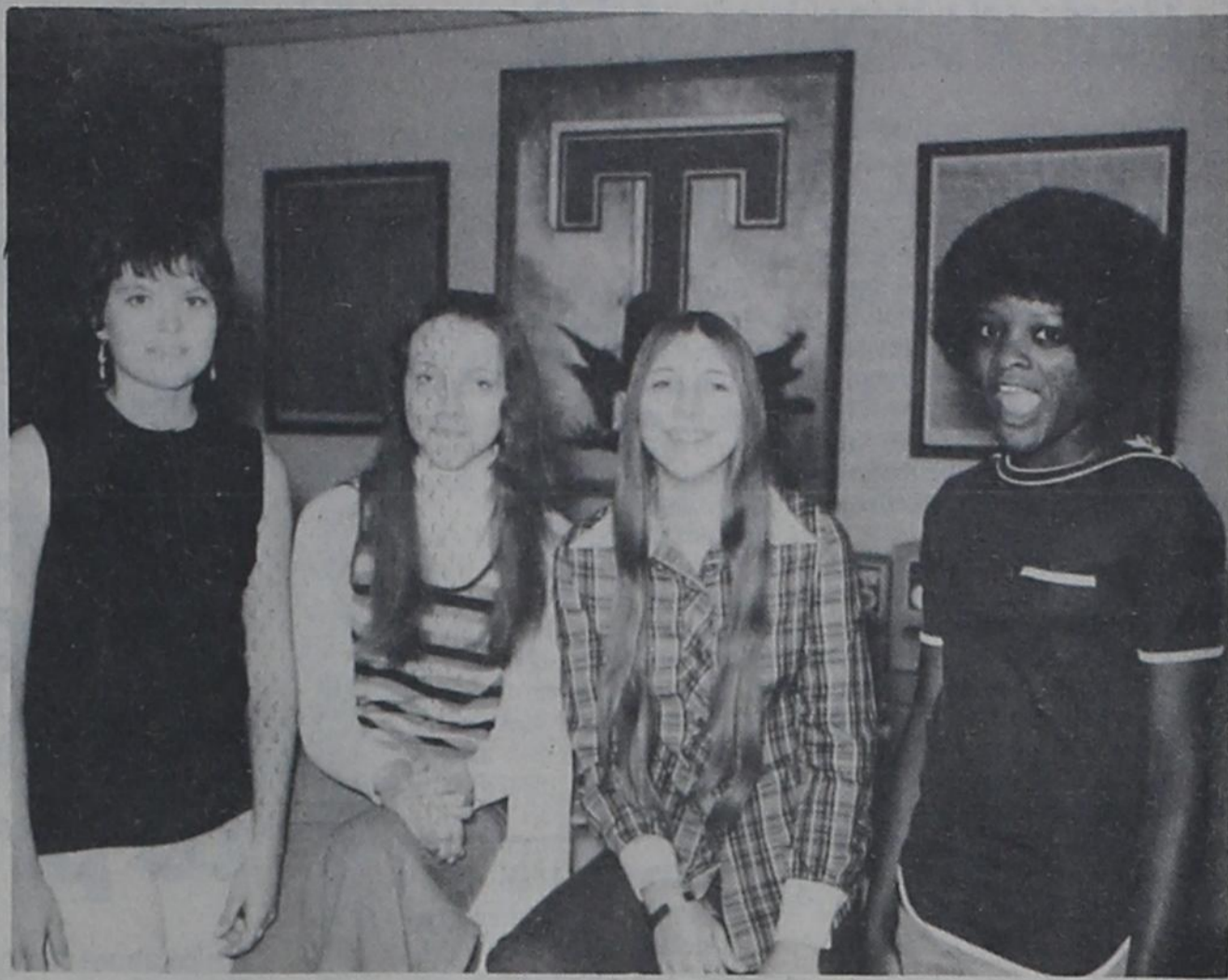

to complete in the Rally. The school is where participants find out the rules and regulations and just what the Rally is all about.

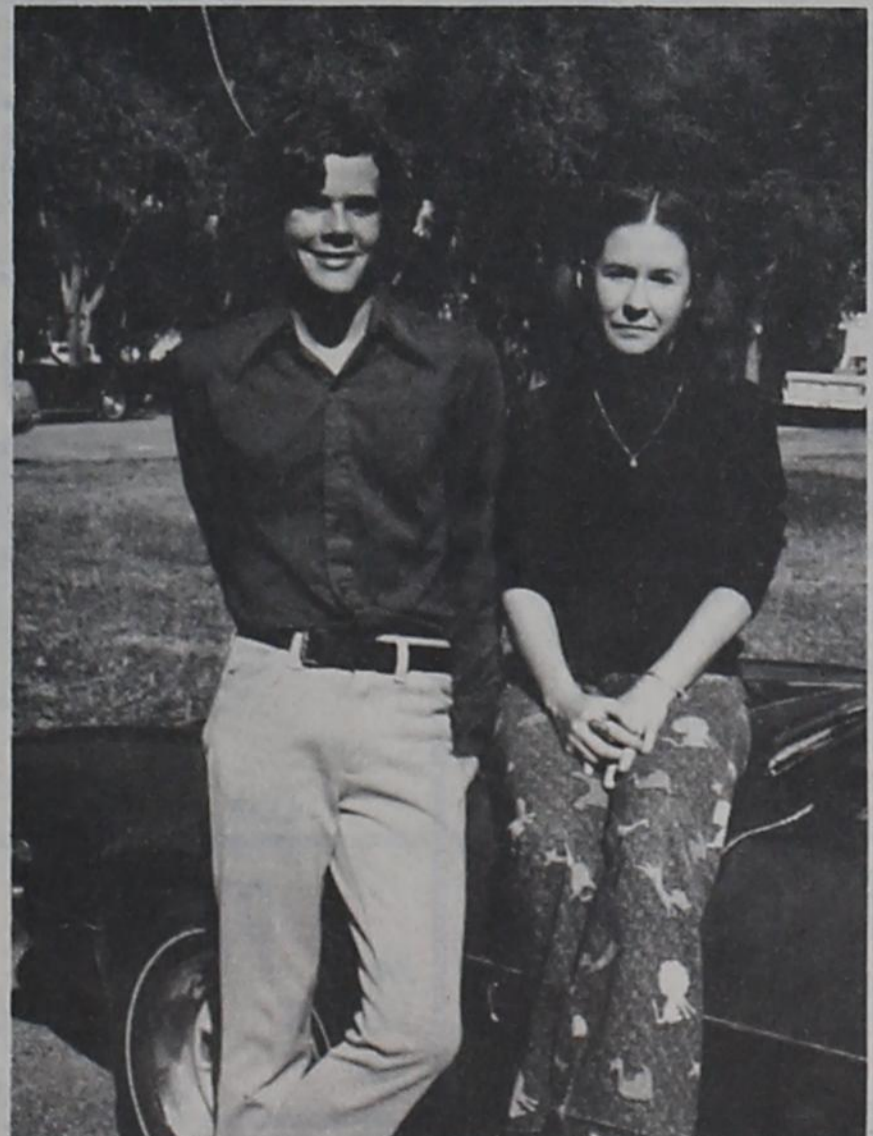

reading, while in town over a fat inch was recorded.

The fall rains were accepted as very helpful to the struggling wheat field and many felt it materially increased the wheat pasture that will be available on the High Plains. With the return of the hot sun, the rainy interlude did little to hinder the harvest already underway in the area.

## Ft. Sumner Foxes 'Sly' Past Wolverines 42-0

During their fourth game of regular season play the Texico Wolverines were defeated by the Ft. Sumner Foxes Friday night, Oct. 5, by a score of 42-0. The Wolverine season record now stands at 1-3.

The Wolverines took the opening kickoff and put their offensive machinery into motion on their own 21-yard-line. A fumble occurred on the 35 with Ft. Sumner recovering and driving to the Wolverine 11-yard-line in three plays. Unable to gain any yardage on their first three plays, the Foxes tried on their fourth down but failed to get any more yards against the Wolverine defense.

Texico started on the 11-yard-line but soon turned the ball over on a Wolverine fumble on the line of scrimmage. Ft. Sumner then scored when running back Alan West ran it in for six points. West also made the extra points and the score stood 8-0, Ft. Sumner.

After the kickoff, Randy Harrison, Wolverine halfback, broke away for 32 yards to advance the Green and White to the Ft. Sumner 40-yard-line. Wolverines lost possession on downs and Ft. Sumner capitalized on the turnover when running back George Sparks turned a 16-yard run into a TD widening the margin 14-0. PAT for Ft. Sumner was no good and the score remained 14-0. Following the kickoff the

Wolverine offense was again forced to punt from their own 27-yard-line when they failed to gain the necessary yardage for a first down. Punter Randy Harrison had his punt blocked by Fox tackle Keith Nahlovsky and Ft. Sumner's offense started on the Wolverine 20-yard-line. After two plays Alan West once again barreled across into the end zone for another six points. Ft. Sumner's PAT was good and with nine minutes left in the half, the score stood Ft. Sumner 22, Texico 0.

Ft. Sumner kicked off and Wolverine Steve Harrington carried to the Wolverine 30-yard-line. Sammy West moved the ball four yards but Texico soon was forced to punt. After a strong drive, Fox running back George Sparks scored on a four-yard run making the score 28-0 with 1:13 left in the half.

The Wolverines kicked off to start third quarter action. The Foxes moved only seven yards and were forced to punt. The Wolves moved for good yardage on their first play but fumbled on the second play with the Foxes recovering. Ft. Sumner marched to the Wolves' 25-yard-line and gained a first down. With 5:01 remaining in the third quarter Fox running back Johnny Stallard scored on a 25-yard run to add six more for the Foxes. PAT was no good and the score was 34-0.

Kevin Stanley received the Fox kickoff and ran the ball to the Wolverine 37-yard-line. The Wolverine offense again failed to get a drive going and were forced to punt. On the Foxes' first play George Sparks almost broke away for a TD but safety Curtis Lindley dropped him after a 16 yard gainer. The Foxes moved the ball to the Wolverine 1-yard-line before the whistle sounded to end the third quarter.

In fourth quarter action, first play for the Foxes was a TD play as Alan West crossed into the end zone from the 4-yard-line to make the score 40-0. Extra point attempt was good and the score moved to 42-0.

After this score by the Foxes no points were put on the scoreboard by either team and the game ended with the Ft. Sumner Foxes downing Texico 42-0.

Bucky Walters, head coach of the Wolverines, said, "The Foxes were just too big."

"The Foxes are in Class AA and they played a tough game

against us. Our defense couldn't stop running back George Sparks who made most of the Foxes' touchdowns," the coach commented.

"Roger Pace played very well at the defensive tackle position," added the coach who also stated, "Our offense couldn't move very much against the Fox defense and too many fumbles were made by the Wolverines."

Texico Wolverines will face the Moriarty Pintos in their next game Friday (tonight). Action will be in Wolverine Stadium and will begin at 8:30 p.m. Texico will be working hard to down the Pintos before an anticipated record attendance during the 1973 Homecoming game.

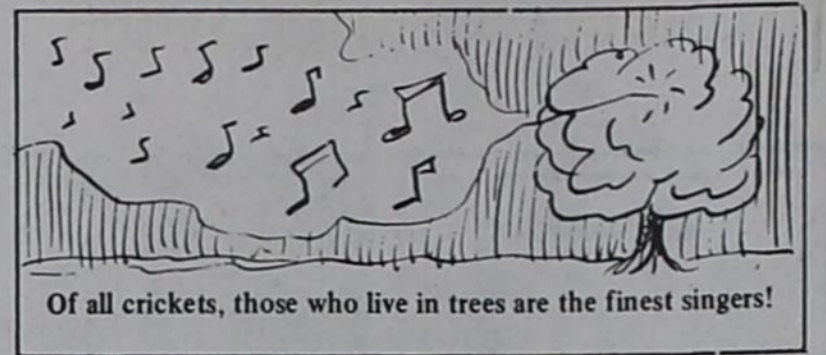

# Kress' Roos Hop By Steers In Final 39 Seconds

Farwell Steers started district play last Friday night with a rather disappointing note. The Steers were unable to handle the hopping Kangaroos as Kress took the victory 6-3.

The Farwell squad played a fantastic ballgame and led in all the statistics, but somehow Kress got a touchdown in the final 39 seconds of the ballgame to put the district win in their pouch.

The Steers kicked off to the Kangaroos to start the first period of play. Kress turned the ball over to Farwell three times and the Steers in turn handed it to the Roos twice in the first quarter. The Steers accomplished several downs and moved the ball down in scoring territory but were unable to get any points in the first quarter.

At the end of the second quarter the score remained 0-0. Farwell was forced to give the

ball to Kress four times and Kress gave the ball up three times. The ball exchange was about the only spectacular event that happened in the first half of the game.

In the third quarter, the action picked up. Kress kicked to Farwell and on the Steers' third play, a pass was intercepted by a Kangaroo. Kress, however, was soon in a fourth down situation and was forced to punt. Then the Steers were ready to hang on. They kept driving and making first downs until they reached the Kress 12-yard line. From that point, a field goal attempt was in order. Quarterback Kevin Hargrove booted the ball up and between the goal posts to give the Steers three points. Farwell led 3-0 with 5:32 remaining in the third quarter.

Coming into the fourth quarter the Steers had a fourth down situation and set up for a field goal attempt. However, it was a fake field goal attempt

and a Hargrove pass was completed to Mike Woods for a pick up of 18 yards and a first down. The Steers were now on the Kress three-yard line. The next play gained one yard and on the following play, Farwell fumbled and the Kangaroos recovered. After an exchange of punts Kress started on their own 25-yard line. As the time ticked slowly away, Kress continued to move down the field. With 43 seconds remaining, the Kangaroos were on the Steer 2-yard line. On their next play they went over the goal line for their six points to put them in the lead 6-3 with 39 seconds remaining. The Steers could not make up for the six point damage and lost their first district game, 6-3.

"The best effort we've had in three years," is the way Steer Head Coach Toby Booth described the fine performance of the Steers during Friday's action.

Booth continued, "there really isn't anything left to say. We played good enough to win but didn't. We out-gained, out-first downed, and out-played Kress on defense."

The coach continued by stating, "In the last five minutes when Kress started their drive we failed to stop them. We just seemed to lose our momentum."

Offensively the Steers all did a fine job, according to Booth. "Our backs did an outstanding job of running. Winfred Long played his best game of the year. Mike Woods and Carl Kirkland also did outstanding jobs on offense."

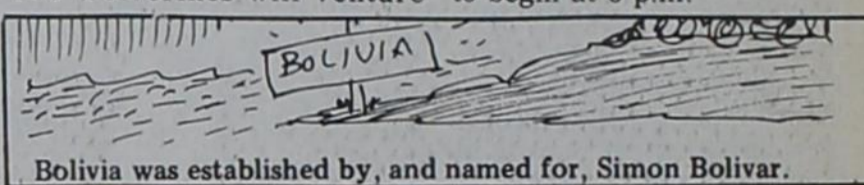
In commenting on defensive play Booth said, "We just can't gripe. There were just not enough points on the scoreboard."

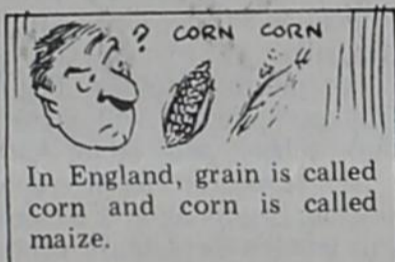

PUMPKIN PIE

- 3 c. pumpkin
3/4 c. white sugar
3/4 c. brown sugar
2 1/2 t. allspice
1 t. cinnamon
2 1/2 t. nutmeg
2 1/2 t. ginger
4 eggs
1 large can evaporated milk
1/2 c. milk
Blend sugar, spices and salt together. Add beaten eggs, pumpkin and milk. Blend well.

GINGERBREAD

- Cream:
1 c. sugar
2 eggs
1/2 c. shortening
1/2 c. sorghum syrup
Add 2 1/2 teaspoons each ginger and cinnamon to 2 cups flour.

1 can great northern beans
1 can cut green beans
1 can cut yellow wax beans
1 can garbanzo beans
Drain in colander 30 minutes
ADD:
1 c. chopped onions
1 c. salad oil
1 c. vinegar
1 c. sugar
2 t. salt
1 t. celery seed
1 t. black pepper
Marinate one hour, but better if left overnight. Will keep several weeks in the refrigerator.

The mixture of fresh ground beef contains textured soy protein in a blend of 75 percent beef and 25 percent soy. The cost is approximately 22 cents less per pound than regular ground beef.

'The nutritional value of the blend matches quality of the meat alone,' Miss Garrett says. 'Additional nutrition may be obtained by ingredients used in preparation.'

'Soy protein actually improves meat dishes because it helps reduce shrinking. Natural meat juices, water, and fat are retained better and this helps improve texture and flavor.'

Consumers should not fear the beef-soy product because it is new, says the specialist, noting the widespread use of soy products in shortings, salad and cooking oils, mar-

garines, mayonnaise, salad dressing, and frozen desserts.

Valued for centuries in the Orient, the soybean was long neglected in the Western world. It is considered the most nutritious plant food known, according to the specialist.

Into a bowl, mix ground beef and soy protein, seasonings, dry milk, oatmeal, onion, egg, catsup, and water. Stir well. Shape or lightly pack mixture into a baking pan. Spread catsup on top. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.), 45 minutes to 1 hour. Pour off excess fat. Serve hot, or slice cold for sandwiches. 8-10 generous servings

It's also expensive to mistreat it. Proper care and maintenance play important roles in conservation of resources-by avoiding unnecessary breakdowns, repairs and expenses.

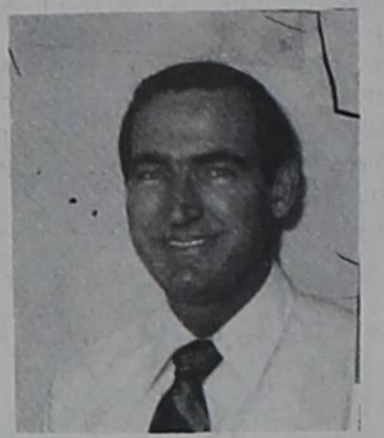

Dr. Hardage is currently serving as head of the physical education department at Wayland Baptist College. He is also head track coach for the Plainview school.

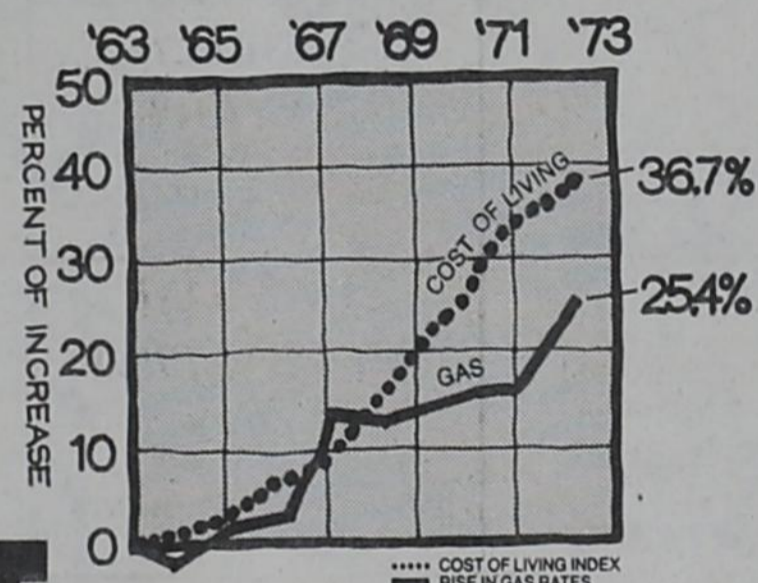
