Name Officers - -

Texico Planning Major Community Improvement

Chosen to lead the Texico Community Planning Commission during the coming year are A. D. McDonald, president; Bill Thigpen, vice president and Alma Hendrix,

secretary. They were elected during a meeting of the TCPC members Monday night.

Main topic of discussion during the meeting was the work presently underway remodeling the Texico Community building and funds needed to complete the project.

Outgoing president Jim Pierce reported approximately \$4,000 on hand with an estimated \$13,000 needed to complete the remodeling process. Estimates on mechanical, which includes two bathrooms, two air conditioners, heating facilities, a water heater and remodeling the kitchen would be around \$5,000. A new floor, lowering the ceiling and other general repairs are expected to be about \$5,000-\$6,000 and electrical repairs and wiring is estimated to be around \$1,600-\$1,700.

The estimated cost is all for supplies as all labor is being donated for the remodeling process.

Pierce reported that remodeling of the building, which is the only building large enough in Texico to hold dinners, meetings, receptions and other functions of varied organizations, is expected to be completed as soon as funds are made available to purchase necessary building supplies.

"We need a continuing supply of funds coming in to replace funds as they are spent on the building," he told TCPC members, "and a number of organizations have indicated an interest in helping with fund-raising projects."

Tabled was a decision on who will be in charge of leasing the building when remodeling is completed.

Andres Sammul, who is with

Eastern Plains Planning Commission of Clovis, said a speaker from the State Department of Development would be available for the December meeting of the TCPC to discuss the potential for industrial development in Texico.

He will discuss how to attract industry and what the Department of Development can do for the Texico community.

Sammul said the speaker is a former plant manager and should have an interesting and informative talk ready for the planning commission.

The names of three appraisers for the park site in Texico have been submitted to Santa officials, according to a report, and one appraiser will be chosen.

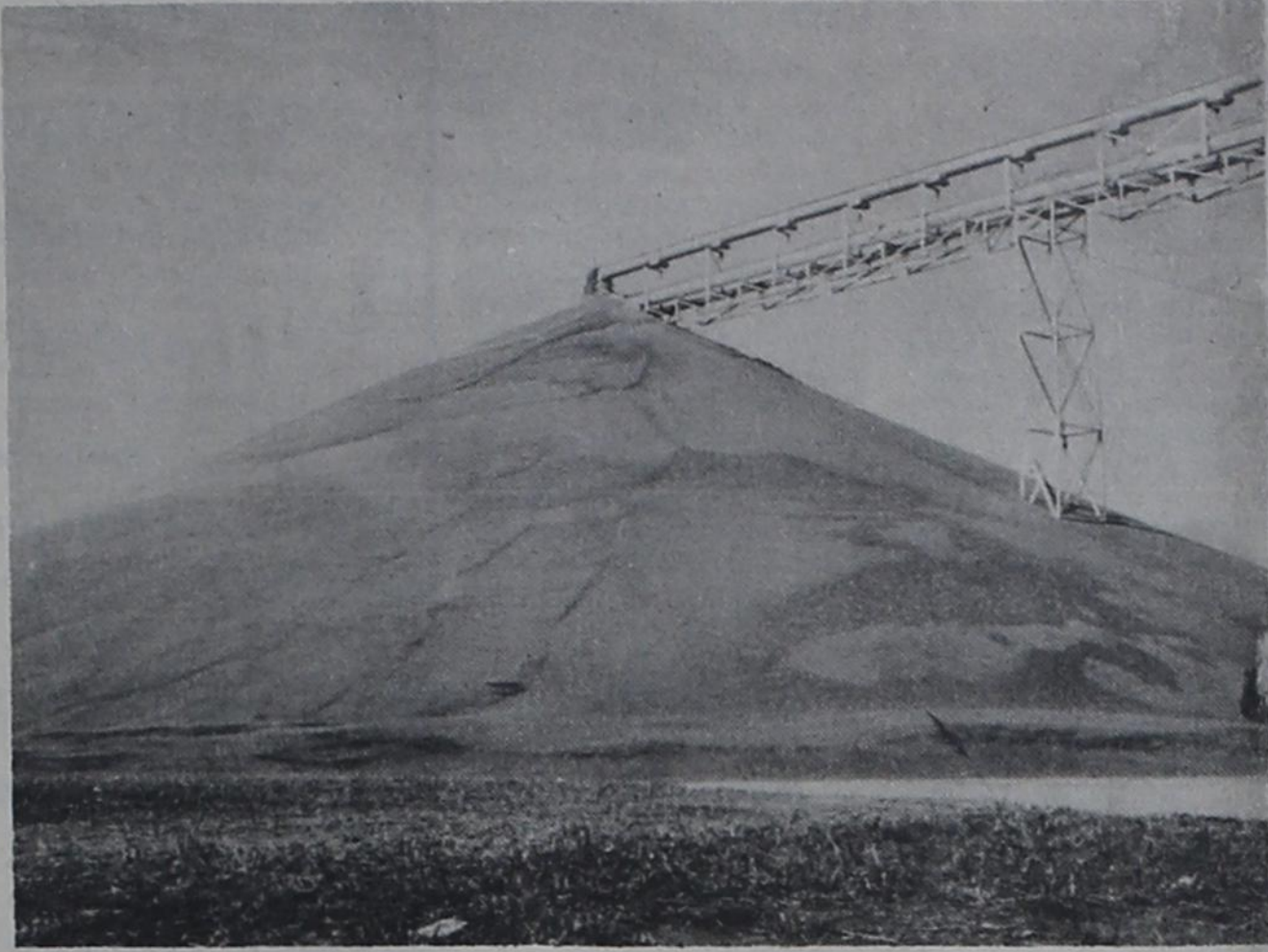
Bill Christian reported that an option on the park land has been signed and dirt fill is expected to begin in the lake area in the near future.

Sammul reported that Texico is ready to begin Extra-territorial zoning and six names were proposed to study and prepare the tentative plans for study by the city board of trustees prior to a public meeting.

Future activities and plans for senior citizens occupied much time during the meeting. Preliminary plans were mapped out to access the needs of senior citizens in the Texico area and decide on entertainment and other benefits for the senior citizens.

The possibility of a building, luncheons, breakfasts, arts and craft classes and other forms of entertainment were discussed with no concrete plans being formulated during the meeting.

Members are being accepted in Texico Community Planning Commission to help with long-range planning for the Texico area development.

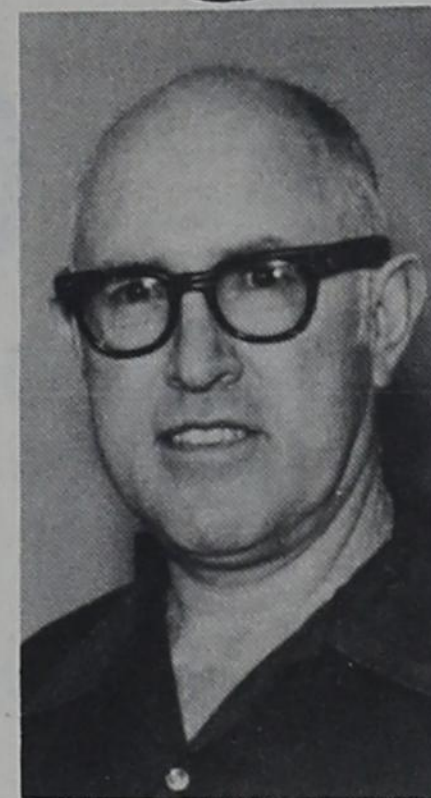
A native of Flomont, he was a graduate of Texas Tech University, Lubbock and served as an Army Medical First Lieutenant in World War II.

362 Vote For Amendments

Only 362 of the estimated 3,900 plus registered voters went to the polls in the entire county Tuesday to vote on nine proposed constitutional amendments. Parmer County voters approved amendments two and three by a large margin and narrowly approved amendment five.

This followed a statewide trend where only a 'light' vote was recorded.

In Farwell, 88 persons voted; Friona, 125; Bovina, 56; Lazbuddie, 39; Rhea, 16; Black, 11; Oklahoma Lane, 20 and Lakeview, 6.

The vote went this way: Amendment 1: For 122, Against, 232; Amendment Two: For 258, Against 96; Amendment Three: For 243, Against, 117; Amendment Four: For 148, Against, 190; Amendment Five: For 181, Against 159; Amendment Six: For 86, Against 256; Amendment Seven: For 154, Against 179; Amendment Eight: For 124, Against 227; Amendment Nine: For 153, Against 193.

All polling places approved proposed amendments two and three by a wide margin, with only Farwell, Friona, Rhea, Oklahoma Lane and Lakeview approving proposed amendment five by a narrow margin to squeak it by for approval in Parmer County.

Damage Heavy - -

Vandals Hit Texico Churches

Texico City Marshal Willie Ronquillo has issued a warning to vandals who have been shooting out church windows and church signs in Texico.

Apparently using b-b guns, the vandals shot out a number of windows in the First Baptist Church and Assembly of God Church in Texico.

Marshal Ronquillo said, "According to Texico City Ordinance Number 127, b-b guns are prohibited in the city limits

of Texico. "Anyone caught shooting a b-b gun in the city limits will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law."

Approximately \$300 in damage was inflicted to the sign at the Assembly of God Church and b-b's were also shot through windows of a car parked at a home across the street from the church.

At the First Baptist Church, some 14 windows had been

broken, all apparently shot out.

The city marshal has asked that anyone seeing b-b guns being used in Texico call the city police department or call him at home.

Last Monday, Guadalupe Rodriguez of Friona was picked up and charged with wreckless driving and hit and run after he allegedly hit an automobile owned by George Martinez of Farwell and leaving the scene.

He paid a fine of \$200.

Also last week, fire totaled out a motorcycle owned by Walter Kenemore of Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis. The fire occurred in Texico.

"If elected treasurer, I pledge to serve the people of Parmer County to the best of my ability." Pd. Pol. Adv.

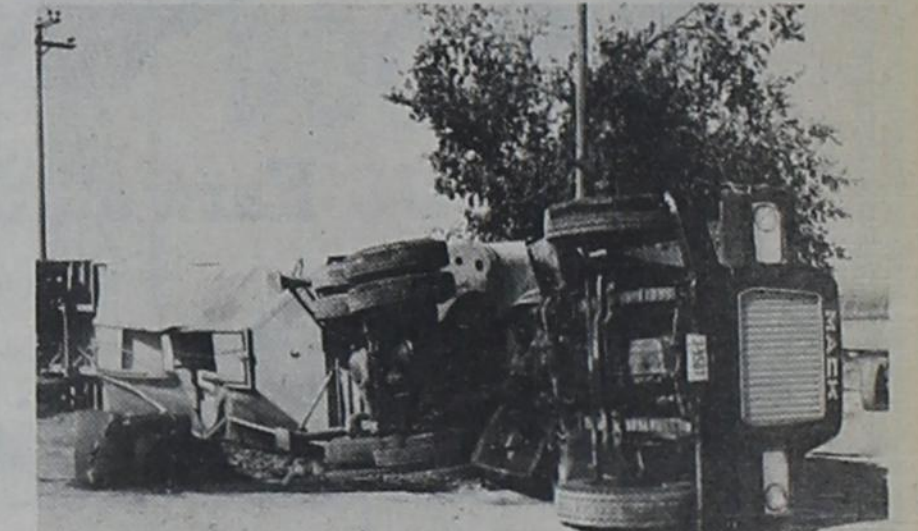

Pallbearers will be Jack Gilleen, Bill Hudson, Jim Walker, Chuck Bradley, Pete Harrison and J. B. Taylor.

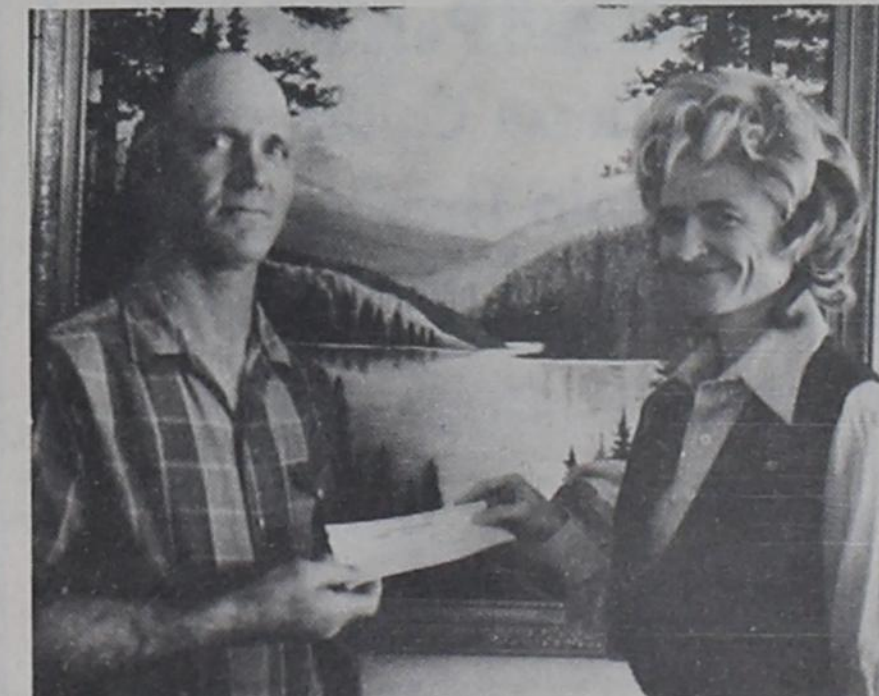

Wolves Wrap Up Season With District Win

 Texico's Wolverine football team closed out their 1973-74 season with a happy face last Friday night as they shut out the Roy Longhorns 44-0 in Wolverine Stadium.

The clash was a district game and the Wolves wound up their season with a two and one district record and second place in district behind the first place Vaughn Eagles.

The Wolverines received the opening kickoff and after a fine drive against the Longhorns fullback Sammy West got a first down to the Roy 42-yard-line. After this first, the Wolverines were stopped by the Roy defense and punted. The Longhorns fumbled on their first play and linebacker Jimmy Ortiz recovered on the 25-yard-line. The Wolverines were again stopped by the 'Horns and punted to the Roy 5-yard-line. After a drive to the Wolverine 41, a Roy back fumbled and the Wolves were there to recover. On the first play for the Green and White, a Wolverine player handed the ball right back to the Longhorns when he fumbled on the Wolverine 43-yard-line.

After no drive by the 'Horns, the ball was soon punted to the Wolverines. Quarterback Curtis Lindley made a good move and ran all the way to the Roy 30 and West got a first down when he ran to the 12. Halfback Tommy Galvan gave another first down to the Wolves when he scrambled to the 3-yard-line. After this drive by Texico's offense West made it all worthwhile when he crossed the goal line from the

Texico Wolverine Jr. High football team played their last game of the 1973-74 season Oct. 27 when they hosted the Tatum Coyotes. The Wolverines overpowered the Coyotes by a score of 14-6.
 According to Jr. High Coach, Kenneth Shaw, "The Jr. Wolverines played an outstanding game against Tatum."
 Arthur Salguero, quarterback for the juniors, threw 12 passes and completed nine; one to fullback Joe West who ran for a TD. Salguero made

three to put the Wolverines in front 6-0. Lindley kept the ball and scored the conversion points to make the score 8-0.
 After the Wolverine kickoff, the Roy offense started on their own 38 but soon punted to Texico. The two teams had a series of punt exchanges before the half came to an end.
 The Wolverines came back all fired up in the third quarter and had the Longhorns in a tough third and thirteen situation deep in their own territory. The Longhorn quarterback tried a pass but West intercepted and ran all the way in from the 24-yard-line for his second TD of the night to gather up six more points for Texico. Galvan made the extra points and the Wolverines extended their lead to 16-0.

The Wolves kicked off once again to the Roy 19-yard-line. Roger Pace, tackle, stopped the Roy offense twice behind the line and Roy had a third and eleven situation. Jeff Brown, tackle, also stopped the Roy QB behind the line and Roy was forced to punt. Texico soon started another drive with Lindley gathering a first to Roy's 20. After more forward progress by the Wolverine offense Galvan took it in from the four for another Wolverine TD. Extra point attempt was also good and Texico led 24-0.

After the Wolverine kick, hard luck struck the Longhorns again when linebacker Craig Chumley intercepted a Roy pass and ran to the 37-yard-line. Soon West once again was across the goal line with 9:40 left in the fourth quarter. Lindley made the PAT and

the other score when he ran a keeper. West made the PAT for Texico.
 Coach Shaw also stated that he was real proud with the way the freshmen have played all year. The 7th and 8th graders also played fine football and gained a lot of experience for next year's schedule, according to Shaw.
 Statistics show the Wolverines with a total of 72 points to their opponent's 48 points for the year.
 Texico's Jr. Wolves wound

up the season with a four win, two loss, record. Both losses were to Ft. Sumner, said Coach Shaw.
 Texico went farther ahead 32-0. Texico kicked off and Roy was again stunned by the Wolverine front four defensive linemen and punted to Texico. The Wolverines had pushed to the Roy 16 when Galvan broke loose to the four before being brought down. Wallace gathered up the remaining four yards for another Wolverine TD to change the score to 38-0. The Wolverine PAT was no good.

With five minutes left in the game, the Wolves kicked off to Roy. As the game came near to an end, the Wolverine defense got tougher and held the Longhorns to only a few yards of forward progress. After a Roy punt, Wallace ran the ball back to the 21-yard-line. On the first play, the Wolverines were given a fifteen-yard penalty for offensive holding and were put deep in their own territory.

The Wolverines still came on strong as Wallace advanced to the Roy 33-yard-line and a Wolverine first down. Texico progressed to the Roy six before halfback Spencer Turner took the pignisk the rest of the way for a TD. Turner's score put the Wolves farther in front with a 44-0 lead with 1:49 left in the game. The Wolverine PAT failed and the score remained 44-0 when the final buzzer sounded to end the contest.

Texico Head Coach Bucky Walters said the Wolverines took the Roy team too lightly in the first half but "we decided to go in the second half."

According to Walters, the defensive secondary did a fine

job all night and the defensive linemen did a good job in the second half.

Walters commended Eugene Wallace for "playing real well on defense and offense." The coach commented, "Wallace did a fine job at the halfback position." Craig Chumley, offensive center and defensive linebacker has done a great job all year, according to the coach. Roger Pace and Jeff Brown, defensive tackles, also did an outstanding job at their positions the coach stated.

Remain Undefeated

Longhorns Trample Farwell Steers 39-0

The Farwell Steers just couldn't get it all together last Friday night when the Vega Longhorns handed the Steers a 39-0 defeat during action in Steer Stadium.

During the first quarter of action Farwell's Steers were able to hold the Longhorns down. The Steer offense gained access to its touchdown territory but all was lost when a Steer fumble to end the drive.

Scoring was opened early in the second quarter by a Longhorn on a three yard run for the first touchdown of the night. The Longhorn's kick for extra point was unsuccessful and the scoreboard read 6-0 with 8:32 remaining in the first half.

Farwell Steer Mike Woods took the Vega kickoff and returned it to the Farwell 21 before being halted. On the first and 10 play to Winfred Long the Longhorns racked up a five yard penalty to give the Steers a first and five situation. Kevin Hargrove gained five yards on the next play followed by a first down by Woods. On a third and 11 situation quarterback Hargrove's attempted pass was intercepted by Vega and returned to the Farwell 18-yard-line. Vega's Jim Davis managed to gain a first down at the Steer 2-yard-line and came back on the next play to gain the endzone. PAT run for Vega was good and the Steers dropped farther behind, 14-0.

Vega's kickoff was returned by Woods to the Farwell 24. Unable to gain enough yardage for a first down the Steers were forced to punt. After three plays which took Vega to the Farwell 36-yard-line Vega was handed a five yard penalty to give them a first and 15. Two plays later Vega's quarterback Arnold Gilbreath connected on a pass play for their third TD of the night with 1:13 remaining in the half. PAT failed and Vega maintained their lead at 20-0.

On their first play after the third quarter opening kickoff a Longhorn was dropped by Long for a four yard loss. On the second down play, Gilbreath connected with Davis for a gain of 14 yards. Third down pass attempt was foiled by Steer Greg Taylor and Farwell gained possession on a punt only to return the punt six plays later. Vega managed to gain three first downs in their next four series of plays with their drive being aided by a Farwell five yard offside penalty. On a third and goal to go from the Farwell three Gilbreath crossed into the endzone to give the Longhorns another six points and a 26-0 lead. PAT run by the Horns failed with Gene Christian credited with breaking up the play.

Following Vega's kickoff Farwell fumbled on a third down play but recovered the ball on the Vega 26 for a first down and gained another first down on a pass to Rudy Rodriguez. Vega grabbed a pass from Farwell on the second down with goal to go from the eight. On their second first down play of the series Vega once again crossed the mark for six making the tally 32-0. PAT was good and Vega led 33-0.

Jack Foster returned Vega's kickoff to the Farwell 32 but four plays later Farwell was forced to punt. Vega capitalized on the knocked down punt and ran for their final TD. PAT failed and Vega had widened their margin to 39-0 with 7:44 left on the clock.

Neither team was able to attain the endzone to add any more points to the scoreboard and the final buzzer sounded with the Steers taking their eighth loss of the season 39-0.

"During the first quarter we played fine football but we should have scored more," commented Farwell Head Coach Toby Booth regarding last Friday's clash. "Other

than a couple of mistakes we played good defensive ball," he added.

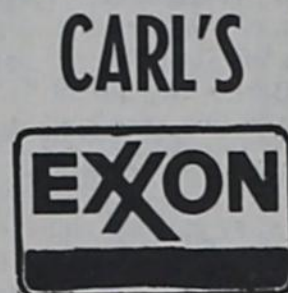

The Yearlings were to play their final game of the season

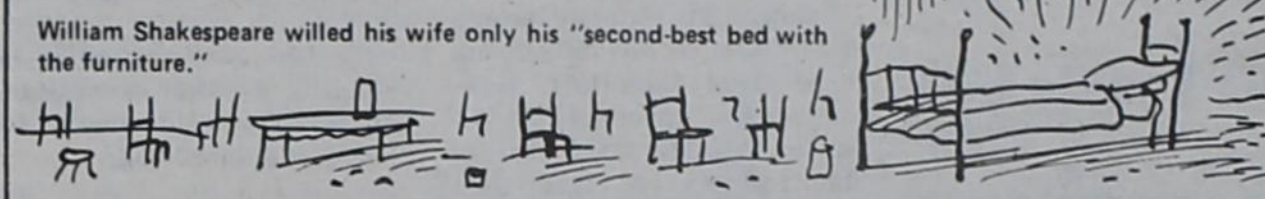

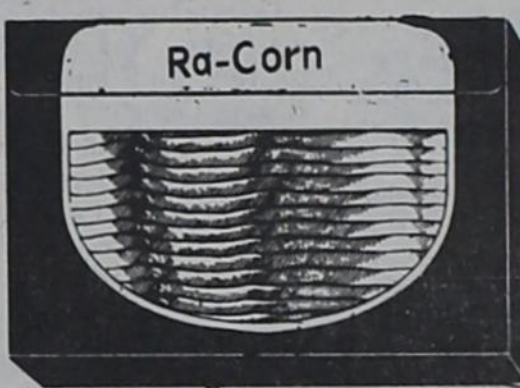

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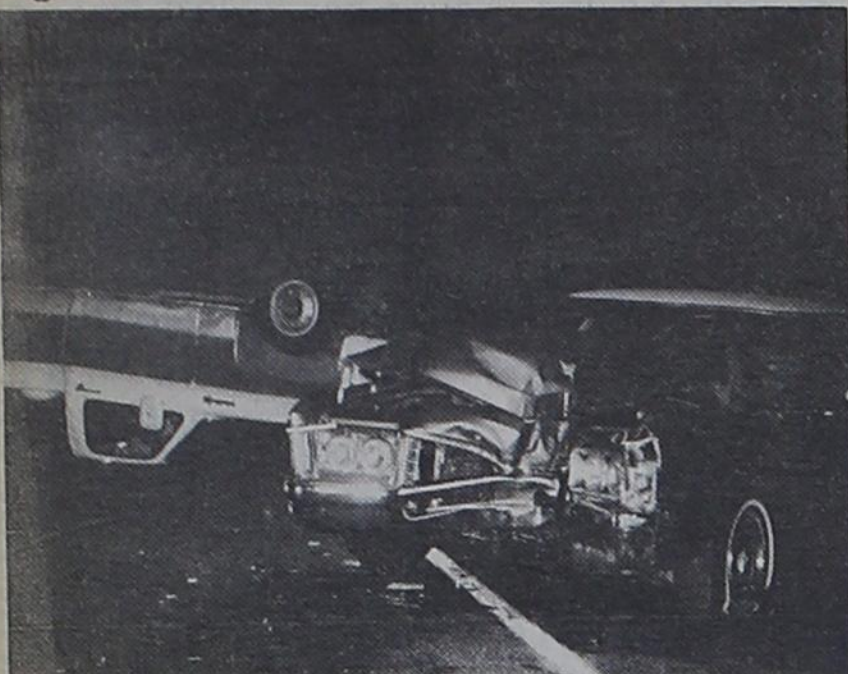

On The Farm In Parmet County

Sure, everyone knows that agriculture is big business in Texas! But just how big is it? With November designated as Food and Fiber Appreciation Month in the state, now is a good time to take a brief look at the bigness of Texas Agriculture.

First of all, agriculture in all its phases -- agribusiness -- adds more than \$10 billion to the Texas economy each year. Agribusiness provides employment for about 30 per cent of the state's labor force.

Of the state's 168 million acres of land area, 142 million are devoted to agriculture. Realized gross farm income in 1972 totaled \$4.7 billion, up 13 per cent from 1971. However, farm production expenses totaled \$3.8 billion, almost 23 per cent higher than in 1971. This left realized net income 19 per cent below that of 1971, but a boost in farm inventories brought total net farm income up 28 per cent over that in 1971.

Texas is the third leading state in total agricultural cash receipts behind California and Iowa. However, it leads the country in producing cotton, grain sorghum and rice and is the top cattle producer. Texas also leads in the production of sheep and wool, goats and mohair.

The state is also a leader in other enterprises: --Fourth in agricultural exports, leading in cotton and rice exports and second in hides, tallow and meat products. --Second in peanut production. --Third in vegetable production, leading in cabbage, watermelon and spinach and second in onions, carrots and cantaloupes. --Second in grapefruit production and third in oranges. --First in native pecans and third in total production. --Third in the number of honey bee colonies. --Among the top 10 dairy states. --First in horse numbers. --A leading state in poultry and eggs. --A leading state in fish farming.

These are just a few of the things that Texas is noted for on the agricultural scene. Agriculture continues to grow and to become more diversified, and it must do so to meet the ever-increasing demands for high quality food and fiber products.

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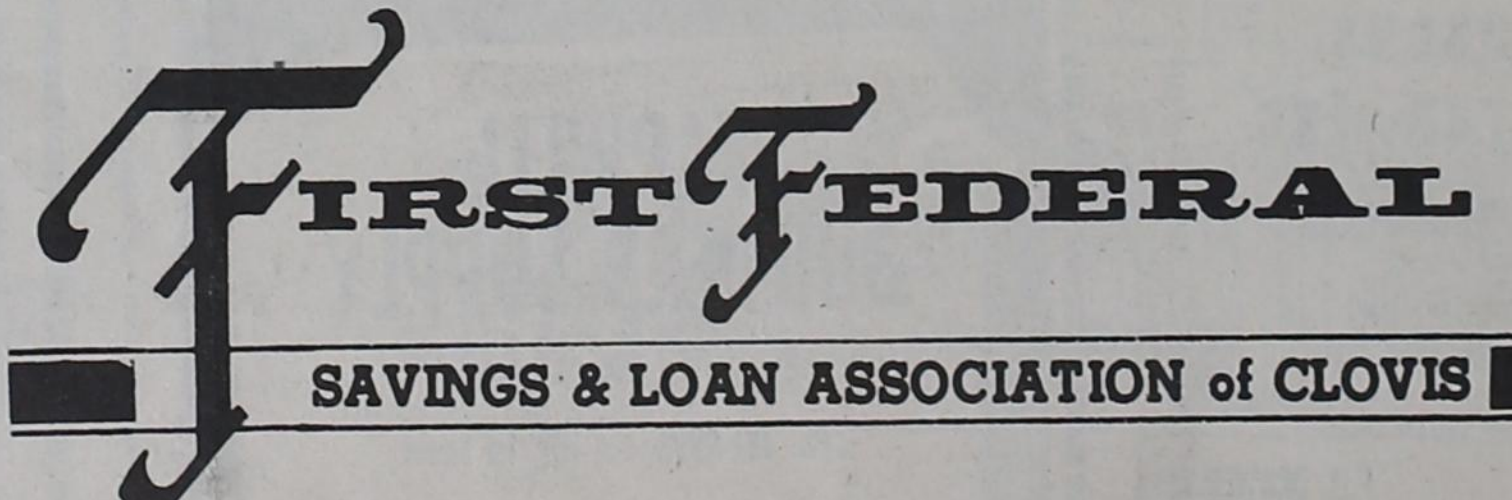
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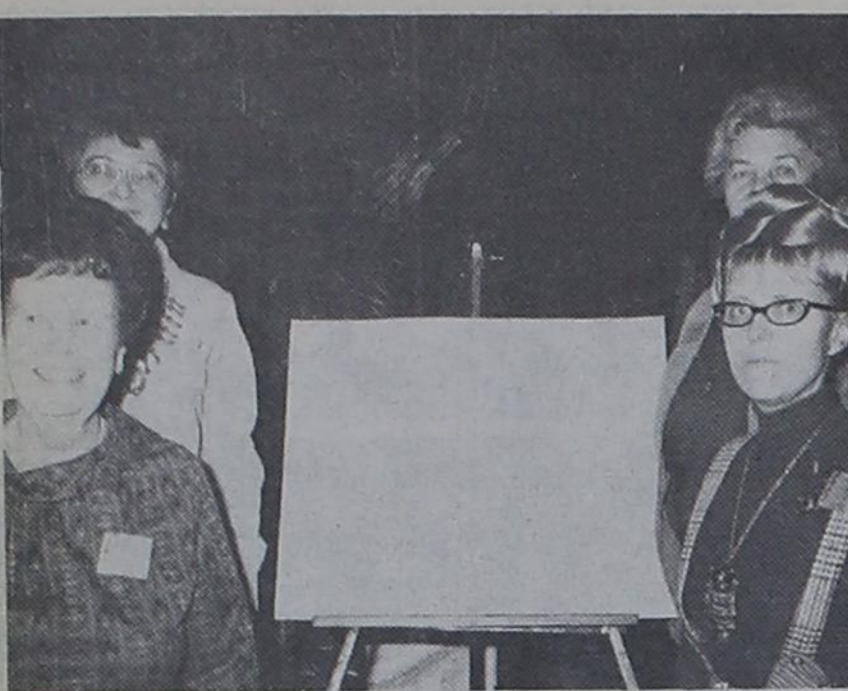

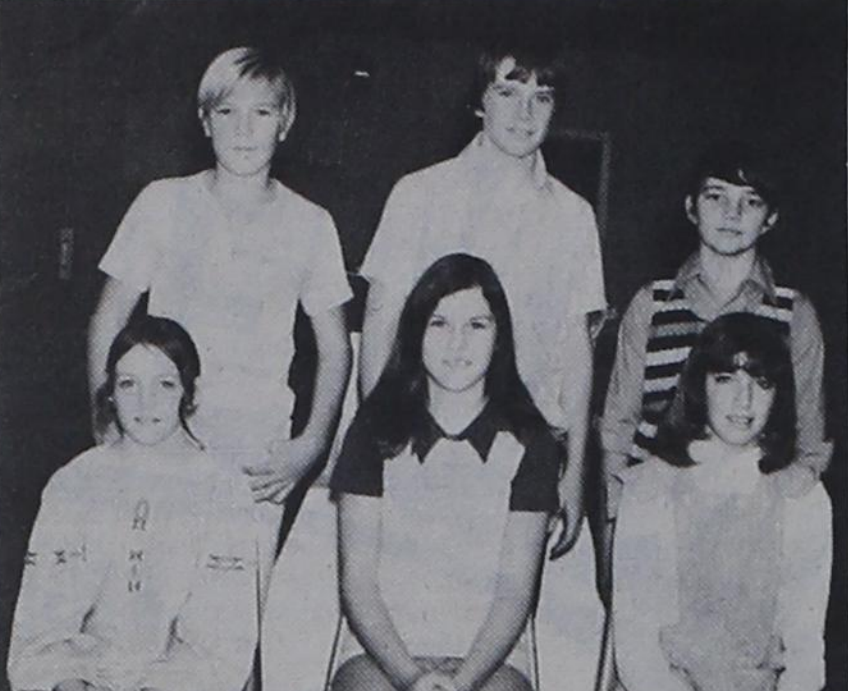
Farwell Duet Competes For Homecoming Queen

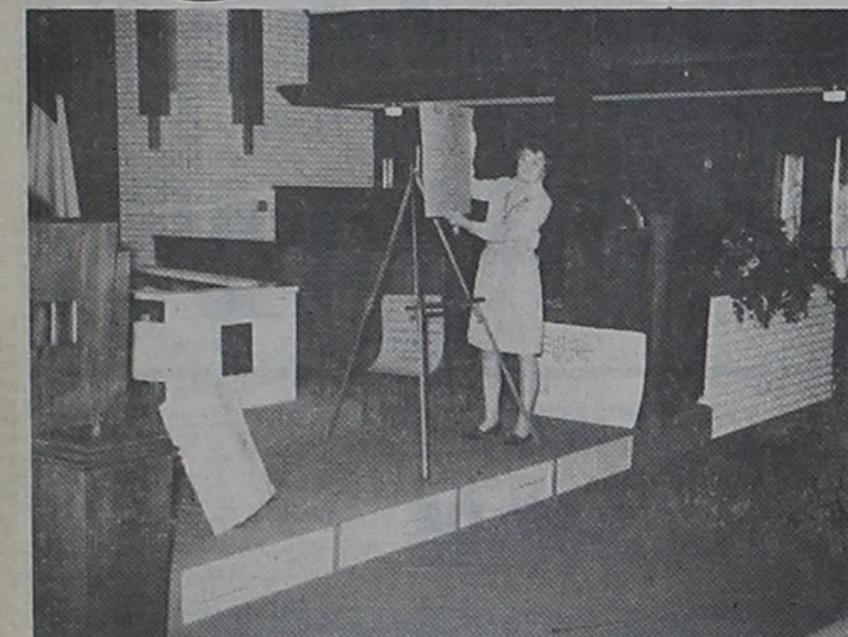

Farwell, Texico Bands To Parade

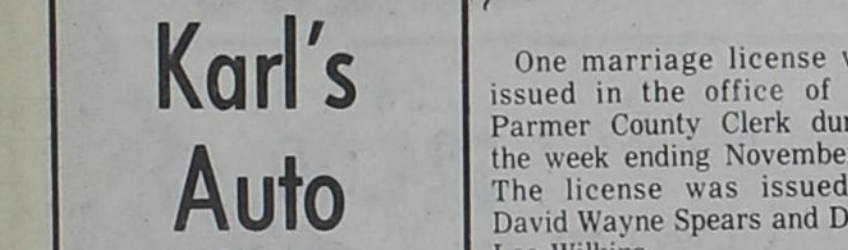

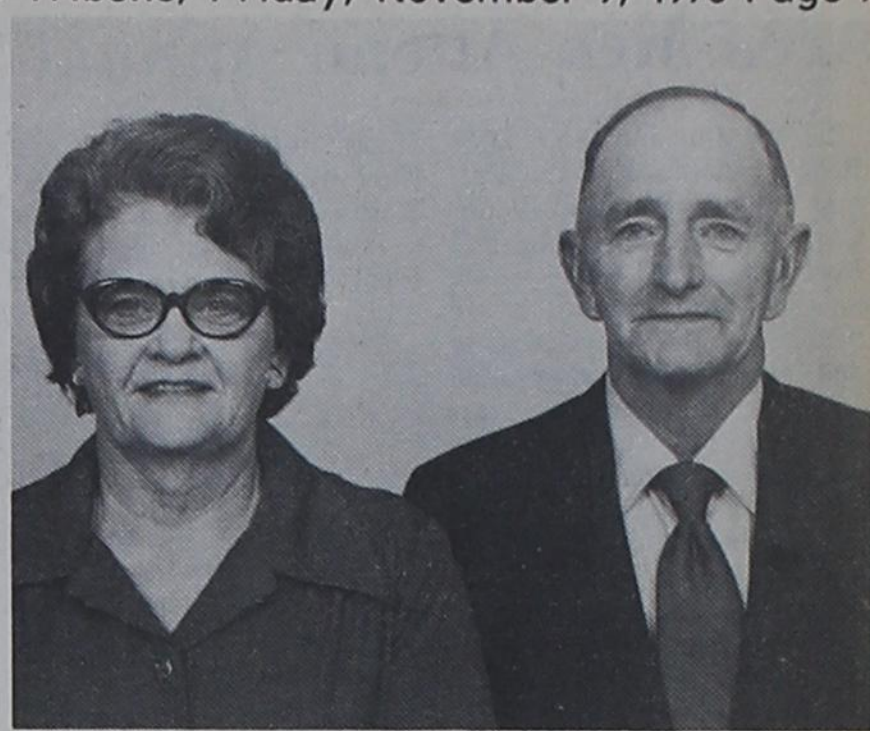

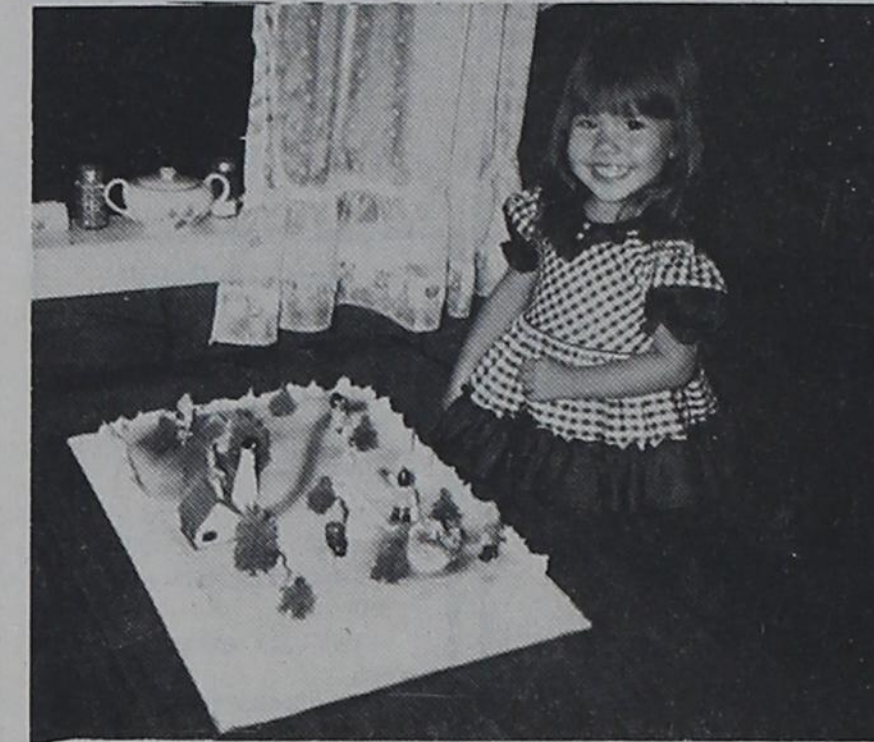

The coach concluded, "We

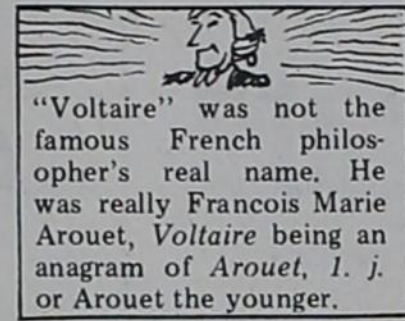

Final Weekend For Crane Hunt

Saturday and Sunday will be the final weekend this year for the Eleventh Annual Sandhill Crane Hunt sponsored by the Muleshoe Jaycees. Jaycees report a good response the first two weekends of the annual hunt on land adjacent to the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge.

The Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge is the oldest in the State of Texas, and during winter months, as many as 100,000 sandhill cranes can be found wintering at the refuge, away from their Arctic breeding grounds. The Muleshoe population represents the largest concentration of this species in the United States.
