Dear Mr. Graham: I read your comments in the Hopper about irrigation water running down the bar-ditches in Parmer County with much interest and concern, especially your intimations that they were running bankfull, but I particularly noted that you failed to state how many miles of bar-ditches that you saw water runing down.
