

The drive for pure air in this country has also been a drive toward inflation. A prime reason behind the sharp rise of most everything we are buying new is the added cost to industry of anti-pollution de-

Industry has had to use what would normally be their reserve funds for production expansion for the installation of anti-pollution devices that do not add to productive capa-city. This has led to a situation where per unit costs have gone up with no increase in production to offset these costs. Therefore, these costs have been passed along to the party who ultimately always pays - THE CONSUMER.

In addition to driving up the cost of goods produced in the United States, it has also left us vulnerable to the caprices of foreign producers. Newsprint is a good example of this. The cost of putting many paper producing plants in the United States in line with pure air standards was deemed prohibitive, so, much of our domestic production has shut down and Canada has become the source of the bulk of newsprint used in the United States. Now, the Canadian mills have raised the price of their print to United States consumers by over 40% since just last spring. The price to their own Canadian users has only been raised by some 20%. Whout the protection of the Fost of Living Council, domestic consumers are at the mercy of foreign interests.

This extraordinary rise in printing costs, coupled with all the other things we use has forced local newspapers into price raises heretofore unknown in the newspaper business. We at the Tribune have had to raise our subscriptions a dollar a year as well as our advertising rates by a dime a

they do. Considering inflation and its root causes, we must not forget the proliferating blizzard of paper work imposed in business. It is almost unbelievable the amount of hours spent by even the smallest business in preparing forms and reports for all levels of government octopus. All this costs money and it is part of every business cost of production that figures in the ultimate price in the market place.

With this in mind, we have developed an idea to wipe out the Federal Government's' huge debt in a simple and expeditious manner that will not raise current tax rates.


Let a task force of paper work experts reduce the flood of forms to a reasonable trickle and let business keep the profit derived thereby so the good old Internal Revenue Service can levy its tax bite thereon. With the dramatic increase in profits, the tax man would double his take in no time. 

362 Vote For **Amendments**

Only 362 of the estimated 3,900 plus registered voters went to the polls in the entire county Tuesday to vote on nine proposed constitutional amendments. Parmer County voters approved amendments two and three by a large margin and narrowly approved amendment five.

This followed a statewide trend where only a 'light' vote was recorded.

In Farwell, 88 persons voted; Friona, 125; Bovina, 56; Lazbuddie, 39; Rhea, 16; Black, 11; Oklahoma Lane, 20 and Lakeview, 6.

The vote went this way: Amendment 1: For 122, Against, 232; Amendment Two: For 258, Against 96; Amendment Three: For 243, Against, 117; Amendment Four: For 148, Against, 190; Amendment Five: For 181, Against 159; Amendment Six: For 86, Against 256; Amendment Seven: For 154, Against 179: Amendment Eight: For 124, Against 227; Amendment Nine: For 153, Against



Wolves Wrap Up Season With District Win

Final Game - -

Texico's Wolverine football team closed out their 1973-74 schedule with a happy face last Friday night as they shut out the Roy Longhorns 44-0 in Wolverine Stadium.

The clash was a district game and the Wolves wound up their season with a two and one district record and second place in district behind the first place Vaughn Eagles.

The Wolverines received the opening kickoff and after a fine drive against the Longhorns fullback Sammy West got a first down to the Roy 42-yard-line. After this first, the Wolverines were stopped by the Roy defense and punted. The Longhorns fumbled on their first play and linebacker Jimmy Ortiz recovered on the 25-yardline. The Wolverines were again stopped by the 'Horns and punted to the Roy 5-yardline. After a drive to the Wolverine 41, a Roy back fumbled and the Wolves were there to recover. On the first play for the Green and White, a Wolverine player handed the ball right back to the Longhorns when he fumbled on the Wolverine 43-yard-line.

After no drive by the 'Horns, the ball was soon punted to the Wolverines. Quarterback Curtis Lindley made a good move and ran all the way to the Roy 30 and West got a first down when he ran to the 12. Halfback Tommy Galvan gave another first down to the Wolves when he scrambled to the 3-yard-line. After this drive by Texico's offense West made it all worthwhile when he crossed the goal line from the

points to make the score 8-0. After the Wolverine kickoff, the Roy offense started on their own 38 but soon punted to Texico. The two teams had a series of punt exchanges before the half came to an end.

The Wolverines came back all fired up in the third quarter and had the Longhorns in a tough third and thirteen situation deep in their own territory. The Longhorn quarterback tried a pass but West intercepted and ran all the way in from the 24-yard-line for his second TD of the night to gather up six more points for Texico. Galvan made the extra points and the Wolverines extended their lead to 16-0.

The Wolves kicked off once again to the Roy 19-yard-line. Roger Pace, tackle, stopped the Roy offense twice behind the line and Roy had a third and eleven situation. Jeff Brown, tackle, also stopped the Roy QB behind the line and Roy was forced to punt. Texico soon started another drive with Lindley gathering a first to Roy's 20. After more forward progress by the Wolverine offense Galvan took it in from the four for another Wolverine TD. Extra point attempt was also good and Texico led 24-0.

After the Wolverine kick, hard luck struck the Longhorns again when linebacker Craig Chumley intercepted a Roy pass and ran to the 37-yardline. Soon West once again was across the goal line with 9:40 left in the fourth quarter. Lindley made the PAT and

Texico kicked off and Roy was again stunned by the Wolverine front four defensive

Texico progressed to the Roy six before halfback Spencer Turner took the pigskin the rest of the way for a TD. Turner's score put the Wolves farther in front with a 44-0 lead with 1:49 left in the game. The Wolverine PAT failed and the score remained 44-0 when the final buzzer sounded to end the







Longhorns Trample Farwell Steers 39-0

The Farwell Steers just couldn't get it all together last Friday night when the Vega Longhorns handed the Steers a 39-0 defeat during action in breath connected with Davis Steer Stadium.

During the first quarter of action Farwell's Steers were able to hold the Longhorns down. The Steer offense gained access to its touchdown territory but all was lost when a Steer fumble to end the drive.

Scoring was opened early in the second quarter by a Longhorn on a three yard run for the first touchdown of the night. The Longhorn's kick for extra point was unsuccessful and the scoreboard read 6-0 with 8:32 remaining in the first

Farwell Steer Mike Woods took the Vega kickoff and returned it to the Farwell 21 before being halted. On the first and 10 play to Winfred Long the Longhorns racked up a five yard penalty to give the Steers a first and five situation. Kevin Hargrove gained five yards on the next play followed by a first down by Woods. On a third and 11 situation quarterback Hargrove's attempted pass was intercetped by Vega and returned to the Farwell 18-yardline. Vega's Jim Davis managed to gain a first down at the Steer 2-yard-line and came back on the next play to gain the endzone. PAT run for Vega was good and the Steers dropped farther behind, 14-0.

Vega's kickoff was returned by Woods to the Farwell 24. Unable to gain enough yardage for a first down the Steers were forced to punt. After three plays which took Vega to the Farwell 36-yard-line Vega was handed a five yard penalty to give them a first and 15. Two plays later Vega's quarterback Arnold Gilbreath connected on a pass play for their third TD of the night with 1:13 remaining in the half. PAT failed and Vega maintained their lead at 20-0.




