The following letter is from O. W. Rhinehart of Bovina, a former mayor of that city, and a realtor and owner of farmland in the area. He takes exception of The Tribune's position that excessive irrigation water in bar-ditches near fields indicates wasteful methods.

Dear Mr. Graham:
I read your comments in the Hopper about irrigation water running down the bar-ditches in Parmer County with much interest and concern, especially your intimations that they were running bank-full, but I particularly noted that you failed to state how many miles of bar-ditches that you saw water running down.

Also you didn't mention how many miles of bar-ditches that didn't have any irrigation water running in them. A close check will reveal such a small percentage of our bar-ditches with any appreciable amount of irrigation water running down them that it sounds almost negligible. The percentage would be a long drawn-out decimal figure, something like this .003% of the miles of bar-ditches.

Although it is regrettable to see any amount of water running down a bar-ditch, yet another way to figure just how much waste it amounts to is to compare it with how much land it would irrigate. For instance, we have here in Parmer County about three thousand, six hundred quarter sections of land. If it were possible to catch all the water that runs down our bar-ditches in one pond or lake, I doubt very seriously that more than three or four of these quarter sections could be adequately irrigated.

Another way to look at this picture is to figure the value of our water on a \$ basis. Let's take a quarter section under irrigation. In the event we don't let the water run long enough to wet the lower end of the rows it will naturally cut our production of crops.

The average strip of land on the low side of the farm would be about ten acres that would not be adequately watered. The difference in yield would be approximately 2000 pounds per acre if it happened to be grain sorghum. This figured at \$1.50 per hundred (which is the price under Mr. Benson's prosperity program) would be \$30 per acre or \$300 per quarter section of land and if all quarters in the County were irrigated this would figure \$1,080,000 the farmers would be penalized if they were forced to stop the water from running out at the lower end of their rows. So, all the water which we see running down the bar-ditches is not a wasted item if it has caused the farmer to produce an appreciable amount of additional crops.

Another comparison we could make would be to place an 8" irrigation well in the N/W corner of Parmer County and put it to pumping 800 gallons of water per minute into the bar-ditch. During a period of 24 hours it will fill a bar-ditch bank full 48 miles long. This same amount of water in a bar-ditch 48 miles long running across Parmer County would certainly create an uncontrollable sentiment against the farmers, yet this same amount of water, a bar-ditch bank-full and 48 miles long, will irrigate only eight acres of land one time.

Now, if we could control or maybe reserve our magnified imagination of this waste of water we might find it a profitable blessing.

I have no intentions of condoning or encouraging the wasting of water but just thought we should look at this condition from another angle.

Mr. Rhinehart, I appreciate your interest in this matter, and the thought which you apparently have given to the subject. You bring out some pertinent ideas, though I still cannot accept the principle of brushing aside the matter of irrigation water in the ditches as inconsequential.

This newspaper has frequently editorialized on the need for improved irrigation methods, but I hope that we have never created the impression that we believe that the appearance of any water in the ditch is cause for suit by the Water District against the farmer.

I am not a hair-splitter, and certainly am aware that it is a virtual impossibility to never let a drop of water escape from the rows. Circumstances which vary from farm to farm change the picture, but I venture to say that not 10 percent of the irrigation farmers of Parmer County will water through this season without letting some water get away.

It is not this occasional tail flow to which our paper objects. It is the obvious disregard for this condition which some irrigation farmers have.

You suggest in your good letter that I have been careless enough to fail to supply examples to support the paper's editorial contention

Texico Commission Has Busy Evening

A city ordinance establishing and fixing a fee for all new construction in the town of Texico and adjacent territory for tapping the municipal water line was approved by the Texico city commission at a meeting of the group Monday night at the Town Hall.

Mayor Scott Levins presided at the meeting and all town trustees, the town clerk, attorney for the city, city inspector, town marshal, police magistrate and fire chief were present.

Les Means, town trustee for 14 years, resigned from this post effective Monday night. A new trustee will be appointed at the next regular meeting.

A brief discussion concerning the trial involving Lewis Pierce and the town of Texico was held. Pierce was present and stoutly defended his position.

Johnnie Williams, mayor of Farwell, was present to hear discussion concerning a raise in salary for the Jones Brothers. The Jones Brothers are in charge of hauling garbage for the towns of Texico and Farwell and asked for a \$50 raise in salary from each town.

Texico voted to increase their portion of the salary to \$150 per month. They were paying \$110 prior to this motion, Farwell pays \$150 per month for this service and discussion concerning the raise in Farwell will be held at the next commission meeting, according to Mayor Williams.

Mayor Levins read a letter from the town's attorney, Earl Hartley, to Governor John F. Simms regarding requests that no sales tax be paid in Texico.

The group also discussed a letter from the state highway department concerning a proposed paving route for Texico.

A letter was also read stating that officials will be at the Town Hall on Monday, July 16, at 2 p. m. for the purpose of setting up a budget for the town of Texico. All trustees are requested to be present for this meeting.

An application for the moving of a house and the erecting of a barn was approved as were office appointments made by Mayor Levins.

Bindweed Threatens Farms, Says Jones

Bindweed, a noxious plant that spreads across farmland like cancer spreads through the human body, is more serious this year than last, in spite of control measures undertaken across the county in 1955, reports County Agent Joe Jones this week.

"This is the time of year to get after bindweed," he says. "And farmers surely ought to be on the lookout for the little blooms—which later turn pink—that indicate the spread of bindweed."

Once bindweed has taken hold of some ground—whether it's a square foot or 200 acres—retirement of the land from crop-growing is paramount if control is to be effective.

The method Agent Jones recommends is to first isolate the infection with a border, apply soil sterilant, and then irrigate with about three inches of moisture. This dissolves the chemicals and puts them to work on the unwanted plants. Don't over-water, however, cautions Jones, as that practice may carry the sterilants down into the soil below the bindweed root zone.

"Bindweed is moving in on Parmer County from all directions," warns Jones. He pointed out that new patches of the infectious pest have sprung up all over the county.

"Learn to identify bindweed

Bills passed and approved for payment totaled approximately \$2546. The commission also voted that Sam Lewis, police magistrate, continue to furnish \$500 property bond for himself.

Other routine business was discussed before adjournment.

seed," Jones admonished farmers. "Check some plants and see for yourself what the seed looks like, and then watch for it in the seed you plant."

He says that infested planting seed can be serious, if bindweed is not spotted.

Another point to watch is transient combines, which may move the seed from one field to another, unknown to the farmer.

"Don't forget that bindweed is like cotton," says Jones. "That is, it produces seed at the same time that it is blooming. Now is the time to start control measures—don't say 'I'll wait until it get ready to make seed.'"

Sodium chlorate, the most common chemical in use for controlling bindweed, should be handled with caution because of its inflammable nature. It is locally available and recommended, but Jones suggests that farmers obtain bulletins on its use at his office.

He also cautioned farmers about using Karmex W, which renders soil sterile for many years, and in addition, may contaminate more land than desired because of its tendency to be carried down the row by irrigation water.

Payments for buying and applying bindweed control chemicals are available through the ACP program again this year, and a news letter setting forth details of this

A city doesn't stand still—it goes backwards or forwards. Progress and improvements don't just happen. You have to make them happen at a cost of hard work and money. Nothing is for free when it comes to progress, yet some people seem to think you can have sewer, garbage, pavement, water and fire department without cost.

Some seem to think when they pay their bills that the money goes into the mayor's or council's pockets, and say mean things about them and of course blame the mayor, council, secretary, and water superintendent and abuse us all in general.

When our Savior was being nailed to the cross he uttered these words, "Forgive them, Father, for they know not what they do." I have given those words quite a

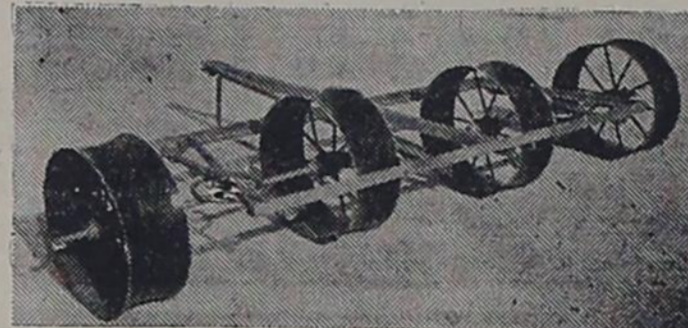

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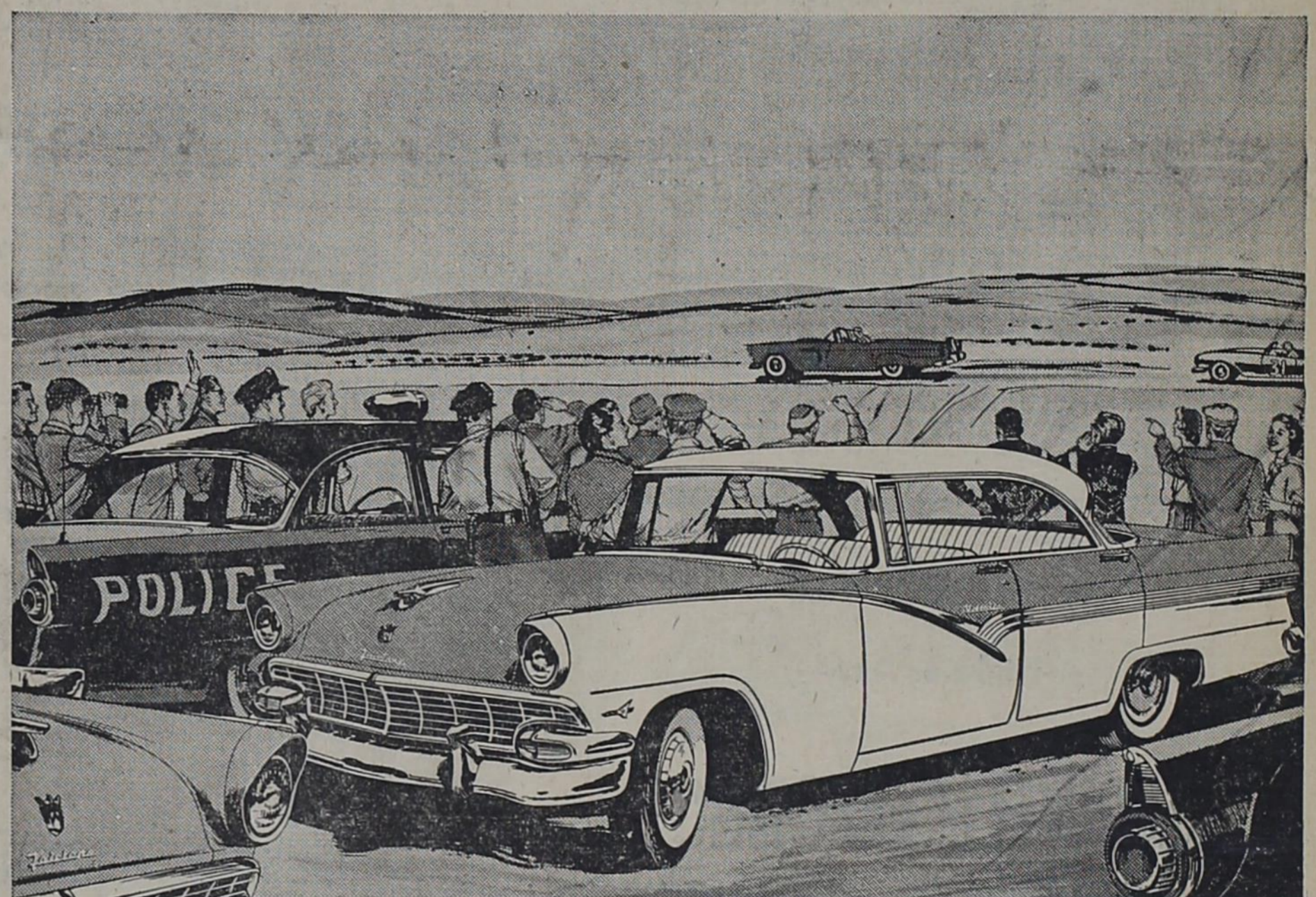

Nearly everyone we have talked to is ready for a rain of one kind or the other. It does seem that it is about time for something like that. People who have no irrigation are reaching the state of desperation, and irrigation farmers could use the supplement to their efforts. As widespread as the drought is, it is a little surprising that rain was not mentioned in some of the prosperity-promising amendments offered to the agricultural bill. It would be no harder to fulfill a promise of rain than some others that have been made. Perhaps if we reconsider and place our faith where it should be, in God, instead of man, several very difficult problems could be solved. The Texas Farm Bureau convention will be held in the Rice Hotel in Houston, November 12, 13 and 14 this year. "We farmers in the United States have the highest standard of living of any agricultural people in the world. 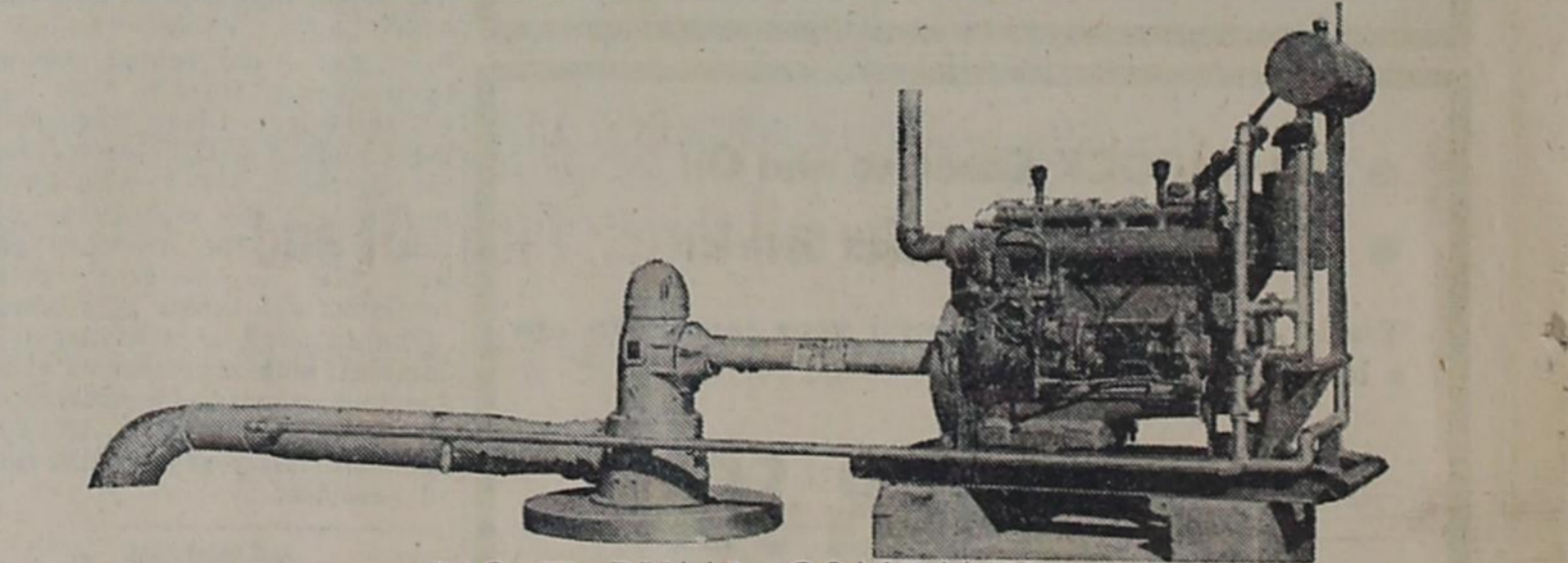

Parmer Ranks High In Farming Income

The U. S. Department of Commerce Friday verified a statement that Parmer County people have been making ever since large-scale development of irrigation: this county ranks among the top ones in the state in agricultural production.

To be more specific, Parmer County holds the ninth rung in Texas' 264-county ladder of farm income, and surpasses all its neighboring counties in farming prosperity.

In the most recent census of agriculture—taken in 1954—Parmer County farmers took in \$24,218,900 from the sale of field crops, vegetables, fruits, dairy products, poultry, and livestock.

Parmer's closest competitor—and its closest neighbor in terms of both geography and comparable resources—tallied \$23,216,016 in farm income in 1954. That was Castro County to the east.

Leading all Texas counties that year was Hale County (Plainview), which produced a staggering \$50,826,307 on its farms. Lubbock County pushed close to the leader with \$48,862,502.

Coming down the line behind those two South Plains champions were the lower Rio Grande Valley counties of Hidalgo and Cameron, with their great diversity of cattle, cotton, field crops and truck farming. Lamb County, also a heavy Plains producer, fell into fifth place with over \$37 million.

Comparing Parmer County with some of her other neighbors: Deaf Smith, \$17,602,659; and Bailey, \$11,841,482.

Some conditions which these figures do not point out, naturally, are that the year 1954 was the most prosperous one in Parmer County's history so far as farmers were concerned.

All irrigated crops yielded well, especially cotton and grain sor-

ghum, and prices were good and acreage of desirable crops plentiful in most cases.

Residents will remember that 1954 was the peak of the irrigation boom when much "brand new" land was pressed into production, and the weather gave farmers more than an even break—especially in the fall when rains and early freezes failed to plague such crops as cotton as they did last year.

Had it not been for Parmer County's comparatively late start in development of irrigation, coupled with an extremely poor history in cotton acreage, farm observers feel that this area would

The breakdown of the \$24 million in Parmer County: field crops, \$21,487,183; vegetables, \$25,820; fruits and nuts, \$106; horticultural specialties, \$115; dairy products, \$123,541; poultry and poultry products, \$43,022; livestock and livestock products, \$2,851,307.

Parmer County's income last year was estimated at \$20 million by County Agent Joe Jones. In 1954, he estimated the income to be \$25 million so likely his methods of figuring will be very nearly correct.

Reduced cotton acreage, lowered prices for crops—especially grain sorghum, and generally less favorable weather conditions contributed to the county's decrease in agricultural income the past year.

TIME TO CHECK LAWN

If the lawn has a raggedy appearance and is brown in spots and dead or dying grass can be pulled up by the roots, better check for white grubs, says C. F. Garner, assistant extension entomologist. Use control methods if six or more grubs are found in a one foot square area. Ask the local county agent for a copy of L-199 for the control measures.

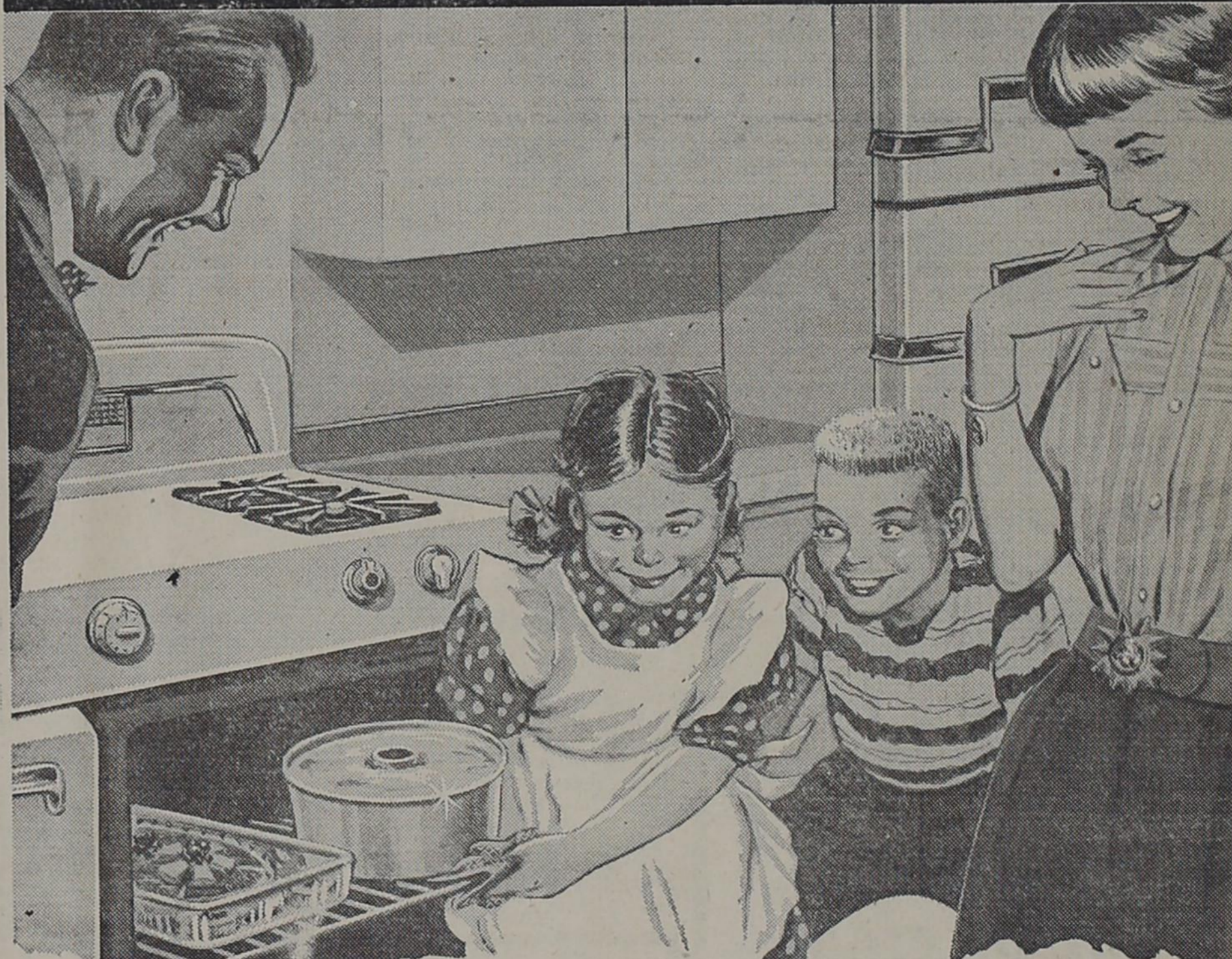

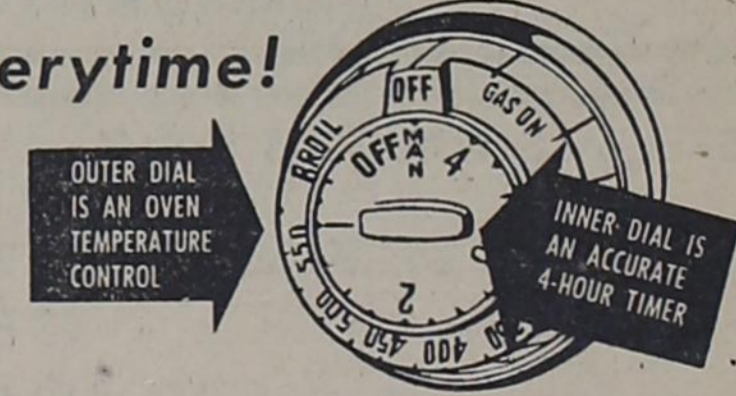

Bovina Man Has "Another Angle" On Ditch Water

that our waste is sufficient to cause concern.

It is not pleasant for us to make specific references and we would prefer not to do so. However, as you feel comparisons might be helpful, I will say that on the afternoon which I received your letter, (April 24) I took it upon myself to be a little more factual in my commentary.

Traveling from Bovina to Friona on U. S. 60, a route I am sure you are very familiar with, I drove slowly and made careful calculations on my car's odometer. The statistics: my car registered 11.6 miles from the Bovina city limits to the Friona city limits.

Of this mileage, 4.7 miles of the right-of-way had water running in the bar ditch on one side or the other, and .8 miles had water on both sides.

Now, I have no desire to be labeled an extremist, and if I am choosing an isolated instance, then let's check elsewhere for more facts. However, I have twice been across this part of Parmer County in company with other men from out of the area who deplored our practice of running water down the bar-ditches.

No doubt they were inclined to exaggerate the seriousness of the problem, but there is no denying the fact that this well-travel-

ed route gives the area world's of bad publicity. And it's TALK like this, O. W., that will LEAD US TO STATE OR FEDERAL—NOT LOCAL—CONTROL OF OUR WATER RIGHTS.

Also, on the same trip I observed, unless I made incorrect markings, a 22-hour set in which water freely flowed from the ends of the rows.

Don't forget that the Texas High Plains isn't the only well irrigated area in the country—far from it. I have seen the Pecos Valley area, the Big Bend area, and the fabulous cotton and vegetable sections of lower Arizona and California.

But I have never seen water in the ditches like I see it here on The Plains. Someone's analysis of our problems is awry!

Oh yes. Better brush up on your arithmetic with that 48-mile long ditch full of water, O. W. Can't be done.
