Deaf Smith County led the list with a figure of \$181,000,000.00 This has been the relative placement of the counties for the last several years. Hale County latches onto second place, with Castro coming in after Parmer.

No doubt about it, the Texas Panhandle is a productive agricultural area.

With this tremendous contribution to the nation and the world's food basket, we cannot see how any sane person can say that the importation of water is not feasible. In fact, it appears to us as an absolute necessity for the years ahead. In 20 years the need for a deepwater oil importation port in the Gulf may have outlived its usefulness, but people will still be eating.

Well our advice is, buckle up neighbor, these falls come *around only once ever decade or so, and it will get better and better each year on the High Plains

Inflation it seems, is devaluating the language as well as

the dollar. Take the phrase "It's dirt cheap." Well, dirt's not so cheap anymore. Highway officials in Illinois report they paid 72 cents a cubic yard for dirt fill in 1972. Now it's at one dollar and 55 cents.

Or what about the phrase "chicken feed?" That traditionally denotes low cost. But chicken feed has doubled in price in the past two years.

And how about the American expression "It's not worth a continental?" Current inflation has pushed the 1776 Vintage Continental to \$40. Two years ago it was worth \$15.

And what about "Not worth the paper it's printed on?" Standard grade newsprint now costs about \$12 a hundredweight. Less than a year and a half ago it was \$8.50.

And if you're angry about something, you might say "It's not worth the powder to blow it up." But gunpowder prices have shot up 22 to 40 percent in the past year.

Bacon is commonly sold in one-pound shingle packages. However, it is available in two-pound packages or the smaller 12-ounce or half pound packages. When comparing prices, check the weight of the package.

Bacon is also sold unsliced, To meet this requirement, and usually with the skin not "slab bacon."

Some bacon buyers might be surprised to know that bacon comes from a pig's side that is processed in a special way. If Look at the representative you were able to buy meat from a pork side that hadn't gone through this special process, you would be buying what is called "fresh side pork," and it would taste like other fresh pork cuts rather



The population analysis projection will include figures on how many persons will move into Farwell each year, and a goal set of, for example, two percent per year. The housing study will delve into handling persons who live in sub-standard housing and cannot afford any better.

The comprehensive plan will discuss overhauling the city law enforcement system There is overwhelming sentiment among Farwell residents for a city police system.

The plan will be a total concept of municipal and residential growth, according to Farwell Mayor Gil Patschke. It will include city needs and desires and will offer recommendations in zoning, including mobile home parks, apartments, residential areas, etc.

"We are real pleased with the response," commented Mayor Patschke.

Ferguson captured the Governor and Lieutenant Governor race; however, Texico voters cast 141 votes for the Republican team of Joseph R. Skeen and Virgil O. Rhodes. Apodaca and Ferguson took 68 votes, and American Independent team Gene Gonzales and M. A. (Woody) Woodburn took 2

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

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
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
