get them.

The communities of this area have been moderately successful in selling their citizens on the idea that paving city streets is a good investment, and the appreciation that people show for these improvements is sufficient indication that such

Friona leads the towns of the western High Plains in municipal paving. Right now, a huge program of new paving, coupled with repair of old paving is going on.

Farwell has enjoyed considerable paving in the past five or six years, but badly needs some more in several parts of the city. Farwell's program is unique in that all the paving now installed has been paid for in advance.

Texico, making use of a cent-a-gallon gasoline tax that rolls in about \$15,000 a year, is well on the way to becoming one of the best-improved small cities of the area. Citizens of this community were in February, when their newly-laid paving was investment.

Bench Levelling

A practice which is often very desirable on steeply sloping farms is bench levelling. In this system, the land is levelled in separate grades and has the appearance of a stairway when completed.

Sometimes it may not be practical to bench level an entire field, but irrigation farmers find that by so treating the lower end of their farms, a great amount of tail water can be utiliz-

In some cases, bench levelling of the lower end has resulted in a complete elimination of waste water. In any event, this practice is classed as a permanent improve-

Another treatment which can be inexpensively given the lower end of sloping irrigation runs is to close drill or broadcast a string of grain sorghum, hegari, or some other

The close-knit stalks of the crop vill do a great deal to retard the headlong rush of water from the irrigation well. In addition, farmers who have tried this method report that often the best part of their crop is taken from this broadcast strip where saturation of water

Broadcast strips are obviously a year-to-year practice and not permanent improvements in any sense.

- 3. Turn purple in crops when small.

SOURCES: Phosphorus may be obtained from commercial fertilizers and manures, although very little is found in manures. A 100-pound bag of superphosphate contains 18 to 20 pounds of phosphoric acid. A 100-pound bag of triple superphosphate contains 40 to 48 pounds of phosphoric acid.






